Council suspends building permit fees

The Brackettville City Council voted to suspend the fees for building permits at their Regular meeting on July 12.

The city recently advised the public of their intention to begin enforcing a 1990 ordinance to collect a fee for building permits.

"City of Brackettville Ordinance #168-A requires the owner of any property, commercial or residential, to obtain a building permit prior to any construction, remodel, or other cosmetic or structural alteration prior to the work being performed. Including, but not limited to: New Construction, Additions, Foundations, Swimming Pools, Siding, Painting, Roofing, Fencing, Installing Doors/Windows, Moving a Structure, Demolition, Moving Doors/Windows..." the ordinance reads.

City resident Dr. Kent Lowery spoke to the council

during public comment and stated he believe the ordinance as it read today was obsolete, poorly written and without a certified inspector would only set the city up for legal liabilities. Lowery also felt the ordinance penalized city homeowners for making improvements to their homes and recommended tabling the item until more research could be conducted.

Alderwoman Rachel Munoz wanted to strike the ordinance

altogether and said she did not feel the people should be charged a fee if they did not receive service in return. Munoz said she felt as though the citizens were being taxed if the city did not follow up the building project with an inspection. Munoz asked Maintenance Supervisor David Martinez if he or was certified to conduct inspection. Martinez said he was not.

The council voted unanimously to continue to require

citizens to obtain a permit at no charge until the council could conduct a workshop to revise the ordinance. All members of the council were present.

Maintenance Supervisor David Martinez gave his monthly report. Martinez said the city's maintenance employees performed nine new service water turn ons; six temporary water turn offs; 35 water meter re-reads; 13 water leak inspections; 19 stray animal pick ups; and zero pot hole fill ins.

