COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Several Important Matters are up for Consideration.

This session of the commissioners court will go on record as one of the most important for some time. A number of important questions have already come before the court, among them being the districting of some of the school communities.

The Gulf Pipe Line Co., a corporation chartered under the laws of Texas, has applied to the court for a franchise to lay pipes on and across the public roads and streams in Nacogdoches county. The company states that the purpose for which its charter was granted is for the transportation of oil or gas through its pipes from Tulsa, I. T., to Sour Lake, Texas, and the franchise is asked for permission to lay these pipes through the county, and to erect and operate telephone and telegraph lines along the route. The proposed line will cross

the county from north to south, passing about six miles west of the city of Nacogdoches.

The Stone Fort Drug Company was awarded the contract to furnish all prescriptions for the county farm, jail and otherwise for the ensuing quarter.

A number of accounts have been presented for the court's consideration.

The commissioners court went out to inspect the county poor farm this morning, and the members report that they found everything in excellent shape.

Died

Mrs. Margaret Adams died this morning at 2 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Nora Jones, on East Main street, at the age of 67 years. Her life was unselfishly spent in Christian service to her Maker and now when He calls her to Him she is prepared to go and receive all His blessings. Funeral services took place this afternoon at 5 o'clock in the City cemetery.

PASSING OF A VETERAN.

George W. Rector Dead at the Age of 85.

When Mr. George W. Rector died yesterday afternoon one of the oldest citizens of Nacogdoches county passed away. He had been in feeble health for some time, and his death was not unexpected. He died at the home of Mr. Dude Stallings, his son-in-law, about six and a half miles east of Nacogdoches.

George Washington Rector was born in 1822, and was nearing his 85th birthday. He had lived in Nacogdoches county pretty much all his life, and was a Mexican war veteran. In 1848 Mr. Rector joined Jas. R. Arnold's volunteer company with a number of other Nacogdoches county citizens, and during the memorable war between the United States and Mexico he did valiant service.

Mr. Rector was drawing a pension from the United States government for the services he rendered in that war, and on last Monday Mr. Clifton Wells, deputy county clerk, went out to Mr. Stallings to take the old veteran's acknowledgment to his pension papers, but he was too near death's door to permit of the officer performing that duty.

Deceased was a member of Milan lodge No. 2, A. F. & A. M., of this city, and he was buried under the auspices of this lodge at Fair View church at 10 o'clock this morning.

DAMAGE SUITS FILED.

Two Suits Against the Houston East and West Texas.

Two suits have been filed in the district court of Nacogdoches county for damages against the Houston East and West Texas Railroad company.

The first is by J. H. and Florence Burnham for \$4,000. The petition alleges that the plaintiff, Mrs. Florence Burnham, had her foot sprained and permanently injured by reason of a defective seat in the passenger station at Nacogdoches falling on and mashing her foot.

The second suit is filed by Sam Skeeters, who asks for \$5,000 damages for injuries sustained by being knocked from the H. E. & W. T. railroad company's track by a moving train. He alleges that his shoulder was seriously and permanently injured by being hurled from the track some distance when the train struck him.

FELIX HOLMAN'S STATEMENT.

Cause of the Young Negro's Trouble in Mississippi.

Felix Holman, the young Nacogdoches negro who is to be hanged at Greenville, Miss. Friday, has written a letter to his mother, Charity Bullock, in which he gives the cause of his trouble, as follows:

"I was sick when I got into this trouble. I had gotten into a strange place. My wife kept worrying me about things she wanted for Christmas. I had about \$40 or \$50 in money, and I gave it to her to carry. She made way with it and this caused the rucus. After she had made way with my money, I spoke to her concerning it, and she then made her expression and ran and said she was going to get a white man and have me killed. Shortly after she left me I saw a white man coming in the gate with a gun in his hand. She then met him at the door and said: 'You black — you, I told you I would have you killed!' Then I grabbed my pistol and shot her three times, and at sight through madness I shot a policeman, not knowing who he was, killing another white man dead on the spot through self defense. I am also accused of the charge of wounding two or three. If I had not lost my right arm there is no telling what I would have done. That is where it goes so hard with me—shooting those white men while not being at my self."

Felix writes that he has professed religion, and that he wants his mother and father to meet him in glory.

It is true there are two sides to this bond issue proposition, but both justify the citizen in voting for a bond issue for water works.

STRAWBERRIES, green lettuce, carrots, and green onions are being sold by the grocers in Nacogdoches now, while the people of the frozen North are living on dried peas. Such is life.

PARIS dispatches say that the Wellman balloon holds more gas than any other extant. That may be true, but if its inventor should bring his big sack to America he would have no trouble in inflating it.

THE madam editor of the Timpson Times is still wincing, we regret to state, under the hallucination that The Sentinel has handed her a "lemon." This only emphasizes the aphorism that "it is dangerous to throw rocks in the dark."

