RUMOR IS DENIED

REPORT OF FIFTY PERSONS KILLED IS NOT CONFIRMED.

In May, 1905, Snyder was almost completely wiped out of existence by a tornado, over fifty persons being killed and many injured.

NO PROSECUTION

WILL BE INSTITUTED AGAINST HARRIMAN.

SHERMAN ANTI TRUST LAW

Has Not Been Violated, According to the Opinion of Leading Lawyers.

Chicago, Ill., May 24.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Washington says: "There is a big surprise in store for people who have been expecting the interstate railroad commission to recommend to the attorney general the prosecution of W. E. Harriman and his associates and the dissolving of their railroad combination for violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. At a conference yesterday between President Roosevelt and Martin A. Knapp, chairman of the commission, the fact was brought out that in the opinion of the leading members of the commission no law has been violated by Harriman, though grave evils have been discovered which warrant the enactment of laws to prevent their recurrence. The commission desires to complete its report by the first of July and will present the facts discovered to the attorney general, but does not believe that upon the showing made a prosecution will be begun."

Vigorous Denial Made.

Washington, D. C., May 24.—Concerning the report published this morning to the effect that Chairman Knapp of the interstate commerce commission had an interview with the president yesterday afternoon, informed Roosevelt that the investigation by the commission into the methods of Harriman had practically acquitted Harriman, Knapp said today. "The statement is absolutely without foundation or excuse. The commission has taken no action, reached no conclusion and not even discussed Harriman of late. No report is likely for some time."

Four talesmen were dismissed for bias this morning, and the fifth was under examination as the noon recess approached.

WILL NOT SELL TO PACKERS

Unless Order Concerning Full Payment of Tuberculosis Cows is Rescinded.

South Omaha, Neb., May 24.—The Omaha live stock exchange today passed a resolution in which the members agree not to sell heifers and cows to packing houses in this city until the packers rescind tax orders taking effect next Monday, to refuse to pay full prices for cattle of these classes if, after being slaughtered, the animals are found to be suffering from tuberculosis or other diseases. The packers state that their action in making the order is due to the fact that the condemnation of this class of cattle is so heavy that the loss is too great and risk too heavy.

NO SERIOUS DAMAGE

LOSSES ABOUT WICHITA FALLS ARE SMALL.

THE HEAVIEST RAINFALL

Known in Several Years—Does Incalculable Good to Crops.

The big tent at the corner of Eighth street and Scott avenue, under which the Methodist revival services are being held, was blown down during the wind storm which preceded the rain last night. The congregation had been dismissed only a few minutes before the storm came up and those in attendance had not more than arrived safely at their homes before the heavy downpour of rain set in. Until the tent can be put up again and the ground and canvas dries, the meetings will be held in the church.

The wind, lightning and rain last night wrought havoc with the lines and phones of the Southwestern Telephone Company and many telephones were out of commission this morning. The line men are consequently spending a very busy day, and every effort is being extended to get every phone in working order at the earliest moment possible.

That heavy storms prevailed last night along the Denver, both east and west of Wichita Falls is evidenced by the fact that only one connection, and that with Dallas, could be secured by the local Western Union office. Early this morning it seemed probable that the Times would not get its Associated Press report today.

The Southwestern Telephone Company this morning reported a heavy hail at Dundee last night, where it is said the hail completely covered the ground. It is feared that the hail has done some damage to corn, cotton and other crops and fruits.

From Vernon is reported a rain, the rainfall there being felt as much as in Wichita Falls.

At Archer City the rain did not begin to fall until after daylight this morning, but continued a steady downpour throughout the morning. Additional reports received at the Times office this morning by telephone from as far as on the Denver and Arkansas as far south as the same road as Fort Worth say that the rain of last night and this morning is the heaviest that has fallen this year.

At Burk Burnett, on the Wichita Falls & Northwestern railway, the fall amounted to almost a cloudburst and at Seymour it was fully as heavy. Reports from along the M. K. & T., as far east as Gainesville indicate that the entire country between here and there was thoroughly drenched.

In Oklahoma and the Indian Territory the fall was fully equal to that in Texas, and at some few points damage to crops by heavy hail is reported. The heavy rain of last night and this morning was the cause of a small washout on the Wichita Falls & Northwestern, and the regular train which left here early this morning could go no further than Burk Burnett, and returned to this city with all passengers and freight bound for points beyond Burk Burnett.

