### A GERMAN COLONY

WILL BE ESTABLISHED NEAR HOLLIDAY.

### SIX THOUSAND ACRES

Are Purchased by Dakota Immigrants. Others Will Follow.

A colony of more than twenty families of Russian Germans is soon to be established near Holliday. These immigrants will come here from the Dakotas, from where they have been driven by the rigorous winters. A party of these immigrants left yesterday for their homes in Dakota, after purchasing over six thousand acres of land through Jackson & Moore's real estate agency. This land is located near Holliday. The Germans will pack up their belongings in the Dakotas and will ship them at once to this place.

These immigrants will at once settle a colony, and have already made arrangements to build a store, bank, church, and livery stable at Holliday. It is expected that a large colony of these people will soon grow up near Holliday. 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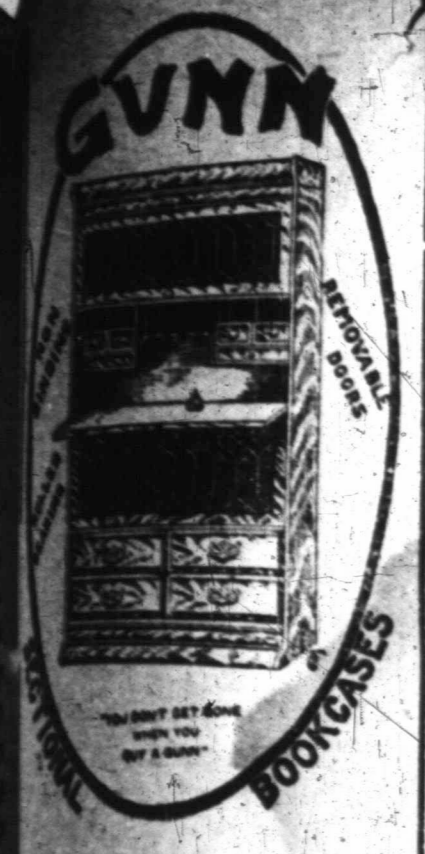