THE recent reports of the two banks in Nacogdoches show that the citizens of this community have over \$672,000 on deposit. Of course Nacogdoches can not plead poverty as a reason for failing to secure that Baptist college—if she should fail.

It has developed that the same letter which Mayor Shindler received from parties inquiring about a cotton mill was written to mayors of other towns in East Texas. If Nacogdoches wants the cotton mill she may have competition.

AN agricultural exchange advises the farmer to not lose too much time worrying about the beef trust, but to go right on raising more beef. That is good logic. Time spent in worrying over the pooling of interests will never raise the calf.

NACOGDOCHES has long enough been in the condition of the man who, while stranded in midocean, exclaimed: "Water, water, everywhere, and not a drop to drink!" Nacogdoches has water all around her and not a drop with which to fight the flames.

NOT OUR WAY.

There are a great many plans being suggested among many different societies, clubs and other organizations in this city just at this time, as to the very best possible way of securing the proposed Baptist college. Many able discussions have taken place at these gatherings. The people are aroused to a sense of their duty in this matter, and while there have been no definite steps taken in the matter as the actual soliciting of subscriptions etc., there is a great deal of interest being manifested by the people who want to see Tyler secure an institution that will be one of the greatest powers in the upbuilding of the city in more ways than one.—Tyler Times.

The people of Tyler may have to call on the "many different societies, clubs and other organizations" for help to secure the Baptist college, but that is not the Nacogdoches way. Our people will go to the committee with a straight out, clean cut proposition, backed up by a fund contributed by the citizens as a people, and not secured from any club or society. By the way, how is that soliciting committee progressing?

LAST year our sales to foreign countries amounted to \$1,798,197,965, an increase of \$171,207,160, the gain being chiefly in the manufacture of tariff protection of infant industries. Our purchases from foreign countries amounted to \$1,321,094,694, an increase of \$151,960,144. Since 1900, however, the gain in exports has been only 20 per cent, while the gain in imports amounts to 60 per cent. The increase has been all to the advantage of our pampered manufacturers, not the farmers or the consumers. Compare these figures with free trade England. Great Britain last year gained \$230,000,000 in exports, and \$215,000,000 in imports. The percentage of raw material—particularly cotton—represented in British imports is far greater than in our own commerce. British trade has grown faster than our own, without feeding, vampire-like, on its own people.

THEY say Japan's ships are better than ours. Yet our own cost more money. Much of it went in graft to the steel trust. But that is not the worst of it. There are gravest fears that the armor of our battleships is defective. Employees of the steel trust were detected recently in forging the government's inspection label and placing it on bad plates. Treason could go no farther. Then there is our beneficent powder trust, that has sold the secrets of our government to foreigners. They are a nice lot of patriots, these trusts.

THE water works question is the all absorbing topic of discussion on the streets, in the offices and business houses, and it is really amusing to listen at some of the arguments that are being advanced against municipal ownership and the issuance of bonds. Strange to say men who are to be most benefited by a system of water works are most outspoken in their opposition to the proposition.

A MERITORIOUS MEASURE.

The bill introduced by Hon. S. M. King, validating all Spanish and Mexican land grants in this state, is a measure of more merit than one would suppose from a casual reading. There are many thousands of acres of land in Texas the title to which is in jeopardy on account of a doubt as to the validity of these old grants, and much of this land is in Nacogdoches county. Notwithstanding the fact that this land has been occupied by bona fide citizens and tax payers for more than one hundred years, land sharks have recently given notice of their intention of dispossessing these owners, and filing on it as state land. Such an act of injustice if permitted by the state would be outrageous and discrediting to the honor of the commonwealth. It is understood that there is opposition to Mr. King's bill, and remarkable to note, it is said to be coming from the general land office in Austin. Every citizen of Nacogdoches county who believes in justice, fairness and right should immediately notify the legislature that they want the bill to become a law, and thus help their neighbors to save their homes from confiscation.

HERE is a problem in agriculture that may not be in the arithmetic, but it would be well if every farmer would work to it: "A pound and a half of butter will buy a bushel of corn. A bushel of corn, if properly fed, will make six pounds of butter. If you sell the six pounds of butter from the farm you remove practically no fertility and get four times as much for it as you would for the corn. If you sell the corn you get only a fourth as much as you could make from it by feeding it to the cows and selling the butter, and still be removing about 17 cents worth of fertility from the farm, about half as much as the corn is worth." Moral: Feed everything possible to the animals upon the farm.

