LOCKHART CASE AFFIRMED.

Court of Criminal Appeals Has Denied Him Bail.

A phone message from Tyler today announced the fact that the court of criminal appeals this morning had affirmed the decision of the lower court in the case of exparte Lockhart.

It will be remembered that during the recent term of the district court Dr. J. J. Lockhart, who had been indicted for the murder of Ollie Branch, sued out a writ of habeas corpus before Judge Perkins upon application for bail.

After hearing the testimony of witnesses and argument of counsel, Judge Perkins remanded the applicant to jail without bail.

Appeal was taken to the court of criminal appeals, and today that tribunal affirmed the finding announced by Judge Perkins, and Dr. Lockhart must now remain in jail until his case is tried.

He is now in jail at Rusk, to which place his case has been transferred upon a change of venue. The district court convenes there December 2.

Commissioners Court.

The November term of the commissioners court convened this afternoon with Commissioners Muckleroy and Sitton present and Judge Mims presiding. Commissioner Satterwhite came down on the T. & N. O. train at 3 o'clock, but Commissioner Patton is confined to his bed with an attack of fever and will not be able to attend this session of court.

Quite a number of important matters are to come before the court this session, among them being the appointment of road overseers.

STRONG TO RESIGN.

Reported That He Will Vacate District Attorney's Office.

The Sentinel yesterday stated that according to rumor there would be some official and political changes at an early date, and though the details of the rumor were related to The Sentinel in confidence with request that the names be withheld, before the paper was issued the whole matter was common street talk.

The report referred to is to the effect that Hon. Beeman Strong will during this week tender his resignation as district attorney to Governor Campbell, to take effect December 1, next. It is also reported that Mr. Strong surrenders his official position to form a partnership with Attorney Geo. S. King, and the fact is Mr. King has confirmed this report.

The only one mentioned so far to succeed Mr. Strong as district attorney is At-

ney W. J. Townsend, Jr., of Lufkin.

As predicted by The Sentinel, the report that Mr. Strong intends resigning has caused much surprise, but the universal expression is that the new law firm of King & Strong will be one of the strongest and most influential not only in the Second Judicial district, but in East Texas.

NACOGDOCHES TOBACCO.

The results of this year's crop of tobacco grown in this county have proven again, as had been proven before, that the cultivation of Cuban tobacco for fine cigars, both fillers and wrappers in our red land district, is a decided success, both as to profits and quality. In like manner, the growing of shade tobacco wrappers and binders, as well as open grown fillers, has increased in popularity or favor. Every farmer that has tried it will repeat it, and many will increase their acreage, while new ones will join the procession. There will be twice as much grown here in 1908 as was grown in 1907, and the yield will be greater. There were many unfavorable forms of season this year, but still the crop proved good. The protracted cold, wet spring and the early summer drouth did not cut the crop off as much as it did other produce. The price was better than last year and there is every reason to believe that the price next year will be still better. About 20c a pound for open field, or cigar filler, and about 90c for shade grown or wrapper tobacco, is expected. The average yield per acre for filler, is 600 to 800 pounds, which would bring, say \$125.00 an acre, and for wrapper 1000 to 1300 pounds, worth about \$750.00. One great advantage for farmers is the short time it takes to make and market the crop. They begin in January and are done in September or sooner, with the cash in hand. Then the same land is used for other stuff, and the farmer goes a-fishing while his children go to school. At Palestine the same results have been attained, and there is to be about 30 acres cultivated next year under shade, and about 50 acres open field. So it seems reasonable to hope that tobacco growing is to become a leader in the red lands of East Texas. The manufacture of fine cigars from this product is proving highly satisfactory. The Nacogdoches Cigar Company is thriving and other tobacco men and manufacturers are looking into the matter.

THE LUMBER SITUATION.

