## Courthouse turns 100

Kinney County will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of its courthouse on Tuesday, March 22 at 2pm.

Section eight, Page ten of the National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet reads, "Although Kinney County was growing, and the railroad connected it to larger cities both east and west, the area retained the feeling of a 'wild west' town. An enlisted man station at Fort Clark in 1889 painted Brackettville as a raucous frontier town in an article for the New Your Herald Tribune: 'Adjacent to Ft. Clark, across a narrow stream dignified by the name of Las Moras River, was Brackettville, a nondescript frontier town, ten miles from the railroad, County seat of Kinney County and about the worst place on the map. Everything ever pictured in the 'movies' of the wild west kind was there, and lots more. The population was some 500, mostly Mexicans. Saloons were on every corner and plenty in between. Dance halls, brothels - let your imagination run riot and you may approximate what this town was in those hectic days...there were several kinds of dances indulged in that are not seen on stage or ballroom floor. There was cheap liquor,

cards, all kinds of gambling, women and no legal restraint."

A description of that kind definitely supported the commissioners desire to build a larger courthouse in 1891.

"Expansion of the army post at Fort Clark led to the subsequent growth of the town. This growth was not all peaceful Brackettville held many time more saloons than churches. The courthouse served a significant role in reversing this situation. The level of peacekeeping activity made it necessary for the county to expand current quarters or build a new courthouse. The "Brackett News" of 1891, published a request for pros and cons regarding the new courthouse, from taxpayers and others with an interest in their town and county," read Architegas' history of Kinney County.

The courthouse construction was deemed complete on March 22, 1911 by Judge Joe Veltmann and Precinct 1 Commissioner N. Castro, Precinct 2 Commissioner Albert Schwander, Precinct 3 Commissioner R.E. Cannon and Precinct 4 Commissioner J.F. McCormick.

The cost for construction was \$44,500 and another \$1,950 was spent on furnishings, including benches still being used in the courthouse today.

Current Kinney County Judge Tim Ward and commissioners Pat

Melancon, Joe Montalvo, Woody Massingill and Dennis Dodson invite the public to join in the Centennial Celebration on Tuesday, March 22, at 2 p.m.

History of the courthouse and the plans for its restoration and preservation will be presented.

## Teens busted with booze; EMS finds bag of pot

Five juveniles were busted with booze after a Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Officer pulled them over in front of the Kinney County EMS Station on March 10.

At around 8:30 in the evening, the DPS officer found the group of teens to be intoxicated or in possession of alcoholic beverages and proceeded to charge the juvenile driver with driving while intoxicated and cited the four passengers with minor in possession offenses. The driver was not processed in Kinney County. The passengers were ticketed and released to the custody of their parents. The vehicle was towed away by Del Rio Towing.

Later the same evening, the Kinney County Sheriff's Department received a call from a county EMS employee requesting a deputy's assistance at the station. The employee was cleaning up the area in front of the EMS station and found a bag of marijuana.

A deputy was dispatched to the scene and took the bag to the Sheriff's Department for processing.

Kinney County Sheriff LK Buddy Burgess said Wednesday, he did not know if the two incidents were related.

## Electrical fire destroys hunting camp

A cloud of smoke rising into the air on March 12, produced more than emergency call to the Kinney County Sheriff's Department (KCSO).

County residents from Fort Clark and Spofford reported seeing black smoke south of Spofford.

The KCSO dispatch record states Fire Rescue was paged to the Cononly Ranch on Standart Lane at 3:49 p.m. last Saturday.

Kinney County Sheriff LK Buddy Burgess said two travel trailers and a vehicle at a hunting camp were destroyed. Burgess also said preliminary reports from an area arson investigator are that the cause of the fire is believed to have been from an electrical malfunction.

The fire was recorded under control at 5:50 p.m.