SENATOR KELLIE and manager Louie P. DeMouche of the Nacogdoches cigar factory are mourning the loss of a box of fine cigars, the product of the Nacogdoches factory and made from tobacco grown in Nacogdoches county. The Senator had been telling his brother senators and other friends in Austin about the fine quality of Nacogdoches tobacco and the excellent cigars made from it, but like the speaker of the house, they were from Missouri, and expressed an inclination to be sighted. To remove their scepticism, Manager DeMouche started a box of his best brand through the mail to Senator Kellie, but a letter from him states that the goods had failed to arrive, and he fears they got burned enroute.

C. O. D. LIQUOR.

Provides for Tax of \$5000 Per Annum on Business.

Following is a copy of the C. O. D. liquor tax bill, which has passed both houses and is now up to the governor. It is very important, as it puts an annual tax of \$5000 on places where such shipments are received:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Texas:

Any person, firm or corporation doing business in this state shall, at each office or place kept, operated or maintained by such person, firm or corporation, at which intoxicating liquors legally delivered upon payment of purchase money therefor, commonly designated as shipments C. O. D., pay annually for each office or place so kept an annual occupation tax to the state of Texas of \$5000. And any county or any incorporated city or town wherein such office or place is located may levy an annual occupation tax upon such person, firm or corporation herein referred to, for each of said offices, not to exceed one-half of the amount hereby levied by the state, such tax to be due and payable annually.

Section 2. The maintaining and operating such office or offices, place or places, by any person, firm or corporation in this state without paying the occupation tax required in section 1 of this act, shall subject such person, firm or corporation so operating and maintaining such office or offices, place or places, to pay to the state of Texas the sum of \$50, and to the county and any incorporated city or very important, as it puts an annual tax of \$5000 on places where such shipments are received:

Section 3. Every new clause.

"We would like very much for you to take this matter up with your fellow citizens and let us hear from you. As you know, a cotton mill in your city would mean from one-half to a cent more for your cotton and big prices for your eggs, cream, poultry, etc., besides lots of surplus money.

PLEA FOR THE FORESTS.

Hon. R. T. Milner Favors Agricultural Bill.

From The Austin Statesmen.

R. T. Milner, state superintendent of insurance, statistics and history, is watching very closely the progress of the bills which have been introduced in the legislature providing for the creation of a department of agriculture. He has devoted considerable time to the question of forestry, and is considered an authority on the subject. Speaking on the subject yesterday afternoon, Mr. Milner said:

"The tree is absolutely without a friend in this great state. There is not a state official who has any authority to speak a word for this grand piece of God's handiwork. Forests are being destroyed with a ruthlessness that at most amounts to a crime—not trees that are used for commercial purposes only, but in the dense forests where the sawmills are located, the big trees are cut down for lumber, and the smaller ones often destroyed by fires produced by the tops left on the ground and the worms (sawyers) which get into the green trees from the remaining portions of cut down trees. All this could be avoided by carefully clearing up the rubbish of the sawlogs and limiting the time of cutting the timber to the seasons when there is no danger of the sawyer. Protection is what the trees needs, and this legislature will, in my opinion, take steps toward that end.

"The bill creating an agricultural department has a provision for the preservation, protection and restoration of our forests and I think it will be passed."

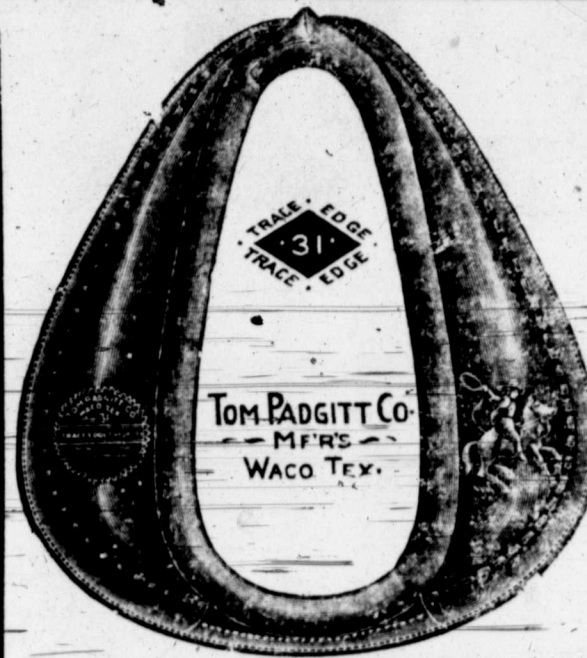

THE JAPANESE QUESTION.

Treaty Must be Signed and Ratified by Government.

A special from Washington says:

Little hope is entertained that the pending troubles between this country and Japan can be settled by the end of this congress. In fact such settlement is deemed out of the question. It is realized that before there can be a permanent adjustment a treaty will probably be necessary. Ratification of a treaty by the senate means long and annoying delay.

It is this fact that presents one of the most perplexing phases of the Japanese question. Long delay in adjustment is likely to result in ugly clashes on the Pacific coast. Members of the California delegation point out that because the San Francisco school board and Mayor Schmitz are coming here prepared to make the concession on the school segregation question, it does not follow there will be a speedy settlement.