There has been much speculation, and some uneasiness, as to what will be the result of the present depressed condition of the lumber industry. The situation in this territory as to general condition affecting the industry may be correctly described as being in a state of transition from a period of depression to a period of better times and improved prices, which is in sight for the great yellow pine lumber industry. At the present time there is no denying the fact, which is conceded by the lumbermen, that the situation is far from being what it was, or what the lumbermen wish it to become. Due to the con-

gestion of stocks in the mills of East Texas and Southwest Louisiana, an accumulation during the past year and one of the principal factors in producing which was inability of the railroads to move the output of the mills because of car shortage, and to the unsettled financial conditions obtaining generally over the country, the lumber industry has felt the depression as well as other business and commercial industries and enterprises.

SURPRISES IN STORE.

Rumor has it that there will be some surprises in political and official circles at an early date. If report be true, there will be some official resignations and changes in law firms before the dawn of the new year 1908. Rumor also has it that there will be a lively race for the office of county attorney as well as other important official positions. While these rumors have not enough certainty about them to justify The Sentinel in giving names, assurance is given that they will soon be made public, and when they are, The Sentinel predicts a political sensation.

Injustice to East Texas.

The Center News and Nacogdoches Sentinel concur in the view that in the matter of calling the rangers to East Texas the service is imposed upon, in other words those papers think that the rangers are often called there when there is no necessity for it. The Statesman is inclined to think they are right about it. However, that may be though the fact that they are so often called to that section of the state is working somewhat of a hardship on that country and that people. As a rule the people of East Texas are peaceable and law-abiding, and men have been raised in that country who have never seen an affair that could not have been handled without the intervention or intercession of rangers. Now it so happens that the time of the rangers is almost entirely monopolized in that section, and we believe it an injustice to East Texas as well as to the state at large. The protest that is being made by those papers will attract the attention of other papers in that portion of the state and the evil practice of officials calling the rangers over there every time a pistol is heard to snap may be abated as it should be.—Austin Statesman.

Feels Personal Loss.

Hon. R. W. Haltom, editor of the Nacogdoches Sentinel, died yesterday at his home in Nacogdoches. He was one of the most popular newspaper men in the state and a very lovable character. He was a member of several fraternal orders, and was buried at ten o'clock this morning with masonic honors. In the death of Will Haltom Times editor feels a sense of personal loss, as will many others of the East Texas newspaper men whose privilege it was to know him personally.

WILL HALTOM IS DEAD.

Another Prominent Citizen Goes to His Final Reward.

The following beautiful tribute to The Sentinel's beloved chief, the late R. W. Haltom, appeared in our esteemed contemporary, the Plain Dealer:

When the words heading this article are read by scores of persons all over Texas, and especially in Nacogdoches county, they will be received with a tinge of sadness and sorrow that is heartfelt. While aware of the great battle he has waged with the Grim Reaper for the past three years, and appreciating to the fullest extent his heroic struggle for life and earthly existence, and realizing that the end meant only a surcease of sorrow and suffering, and the beginning of an eternity of enjoyment of the reward earned by a life of duty well performed, still there is that he has "fallen asleep" ere yet all the work whereunto he had been ordained had been accomplished.

Monday morning those who had for several days been "watchers at his bedside" noticed the elemental spark of life grow dimmer, and ere the day was well advanced it was evident that the next sun he saw arise would be in a land where the "Sun of Righteousness" has arisen to set no more forever. About 10 o'clock there was a rift in the dreary and gloomy clouds that enveloped the earth and through it the portals of eternity burst upon the vision of the spirit that yet struggled within the emaciated form of the silent sufferer, and o'er his face there spread that peaceful smile which in words more eloquent than all the power of articulated speech says, "all is well with my soul." Then the pulse ceased, the heart became forever still and the breath ceased to come and go, and the real Will Haltom had stepped out upon the threshold of a new existence to begin his labors of love in a higher and nobler sphere.

If Will Haltom was possessed of faults they were today forgotten when every place of business in the city of Nacogdoches was closed and one of the largest concourses of people ever assembled at the Nacogdoches cemetery saw his mortal remains consigned to the "tongless silence of the dreamless dust" under the auspices of the Masonic lodge.

