Reduced Rates.

Secretary J. D. Power of the State Fruit and Truck Growers' association is in receipt of a letter from the general passenger agent of the H. E. & W. T. railroad that a special rate of one and a third fare for the round trip will be made on that line to all who desire to attend the fruit and truck growers' meeting in Nacogdoches, April 10 and 11. The rate will extend to all stations north as far as Joaquin, and south as far as Livingston.

The T. & N. O. railroad has also been asked to make a similar rate on that line.

Rev. Geo. E. Clothier has returned to his home at Livingston. He preached two splendid sermons at the Presbyterian church last Sunday, and he made quite a favorable impression on all who heard him. There is a probability of Mr. Clothier receiving a call to the pastorate of this church for at least half his time.

CLEVELAND AT SEVENTY.

Only Living Ex-President Has Reached Three Score and Ten.

Grover Cleveland, the only living ex-president of the United States, was 70 years of age Monday, March 18.

It is interesting to note that of the twenty-five men who have served as President of the United States, eight of the first twelve who filled the office lived to be 70 years of age or older, while of the thirteen who followed in the office of chief executive of the nation there were but four who lived to the age of seventy—President Fillmore, Buchanan, Hayes and Cleveland. Of the first twelve Presidents John Adams lived to the age of 90, James Madison died at 85, Thomas Jefferson at 83, John Quincy Adams at 80, and Martin Van Buren and Andrew Jackson at the age of 79 and 78, respectively.

Of the last thirteen Presidents none has attained the age of 80. James Buchanan, the oldest, died at the age of 77, Millard Fillmore was 74 at the time of his death and Rutherford B. Hayes passed away soon after he had reached his 70th birthday.

It is now 22 years since Mr. Cleveland first assumed the burdens of the White house. Only five other Presidents lived so long after their inaugurations and these were the two Adamses, Jefferson, Madison, Van Buren and Fillmore. No President inaugurated in the past half-century, except Mr. Cleveland, has survived his inauguration for more than 16 years, which was the record of Gen. Grant.

More Discouraging Reports.

Discouraging reports in regard to the fruit crop continue to come in, and in almost every instance the orchardists declare there will not be more than ten per cent of a crop.

Mr. Allen Seale, who has 25 acres in five-year-old peach trees, states that his trees are apparently lifeless and the buds are dead.

Mr. J. L. Maroney, who has ten acres in orchard, nine acres of which are Elbertas, states that with the exception of an occasional bloom, there is no sign of life in his trees. Many of them, he states, are dead or dying, and an examination of the limbs indicate that they are afflicted with San Jose scale.

Every orchardist should examine his trees according to the instructions given by Prof. A. W. Orr, as published in The Sentinel, and where they find symptoms of the scale, the trees should be cut down and burned.

ANOTHER CONTRACT LET.

Perkins Building to be Completed by July 14.

The contract for the erection of the Perkins' building was awarded yesterday afternoon to R. B. Shearer of Lufkin.

When the bids were opened in this city several days ago, Contractor Taylor of Fort Worth was the lowest bidder by only a few dollars, and the awarding of the contract has been withheld awaiting his pleasure in the premises. Yesterday Mr. Taylor authorized Messrs. Perkins Bros., owners of the building, to let to contractor to Mr. Shearer, the next lowest bidder, and this was done.

The building will cover the site of the old Stone Fort, and will be two stories and modern in style and architecture.

This leaves only the Sanders, Hardeman and Weeks & Bailey buildings to be contracted for, to insure the immediate rebuilding of the burned block. Plans and specifications are now being prepared for those buildings.

It is safe to state that the entire block will be completed and occupied by September 1, next.

The Beaumont Journal says: "Rumor has it that Congressman S. B. Cooper is slated for his former position as Texas member of the ways and means committee, the most important committee in the lower house of congress. Congressman Cooper was a member of that committee when his career was interrupted by defeat in 1906 by ex-Congressman M. L. Brooks."

There is much difference of opinion among fruit men as to the fate of the Elberta peach. The trees are very backward, and so far show very little inclination to put on any foliage or show other symptoms of coming to life.—Palestine Herald.

The same diversity of opinion exists among fruit men in the Nacogdoches country. Some contend, however, that the condition of the fruit trees is the result of disease rather than freeze.

