At the session today, the commissioners also ordered that an election be held in the Enterprise school district to determine whether or not a school tax of twenty cents should be voted.

## GREEN AND GANOR ARE FOUND GUILTY

### GOOD NIGHT'S REST MUST SERVE TERM

ENJOYED BY HAYWOOD—HE IS APPARENTLY RESTORED.

### THE FIRST GUN FIRED

And Finer Aggregating \$575,000 Are Penalties Imposed By the

By Associated Press.

New Orleans, La., June 3.—The sentence of the Savannah court in the famous Greene and Ganor case, involving over a half million dollars fraud in the government contract work in Savannah harbor, was affirmed today in an opinion handed down by the United States circuit court of appeals. The sentence is four years imprisonment each and fines aggregating \$575,000. Judges Selby and McCormick rendered the opinion and Judge Pardee dissented.

Boise, Idaho, June 3.—After a good night's rest, William D. Haywood was completely restored this morning and expressed himself as feeling "first rate." He took regular exercises on the lawn around the jail. The trial was resumed at 11 o'clock.

If the jury is secured before court adjourns tonight the first gun of the big battle for life or death will be fired tomorrow. The case for the state will be opened by James H. Hawley, leading counsel, on Tuesday morning. This will be a lengthy recital taken of the position taken by the state of Idaho in the effort to prove that Haywood, together with Moyer, Pettibone, Simpson and Orchard, were responsible for the death of Frank Steunenberg, on the night of December 30, 1905.

E. F. Richardson, a prominent attorney of Denver, will open for the defense, but it is understood that it has been agreed that the case for the defense will not be shown until after the case for the prosecution is all in. It may, therefore, be several weeks before Mr. Richardson delivers his opening address. It is conceded that the introduction of evidence for the State, and especially the testimony of Orchard, will be contested at every point. This will mean, probably, that the State will not be able to conclude under three weeks, or possibly thirty days. The case for the defense will take equally as long. It may, therefore, be estimated that the case will last sixty days after the opening, Tuesday—if, indeed, a jury has been secured by that time. Sixteen days of actual work has been spent in the effort to secure a jury. Counting the adjournments, the case has now been going on a month.

### AN UNEASY FEELING

IN JAPAN OVER FUTURE RELATIONS WITH AMERICA.

### THE PECULIAR POSITION

Of the Federal Government Regarding State Autonomy Gives Rise to Apprehension.

Tokio, Japan, June 3.—Leading persons in and out of politics seem to have apprehensions regarding Japan's future relations with the United States. Actual hostility, however, is not thought of, but it is considered here that the peculiar position in which the Federal government is placed regarding state autonomy and the defiant attitude of the labor interests against Japan's treaty rights, as manifested in the second San Francisco incident, make politicians here uneasy.

### TWO THOUSAND STRIKE.

Machinists Are Refused Nine Hour Day and Quit.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 2.—Two thousand machinists in the shops where the union's demand for a nine hour day was refused, went on a strike today. WILL DROP DUBLIN MEMBER.

Rejection of the Irish Bill Causes the Action.

London, England, June 3.—In the House of Commons today Premier Campbell Bannerman formally announced that the government, in view of the rejection of the Irish bill by the Nationalists' convention at Dublin, had decided to drop the member.

### OLD FIGHTER IS DEAD.

Barney Aaron, Champion of England, Lives to the Age of Seventy-Seven.

New York, June 3.—Barney Aaron, an old time light weight pugilist, was buried Sunday. He died Thursday in a sanitarium on Long Island, where he had been about a year. He was 77 years old. Like his father, Aaron was a great bare knuckle fighter, and he beat every man in his class in England.

### Solving the Problem.

Gradually the problem of what Frederick has to do in order to get the Wichita Falls & Northwestern railroad, is being solved. At a meeting of our citizens last Monday afternoon, the contract which the company submitted to our Commercial Club was read. Frederick is asked to give \$35,000 bonus, and the right-of-way from where the railroad leaves the Big Pasture to and through Frederick to the east line of range eighteen, which is the west side of town. The railroad people made a few concessions. They agreed, that in case the right-of-way and abutment damages amounted to more than \$15,000 damages, they will pay half the excess.