Mr. Haltom was born and reared in Nacogdoches county and was so well known to a vast majority of the Plain Dealer readers as to make a biographical mention of him a work of supererogation on the part of this writer. Though raised on a farm, he early in life adopted that trade, or profession, which almost heads the list of the professional avocations of mankind—printer and newspaper man, and made it the study and work of his life. In 1904 he was elected a member of the Texas legislature, and during the first days of the session of 1905 was attacked by a severe case of lagrippe, which resulted in the malady

that caused his early demise.

He was one of the founders and editor of the Nacogdoches Daily Sentinel and made that paper a financial success. Though greatly weakened physically in the last year of his life by the dread disease with which he was afflicted, his mind remained clear, vigorous and he kept up his contributions to his paper to the last, always handling his subjects with a virility that made his articles readable.

While death came to him as a relief from suffering, still, aside from his wife and children and other relatives, there are many who can't help but wish he had been spared to spend yet a few years of usefulness among his fellow-men, whom he seemed, like Abou Ben Adhem, to love. He sleeps today beneath a bank of flowers, piled high as a token of the esteem in which he was held by his fellowman. His was a life of heroic devotion to duty as he saw it, and to family, and the eternal inheritance of such is a wreath of immortal glory that neither withers nor fades.

Letter to L. W. McLain & Son, Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Sirs: Two men on opposite sides of the same street sell sausages, one at 10c a lb, the other 5. Which sells the more sausages, think you?

SUIT AGAINST STANDAR'D.

Attorney General Asks for Penalties Aggregating \$75,900,550.

On last Tuesday Attorney General Davidson brought suit before District Judge Calhoun at Austin for penalties aggregating \$75,900,550, for receivership, injunction and forfeiture of charter against the Security Oil company, including eleven defendants. The Court immediately granted a temporary injunction forbidding any of the defendants from removing any of their property from the state, pending a hearing, and set the application for receiver for June 6, when the matter of making the injunction permanent will probably be considered.

The eleven defendants are as follows: Security Oil company, Navarro Refining company, H. C. Folger, Jr., and C. Payne of New York, partners alleged to control the business of the Corsicana Refining company; Standard Oil company of Indiana, Standard Oil company of New York, National Transit company, Union Tank Line, Standard Oil company of New Jersey, W. C. Proctor and E. R. Brown of Navarro county, who are alleged to be agents of the several Standard Oil companies; the Union Tank Line company, etc.

From each of the defendants named the State asks \$6,900,050, but Assisiant Attorney General Lightfoot says that some of the companies have not been in existence in Texas the maximum length of time, therefore the number of days of violation will be a matter of proof, but the petition must include everything.

The petition asks for the forfeiture of the charters of the Security Oil company and Navarro Refining company, the only defendants chartered in Texas.

NOT CLOSED DOWN.
Nacogdoches Cigar Factory is Prosperous and Permanent.

Dr. Mayfield, president of the Nacogdoches Cigar Company, requests The Sentinel to state that this enterprise is not closed, nor even suspended.

"The force of cigar makers has only been laid off for two weeks, owing to the money panic," said Dr. Mayfield. "The factory goes on doing business just as it has been. In fact, the business has been constantly growing, and a double force will be put on soon. We made last week the usual number of cigars, about 20,000. They have been making and selling about 75,000 cigars a month. We have on hand now about 200,000 cigars, ready for market. So, the business is here to stay and to make money."

Cause of Short Crop.

The shortness of the cotton crop in Texas this year is due more to the failure of the cotton plant to reach maturity in time to escape the ravages of the boll weevil than to any other cause. Most farmers planted early enough, but few of them were so fortunate as not to have to replant two or three times. Prof. R. L. Bennett, cotton expert at College Station, thinks that the difficulty in getting a stand was in large measure due to the fact that in the first planting the seed were covered too deep. The rains that followed the earlier plantings so packed the ground that the young plants either could not break through the heavy covering, or in doing so, exhausted their vital energy to such an extent that they were unable to survive the very unfavorable weather which they afterward had to encounter. Professor Bennett recommends that in early planting—a thing which since the adventure of the boll weevil, is no longer optional—with the Texas cotton-growers—the seed should have either a very light covering or none at all.

