## Colder Weather Necessary To

## Curb Southern Weevil Movement

UBBOCK, November 7, 2003 The Panhandle and Northern half of PCG's 25 -county area have xperienced some chilly temperatures this week, but in the Permian Basin it's not been chilly enough to call a much-needed halt boll weevil spray operations.
Weevils from the St. Lawrence area, and other parts of Glasscock County not involved in active eradication, have moved into the dges of the Permian Basin Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, as well as the Roliing Plains Central Zone and Southern Roliing Plains
Zone. The cost to growers in the is amounting to millions of dollars. The htest report from Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation shows 309,562 acres were treated in these three zones in the week ending November 2 . The same report shows that $1,951,667$ cumulative acres have been treated in the Permian Basin alone this season.
At an estimated average treatment cost per acre between $\$ 3.25$ and $\$ 3.50$ it can be easily surmised that the three zones have pent over a million dollars in just one week combating an expanive insurgence of weevils from St. Lawrence,
The Southern Rolling Plains Zone was declared functionally eradicated of boll weevil in September 2000. No weevils were caught in
2001 but apparently a few snuck in from St. Lawrence, which is west of the zone, during 2002. SRP Zone recently celebrated becoming debt-free but now faces mounting costs to maintain their eradicated status.

From The Desk Of Bovina City Manager Ernest Terry We had a problem with dogs this week. Fd like to write a few
comments pertaining to the Bovina City Ordinance concerning dogs comments pertaining to the Bovina
and the responsibility of their owners.
and the responsibility of their owners.
It is unlawful for any dog to run at large. Failure to control your dog It is unlawful for any dog to run at large. Failure to control your dog
is a violation of the city ordinance and you can be fined not less than $\$ 10$ and not more than $\$ 500$ for each offense.
What is meant by control? That is a secure fence or leash restraining the dog. The police or animal control personnel do not have to
catch the dog for the citation; they only need to see the dog running free. If the dog can be captured, the dog will be impounded, and the owner will be responsible for all fines and/or fees attached to the dog. Vaccination of all dogs over four months old is required. Failure to
vaccinate a dog annually is a violation of the ordinance and you can vaccinate a dog annually is a violation of the ordinance and you can
be fined not less than $\$ 10$ and not more than $\$ 500$ for each offense. be fined not less than $\$ 10$ and not more than $\$ 500$ for each offense.
Now, what happens if your dog attacks (acts in an aggressive Now, what happens if your dog attacks (acts in an aggressive
manner) or bites another animal or human? If the dog bites, scratches, manner) or bites another animal or human? If the dog bites, scratches,
slobbers, or attacks a person or another animal, the dog could be impounded for a minimum of ten (10) days for observation. The owner will be responsible for all fees and/or fines attached to that dog.
Let's take a hypothetical situation where a dog (non-vaccinated)
runs free, attacks another dog (dog fight), and bites a human. The dog runs free, attacks another dog (dog fight), and bites a human. The dog
will be impounded for a minimum of ten days, and the owner will be will be impounded for a minimum of ten days, and the owner will be
cited for failure to control the dog, failure to vaccinate the dog, attacking another animal, and dog biting a human.
That is four citations for violations of the ordinance and you can be fined not less than $\$ 10$ and not more than $\$ 500$ for each offense,
possibly $\$ 2,000$ of fines plus the bill for capture and impounding of possibly $\$ 2,000$ of fines plus the bill for capture and impounding of
the dog for ten days. That doesn't include the owner's responsibility for the dog for ten days. That doesn't include the owner's responsibility for
medical costs. The dog could be euthanized to check for rabies, and that cost is also the responsibility of the owner.
Finally, any dog deemed to be a vicious animal as a result of attacking or biting a human may be put to death on the order of the Municipal Judge.
A dog deemed dangerous must be confined within a secure enclosure, keep the City notified of the dogs location at all times, restrain the dog at all times on a leash, and obtain inabily insurance of at attack.

## "dangerous/viclous dog" is a dog that:

(1) Makes an unprovoked attack on a person that causes bodily harm/injury and occurs in a place other than an enclosure in which the dog was being kept and that was reasonably certain to prevent the dog from leaving the enclosure on its own; or
(2) Commits unprovoked acts in a place other than an enclosure in which the dog was being kept and that was reasonably certain to prevent the dog from leaving the enclosure on its own and those acts cause a person to reasonably believe that the dog will attack and