The bill authorizing the Santa Fe to purchase and consolidate the Gulf & Interstate and the Texas & Gulf railroads and pledging that company to convert the purchased roads into a trunk line from Bolivar to the Indian Territory, was passed by the senate by a vote of twenty to six. The vote gives the bill a clear two-thirds majority and indicates that in the event it is vetoed by the governor it would pass the senate despite the objection of the chief executive.

THE ANTI-PASS BILL.

House and Senate Conferees Have Reached an Agreement.

Austin, Tex., March 14.—The anti-free pass conference committee completed its report yesterday and submits it to both branches of the legislature. The house conferees submitted to the provision in the senate bill which provides that the bill shall take effect 90 days after adjournment instead of January 1, 1908. For yielding this point practically every exemption made by the house bill was accepted by the senate conferees. The committee accepted the provision in the house bill which says no person shall exchange anything for transportation except money. This provision is supposed to shut out newspapers from exchanging advertising for mileage, but as newspapers are not mentioned it is doubted by some whether it will affect newspaper contracts.

The full report of the conference committee was not given out last night, but the following are practically the exemptions as they will appear in the conference bill to be submitted today:

All employees of railroads and members of their immediate families; ministers of the gospel and secretaries of the Y. M. C. A. are allowed half fare; news agents, transfer checkers, railway mail service employees, postoffice inspectors, chairmen and committees of grievance of employees, custom and immigration officers, peace officers, persons doing repair and construction work, ex-employees in good standing looking for employment, persons in charge of live stock and perishable freight, indigent persons, persons engaged in charitable work, interchange of transportation between railroad companies is allowed.

Proprietors and agents of eating houses are not permitted to accept passes; delegates to farmers' congresses are also excluded. The courtesies in some of the exemptions are limited, but with the two above mentioned exceptions the exemptions are the same as were set out in the house substitute bill.

SENATOR PUGH.

A Worthy Tribute to the Deceased Statesman.

The announcement of the death of James L. Pugh, ex-United States Senator from Alabama, which occurred at Washington on the 9th instant, carries me back to early childhood. For the benefit of the young men now growing to manhood, it may be of some service to them to give a short sketch of Mr. Pugh's life. He was born in Burk county, Georgia, of humble but honorable parents in 1820.

His parents both died when he was quite young. In the early thirties he moved to Barbour county, Alabama, when the present city of Eufaula was called Irvington. His first employment was that of mail rider at a salary of \$6 per month. He saved his money, but was never able to finish his education; a common school was all that his limited money would allow him to attend. But he was a hard student. He studied law and was admitted to the bar when he was quite a young man, and his efforts from the start were successful. He represented the 2nd Congressional district in Alabama two terms in Congress before the war. In 1861, he enlisted as a private in Eufaula Rifles, Capt. Alpheus Baker Commander. He served as a private for 12 months at Pensacola, Fla.

In 1862 he was elected to the Confederate Congress and served in that capacity the last three years of the war. After reconstruction days, which ended in 1874, and just as soon as his disabilities were removed, he was chosen by the legislature of his state United States Senator, and for 18 years he filled that honorable position with great credit to himself and his state.

In the death of Mr. Pugh, it carries the writer back to his earliest recollections. The first political speech he ever heard was delivered by Mr. Pugh. While it was over a half century ago, it seems but a short time. Often at my father's home I heard him talk of his early life and hardships. But by the indomitable will he was possessed of he conquered, and stood as high on the ladder of fame as any of his countrymen. Mr. Pugh and my father were great friends, commencing in 1837, but he outlived all of his old associates. The cold hand of death has parted them for many years, but he is to be brought back to his old home for interment and on the banks of the Chewalla creek, where in the same cemetery they will sleep together until the resurrection. SAN JOSE SCALE.

Perhaps This Explains the Present Fruit Scare.

Some two weeks ago The Sentinel published a statement from Prof. A. W. Orr, state nursery inspector, in regard to the existence of San Jose scale in Texas orchards. Now that East Texas fruit growers have expressed fear that the Elberta peach crop has been killed, the suggestion of Prof. Orr will bear republishing.

Prof. Orr says: "Most of the trees brought from Tennessee nurseries within the last few years are now dying. Many of the owners don't know yet what is the matter.

"Examine closely—and see if the dying trees haven't an ashy color, especially the smaller twigs. Break the twig and see if the inner bark is not red. Press a knife blade against the twig, rub lengthwise and see if a yellow oily substance doesn't follow the path of the blade. These are all evidences of San Jose scale.

