There was a very light yield of corn that year, but a very full crop was made.

THE BONDS APPROVED.

Mayor Shindler Returns From a Trip to Austin.

Mayor Robert T. Shindler returned from Austin this morning, where he went to submit the new issue of water works bonds for the approval of Attorney General Davidson.

Mr. Shindler states that the bonds were readily approved by the attorney general, and that they are now ready for the market.

While in Austin he had a conference with Comptroller Stephens with reference to selling the bonds to the state for the benefit of the permanent school fund, and that Mr. Stephens announced that the state board of education was ready to make an offer at any time.

Mr. Shindler thinks the prospects are good for the disposal of the entire \$50,000 at a premium of from four to five per cent, and bids for the construction of the water works plant will be asked for in the very near future.

SHOT BY HER HUSBAND.

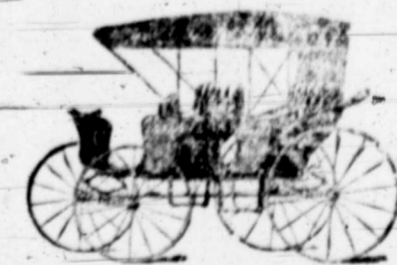
Tissue in Jail and the Militia Guarding Him.

PINE timbered lands in East Texas that sold for one dollar an acre less than two decades ago are now selling at fifty and sixty dollars an acre. Who could have even dreamed that those old "worthless" lands would become so valuable in so short a time. There is a mint in Texas lands, either on top or under the ground and there is no safer investment, especially, wherever they are found cheap. They will grow in value like the increase of a heard of goats.—Del Rio Herald.

There was a time, and not many years ago, when the fertile prairie lands of North Texas could have been bought for one dollar an acre. Now those lands cannot be bought for less than from sixty to seventy-five dollars an acre. The progress of a country can be correctly judged by the value of the property therein, and the more especially does this indicate the progress of East Texas at this time.

THE women have waited long enough for the men of Timpson to put in operation some method of keeping the city clean; they have thought out a plan, and with them to think is to act. In the near future the residents will be called upon to act on a co-operative plan, and all those who are not of the "ox-cart period," just mentioned, will surely aid in the good work.—Timpson Times.

The motto will be: "America for Americans—let Canada take care of herself!" The fruit and truck growers now in session here should send representatives to the San Antonio meeting, their motto being, "Texans for Texas and East Texas for all."

The Old and the New.

When the new city marshal was sworn into service by Mayor Shindler yesterday afternoon, there was retired one of the oldest city marshals in years of official service, perhaps, in the state of Texas. Mr. J. M. Spradley had filled the office of marshal in Nacogdoches continuously for eleven years and two months, and in retiring voluntarily from office he enters private life again with a record of which any one might be proud and one of which few men can boast.

He is succeeded by a man, however, who also has an enviable record as an officer and a citizen, and all are satisfied that the official duties laid down by Mr. Spradley will be efficiently taken up and continuously performed by Mr. A. Y. Matthews.

Mr. H. M. James, the new deputy marshal is also a very efficient man. Having filled the position of deputy United States marshal, deputy sheriff and a member of the police force in the city of Paris for several years, Mr. James is by no means a stranger to the duties of a peace officer. Besides these years of experience Mr. James came before the council with recommendations from citizens and letters from those who knew him in Paris that any one would be proud of. This writer knew Mack James as an officer sixteen years ago, and he was a good one. City Marshal Matthews has made no mistake in appointing Mr. James.

LOOKING FOR LOCATION.

A Chance to Secure a Fifty Thousand Dollar Factory.

The Myers Pump and Manufacturing Company, temporarily located at Kansas City Mo., has written to The Sentinel seeking information in regard to the facilities our city has, and the inducements we are willing to offer to secure their factory, the product of which would be largely in demand in this section of the country.

This company will have, to start on, a paid up capital stock of \$50,000, and proposes to manufacture, among other things in the water supply and fire protection line an automatic pumping machine, which is a great innovation in this class of machinery. The machine may be wound up and then it will automatically furnish fresh water whenever a float in a trough or tank indicates that it is needed. The machine is so constructed that it may be attached to any pump, just as it is in any well; the only change being necessary is the piping to the trough or tank, connected to which is the float and automatic regulation device.

