More than that, the proposition is given at the city will be held open for a week. The citizens will have a chance to see the water works system and to see how badly they want it.

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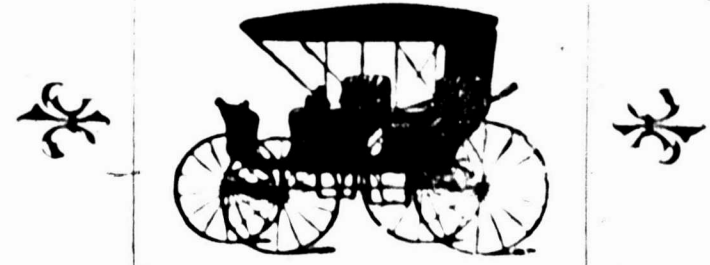

THE ROADS AND THE LAW.

The condition of the public roads in Nacogdoches county is becoming alarming. And, under the existing road law, there is little hope of bettering their condition to any very great extent. As is well known by nearly every tax payer in the county who is eligible to road duty, any one who desires to do so can escape working the roads for one year by paying to the County Treasurer \$4 road tax before the first day of February, and the number of farmers and road hands who are taking advantage of this provision of the law is surprisingly large. In fact, it is stated that in some road districts every man subject to road duty has paid the tax, and the overseers are left without a hand to work their roads. For this reason the roads are not worked except as ordered by the County Commissioner in whose district the roads are located. There is no disputing the fact that our road laws need revising and improving, and it is hoped that an effort will be made to secure a better law by the Legislature now in session—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

If every man in the county mentioned pays his \$4 road tax, that would be a sum in the aggregate which would go a long way toward making good roads. The State needs legislation on the road question. And it needs legislation toward changing the powers and duties of the Commissioners' Courts. Up to within the last five years the Commissioners Court was considered one of the least important courts. But of late the people have been aroused to the fact that it is one of the most important bodies in the county. The laws creating such court and vesting it with certain duties and powers badly needs amendments and changes.—Dal-Gal-News.

In the first paragraph quoted, The Sentinel failed to state that Nacogdoches county has a special road law, which, if enforced or complied with, much improvement in the public roads would result. But even this law is not perfect in several respects. Roads cannot be made without money, and money for any public purpose cannot be obtained without taxation, and no law providing for the collection of a tax is a success that does not make the payment of the tax compulsory. Verily, the state does need legislation on the road question.

The Liquor Traffic Committee of the House has reported favorably the bill providing that any person, firm or corporation who should receive and deliver liquors for cash on delivery should pay an annual tax of \$5,000 to the State, \$2,500 to the county and \$2,500 to the city, unless package is accompanied by original order. This bill is practically the counterpart of the Mississippi State law that has been affirmed and held constitutionally by the United States Supreme Court, and is directed at the C. O. D. express shipments into local op-

tion districts. Its terms make it strictly prohibitive, as this annual tax is imposed for each and several offices of such corporations at or in a local option district.

AFTER several years of continued service, George T. Spears retires from the editorship of the Grand Saline Sun, having sold the paper to E. M. Chrestman.

THE editor of the San Antonio Gazette has been arrested for contempt of the legislative investigating committee. The Gazette man should have remembered the case of poor Canfield.

THE time for action on the water works proposition is drawing near, and there is little doubt but that the question will be submitted to a vote of the tax payers. And, by the way, those who failed to pay their poll tax will be debarred from voting on it.

THE Press Journal announces that Rusk will no longer play second fiddle to Jacksonville, but that the old town now proposes to forge to the front and lead her sister city in the progressive race. The revival of the iron industry will give the Cherokee county capital an opportunity to verify this statement.

LAST Sunday's Dallas News contained a picture of a new church recently built at Winsboro, Wood county, that reflects credit upon the little East Texas town and its people. According to the statement which accompanied the picture, that church cost nearly as much as all the churches in Nacogdoches, and yet by the census of 1900 the little town of Winsboro had a population of less than 1000. Here indeed is a lesson and an example that the people of Nacogdoches would do well to emulate.