A number of our citizens, before signing the bond, guaranteeing the company the full amount of their subsidy, demanded that the railroad company pay all expenses which might be incurred in obtaining a crossing over the Frisco tracks. J. L. Lair and John Mounts were sent to Wichita Falls, where they succeeded in getting the Wichita Falls & Northwestern to agree to this.

The first thing that now remains to be done is to get sufficient responsible parties to go on the bond. At a meeting Monday it was voted that those who signed this would be compelled to pay any deficiency that might occur through the failure of any signers to contribute the amounts promised by them, in proportion to the amount subscribed by themselves and not per capita. It is hoped that everyone who subscribed will readily sign this bond, as nothing further can be done toward securing the railroad until this is accomplished. It is not thought that it will cost anyone an additional cent, but the railroad company demand it to make itself safe.

The railroad people said they preferred the depot on either South Main South Ninth or South Eighth streets, and it seems probable that the last named location will be selected as it will bring the railroad close to the heart of the city at the least cost—Frederick Enterprise.

### New Commandant at League Island Navy Yard.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 3.—Captain Edwin Pendleton, until recently in command of the battleship Missouri, today entered upon his duties as commandant of the League Island navy yard. He succeeds Admiral Tilley, who died in March.

### BIG INCREASE

In Receipts of Local Postoffice—Index to Town's Growth.

The report of Acting Postmaster Ralph Darnell shows that during the month of May the receipts at the Wichita Falls postoffice from the sale of stamps, registered letters, money orders, etc., amounted to \$1,351.98.

During the same month last year the receipts amounted to only a little more than \$900. Year by year and month by month the postal receipts are steadily increasing.

Mr. Darnell also reports that there is not an unrented box in the office, over 1,100 boxes being in use.

Wichita Falls now receives fourteen mails by train each day, in addition to which there are two star routes and three rural routes.

The Supreme Court of the State today handed down a written opinion in which the verdict of the district court was affirmed. The opinion states that the men had had a fair and impartial trial.

## A SHARP BREAK

SEVERE DECLINE IN STOCKS ON WALL STREET.

### STOCK LOST THREE POINTS

Unseasonable Weather and Business Contraction Affect Market.

New York, June 3.—There was a sharp break in the prices of stocks in the early dealings today, which was particularly severe in the Pacific railroads and copper industrials. These suffered losses between two and three points each and sold at lower prices than in the break a week ago. The discouraged public utterances by the head of the Harriman system, unseasonable weather for crops and business contraction in various branches of industry, lower prices for copper and additional exports of gold affected the market unfavorably.

#### New Road to Burkburnett.

A special to the Dallas News from Henrietta says: The surveyors are on the ground ready to begin surveying a railroad from Henrietta to Burkburnett, a distance of forty-five miles, along the Red river valley.

This surveying party passed through Wichita Falls this afternoon on its way to Byers to take up their work on the survey.

This is the third road which has been surveyed to Burkburnett, one of them, the Wichita Falls & Northwestern is already in operation. The other is the Wichita Falls & Lawton, which has been surveyed and for which the engineers are now preparing specifications.

### FLEEING MISSIONARIES REACH SWATOW.

## QUIET IS MAINTAINED

### Leaders of Uprising Allow No Looting. Foreigners are Not Molested.

By Associated Press. Amoy, China, June 3.—Quiet is maintained at Swatow, though there is great anxiety as to the outcome of the revolts in the surrounding country. Many refugees continue to arrive here and a number of missionaries have reached Swatow. Conditions at Chang Chow, where there is a small American mission, and at Ssiokho are unsettled. The revolutionary leaders will allow no looting and no foreigners have been molested so far as is known.