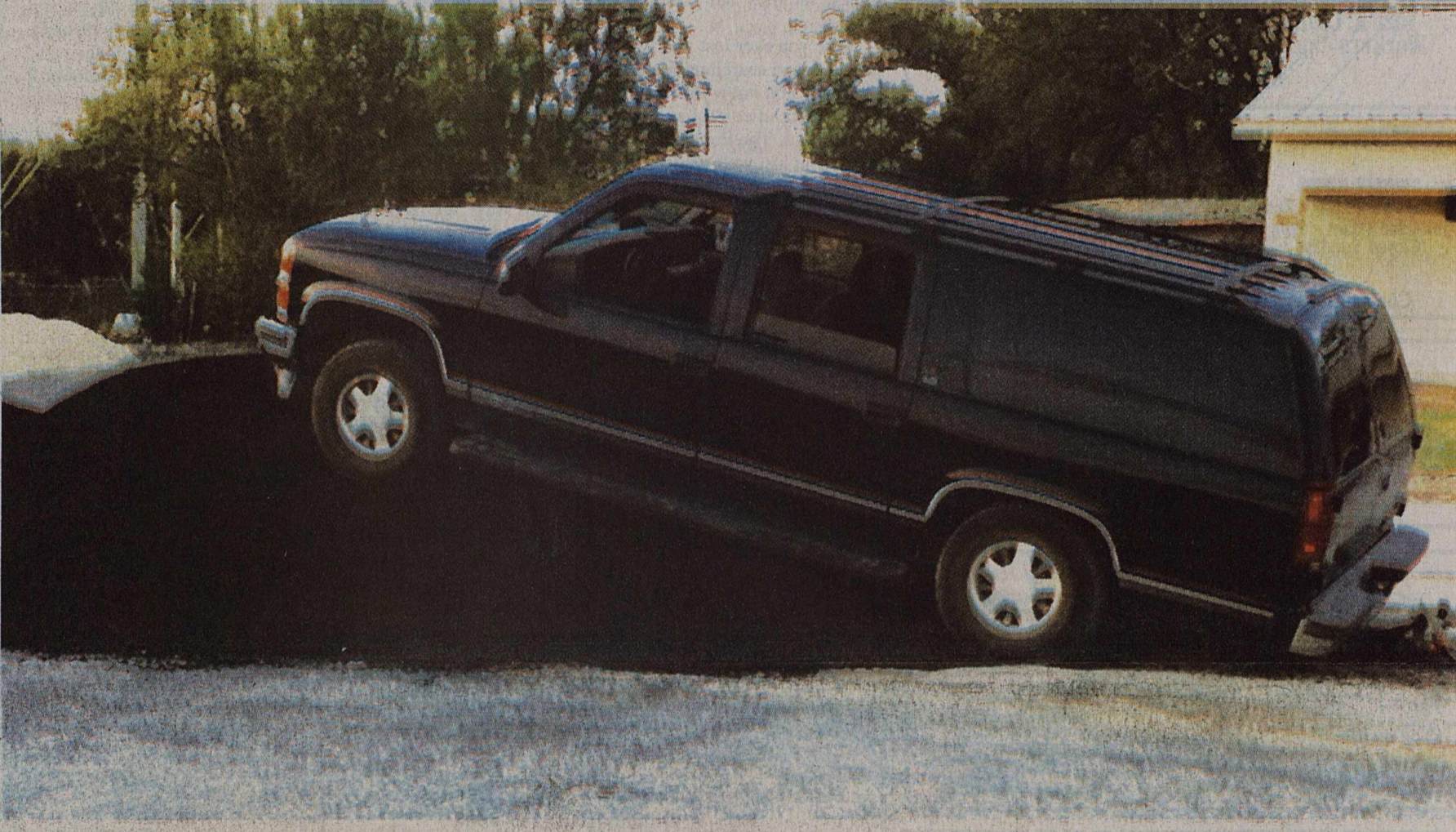

Teachers keep leave days

Brackett ISD Board of Trustees, tasked with finding \$350,000 in budget cuts for the upcoming school year, voted to allow teachers to have five local leave days, but not at the district's expense at the Regular meeting on July 11.

Trustees asked Superintendent Robert Westbrook to comb through the budget and make suggestions where he believed the district could reduce or eliminate expenses without having to cut teacher's jobs. This task however, has become more difficult than the board originally thought, as Trustee Tony Ashley stated that each cut is going to hurt someone.

The first motion made would have eliminated the five local leave days altogether for an estimated savings of \$20 to \$25

thousand to the district. Teachers and staff would still have their State allotted leave days, but no local leave days. This motion died for a lack of a second motion and a lengthy discussion ensued.

With nearly 20 teachers in attendance, back and forth discussion was allowed for a short time between the attendees and the board. In the end, a compromise was reached. Teachers will be allowed to have the leave days, but the cost for paying for a substitute will be deducted from their pay at a rate of \$60 per day. Non-professional staff will be charged \$30 per day.

Other cuts already made at earlier meetings include no longer providing meals for students and athletes that travel out of the district, unless it is above the district level competition. This cutback is expected to save the district \$30 thousand.

Brown commissioned to carve

Trent Brown, a talented local woodcarver, was commissioned by Edwards County Sheriff Don Letsinger to carve a custom art piece for the Sheriffs' Association of Texas 133 Annual Training Conference silent auction to be held in Houston to raise money for scholarships for the children of peace officers.

Brown, a golf club designer in a past life, says he carves for his own pleasure and takes on an occasional commissioned piece as he has done for Sheriff Letsinger. Using wood found during his travels, drift wood, wood from old stumps and wood purchased from specialty shops, Brown has put his beginner's training obtained in Prescott, Arizona to great use.

Brown's first piece was a small dog carved and painted and then later paired with an eight inch figure of a hunter. Brown said in the beginning he had to work against being discouraged because he did not have anyone to instruct him, but he soon learned that he could attend training seminars and at-

tend classes at carving shows and competitions. It was at these shows where he was afforded the opportunity to study under some of the top national and international carvers, learning a wide range of styles.

Known for his extremely detail-oriented style of carving, Brown admits, he does not know where his talent is derived from because he does not draw, paint or sculpt in any other medium.

When asked where his inspiration for his different caricature

carvings comes from, he smiled and said he may see someone in a grocery store with an unusual nose or ears that he will try to replicate when he gets a knife in his hands.

After nearly 15 years of carving behind him, Brown is still surprised at the response to his work.

Brown participates in art shows throughout the year and each year exhibits his work at the Fort Clark Days Festival held in early March.

MUD rumor debunked

Fort Clark Municipal Utilities District General Manager Randy Castilla debunked a rumor about the district selling water to a bio fuel business.

Castilla stated the Fort Clark Municipal Utilities District, better known as Fort Clark MUD, has not received an application from a business to purchase water and said the district had not been approached about being a potential supplier.