The San Augustine Vidette very truthfully says: "There should be no faction in any city. The prosperity of any individual and every improvement made enhances the value of all property in the town. It is simply one big family. When this is discarded there is little progress. When there is a united effort for any thing, it's accomplishment is made easy. Envy, jealousy and hatred are things to be despised. Envy is a canker that gnaws at the heart and makes folks sour and unhappy; jealousy warps the intellect and makes us unfair in passing judgment. Hatred doesn't pay even from a sordid point of view."

Many addresses were delivered and enthusiasm ran high. The Sentinel says Nacogdoches people have unitedly made up their minds to have the great school located in their fine city. It appears evident that if any other place gets the school, some "mighty tall work" will have to be done. Nacogdoches is pulling for it.—Baptist Standard.

That Nacogdoches is still in the lead for this school there is no doubt and as the Standard says, if any other place gets it, they've got to earn it by hard work and tall hustling. Nacogdoches has gone after that college with the determination to win, and fully realizing the great benefit such an institution will be to the town and county, there is a united effort on the part of all the people, regardless of sect or section, and that is an influence that will require unusual effort to overcome. Of course Nacogdoches is in the lead.

Significant Prosperity.

The fact that 160 state banks have been organized under the new law is another of the many proofs that Texas is a good place for those seeking new locations to find them. These new state banks in addition to the national banks give Texas perhaps the lead in banking capital invested, according to population, over any part of the south or west. This condition also has a very significant meaning—the confidence implied that there will be a steady march ahead, and no danger of any halts or turnings backward. Many enterprises can be maintained with considerable show of success on a speculative or inflation

basis without any great solidity or assurance of permanency. The banking business is one requiring the greatest caution in the matter of whether or not a town will justify and support a bank or an additional bank, as well as ability in the management, and the fact that this most conservative of business ventures has increased so fast is a guarantee that all the conditions, present and prospective, are such as to convince the best business instinct that Texas is just commencing to grow. It is certainly a most gratifying showing to Texans and a light in the window for those who want to come and see us.—Current Issue.

AN IMPORTANT BILL.

A MEASURE THAT WILL PROTECT CITIZENS FROM LAND SHARKS.

Mr. King Comes to the Rescue of Nacogdoches County Citizens Who Have Been Harassed by Law Suits.

It will be remembered that a few months ago much excitement and no little uneasiness was created among citizens of Nacogdoches county, by an attempt made by T. N. Jones of Tyler to dispossess bona fide owners of land on the Jose Mora grant in the southeastern portion of the county.

On Monday Hon. S. M. King, representative from Nacogdoches county, introduced a bill in the House, which, if passed, will validate all titles to lands obtained from old Mexican land grants.

The following is the bill:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That from and after the passage of this act all grants of land situated in the various counties of the state of Texas, known as Spanish and Mexican Land Grants, and having their inception under the Spanish and Mexican governments, and which appear upon the maps of the counties in said state in which any of such grants may be located, recorded in the offices of the county clerks of such counties, and extant in the General Land Office of the state of Texas prior to the adoption of the state of Texas, occupied by actual settlers or held by parties under legal conveyances upon a purchase for a valuable consideration, or held by descent and distribution from and under any of such purchasers, be, and the same are, hereby validated and declared to be valid Land Grants so far as the State of Texas can convey its rights in and to any of the said grants or any parts thereof; that the boundaries of the grants of land contemplated by this act fixed and established by the plots and maps thereof of records in such counties, and in the General Land Office of the State of Texas, upon the date hereinabove stated; provided that nothing in this act shall be so construed as effecting or determining the priority of any such grants which may cover and embrace the same territory.

It is presumed that the legislature will be called upon to take action on the measure next Wednesday, if it is not killed in the committee room, but many fear the latter will be its fate.—Center Daily News.

In fact, does not the State Democratic platform recommend if not demand that no legislation be enacted for the consolidation of railroads? Besides, Governor Campbell expressed his opposition to the consolidation of railroad lines during the campaign prior to the primaries, and is no doubt of the same opinion still. Hence those interested should not be surprised if the Santa Fe merger bill should fail to become a law.