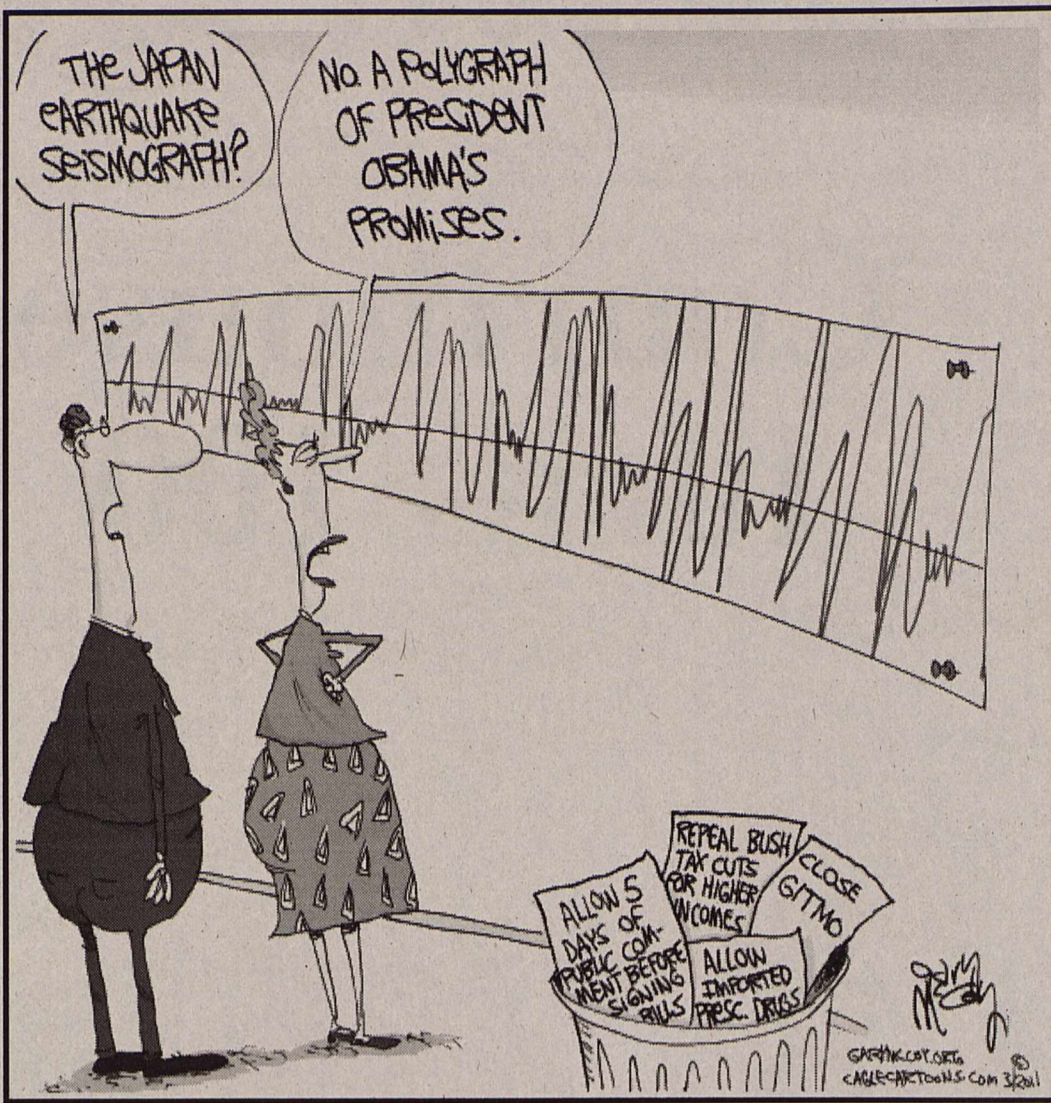

## Looking for Income? Consider Premium Bonds

As an investor, you want your money to grow so that you can achieve your important goals, such as a comfortable retirement or college for your children. But you may also invest to increase your cash flow. In fact, without a strong cash flow, you may be forced to dip into your growth-oriented investments to pay for short-term needs — and if you do this repeatedly, you could damage your prospects for attaining your long-term goals. That's why you'll want to look at different ways of boosting your cash flow — one of which may be premium bonds.

