THE SENIOR OBJECTS.

Del Rio, Texas.—I am just now trying to figure out where I am at on that terrible "bleeding section" of the Terrell election law. As a Representative of the people I am pledged to the blanket system, but as editor of The Sentinel I find myself favoring the law as it now stands, which is optional and leaves it within the power of the executive committee of a district to dictate the nominee by choosing the blanket or the unit system, whichever they may deem most favorable to the candidate a majority of them may favor.

The Sentinel, of a recent date, prints the following paragraph, which I correct from sheer necessity, since it is entirely diametrical to the way I shall cast my vote. It says: "There will be some other matters that will be more than likely be discussed in connection with 'bleeding section 120' of the Terrell election law. The blanket primary may be one of the stunts the law makers will work upon. The primary as it now stands is good enough for all parties, and The Sentinel can see no reason for making a change."

I would favor either a blanket or the unit vote rather than the present law, which leaves it optional with executive committees to change from one to the other as may suit their views, leaving the masses always in suspense and doubt is to how their votes are going to be disposed of in nominating conventions.

In writing up the announcement of Beeman Strong for district attorney, both the papers at Jacksonville said very complimentary things about him. The Reformer of that city in the last issue contained the following: "In our announcement column will be found the name of Hon. Beeman Strong of Nacogdoches, who is a candidate for the office of District Attorney, subject to the action of the democratic party. Mr. Strong is an able lawyer and is serving his third term as county attorney of Nacogdoches county, which fact is proof of his ability and of the confidence the people of his home county have placed in him. He has been a resident of Nacogdoches for a number of years and is well and favorably known in this district. We know of nothing more commending to say of Mr. Strong than that his record is open to all inquirers. He asks the support of the voters and gives assurance that if he is elected he will devote his whole time and talent to the faithful discharge of the duties of the office."

In The Sentinel today appears the endorsement of the candidacy of Hon. Beeman Strong for district attorney, by the Nacogdoches bar. The Sentinel endorses the action of the bar in rec-

ognizing the fitness and qualifications of Mr. Strong for this important position. The office of district attorney is one that should be filled by men who have proven themselves by actual experience, qualified to fill the office. This can be truthfully said of Mr. Strong, and this fact is not only recognized by the people of Nacogdoches county but throughout the entire district. His record as a prosecuting attorney in the county court and the assistance rendered in the district court of this county is on open book; it is a record that he can point to with pride and The Sentinel is quite sure that the democracy of the district will show its appreciation of his worth and will "give honor to whom honor is due."

In speaking of the announcement of Beeman Strong as a candidate for district attorney, the Jacksonville Banner has the following to say of the candidate from Nacogdoches county: "Mr. Strong has been county attorney of Nacogdoches county for several terms, and has proven himself a terror to law-breakers in that section. As a prosecutor he has been fearless and persevering and it is safe to say that his candidacy will meet with little favor with the criminal element. He will visit Cherokee county at an early date, in order that he may become better acquainted with our people."

From every source of information at this time, the indications are that the farmers will plant a much larger crop of cotton this year than they did last, and while The Sentinel is not a prophet, yet it will venture the assertion that the farmers of the cotton-growing States will see 6 cent cotton next fall. If there were a good cotton mill in operation here there would possibly be some show for the farmers to get a better price for the raw product, at least the difference in the freight. This is a matter that the Farmers' Union could discuss with profit to the organization, and the entire country as well. With the location of a good cotton mill here, the stockholders in the enterprise would find it to be a good thing and the farmers would have a market at home for their cotton.—The Sentinel.

No doubt a large acreage will be planted in cotton this year. The farmers expect it, the buyers expect it, the speculators expect it, and the spinners look with favor upon it. A big cotton crop means a busy fall for all hands in the cotton belt and big dividend for the cotton millers. If Texans will plant too much cotton for their own good, then, by all means, let us encourage the installation of cotton factories in this State. What we lose one way we may gain in another. The farmer may figure it out for himself as to where he comes in. If he doesn't come at all he will know where to place the blame.—Dallas News.