They do not ask any bonus whatever from us to locate the factory here, but they will give our citizens an opportunity to subscribe for some of their stock, if after a thorough investigation, they are satisfied it will be a paying investment.

A STATE ENCAMPMENT.

There Will Be One This Year But None Next.

Adjutant General Newton stated yesterday that under the appropriation allowed by the legislature for holding encampments there will be an encampment held this summer at Camp Mabry, but he would not say as to whether there would be a camp of instruction for next year. He regretted very much the scant appropriation allowed for these camps of instruction. He originally requested an appropriation of \$15,000 for the first and \$25,000 for the second year, a total of \$40,000, but the legislature only allowed \$20,000 for the two years. It will consume practically all of the appropriation for holding an encampment this summer, and General

Newton said that it may be that the place of holding the encampment next year, if one is to be held, will be opened to competition among the different Texas cities. It is true that the state will get \$23,000 from the allotment made by the federal government, but General Newton said that the bulk of this amount will be consumed in buying necessary equipment.—Austin, Statesman.

TRUCK GROWERS ORGANIZE.

Interesting and Profitable District Meeting Here Yesterday.

The Central East Texas Fruit and Truck Growers Association was organized at the opera house in this city last night.

The meeting had been called for this purpose, and though it was thoroughly advertised and an elaborate program had been arranged, the attendance was small. But what the attendance lacked in numbers was more than offset by the interest and enthusiasm manifested and the business transacted.

The meeting was called to order in the opera house yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock by President S. L. Miller of the Business League, who was elected to preside over the meeting, and Dr. J. E. Mayfield was elected secretary.

Prominent among those in attendance were the following: Dr. J. E. Mayfield, president of the Nacogdoches Tobacco Grower's Association; S. L. Miller, president of the Nacogdoches Business Men's League; J. B. Power, secretary of the State Fruit and Truck Growers' Association; J. A. Pirtle, president of the Nacogdoches Fruit and Truck Growers' Association; J. T. Booth, G. L. Lilly and J. L. Swanson, Nacogdoches; O. P. Martindale and A. B. Knight, Tenaha; A. C. Schatzenburg, Garrison; J. F. Davis, Lufkin, and Prof. H. P. Attwater of the Southern Pacific Railway Company.

Short talks were made by J. F. Davis, O. P. Martindale, A. B. McKnight, and others, and a committee, consisting of A. B. McKnight, J. F. Davis and J. B. Power, was appointed to prepare constitution and by laws for permanent organization, when the meeting adjourned to 8 p. m.

The meeting was again called to order by President Miller, when the committee on constitution and by laws made its report, recommending the adoption of the constitution and bylaws which govern the State Association. The report was adopted.

The following officers were elected: Geo. N. Weaver of Timpson, President; J. A. Pirtle of Nacogdoches, vice president; J. F. Davis of Lufkin, secretary and treasurer.

The following were also elected a finance committee: A. B. McKnight of Tenaha, J. B. Power of Nacogdoches; Sam H. Dixon of Houston.

An interesting talk was then made by J. F. Davis of Lufkin, in which he discussed briefly the necessity and importance of industrial education, and C. H. Felt of Mantion, manager of the Angelina Orchard company, made a very interesting talk on the planting and cultivation of cantaloupes, which was instructive and edifying.

Prof. H. P. Attwater, industrial agent of the Southern Pacific Railroad company, was called on for a talk, but he excused himself with the promise to deliver an address at a future meeting of the association when the attendance was more general.

The Texas Five Million Club should be given the unqualified support of every citizen in Texas; its aim and its objects are identical with those of the hundreds of smaller immigration organizations doing business throughout the state, and the larger organization is always ready to co-operate with the smaller ones, looking to the one general result.

Five million inhabitants for Texas in 1910, and a diamond jubilee in 1911. Let's push.

NEW SCHOOL LAW.

County Supervision Bill Will Revolutionize Education in Texas.

The passage of the county supervision bill by the Thirtieth legislature is acknowledged to be the most important of educational legislation enacted during the past fifteen years by the state of Texas. It marks an epoch in the educational development of the state, and will do more toward the improvement of the educational conditions in the state than any other act which the legislature could pass.