Brackettville City Manager Henry Garcia has recently participated in preliminary discussions with public and private organizations interested in building a bio fuel plant in Kinney County, but an official deal has not been struck. The city council was not supportive of Garcia participating in the discussions at their April 12, meeting. MUD did not participate in these discussions.

Fort Clark MUD sells water to Fort Clark Springs Association,

Fort Clark residents and the Kinney County Detention Center-Community Education Center. The total amount sold in June 2011, was just over 20 million gallons (or approximately 61 acre feet). Fort Clark Springs Association and Fort Clark residents used 18.4 million gallons (or approximately 55 acre feet) in June, while Kinney County Detention Center-Community Education Center used 1.6 million (or approximately 5 acre feet).

Terrazas plays on championship team

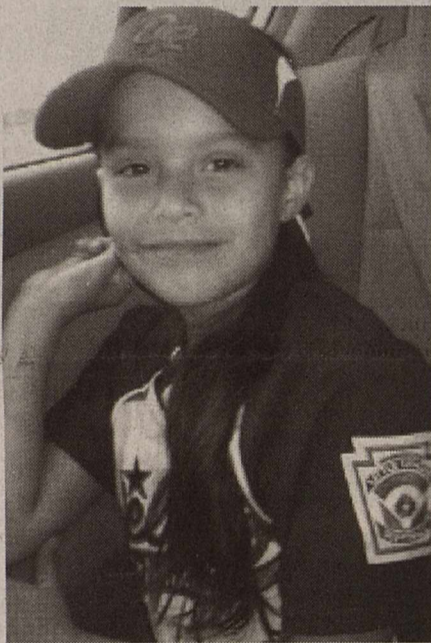

New road construction begins

The Texas Department of Transportation and Hunter Industries continue to move into Kinney County with improvements to widen and resurface US 90 from Uvalde west of FM 481 to the Kinney/ Val Verde County line, five miles east of Del Rio. The purpose of these improvements is to resurface the roadway and construct intermittent passing lanes along the 47 mile stretch of roadway. Motorist will begin to see crews & equipment move into and working in

Kinney County.

The \$8.6 million project which began in Uvalde County March 1, 2011 is anticipated for completion in the fall of 2012.

TxDOT advises motorists to drive with caution through this work zone and anticipate delays during working hours.

Alternating lane closures are in effect. (RMC 6219-41-001)

