WIFE Is Launched Statewide

One hundred eighty people (115 WIFE members) met at the Quality Inn, Amarillo, last Saturday for the purpose of organizing WIFE (Women Involved In Farm Economics) on a state level.

The Swisher County WIFE group was in charge of the meeting this year. At a previous steering committee meeting, it had been decided that one chapter in the state would be responsible for organizing and planning the state convention each year.

Nell Fenney of Tulia, acted as chairman of the group and Hazel Cranley of Amarillo, was the registered parliamentarian.

A constitution and by-laws was acted upon and adopted and officers were elected. They are as follows: Darlene Barnes, Lipscomb County, president; Sonya Godfrey, Spearman, vice president; Karen Kirk. Spearman, second vice president and spokeswoman; Diane Hall, Swisher County, recording secretary; Janice Allred, Hereford, treasurer; Marilyn Groves, Spearman, historian and public relations. In addition, three members were elected to the National Steering Committee.

The speaker for the noon luncheon was Rep. Jack Hightower, who gave great praise to the women for organizing, and promoting the business in which they are so involved, and know as much about as anyone, since they are the grass roots of the situation.

He gave credit to the WIFE group, especially the women who went to Washington, for being responsible for the farm bill that was passed. He said it wasn't what WIFE wanted or what he wanted, but he thought it was a lot better than it would have been if the women had not become so involved and started bringing the problems to the attention of

everyone. Ray Fitzterald, the head ASCS man was the afternoon speaker. He also commended the women for the position they had taken. He had a question and answer period at the end of his speech and really didn't have any answers as to any solutions since he is in the administrative position and recommended that we consult our congressmen and representatives to this end.

Four members from the Bovina chapter attended the convention. They were: Alma Clayton, Furne Harris, Ellen Estes and Erra Jamerson.


Burial will be in the Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

Bovina Ag Meeting Is Well-Attended

The American Agriculture movement staged its first mass local meeting for the public last Friday night in Bovina Schools auditorium.

The crowd trickled in slowly as the 7 o'clock target time arrived, but when the program began about 7:20, there appeared to be an audience of more than 150 persons.

Ralph Roming was master of ceremonies. Grady Sorley gave the opening prayer and David Steelman led the Pledge of Allegiance. Don Murphy offered the closing prayer. Another attraction was singer

Larry Trider, who recently recorded

"The Farmer Feeds Us All," a song

the singer says is a "tool for the farmer to work with." The song was written by Ry Cooder in the '20s, Trider explained, but its theme of farmers losing money while the "middleman gets it

all" fits the American Agriculture

movement today. Clarence Kerns, Pioneer Seed representative, explained his company's position, gave assurances of its past and present support of the farmers' predicament and efforts and wished them the best in their trip to Washington.

Roming then read an article which attempted to explain the meaning of parity, and pointed out that parity deals with our complete economic system, and not simply agriculture.

"Current misinformed stories say farmers are striking for guaranteed profits. Spokesmen for American Agriculture say this is not true. All farmers want is parity for what is consumed and exported. They want to be equivalent with the rest of the economy," Roming said.

Don Kimball of Canyon, noted North Plains Leader and speaker for American Agriculture, was the featured speaker.

Kimball had given virtually the same speech at Lubbock the previous night, and said that it was well accepted.

In his speech, Kimball gave details on a 12-point plan which was

drafted by farmers from 44 states who met in Omaha, Nebraska, recently. He said the proposal will be taken to Washington this week as farmers attempt to get their plight before representatives of the Carter administration.

Kimball said he had been asked "How can the farmer be in such bad financial shape and drive a \$40,000 tractor all over town?"

His reply was that the past farm policy of the Federal government has forced the farmer to produce at cheap prices. The cheaper the price becomes, the more volume the farmers must farm, the larger the equipment he must buy, the more money he has to borrow, the more risks he must take, just to maintain a reasonable standard of living.

"If he had his choice, he would rather pay \$10,000 for a tractor like people in the cities would like to buy a Chevrolet for \$2,500. Those days are gone," Kimball stated.

Others have also said "If the farmer can't make a living at farming he should get out of farming." This is a simple solution for someone who doesn't understand agriculture, Kimball maintains.

"If the farmer quit farming you would have to quit eating, and the same philosophy should also apply. If there's no food to eat, learn to survive some other way," was the tongue-in-cheek analagy.

"Mr. Secretary, you are misleading farmers and the people of this nation, insinuating we are nothing more than a few trouble makers and we have no sensible working plan whatsoever. The truth is, Mr. Secretary, you don't want to hear our plan!" Kimball charged.

Following his speech, plus a reading of the American Agriculture Movement's recommendations to the secretary of agriculture, plus a message from the movement to the secretary and to President Carter, Kimball opened the meeting to questions.

The first train was stopped

early Wednesday morning, and was held up until a Santa Fe supervisor arrived from Clovis,

The farm strike leaders offered coffee and doughnuts to the train men, who were apprehensive especially during the stoppage of the first train. "A potentially dangerous situation turned into a pleasant encounter. Cool heads prevailed on both sides. The train men were sympathetic to the farmers' problems," said a local Santa Fe spokesman.