Vernon, Tex., May 24.—Beginning last night at 8 o'clock, one of the heaviest rainstorms ever known in this section set in, and continued all night and at this writing, 10 a. m. It is still raining. Reports from different parts of the country say the rain was heavy. The streets are flooded and owing to the telephone wires being down in some parts of the county, it will be several days before reports can be had. Stockmen as well as farmers say this gives the best season ever known at this time of the year. Stock water is plentiful. There was some hail last night, but so far no report has been received as to any damage.

"THE GALLED JADE WINGS."

A gentleman who has been engaged
 in business in Vernon for the last three
 months but owns city property in
 Wichita Falls, speaking of Wichita
 Falls contrasted conditions in Vernon.
 Nine-tenths of the people in Vernon
 are home owners, while two-thirds of
 them in Wichita Falls are tenants.
 Vernon was located by twelve of her
 citizens in 1881 and on account of the
 absence of shade trees was called by
 many the Prairie Queen city on a sand
 soil, but now strangers would call
 it the Forest Queen city, while Wich-
 ita Falls was made a town by the Den-
 ver road stopping at the red mud val-
 leys and lagoons on the south banks of
 the Wichita river. Vernon covers a
 territory large enough to contain a
 city of fifty thousand people, while
 Wichita Falls is situated compactly in
 a red, muddy valley which makes side-
 walks all over the town a necessity.
 There are many wealthy people in
 Vernon, but wealth is more evenly dis-
 tributed than in Wichita Falls, where
 three-fourths of the people are de-
 pendent for support on the more
 wealthy. In Wichita Falls the few are
 growing daily more wealthy, while the
 many are getting poorer. In other
 words, corporate interest rules in
 Wichita Falls, while local citizen-
 ship controls in Vernon.

The local newspaper in Wichita
 Falls is owned by a corporation which
 advocates corporation policies that are
 almost individual ownership of public
 utilities. Bonuses are made up in
 Wichita Falls from the masses of the
 citizens, and railroads constructed
 with the money, and a few wealthy
 men bond the road and are given stock
 in the railroad for these bonds, thus
 the rich are made wealthier, while
 the many poor are made poorer and de-
 pendent for their support. All the pub-
 lic utilities in Wichita Falls have been
 built by public subscription from the
 whole people, and when built owned
 by a corporate body of her few very
 wealthy citizens, which of conse-
 quence makes the many poor that
 much poorer. The wealthy corporate
 interests control public sentiment in
 Wichita Falls. We never hear of any
 local option elections down there, as it
 is a whiskey town.—Vernon Call.

The Times cares but little for the
 stir the Call has seen fit to cast upon
 it, and were it not for the numerous
 inaccuracies which characterize the
 article from beginning to end we
 would pay no attention to it. Vernon
 is a prosperous and growing town, but
 so far as this paper can observe, none
 of the prosperity of that thriving lit-
 tle city can be attributed to the Call.
 Its editor has been a wart on the city
 for the past fifteen or twenty years,
 and in nearly every instance that civic
 improvements of any kind are propo-
 sed by the city or county officials, the
 editor of the Call opens his columns
 and begins to spout his filth.

The cause of all this tirade of abuse
 comes from the fact that Vernon quite
 recently sent a committee of its citi-
 zens on its sidewalk and street improve-
 ments. They were delighted with the
 condition of things in Wichita Falls,
 and so expressed themselves before
 returning to Vernon.

As to the charge that nearly all of
 our business people—those who are
 engaged in the retail business, such
 as grocers, clothing, dry goods, hard-
 ware, etc., do not own their houses,
 when they were clerks and working
 on salaries. Now all of them own
 their stocks of goods, and some own
 from one to a half-dozen business
 houses, to say nothing of their homes
 and numerous residences they have
 been able to buy and build from the
 profits realized from their respective
 businesses. In fact, the more wealthy
 of our citizens came here comparatively
 poor men, and it is to their credit
 that they have by the exercise of good
 judgment and hard work built up what
 in this part of the country is consid-
 ered little fortunes.