BRIGHT PROSPECTS

Mr. Jordan of The Southern Cotton Association Speaks.

From Thursday's Daily:

This morning at 11 o'clock Harvie Jordan addressed a small, but enthusiastic audience on the benefits that have been derived from the Southern Cotton Association, and what the association hopes to accomplish in the future.

The following is a brief synopsis of Mr. Jordan's address:

"The South is now enjoying an unprecedented era of prosperity. This is due largely to the fact that cotton, the basis of Southern prosperity, has commanded fairly remunerative prices during the past five years. A short period of depression in prices one year ago, caused by the production of an enormous crop in 1904, culminated in the organization of the Southern Cotton Association and the cementing together of the farmers, merchants and bankers for co-operation in a general effort to protect and safeguard the staple from the disastrous influences of speculation and depression. The history of the work accomplished by the Association during its short period of existence is one of the marvels of the age.

"The crop of 1905 has up to the present time been marketed with greater intelligence and system than any crops of recent years. It has been the only crop which has netted to the growers an average of ten to ten and a half cents per pound in twenty-five years. It was the only crop where the rank and file of the growers throughout the South stubbornly refused to yield to the unwarranted depressing influences of the market last October when prices were forced down by speculation and combination below ten cents per pound. The farmers of the South therefore deserve the highest commendation for their loyalty during the past to the Southern Cotton Association and for the intelligent manner in which they have protected and safeguarded these interests.

"The marketing of the past two crops has demonstrated the fact that two important essentials are needed to place the growers in a position to safely resist the depressing influences of speculation. The South must be supplied with a first-class system of adequate ware house, where the cotton can be stored and financed so as to meet the legitimate demands of consumption.

The greatest single evil confronting the South, and indeed the whole country at the present time, is the rapidly growing tendency toward speculation in cotton futures. The price of this magnificent staple crop, the most valuable of all agricultural products is daily kicked about like a football on Cotton Exchanges of the world. The rottenness of the New York Cotton Exchange is known to all dealers in cotton and has been roundly condemned by its own members.

"The entire business interests of the country should

either insist upon the adoption of such rules in the New York Cotton Exchange as will permit the establishment and maintenance of legitimate transactions or there should be enacted stringent laws throughout every cotton state that will heavily penalize every person who is not in position to deliver the actual product which he sells or will receive the product that he buys. If gambling in cotton futures is not suppressed it will ultimately demoralize and jeopardize the entire business interests of the South, and especially will it be ruinous to farmers.

"The spinning industry of the entire world is enjoying an era of unprecedented prosperity. Cotton goods are abnormally high, the spinners have sold the entire output of their mills for many months ahead. Many millions of new spindles are in active operation, and the great difficulty of the jobbing and retail trade is to secure the prompt delivery of their purchases. It has ceased to be a question of price, but one of delivery of goods.

"I rejoice at the prosperity of the manufacturers. I want them to prosper. Upon the success of the mill's depend the success of the growers. But I also want see the growers prosperous and happy, enjoying with the mills a fair

and equitable divisions of the profits arising from the production and manufacture of the South's great staple crop. I want to see a closer relation and a better understanding between the cotton producers and cotton manufacturers. I hope to see a direct trade established between grower and spinner.

The slogan to be preached from the valleys and hilltops of the entire cotton belt during the next three months is the curtailment of the cotton acreage for 1906 and an increase of the food supply crops.

Fill your corn crib and smokehouses from the products of your farms and thereby be in a position to maintain the price of your cotton on a fair and profitable basis.

"If the world has more cotton than it needs at this time curtail production and reduce the yield of the staple to the actual needs of consumption. The cotton acreage must not be increased this year. Every man who did not decrease his acreage fully 25 per cent last year, should do so this year. Cotton is to-day the cheapest product on the market. The cotton growers receive less compensation for their labor than any other people in the United States, notwithstanding they enjoy an absolute monopoly of its production, while 2-3 of the civilized world de-

pend upon the staple for clothing.