It is now in order for "the oldest inhabitant" to tell us that this is unprecedented weather.

THE Troupe Banner remarks that "mossback citizens make mossback communities." Certainly; and mossback communities produce mossback citizens.

NOVEMBER 28 has been designated by presidential proclamation as Thanksgiving day; but unless conditions change many of us will have little to be thankful for.

THE statement of Leslie M. Shaw, former secretary of the treasury, that our currency is nonelastic, will be unwelcome news to those who would like to make one dollar pay a two dollar debt.

MISS OVERTURE undertook to drive across the railroad track at Dallas in front of a train. The train overtook her, and her remains were turned over to an undertaker. Now she is under turf.

VERY little is heard now of the Jamestown exposition, which is drawing to a close. The next alleged world's fair will be the Alaska-Yukon exposition, which opens June 1, 1909, and next will be the great Texas Diamond Jubilee exposition in 1911 at Port Arthur.

REPORT states that Brewer Busch has returned to St. Louis from six months sojourn in Europe with firm tread. The fact that the big brewer has returned to America will likely excite little interest, but no doubt the general public is deeply concerned about his tread.

THE Rusk Press-Journal has been sold by J. S. and Riley A. Burke to Frank B. and Chas. R. Guinn. Rev. J. S. Burke will move to Kansas City to engage in evangelistic work, and Riley will remain in Rusk. The new editors of the Press-Journal announce that while the paper will continue to be democratic in politics, it will not be so partisan but that it may advocate reforms and the suppression of evils in the party.

THE inauguration of Charles H. Haskell, the first governor of the new state of Oklahoma, next Saturday, Nov. 16, promises to be the greatest event in the history of the territory. President Roosevelt will issue his proclamation of statehood on that date, and thousands will gather in Guthrie to see the new governor take the oath of office. One feature of the inaugural ceremonies will be the wedding of Oklahoma and Miss Indian Territory, the two being united by a minister. Immediately following the symbolic marriage of the two territories a grand reception will be tendered to Governor Haskell in which the retiring governors of the five civilized tribes will participate.

COL. MILNER'S INTERVIEW.

He Urges Texas Farmers to Diversify Their Crops.

"Diversity and Intensity" is the subject of an interview given out by Commissioner of Agriculture Milner.

"This subject ought to be the motto of the state" he says. "To give it emphasis and a kind of circus ring, it should adorn the harness of every plow mule and be painted on each farm wagon in Texas. It should be proclaimed in the crowing of the fowl and the lowing of the cow. The swine at the going down of the sun and the turkey at the break of day should shed forth its glad-some sound. Corn, cotton, potatoes, goobers, melons, peas and sugar cane, together with vegetables, and fruits, should enliven farms through spring, summer and autumn; and wheat, alfalfa, oats, barley and rye should show forth a wisdom of a diversified agriculture mid the snow and sleet of winter. In fact, every plant and tree bearing food and fruit for men, beast or fowl, should stand out in every field where soil and season and climate conspire to produce them, challenging the highest admiration of every advocate of diversification.

"Yes, diversify. Poverty of land and poverty of man will follow the one crop system of farming as the night follows the day.

"Intensity. Two-thirds of the land now cultivated to cotton in Texas can be made to produce the present crop. Let the brain help the farmer. Reading and thinking are as necessary to his success as they are to the success of the professional man. The farmer who uses his brain some of the time will succeed beyond the man who uses his muscle all the time.

"By intensified cultivation and the improvement of seed, Iowa has increased the yield of corn from twenty-nine bushels per acre in 1897 to forty-one bushels per acre in 1906.