To understand the nature of premium bonds, you'll first want to be familiar with the relationship between a bond's price and its interest rate. When a bond is issued, it sells for face ("par") value, which is the amount returned to the bondholder when the bond matures. This bond also comes with a "coupon" rate — the interest rate that the bond will pay throughout its lifetime. So, for example, if you paid \$10,000 for a 10-year bond with a coupon rate of five percent, you would earn \$500 per year, every year. If you held the bond until it matured, you'd also get your \$10,000 back, provided the issuer doesn't default. But if market interest rates move up to six percent, and you wanted to sell your five-percent bond before it matures, you'd have to offer it at a discount from the \$10,000 face value. Conversely, if market rates were to fall to four percent, you may be able to sell your \$10,000 bond for more than its face value, because investors will be willing to pay a premium to earn the higher interest rate.

Now, let's flip the equation, so that instead of being a bond seller, you're a buyer. If you want to increase your investment income, you might be interested in a premium bond. You pay a premium for the bond in return for higher interest payments for the life of the bond, and, if you hold it until maturity, you'll still get the face value back (again barring a default).

Furthermore, because premium bonds pay higher interest, they also pay a greater proportion of their cash flow before they mature, in comparison to discounted or "par" bonds. This helps provide for greater price stability, so if interest rates rise or fall, premium bond prices typically will not decrease or increase as much as those of discount or par bonds.

Keep in mind that while premium bonds are attractive to you because of their higher interest rate, they are unattractive to bond issuers for the same reason. In fact, when market interest rates fall, some issuers may try to redeem ("call") these bonds so that they can issue new ones at the lower rates. Obviously, if your premium bond were to be called, your cash flow might take a hit. That's why, when investing in premium bonds, you might want to look for those that have at least limited call protection — in other words, they can't be redeemed for a certain number of years.

Your portfolio should comprise a number of different investments designed to work together to meet your long-term financial goals. So give premium bonds some consideration as part of a well-diversified portfolio.

Before investing in bonds you should understand the risks involved, including interest rate risk, credit risk and market risk.

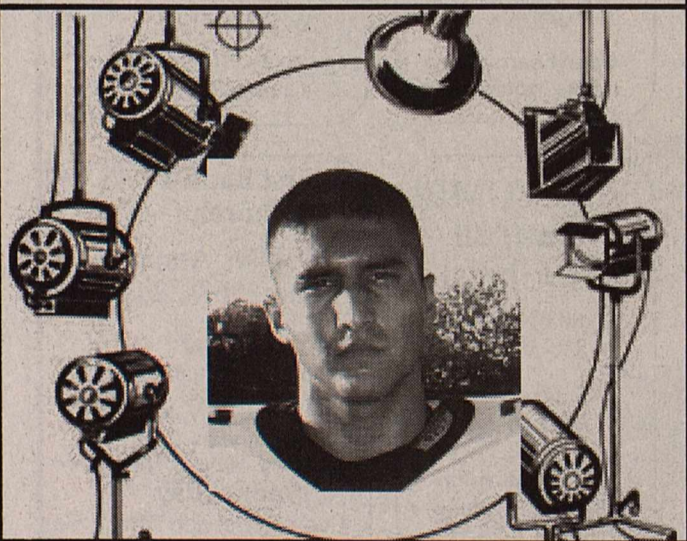

## Ext Office to offer pesticide training

Extension Offices in Kinney and Val Verde Counties Offer Pesticide Applicator Training Course With Spring not far away, some of us begin thinking about ways to control unwanted vegetation. However, you should know that some chemicals are designated general-use pesticides and can be purchased "over-the-counter" while others are restricted-use pesticides and require a pesticide applicator license. So, if you've considered acquiring an applicator license, here are some things you should know.

Private applicator license are required in order to use or supervise the use of restricted or state-limited pesticides or regulated herbicides in the production of agricultural commodities. Applicators must obtain 15 continuing education units (C.E.U.s) every five years, including a minimum of two C.E.U.s in laws and regulations and two in integrated pest management (IPM).

