



Well as Mr. Brackett was fond of saying...did you know that... Since July, 2011 there have been 26 Open Records Request made to the city administration searching for financial information. Such things as Budgets, expense reports, Audits, Step Grant Accounting, Agendas and minutes and other information which should be readily available to anyone desiring to see it. To date there are 14 ORR partially or completely unanswered. This has deeply troubled me and made me think of a couple of reasons why this "stone walling" would occur. One, there would have to be absolute disregard for Texas law to violate it so openly. Two, the books are in such disarray that administration is trying to cover up the fact that they do not have a clue as to what is going on. There perhaps is another reason, and maybe the reason why we have been unable to obtain a copy of this year's budget. If the budget was very simplistic and only listed broad category items containing large amounts of money without detail as to how the money would be appropriated it would leave a great deal of discretion as to how the money was spent and make it difficult to know if it was being spent appropriately and for the best purpose. A third vehicle being driven by Melvin Rott, of Del Rio, traveling east then struck Garcia's vehicle. A fourth vehicle being driven by Paul Cornell, of Spring, traveling east then struck Rott's vehicle. Rott was airlifted to a San Antonio hospital, where he later passed away. Icy conditions on the roadway were rumored to be the cause, however DPS reports do not cite ice on the road as a factor.

Armed with razor-sharp tusks, the hogs shred fields and pastures and wreck ecosystems by wallowing in riverbeds and streams. Even perennials planted at graves aren't safe. In recent years, the hogs are increasingly showing up in urban neighborhoods around the state.

Feral hogs, which can stand 3 feet tall and weigh up to 400. pounds, make meals of lambs. kid goats, baby calves, newborn fawns and ground-nesting birds. They compete for food and room with many native species of wildlife.

The animals commonly destroy urban yards, parks and golf courses, as well as rangeland, pastures, crops, fencing, wildlife feeders and other property. Additionally, they contribute to E, coli and other diseases in Texas, streams, ponds and watersheds.

The hogs are also a road hazard. Motorists sustain an estimated \$1,200 in damage per




