INSTANTLY KILLED.

Severed Beneath the Cars.

A shocking accident occur red near Greene's planer, in the South end of the railroad vards here about 9 o'clock last night.

James Williams and J. W. Hinson, two Texas and New Orleans railroad brakeman, were doing some switching in the yards, with Brakeman Bass and Conductor H. G. Hodnett, when Williams was instantly killed and Hinson was seriously injured.

Williams and Hinson were swinging onto the ladder on a box car that was being drawn by the engine when they were struck by a telegraph post that was standing too close to the siding and both were knocked from the car

Williams fell beneath the tracks and his head and right arm were almost—completely severed from his body. Him son was knocked several - feet from the cars, and was picked up in a badly injured condition

Physicians were summoned and after examining Hinson's injuries it wasfound that they were not necessarily tatal.

Justice F. D. Huston held an inquest on the remains of the dead breakman, when the facts were learned as above stated. Williams, the man killed, was about 30 years of age and has a wife and three children residing at Jackson

CONFLICT WITH CONSTITUTION.

Law Authorizing Governor to Appoint Special Judges no Good.

One of the most important documents that has emanated from the attorney general's department was the opinion addressed to the governor by Judge W. E. Hawkins, first assistant attorney general, a few days ago.

The opinion was relative to the new law passed by the 30th Legislature, authorizing distsict judges to exchange districts or to hold courts for each other, and giving the governor authority to appoint a special district judge when the regularly elected judge is

CAUSE OF FRUIT FAILURE.

Some Timely Suggestions Tha Orchardists Should Heed.

The failure of the peach crop this year differs radically in two respects from the three or four tailures which have occurred since peaches first began to be shipped in car load lots from this state in 1891. First, heretofore it has not been very hard to attri bute the failure to some definite cause, but this year every one seems to have a different reason for disaster. Second, while the other failures resulted in the loss of most of the fruit, the trees seemed to have been weakened very little, if any at all, while this year a num dead and many more will die unless they are given heroic treatment. The ob ject of this bulletin is to re commend to the growers a treatment which will assist greatly in helping the trees to regain their normal vigor and set a crop of fruit buds to make the Thaw trial look for next year. During the civil war we arrived at Indianapolis August 8, 1863, and remained until March 13, 1865. Our treatment was cruel. As for our grub they gave us about one fourth of a pound of beef and the same of loaf bread every twenty-four When worsted in a fight, that was cut as long as four days and nights. They cooked that in prison and they would throw their bones in the prison. I have seen men gather then up and boil them until they were as white as snow to get a little grease to eat. If a rat showed his tail they got him. If a dog came in there he never went out; they would kill it, skin it quarter it and boil quarters whole and eat it without bread or salt. CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Contract Let for Water Pipe and Fire Apparatus.

As indicated in yesterday's report of the city council meeting, the contract has been let for all the material and machinery for installing the new system of water works.

Several bids were submitted for furnishing the water pipe, but the contract for all the 4 6, 8, and a portion of the 10 inch pipe was awarded to the Central Foundry Company of New York. The pipe to be shipped from Bessamer, Ala., and delivered within 60 days.

The National Tube Company of St. Louis was awarded the contract for sufficient 10 inch steel pipe to extend from the pump station to the storage tank and from the storage tank to North street.

The contract for furnishing fifty fire hydrants and all valves was awarded to the Fairbanks company of New Orleans.

The pumps, boiler and all necessary machinery were purchased from the Briggs-Weav er Machinery Company of Dallas.

The steel reservoir tank, with a capacity of 250,000 gallons, was bought from the Chicago Bridge and Iron