They pointed out that the president and Secretary Root are hopeful of negotiating a treaty of exclusion, but obstacles may balk them. They fear the Japanese will demand too much in return and the senate will not grant it.

The senate will hesitate long before granting the Japanese all the rights and privileges of a most favored nation, and this is what Japan is likely to insist on. Such rights would mean naturalization and admission of Japanese into the public schools of each state on the same terms as white pupils.

California members say that pending adjustment by treaty, in case of a long delay, the Japanese government should by imperial decree, prohibit coolies entering this country, since at the present rate they are now rushing into California there will be rioting and bloodshed. That there will be long delay in getting a treaty negotiated and ratified and an act passed to put a treaty into effect is quite convincingly shown by the long delay in getting everything done with the Chinese exclusion question.

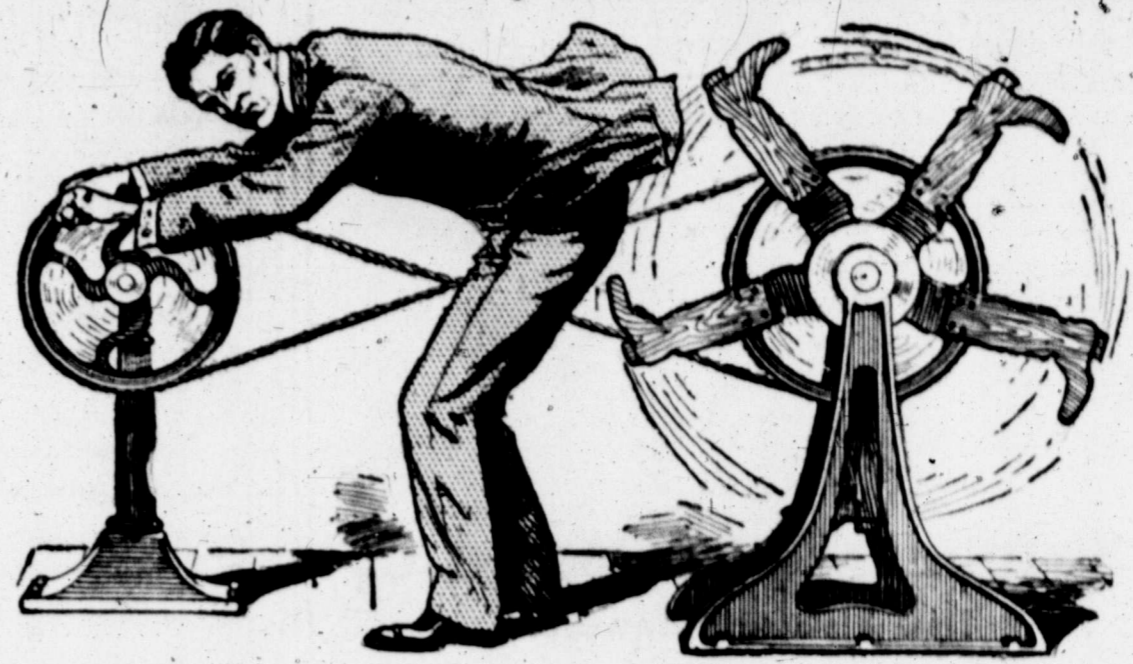

LIQUOR BILL PASSED.

Bill to Tax Express Offices Awaits Governor's Signature.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 8.—The house bill imposing a tax of \$5000 upon companies transporting packages of intoxicating liquor, payment upon delivery, was laid before the upper house of the legislature today. It was fitted with the emergency clause, and upon that issue the fight was raised. The measure was finally passed as reported. It was so framed as to provide for the confiscation, and destruction of liquor found in possession of companies.

An amendment was offered striking out the emergency clause making the measure effective after passage. It was lost by the overwhelming vote of two ayes and 27 nays.

The bill went to final passage by an unanimous vote, and is effective immediately upon the governor's signature.

He alleges that they have squandered the people's money, appropriated by congress, in unnecessary political bickerings, thereby leaving no fund for holding an election for the adoption or rejection of the constitution. Murphy's bill went into the hopper, but is not likely to be heard from again. It is regarded as political buncombe.

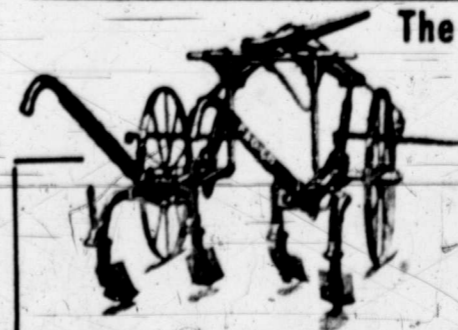