AMICABLY ADJUSTED.

Question of Widening Street at Perkins Corner is Settled.

The city council met in called session at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, with the mayor and all the aldermen present.

Mayor Shindler stated that the object of the meeting was to hear the report of the committee on survey and measuring the Perkins lot and other lots on the North side of the square with the view to widening the street at the Perkins corner.

After the committee submitted the report, and the matter was discussed fully, it was suggested that the diagonal corner of the Perkins building be dropped back on the south about two feet, and that the sidewalk at that point be made only seven feet wide.

This suggestion was agreed to by Perkins Bros., they agreeing to donate the land necessary to make the suggested change in the building, on condition that the city reimburse them for whatever extra expense they may be put to in putting in new foundation, new lintels, etc.

This was adopted by the council, and the mayor appointed Aldermen Rulf and Floyd to make the necessary plans and measurements with Perkins Bros., put the agreement in writing and report the same at the next meeting of the council.

This number is about 300 short of the total number of polls paid in 1906, and over 2,000 short of the number assessed.

The total city polls paid was 386, out of a total of 600 assessed, and of this number about 25 paid who had not been assessed, leaving about 240 citizens of the city who have disfranchised themselves by failing to pay their poll tax.

WILL BUILD WAREHOUSES.

Farmers Union Planning to Control Price of Cotton.

According to a recent statement appearing in the Houston Post, the Farmers Union of the South has inaugurated a plan by which it is proposed to control the entire cotton crop of this country.

That this statement is true, and that there are forces now at work which will bring about such a consummation, says the Post, a little insight into the plans of this organization will remove all doubt in the minds of the most skeptical.

There are about 712 cotton growing counties in the Southern cotton growing belt. It has been planned to place on an average of two warehouses in each county, or a total of 1424. The average county warehouse will house about 1500 bales of cotton. This number of county warehouses will house in the neighborhood of 2,136,000 bales. In addition to the county warehouses there will be large central warehouses, such as the warehouse in Houston. For instance, the union is planning to erect a large central warehouse in Charleston, S. C., at a cost of \$25,000. The average county warehouse costs \$2500. This means for county warehouses alone the union proposes to spend \$3,560,000.

An amount almost double that will be expended in erecting large central warehouses. At any rate it can be stated on the authority of men on the inner circles of the Farmers' union that it is proposed to expend at least \$10,000,000 toward the erection of warehouses in the South.

The laymen might be pardoned for asking the question: Where is the money coming from?

A Farmers' union man who appears to talk with assurance says that it is coming from the farmers themselves, aided by the bankers and merchants of the South.

In Texas alone at the present time there are 100 Farmers union cotton warehouses, and they are being contracted for at the rate of an average of one each day. The money is being put up by the farmers, merchants and bankers of the immediate community where the warehouses are being installed. Owing to the success attending the holding of cotton in warehouses during the season just closing the warehouse plan has taken like wildfire among the farmers. Their merchants and bankers are as enthusiastic as the farmers themselves. Between all forces the warehouse building propaganda goes merrily on, and there is every indication that it will continue to go on until there are a sufficient number of warehouses to hold 6,000,000 bales of cotton.

Upon the whole, the plans of the union may be summarized as follows: Farmers union will have warehouse capacity by September, 1908, for 6,000,000 bales of cotton. They propose to erect on an average of two county ware-

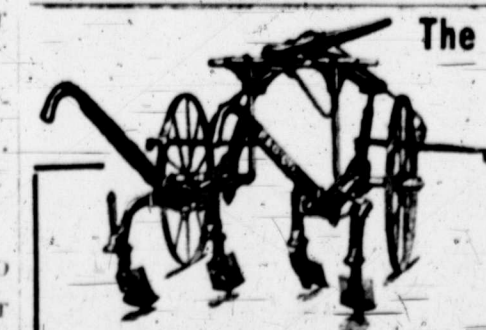