Commercial licenses are required to use or supervise the use of restricted or state-limited pesticides or regulated herbicides, for hire or compensation, on the land of another person. An individual that is not a licensed commercial pesticide applicator, certified private applicator, or structural pest control applicator, but intends to apply restricted use pesticides in the performance of his or her job duties (e.g. government entities, such as state, county, or city) must be licensed as a noncommercial pesticide applicator. Both commercial and noncommercial licensees must obtain five C.E.U.s annually, including at least one C.E.U. each in two of these three topics: laws and regulations, integrated pest management, and drift minimization.

With that in mind, if you are interested in acquiring a license, please contact your local County Extension Office. Kinney County and Val Verde County

will be offering a training course on March 25th starting at 9:00 a.m. at the Val Verde County Extension Office. We will also provide take-home study material and the testing will begin at 9:00 a.m. on April 1st. Texas Department of Agriculture personnel will be on hand to administer the testing. Call by March 18th so that study manuals can be ordered for you. Contact us at (830) 563-2442 in Kinney County or (830) 774-7591 in Val Verde County if you have need for additional details and to pre-register.

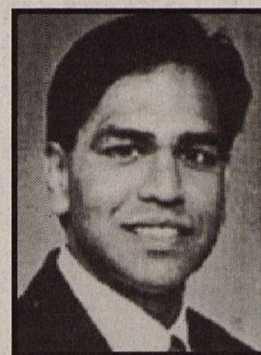

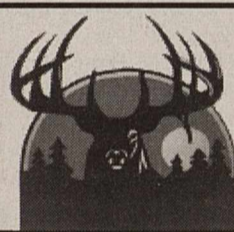

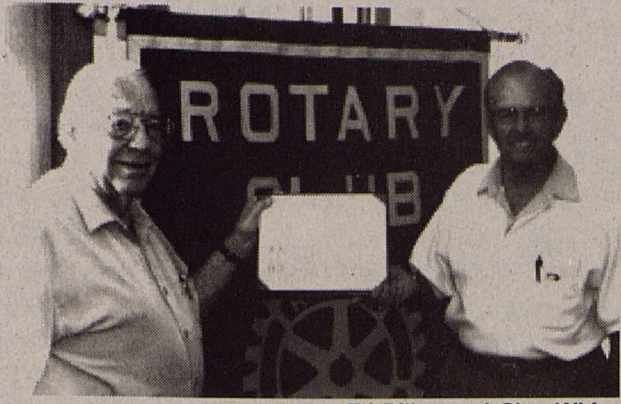

## Variety of birds seen at FCS Lagoon

Down at the Lagoon this morning and sighted over a dozen Black Bellied Whistling Ducks. Though not rare for us really, just lovely to see and hear.

Anyone not familiar with these should get down there to see them. Usually perching all

together on bare snags above the water.

When they take off you hear their whistling call and see their dark outline with broad white wing patch which is distinctive. Rarely seen alone they want to hang out with the flock.

Their shocking pink or orange legs shine out and catch the eye as does their orange bill. Once we see them here they usu-

ally will stay but could move over to the Water Treatment Plant as a Tree duck having Webbed feet and also claws may prefer the abundance of perching and roosting possibilities at the Lagoon. Also seen down there the Marsh Hawk or Harrier flying low over the water and displaying a shining white patch on his rump above his tail feathers. A regular down there

also calling loudly is the Belted Kingfisher male and female and the Olivaceous Cormorant distinguished by his long tail, and smaller size. The usual birds were there of course Vultures, the Great Egret, the Vermillion Flycatcher, Great Kiskadee, Red Winged Blackbird and the Black Phoebe.

## Bulbs die differently

*Don't be fooled; a popping sound or smoke means a CFL's end-of-life mechanism WORKS*

Worried when you hear a compact fluorescent light bulb (CFL) pop or sizzle? Despite confusion caused by an e-mail hoax circulating since April 2010, these sounds signal the bulb is working safely in its final hours. Smoke, a popping noise, and even a slight odor are typical and do not pose a fire risk as claimed in the misleading e-mail.