"South Carolina averages nearly as much cotton to the acre as Texas, on lands abandoned by many of our ancestors, because they ceased to respond to the old methods of farming. In the more primitive days of Texas, when the soil possessed all of its original fertility, and nearly all flesh was grass, it was scarcely worth one's while to bother about farming. New conditions now confront agriculture as they do every other business. The virgin soil will not last without skillful attention. One or two straight crops planted on the same land through a series of years will consume all the food which the soil originally had to sustain plant life. Without the elements of food to feed plant life, vegetable starvation is inevitable. If these elements have been exhausted they must be restored. Rotation of crops, fertilization of the soil, and intensive cultivation appeals to every farmer. The most fertile land will fail under the strain of taking off and putting

nothing back. The rich Braos bottom lands, which in their virgin state produce two bales to the acre, have been reduced to a state of poverty so dependent that they rarely yield one-half of that amount. The deep black lands of the prairies will finally become barren under constant and exhaustive cultivation of cotton alone. Nature unassisted can not supply the excessive drain. Reduce the acreage; increase the yield. Diversify and intensify, and thus move Texas up from the fifth place in agriculture to the first place in 1910."

ONE of the problems that is confronting the commissioners court of Nacogdoches county is how to most judiciously and advantageously expend the \$15,000 road and bridge fund that will be collected during this fiscal year. It seems like throwing money away to pay out the people's taxes in plowing up the roads and letting them wash away, as has been the practice during all these years that have past, yet it is contended by some that the fund now at the disposal of the court is inadequate to justify an effort to make good roads. The Sentinel believes that no better use could be made of the money than to make some experiments along this line. In some of the western counties of the state wheat and oat straw has been effectively utilized in abating seapy mud holes and abnoxious sand beds, and we believe that saw dust can be used as successfully and effectively as straw. The probability is the court will make a test of this material, and if it proves successful, the road problem in Nacogdoches county has been solved.

Gov. CAMPBELL has issued the following proclamation: "In accordance with the proclamation of the president of the United States appointing a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, I, T. M. Campbell, governor of the state of Texas, in consideration thereof and in conformity with law, do hereby designate Thursday, November 28th, 1907, as Thanksgiving Day, and proclaim a legal holiday for the offering of thanks and praise to the Giver of every good and perfect gift for the bounties of nature, for the rewards of toil, for the blessings of peace and prosperity vouchsafed our state and union."

Charity Most Commendable. A dispatch dated at Rock Island, Ill., Oct. 21, says: "In the hope of reducing life insurance losses, the executive council of the Modern Woodmen of America has closed a deal for the purchase of 1000 acres of land adjoining Colorado Springs, known as the Ambler ranch, whereon to erect a sanitarium for the treatment of members of the society with tuberculosis. The present ranch buildings will be temporarily refitted until new buildings are erected."