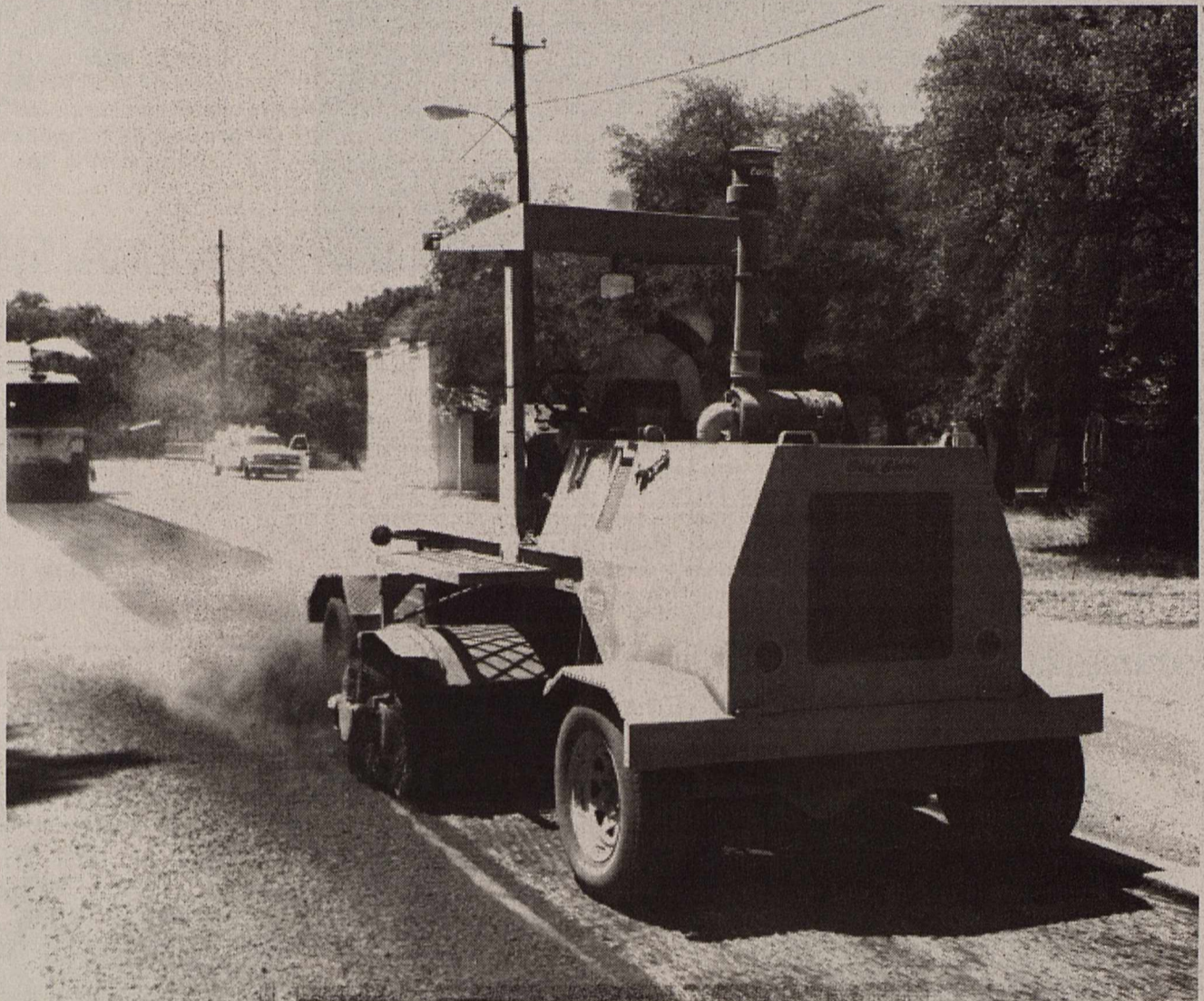
Time frame of work, consisting of road planning, overlay and pavement markings, is approximately one month with all work expected to be completed by August 31. Weather permitting on Monday, July 18, 2011, H.L. Zumwalt Construction, Inc. will begin Blade Level up road maintenance work (placement of asphalt pavement, upper layer) on FM 1572 in Kinney County for approximately

two-three weeks, and then move blade level operations to FM 481 in Maverick County.

Motorists should slow down, prepare to merge left to open lane(s) and drive with extreme caution keeping a watchful eye for advanced flaggers and work crews.

July 15, The Upstagers, along with the Broke Mill Players, will present Always, Patsy Cline, at the Paul Poag Theatre. Sponsored by the Bank and Trust, the Upstagers' first musical of the 2011 season will begin at 8 p.m. on July 15 and 16 as well as July 22 and 23.

Kathryn McWilliams will star as the legendary country/pop crossover artist, Patsy Cline. Kathryn will be remembered for her role as Miss Mona in Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, as well as for directing The Wizard of Oz. Wendy Van Winkle will play Patsy's friend, Louise Seeger. Upstagers fans will remember Wendy from her role as the hard-luck queen Vernadette in last summer's Dixie Swim Club.

Music will be performed live by the Broke Mill Players. This exceptional group consists of the incredibly talented Elizabeth Hodges on the piano; Nathan Lafrenz, a former concert violinist, playing the fiddle parts; along with Mike McCarson, owner of the Broke

Mill RV Park and Event Center, playing second fiddle. Anna Lafrenz, talented singer/songwriter will play guitar, while the versatile David Rhinesmith, will play the drums. Rounding out the Broke Mill Players is Dan White, a former member of the U. S. Army Band and currently a Band Director at Del Rio, Mike, Nathan and Anna, along with David Rhinesmith are well known in Brackettville. Elizabeth Hodge is currently the director and teacher of Brackett Educational Academy. Both Mike McCarson and David Rhinesmith live in Brackett and Nathan and Anna LaFrenz just moved from Brackett to Uvalde. Kathryn McWilliams is the daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Don McWilliams of Fort Clark Springs.

Always, Patsy Cline, produced by Ted Swindley, premiered in 1993. The story was taken and expanded from a section of the Cline biography, Honky Tonk Angel, which chronicled the real-life story of her encounter in 1961 with a fan

and Mississippi native, Louise Seger, who arrived early at The Esquire Ballroom in Houston for Cline's performance. In a chance encounter before the show, the two met, starting a lasting friendship.