According to Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. (UL), an independent not-for-profit firm that tests and sets minimum standards for electric-consuming items, about 130-150 million CFLs are sold every year in the U.S. While the bulbs produce 75 percent less heat than their incandescent cousins, differences

between the bulbs go deeper than the amount of heat released. As the first wave of CFLs begins reaching the end of their lifespan, consumers are learning the bulbs die differently, too.

"As with any new product, it's important that consumers understand how it works," notes John Drengenberg, UL consumer affairs manager.

Most folks know traditional incandescent light bulbs tend to burn out the same way: a pop, a flash, and, when shaken, the familiar rattle confirming the bulb needs to be changed. With CFLs, light dims over time and the lamp may produce a more dramatic pop, emit a distinct odor, and even release some smoke. Sometimes the plastic at the base of a CFL will turn black, which is normal in most cases as safety standards require application of

special flame-retardant plastics.

"CFLs are one of the products we regularly test to specific requirements for electrical safety, fire, and shock hazards," Drengenberg notes. "Any popping sounds or smoke that a consumer might see when a CFL burns out means that the bulb's end-of-life mechanism worked as it should have." Consumers should look for the UL mark on packaging when purchasing CFLs. If a CFL carries the UL mark, consumers know it has been investigated, and conforms to specific safety requirements.

When CFLs need to be replaced, remember to drop them by any Rio Grande Electric Co-operative office for responsible recycling. The Co-op only accepts unbroken compact fluorescent bulbs. The EPA's National Partnership for Environmental

Priorities Program, in which RGEIC is a partner, is ending due to budget constraints, however, the Co-op is continuing its recycling efforts.

Approximately 12% of electricity usage in a typical household is expended on lighting. Using CFLs can save consumers approximately 75% on lighting-associated electric costs. So, if a consumer's monthly electric bill is \$250, they spend approximately \$30 on lighting. Using CFLs could reduce this amount to approximately \$7.50. Of course, each homeowner's usage patterns are different, and the amount will vary accordingly.

### Earthquake in Japan

On March 11, 2011 a major earthquake off the coast of Japan damaged buildings throughout the nation and caused a tsunami that brought about even more destruction and loss of life.

This special **Kid Scoop** page explains how earthquakes and tsunamis happen and ways you can help victims of the disaster in Japan.

#### Measuring Earthquakes

An earthquake is one of the most powerful forces on earth. Scientists use an instrument called a seismograph to measure earthquakes. Try this activity to get an idea of how a seismograph works.

**Try This**

- On a table place a small toy car on a piece of paper.
- One person holds a pencil with the lead lightly resting on the paper.
- The other person moves the paper back and forth very slowly. What kind of line does the pencil make? Does the car move?
- Move the paper so that the car starts to slide around. What kind of line does the pencil make now?

#### How do earthquakes happen?

When you crack the shell of a hard-boiled egg, you get a lot of separate pieces or **plates** of shell. The crust of the earth is like the shell of a hard-boiled egg. It is broken up into plates, too. But, unlike the pieces of a hard-boiled egg, the plates of the earth's crust move.

When these plates move and collide, one of the plates can slide beneath the other.

On March 11, 2011 the Pacific plate slid beneath the North American plate causing the earthquake and tsunami in Japan.

Standards Link: Earth Science: Students know that plate tectonics account for major geological events.

#### How a Tsunami Forms

A **tsunami** (*soo NAM eee*) is a series of large ocean waves created by an underwater earthquake or volcano. The waves can cause destruction when they reach land.

- An earthquake strikes deep below the Pacific Ocean as two plates push against each other.
- The ocean floor cracks and part of it rises, lifting huge amounts of water above it.
- Tons of water swells high above normal sea level, forced upwards as the plate below rises.
- The massive swell spreads out in all directions in the form of large waves.
- The tsunami hits the shore in waves as high as 30 feet, flooding lower land areas and destroying some buildings.