### Squadron Ordered to Concentrate.

By Associated Press. London, England, June 3.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Shanghai says the American Pacific squadron has been ordered to concentrate in view of the possible disturbances in southern provinces in China.

### Burkburnett Opening Will Take Place Next Thursday.

Everything is now in readiness for the opening of the new town of Burkburnett, fifteen miles north of this city on the Wichita Falls & Northwestern railway, next Thursday, June 6th.

About six hundred lots in the new town and a number of fine tracts of Red River valley land will be sold at auction on this date. The sale will be held under the auspices of the Red River Valley Townsite Company of Wichita Falls, and Arnold & Arnold, the well known auctioneers of Wichita, Kansas, will conduct the auction.

Burkburnett is located only two miles south of the Red River, at the point where the new wagon bridge crosses the river into the Big Pasture into Oklahoma. The town is surrounded by a splendid agricultural country and gives promise of becoming one of the best towns in this section of the State.

On the day of the sale a special train will convey passengers from Wichita Falls to Burkburnett free of charge. This train will leave Wichita Falls at 8:30 a. m. A big barbecue dinner will be served on the grounds by the church ladies of Burkburnett.

## HENRIETTA IS BOOMING.

### Railroads, Compress and Big Crops—By Special Correspondent.

Henrietta, Tex., June 2.—After several days rain, the weather has settled down and this county is now experiencing some fine growing weather and the farmers of this county are the best contented set of people anywhere in this country. They are exceedingly jubilant over the present prospects for an unusually large cotton crop this year. This county produced at least thirty thousand bales of cotton last year and over ten thousand five hundred bales were marketed in Henrietta.

Prospects are very flattering at this time for Henrietta to become the metropolis of this entire country. The huge oil mill that is now under course of construction will be a great help to this city and insures that at least three times as much cotton will be marketed here this season as was last season. Besides it is now almost an assured fact that within the next sixty days there will be located at this place a large wholesale grocery and hardware house and a cotton compress will be under course of erection in a few days.

The Henrietta and Southern railroad is being pushed with all the dispatch possible. There are now a large number of teams at work on the road and it is expected that trains will be running out of here in sixty days as far as Halsell and the road will be pushed rapidly to the southwest and the farmers along this line will have direct railroad connection with one of the best cotton compresses in the northwest and one of the best oil mills anywhere in this country.

The Wichita Falls Development Company have awarded Smith & Schenk, architects of Fort Worth, the contract to draw up plans and specifications for twenty-four new residences to be built on the company's plat of ground across Crescent Lake from the court house. As soon as the plans are completed the company will advertise for bids for the construction of the work.

### Fifteen Cent Cotton.

If weather conditions do not improve shortly cotton will certainly sell for prices unprecedented since the cotton famine of the Civil War but it is devoutly to be hoped that the 15-cent cotton which some of the growers' associations are talking about will not arrive.

In order for the crop now planting to sell at that price, there must be a crop shortage that would be little less than a calamity. The world's demand for cotton goods was never in all history so great as it is at the present time. It is growing at a rate which will make the South the wealthiest agricultural region of the earth if it can supply, at reasonable prices, all the cotton that is wanted from it.

The true policy of the cotton belt is to make all the cotton it possibly can, and insist upon prices that yield a good profit. Texas is pursuing this policy, for after making last year, the largest crop it ever made, the Texas acreage is this year increased. If the crop should be cut short and the prices, abnormally high, the Texas planters will have, from their large planting, an exceedingly profitable year, the big price more than balancing the reduced yield.

In the soil and climate of its cotton belt, which runs nearly up to the southern line of Missouri and Kentucky, the South has an invaluable monopoly for no other part of the world can make good cotton in abundance. It is capable of producing crops four times as great as those of the present, and it will prove most profitable if it is steadily increased at a rate which supplies the world's increasing demand at fair prices.

With good weather in June, there is yet time to make a crop that will keep the mills going and put abundant money into the pockets of the farmers. The price has been steadily climbing for some weeks, but it is too soon for the speculators to begin betting on a famine.—St. Louis Republic.