In the musical, Cline expresses her worry to Seger over the attendance that night, and Seger tells her that she'll have no problem filling the hall for both shows. She later persuades Cline to spend the night at her house rather than a hotel. They stay up all night girl-talking and record a radio spot in the morning.

Several weeks later, Seger would receive the first of many letters over the ensuing two year period prior to the singer's death, which when collected, formed the basis for the musical. It allows the audience a rare and up-close look at the singer's daily life. The title of the musical came from the sign-off Cline used at the end of each letter. The revue has played across the U. S., running off-Broadway in New York City, and for over a year at Nashville's Ryman Auditorium, where it sold out nightly.

The show features 27 of Patsy Cline's hits including "Walking After Midnight", "She's Got You", "Sweet Dreams" and "Crazy" to name a few. It combines humor, sadness, and reality. It offers fans who remember Cline while she was still alive a chance to look back, while giving new fans an idea of what seeing her was like and what she meant to her original fans.

As late as 2002, Patsy Cline was voted by artists and members of the country music industry as number one of CMT's 40 Greatest Women of Country Music. Before Patsy Cline's recordings in the late 1950's and early 1960's, there were only a handful of country and western female singers. Her big break came in 1957 singing "Walking After Midnight" on Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts. The song went on to make both the country and the pop charts. She joined the Grand Ol' Opry in 1960. Despite a severe automobile accident in 1961, her second hit "I'll Fall to Pieces" hit number one on the country charts. Again, that year "Crazy" hit the top 10. In 1962 and 1963, her major hits included "She's Got You," "When I Get Through with You, You'll Love Me," "Faded Love," and "Leavin' on Your Mind."

Tragedy struck March 5, 1963, when, on her way home from a benefit in Kansas City, her private plane crashed near Camden, Tennessee. She was 31 year old. Ironically her most identifiable tune, "Sweet Dreams" was released posthumously. Ten years after her death she became the first female solo artist inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame.

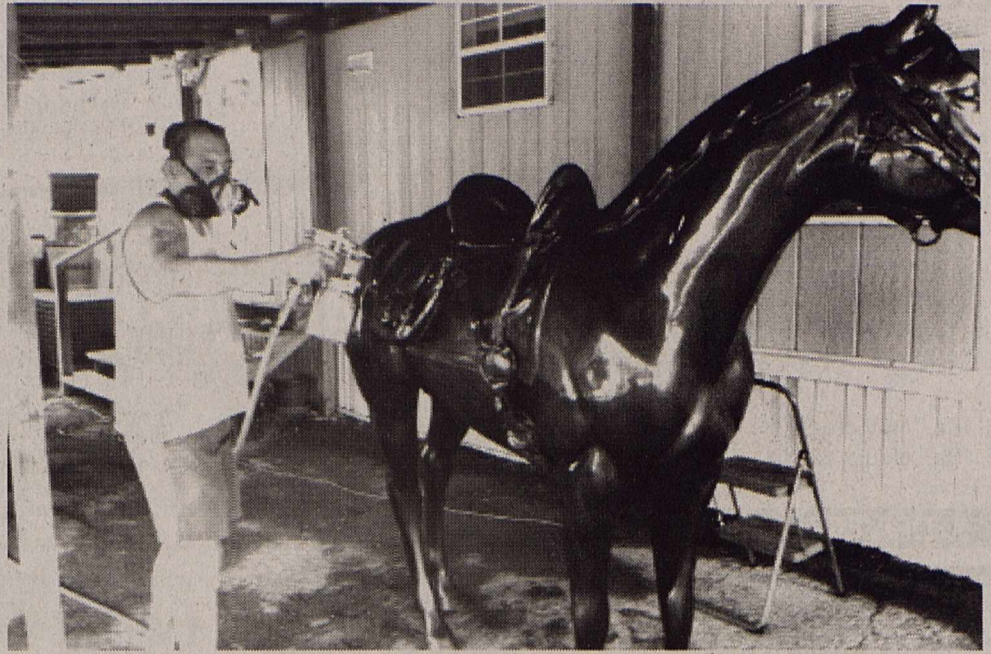