"Five years from now the San Jose scale will likely be doing for our orchards in Texas what the boll weevil is now doing for our cotton patches. "On account of this pest hundreds and hundreds of Georgia peach orchards are now being cut down and burned.

"Nothing can save the fruit belt of East Texas but prompt and concerted action, for some of our people are going to buy what they consider cheap trees from the infected districts. This would not be so great a calamity if only the 'success' were victims. But

the scale when once carried into any section scatters rapidly in every direction.

"It can be killed only with the sulphur and lime wash sprayed on the tree while there are no leaves."

OVER SIX TO ONE.

Result of Bond Election a Victory for Progress.

From Saturday's Daily:

The result of the bond election yesterday was a glorious victory for progress and a greater Nacogdoches.

It was expected that the bonds would carry by at least two to one, and a majority of three to one would have been no very great surprise, but even the most sanguine advocate of municipal ownership of a water-works system did not dream of a vote of six to one.

It is true that a full vote was not polled, but the vote was large enough to demonstrate that the sentiment is overwhelmingly for municipal ownership of water works.

The vote was as follows: For the bonds..... 202 Against bonds..... 33

Majority for bonds..... 169

The total vote polled, 235, was about 100 votes short of the total qualified vote of the city, but like Mercurio's wound, it is sufficient.

COTTON MILL PROPOSITION.

Proposed to Invest \$750,000 in a Chain of Mills.

Palestine, Tex., March 14.—J. S. Head, representing Britton Bros., brokers of Dallas, is in the city with a cotton mill proposition for Palestine.

He says his concern represents capitalists, who have \$750,000 to invest in a chain of cotton mills in Texas, and that this city has been chosen as one of the sites for a mill. The capitalists already own mills in the state, and it is their plan to establish several others. The proposition will be laid before the board of trade, and it is expected that something will be done in the matter soon. Mr. Head is secretary of the mill located at Celeste, Texas, and says that if a mill is established here, it will be a 5000 spindle mill, with all modern machinery, requiring about 200 operatives. The weekly payroll will be from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

The proposition is for these outsiders to put up \$75,000 and local capitalists to take \$50,000. He says this preferred stock will be sold to Palestine people on a guarantee that the investment will pay not less than 6 per cent.

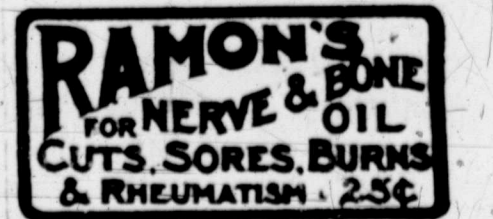

AS TO PEACH CROP.

Statement From Secretary Power of the State Association.

Editor Sentinel.

As I have been asked to make a statement regarding the present fruit crop, will say that within the past three days I have observed perhaps a hundred orchards, including the small as well as those planted for commercial purposes, and in every instance found the Elberta very badly damaged and other commercial varieties considerably damaged. Some of these orchards were carefully examined, and a great many trees that have not been kept in a good state of cultivation will very likely die, and those that live will mature very little, if any, fruit.

But orchards that were cultivated well and late last season, or from other reasons kept up a vigorous growth till late in the season, will come through in a good condition and are now putting out blooms, and will in many instances mature fair crops.

Many think, and some are stating as a fact, that the San Jose scale is causing all this trouble; but I am in position to know that this is wrong. Those who know what the

scale is, know that it makes no such sudden and universal attacks. I attribute the cause to a series of freezes that followed the spring weather we had the first three weeks in January. When these freezes came the Elberta buds were full of sap and swollen ready to bloom, but were checked and held in that stage till spring really came, then the bud was so weak that it could not grow, and consequently are dying as the sap rises. The seedling varieties are not suffering this fate because they are acclimated and naturally more hardy. Will also state that it is yet too early to say positively what the crop will be, but the country will doubtless have more fruit than is now the general opinion.

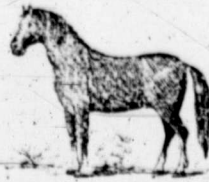

The needs of this section of Texas, in reference to a thoroughly religious college, is not debatable. That it is a pressing, urgent need, all agree. That Nacogdoches is a central location—and a place well fitted for the college, none will dispute. That there is to be a college in East Texas is settled.

With these facts before us, "wind jamming" is uncalled for; but attention to detail, thorough business. And money—much money—is the urgent call. I have listened to some of the speeches, read much of the writings on the subject, and must say it was all good. But just at this time I am of the opinion that it is going to take concert of investment to secure this much needed college for Nacogdoches.

