977 Tax statements were mailed in November 977 to owners of real and personal property as shown by our current records. Because numerous : arcels change ownership each year many new owners do not receive their statements and consequeantly their taxes become delinquent or those people and others who may not have paid their REAL ESTATE taxes, this is a reminder to check your records to verify that all of your taxes have been paid.
Included in taxes that become delinqunt FEBRUARY ist are AUTOMOBILE TAXES and BUS INESS, PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES. Be sure to check these items very closely as these taxes are are not paid by your loan company.

PENALTY and INTEREST charges become effective FEBRUARY 1, 1978 and apply to all taxes, whether REAL or PERSONAL that are not paid by January 31, 1978.
Renditions for 1978 taxes should be signed, and in the office BEF ORE April 30th.