The new law at once creates the office of county superintendent of schools in fifty-seven counties in the state, among them being Angelina, Cherokee, Panola, and Rusk. These fifty-seven, added to the forty-eight county superintendents already in that many counties in the state, makes a total of ninety-nine, and which embraces all of the counties in Texas having a scholastic population of 3,000 and over.

Under this new law the authority of the county superintendent is extended so as to include all independent school districts below 500 scholastics; it provides that one institute must be held lasting five consecutive days in the first four months of the scholastic year; it exempts teachers in independent school districts having more than 500 scholastics from attendance at county institutes, and provides for city institute work to be counted towards the extension of teachers' certificates in cities; it provides that the county superintendent shall have an office in the county court house, and that such office shall be furnished with furniture and fixtures, and also provides that stamps and stationery for official use shall be paid for by the commissioners court out of the county general revenue fund.

Another important feature of the new law is that it graduates the salary of the county superintendent. In counties having 3,000 scholastics the salary is fixed at \$1,100, and in counties of 3,000 to 4,000 scholastics, \$1,300; and in 5,000 scholastics or over the salary is fixed at \$1,500. In many instances it increases the present salary of many of the county superintendents.

FROM THE PAN HANDLE.

An Interesting Letter From Mrs. Emma B. Shindler.

Dear Sentinel.

Dalhart, Tex., April 12.—Glad to see your familiar face when you came in yesterday; seems like a long time since I picked you up in the yard where the roses are blooming. We are having a little touch of winter here yet and instead of summer clothes we find a fire something more comfortable, especially in the early morning.

The first day I was here, Wednesday, Mr. S. got a nice team and we drove over the boundless prairie, and the eighteen miles drive was accomplished in three hours with very little effort and not much fatigue, though I did leave home almost an invalid. GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION.

Matters to be Considered by the Extra Session.

The following is the proclamation of Governor Campbell convening the legislature in extraordinary session:

Proclamation by the Governor of Texas:

I, T. M. Campbell, governor of the state of Texas, by virtue of authority vested in me by the constitution, do hereby call a special session of the Thirtieth legislature to convene in the city of Austin, beginning at ten minutes after 1 o'clock p. m., April 12, 1907, for the following purposes, to-wit:

1. To enact adequate laws simplifying the procedure in both civil and criminal trials in the courts of this state; and for such reforms as may be practicable in our jury system.
2. To enact adequate laws compelling telephone and telegraph companies to transmit each other's messages and to make necessary connections for that purpose at common points.
3. To enact adequate laws to secure equality and uniformity in taxation and to secure the just rendition of all taxable property at its full value and to compel payment of such taxes properly assessed against it and to enact such laws as will secure the taxation of all property, tangible and intangible, including the franchises or intangible assets or property of those corporations which by reason of nature or character of their assets or property, under the present laws escape their just proportion of taxation.
4. To enact laws to increase charter and filing fees of domestic and foreign corporations doing business in Texas.
5. To enact laws increasing the franchise taxes of foreign and domestic corporations doing business in Texas.
6. To enact laws imposing proper taxes upon the gross receipts of corporations and enterprises now doing business in Texas, which, under the present system of taxation, are not contributing their full share of taxes.
7. To consider and act upon such other matters as may hereafter be presented pursuant to section 40, article 3, of the constitution of the state of Texas.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the state to be affixed at Austin, this, the 12th day of April, A. D. 1907.

Hon. June C. Harris Returns From Meeting at Waco.

Nacogdoches has the best chance yet to secure the East Texas Baptist college.

Hon. June C. Harris returned from Waco yesterday afternoon, where he represented this city before the Education Commission. Mr. Harris states that the members of the board were very favorably impressed with the proposition presented by this city through him.

Tyler was the only town that competed with Nacogdoches before the commission, and under the conditions upon which Tyler's bonus was subscribed, that city virtually had nothing definite to present. Prof. Birdwell, who represented Tyler, stated that his town had raised \$32,000 for the college on condition that \$50,000 be raised.

Mr. Harris guaranteed for Nacogdoches ten and one-fourth acres of land on North street, together with all buildings and improvements thereon, and \$8000 in cash. The site mentioned is the Perkins property.

After hearing the two propositions, the commission selected a committee consisting of President S. P. Brooks of Baylor University, Rev. D. I. Smyth of Grandview, president of the commission, and Secretary Ward. This committee is expected to visit Nacogdoches the first of May.