"In conclusion let me impress upon you the high importance of extending and perfecting the organization of the Southern Cotton Association to the end that every man in Nacogdoches county will speedily become a loyal and patriotic member of this great movement. Nothing can be accomplished without systematic effort and thorough organization. The forces with which we have to contend have been organized for fifty years and have unlimited resources of both brains and money. Learn to have confidence in your association and its leaders. Determine to contribute to its support, that its efforts in your behalf may not be handicapped for the want of friends. Combine with your local merchants and bankers to safeguard and protect the value of your great staple crop from the withering and blighting hands of its enemies. Cut down your cotton acreage, increase your food supply crops. Live at home. Hold your cotton for fifteen cents and victory will be yours before the hot days of summer are felt over this land of the free and the brave."

At the conclusion of Mr. Jordan's address, Col. R. T. Milner organized the Nacogdoches association of the Southern Cotton Growers Association with the following gentlemen as officers: E. A. Blount, president, John Schmidt, vice-president, J. M. Weeks, secretary, and L. L. Sturdevant, treasurer.

Grand Jury Adjourns.

From Saturday's Daily: Yesterday afternoon the grand jury came into open court and reported the work of that body up to that time, and asked that the jury be granted a recess. This was granted, and the jury adjourned until Monday, April 9.

During the deliberations of the grand jury sixty-six bills of indictment were returned. Of this number nine were for felonies, and fifty-seven misdemeanors.

Order of Commissioners' Court.

Declaring the result of Prohibition Election and forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquors in Nacogdoches County.

Nacogdoches, Tex., March 19, '06
Whereas, the Commissioner's Court of Nacogdoches County, Texas, at a special session of said court held on the 19th day of March, 1906, opened the polls and counted the votes of an election held throughout Nacogdoches county on the 8th day of March, 1906, for the purpose of determining whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors should be prohibited in said county of Nacogdoches, and it appearing to the court that said election was held in conformity to the laws of the State of Texas and the court having counted the votes, found that (1599) fifteen hundred and ninety-nine votes were cast "For Prohibition," and (953) nine hundred and fifty-three votes were cast "Against Prohibition," and that a majority of the votes are "For Prohibition."

And, whereas, said court declared and ordered the sale of intoxicating liquors is absolutely prohibited in Nacogdoches county, Texas, except for the purpose and under the regulations specified in the laws of the State of Texas, until such time as the qualified voters of said county of Nacogdoches, at a legal election held for that purpose, by a majority vote, decide otherwise.

Therefore, I, Robert Berger, in my official capacity as County Judge of Nacogdoches County, Texas, do hereby order that said order of the Commissioner's Court of Nacogdoches County be published as the law requires, in The Nacogdoches Sentinel, a weekly newspaper published in Nacogdoches County, Texas.

DOCTORING THE LAW.

Poor bleeding Section 120 of the Terrell election law is about to be put in shape so that the candidates will know where they are "at" in the primaries. The following is the way the senate of the special session of the legislature would have the bill corrected: "Section 120—The candidate for any county office who received either a plurality or majority votes of all the votes cast in his county as provided in section 3 of this act, shall be entitled to be placed upon the official ballot as a candidate of his party for the office for which he was nominated. Candidates for all State and district office shall, in the nominating convention, have prorated among them the convention vote of each county in proportion to the vote cast for each candidate in the primary election in such county."

The Houston Chronicle this morning is authority for the statement that the bill in the senate, after the constitutional rule was suspended, passed at the third reading by a vote of 24 ayes; only three votes against. The blanket primary amendment was tabled by a vote of 17 to 10.

Nothing but another yellow fever scare can get some of the citizens of Nacogdoches awakened to the necessity of putting the town in good sanitary condition.

In figuring up the mileage and per diem of the special session of the legislature to correct a mistake, the committee having the matter in charge stated that it would require an appropriation of \$35,000. Gee, but "bleeding section 120" was a costly error on the part of some one.

The provision in a railroad ticket that in the case of dispute between the passenger and a conductor as to the right of a passenger to use the ticket, the passenger should pay the conductor's claim, take his receipt and report the matter to the general passenger agent, is held unreasonable and void by the Missouri Supreme Court in *Cherrey vs. Chicago and Alton Railroad Company* (90 Southwestern Rep. 381).