The fact that the Times is owned by
 a corporation does not necessarily
 mean that its manager has sacrificed
 his principles in order to accomplish
 that end. He has pronounced views
 upon local option question and has

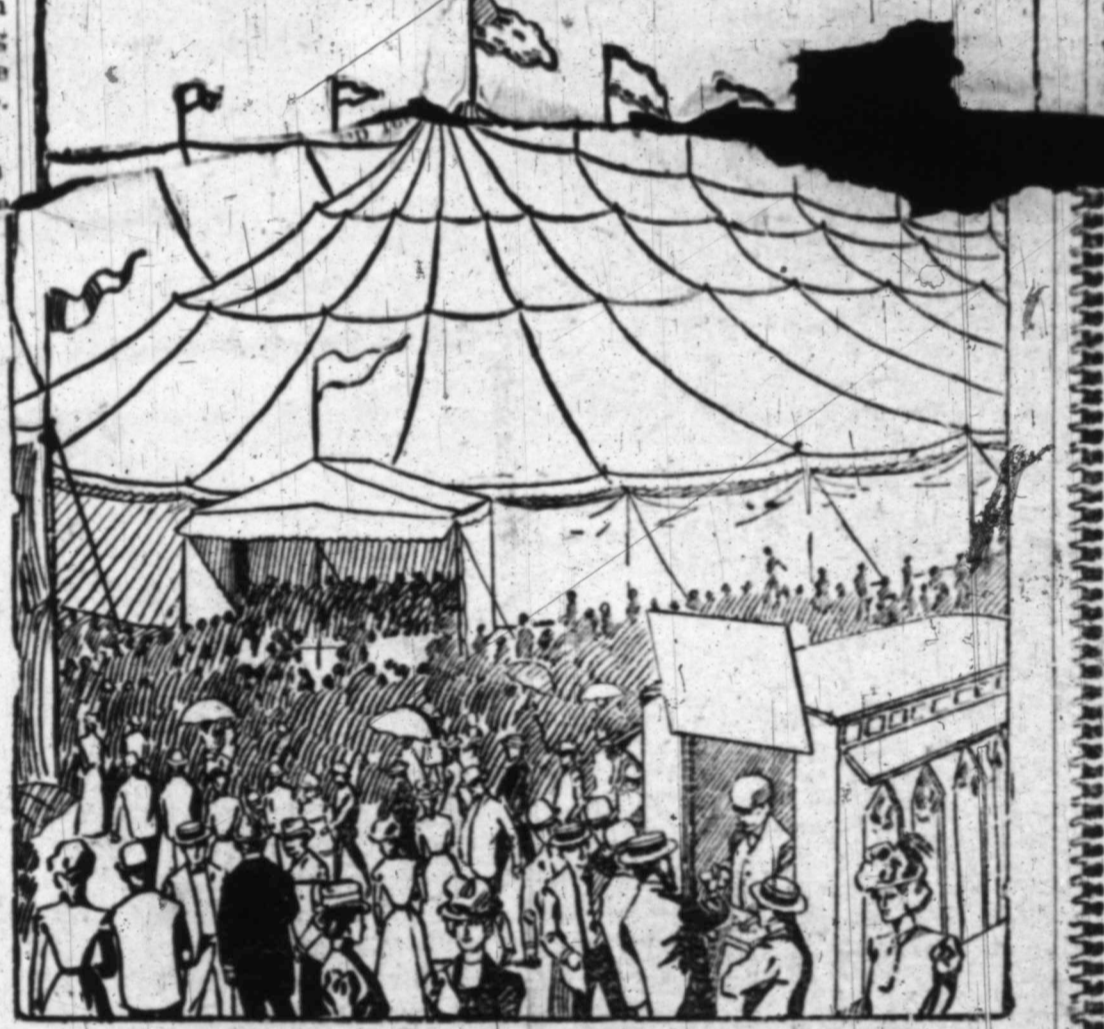

PROMINENT MEN

SAID TO BE INVOLVED IN MINE AND TIMBER LAND FRAUDS.

THE GRAND JURIES

In Half a Dozen States Will Investigate Evidence Incriminating Men High in Business Circles.

By Associated Press.
 Chicago, Ill., May 24.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Washington says: "Amazing revelations of a conspiracy to defraud the United States of millions of dollars worth of mineral and timber lands will be laid before the grand juries in half a dozen states within a few days. The facts, it is said, will involve in criminal charges men high in business and social circles including one United States senator, one former senator, a man reputed to be one of the wealthiest in the world, a railroad man known from the Atlantic to the Pacific, two of the wealthiest coal barons in the United States and numerous smaller fry. The frauds, it is declared, were perpetrated in California, Colorado, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Minnesota and the Dakotas. Much of the evidence was secured by Detective Burns, who is engaged in the municipal graft prosecution in San Francisco, and upon the conclusion of his work there Burns and Attorney Francis J. Heney are expected to return to the government service for the prosecution of timber and mineral land thieves. In obtaining the conviction of the men said to be involved in the frauds, the government expects to regain possession of large areas of forest lands."