A weak, sickly school is a sickening thing. A weak, sickly college is a farce and a shame. So in the outset, the first thing needed, in my opinion, is to build on a firm, steady, healthy constituency, that will maintain a good college for all time to come. East Texas wants a school of which she can be justly proud. The city of Nacogdoches wants a school that will be an honor to the place, and the Baptists want, when they plant a college, to know that it will grow from strong to stronger.

Some of the business men have expressed their interest by liberal subscription towards the college. Now a few men are not going to, nor ought a few, build this school. It is not the classes that build and maintain schools. It is the masses; so this is a time when the man or woman of small means needs to join their wealthier neighbor and not look upon the proposition as a charitable object, but as a business proposition and make their subscriptions as an investment. Let all push the college as a business matter, putting business and common sense at the front, making this first, and sentiment, flowers, oratory, song, painting and beauty real, will follow.

A large Baptist college is to be located somewhere in East Texas in the near future. The educational commission of the church has already decided finally as to building the college, but the location is yet to be selected. Such an institution will, of course, be competed for by all towns that have any chances to secure it. It means much for the successful town and surrounding country. The college, it is stated, will go to the town offering the best environment, the largest bonus and the best railroad facilities. It is natural that it should, but isn't there a hint here to some of the anti-corporation extremists that

they may possibly be wrong. Railroads are denounced as enemies of the people, but not only the merchants, the farmers, the stockmen and worldly people generally want to get in touch with railroads, but the great religious organizations, among the first desirable features of any town, court railroad facilities. The church people are right, too. Whatever natural advantages an isolated town might offer, the town with ample transportation facilities must win. The days of the circuit riders are gone with the days of the ox wagon, and even religion is in league with the chair car and the cannon ball train. The men who cling to prejudice against railroads are doomed to get lost off and left out of sight of the procession. All classes of people are beginning to say or at least to think—"more roads and not so much fuss about what we have."

REPORTED CAPTURE.

Alleged That the Slayer of Jim Truitt is Arrested.

The Timpson Times of Tuesday states that a man who is believed to be the murderer of Editor Jim Truitt, the founder of the Times, has been captured and is in jail at Granbury, Hood county.

Mr. Truitt was assassinated while seated at his home in Timpson in the presence of his family, in the summer of 1886, and since that time the assassin has been at large. Enough has been written and published in The Sentinel and other East Texas newspapers about this case to fill several huge volumes, and several times have the newspapers recorded the statement that the murderer had been located or captured, and each report proved to be untrue.

It is sincerely hoped that the guilty assassin has at last been caught, and if the one now in jail should prove to be the right man, it is an easy matter to foretell his fate.

DISTRICT COURT.

March Term Convened with Judge Perkins on Bench.

From Monday's Daily:

The regular March term of district court convened this morning at 9 o'clock. Judge Jas. I. Perkins presiding.

The following were sworn in as grand jurors: E. S. Thrash, Rho Garrison, Allen Seale, W. H. Overall, A. A. Wilson, Z. T. Mast, T. S. Neel, J. D. Fussell, W. L. Burneman, I. C. Skillern, Henry Fuller, F. H. Tucker. After Judge Perkins had delivered to the grand jury an exhaustive charge covering all offenses against the statutes, he appointed Allen Seale foreman, and the body retired to the room prepared by Sheriff Blackburn in which to hold its sessions. The following were appointed bailiffs by the grand jury: Door bailiff, F. M. Sloan; riding bailiffs, Jim Derrick, W. D. Slay, D. W. Bruce, J. D. Blakey and H. C. Rich.

The petit jury for the week was empaneled, and Judge Perkins then proceeded to set the docket.

The court announced that in accordance with an agreement previously arranged between the bar and the court, the first two weeks of the term would be devoted to the jury civil docket, petty felonies will be taken up the third week, the fourth week will be devoted to capital cases requiring venire, the fifth week will be consumed with unfinished criminal and jury civil cases, and the non jury civil docket will be taken up the sixth week.

The case of the State against Dock Watson was set for Friday of the third week—April 5.

Judge Perkins being disqualified in several jury civil cases to come up during the first two weeks, Hon. S. P. Wilson of Jacksonville was selected as special judge to preside in Judge Perkin's stead.

The following visiting attorneys are attending court: E. P. Miller of Athens, H. B. Short of Center, H. P. Lawther of Dallas, A. Chestnut of Houston.