In our announcement column this week will be found the name of Hon. Beeman Strong, of Nacogdoches, candidate for district attorney of this judicial district. Mr. Strong is a fine lawyer, possessed of splendid qualifications for the position he seeks. He is at present county attorney of Nacogdoches county; was elected to that position four years ago by a majority of 1500 over his opponent in the primaries, and was re-elected two years ago without opposition. Mr. Strong is very popular throughout the district, and we doubt not will make a most creditable showing in the primaries.—Alto Herald.

A BIG FIGHT IS UP.

In The House on The Blanket Primary.

Austin, March, 27.—Two days have been consumed by the extraordinary session of the 29th Legislature, and the prospects are that there will be no adjournment before Friday or Saturday. The day has been spent today in discussing an amendment to Section 120 providing for a blanket primary. If the House could have come together and had concurred with the Senate, emulating the example of the upper house by suspending the rules and passing the bill, or rather adopting the portion of section 120 as it originally was, this special session could have adjourned today. But there is a fight up now over the amendment above mentioned, and an adjournment may not be had for several days.

The "Third House" is not conspicuous at this called session but there is a multitude of candidates for State officers here. It affords them a fine opportunity to enquire about "fences" in every part of the state and they are taking advantage of it. I haven't seen Kalamity Bonner since I came to Austin. I think he must have taken to the Cedar Brakes when the legislators began to "drive up."

Col. T. S. Garrison, of Timpson is here, attending the State Sunday School Convention and at the same time looking after his campaign, and from the general expression I hear on every hand I consider his prospects of securing the democratic nomination for State Treasurer exceedingly good.

Oil City.

Mr. Editor:

The committee appointed by the Business League to ascertain how soon the Nacogdoches & Southeastern railroad will extend from Woden its present terminus to Oil City, were assured by the railroad officials that the road will reach Oil City some time this year. The contract between the Hayward people and the Nacogdoches people was to "build sixteen and a half miles as soon as possible." This will carry it beyond Oil City. There is hardly a man in Nacogdoches county that would not be benefited by the extension of the road into Oil City. It would mean the immediate development of our splendid oil field, which gives promise of being the greatest oil producing territory in the world. The Higgins Oil Co. has leased the entire holdings of the Houston Oil Co.—about 3400 acres of land including everything at Oil City, and is ready to go to work as soon as railroad transportation is assured. To the Northeast of Oil City are the famous "Sawyer" wells, which, like the wells at Oil City, produced profitably for years and are now standing full of oil. These wells are only about two or three hundred feet deep, yet it is known absolutely that some of them produced when first brought in

hundreds of barrels per day. Other oil Companies are ready to begin and cover the entire country with derricks. Oil City is the key to the situation and the Hayward people can unlock the door and let its imprisoned wealth gush forth, and they themselves will be the greatest beneficiaries of its development. The probability of getting gushers at a depth of 800 to 1000 feet is very great and the Higgins Oil Company and other companies will sink deep wells as well as "work" the territory for shallow oil, which already is a better field than Corsicana. If gushers are struck Nacogdoches county will have Spindle Tops, Sour Lakes, Batsons, Saratogas and Humbles with the famous fields of Baku in far off Russia thrown in for good measure.

Verdict of Acquittal.

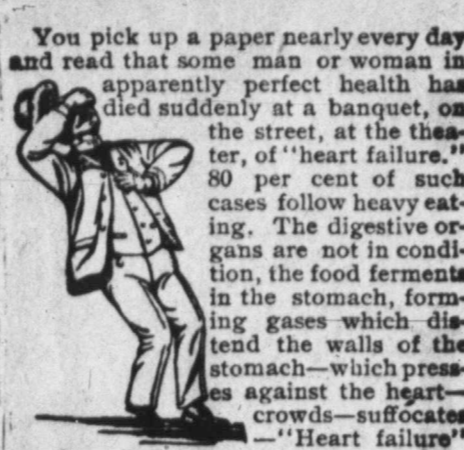