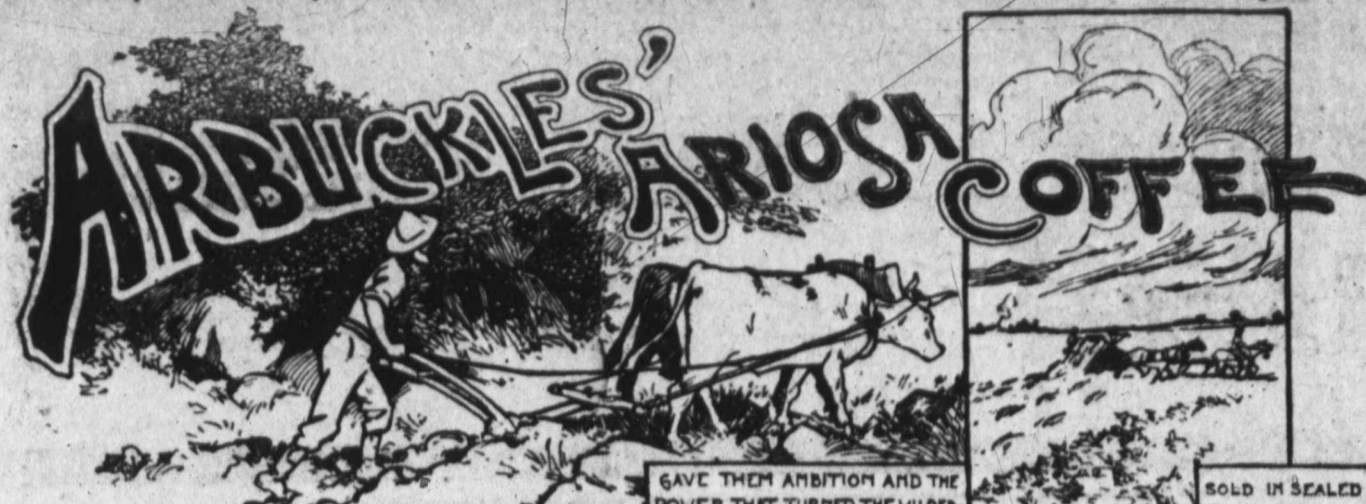

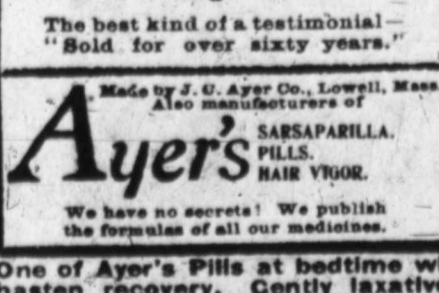

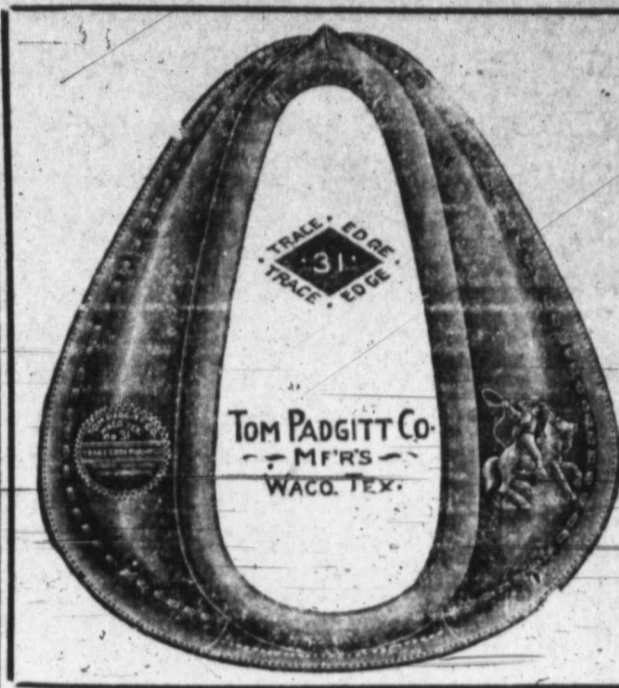

Supply and Distribution of Cotton.

The Bureau of the Census has just published a bulletin which contains a report on the supply and distribution of cotton in the United States for the year ending August 31, 1907.

The supply of cotton for the year ending August 31, 1907, according to the census bulletin, was 15,025,720 bales of 500 pounds each. To this number the cotton crop of 1906 contributed 12,897,714 bales and that of 1907 contributed 200,278 bales; stocks held on September 1, 1906, amounted to 1,849,139 bales and the imports of foreign cotton to 202,738 bales.

Of this supply 4,984,936 bales were consumed by manufacturers, 22,952 were burned, and 8,503,265 were exported, leaving 1,514,567 bales in stock at the end of the year. Manufacturers in the cotton growing states consumed 2,410,993 bales, which was slightly less than the amount consumed by the manufacturers in all other states, 2,573,943 bales.

Dock Bailey Hung For Murder of D. D. Owens.

From Thursday's Daily:

Fully 5000 people witnessed the hanging of Dock Bailey this afternoon.

Sheriff Blackburn returned from Rusk with the prisoner on the early train this morning, and all the forenoon crowds have been congregated about the jail and the court house, hoping to get a glimpse of the negro.

People began to arrive Wednesday afternoon by train, by wagon, horseback, and other modes of conveyance, and by daylight this morning the streets had the appearance of circus day. Eyewitnesses here to see the Sells-Floto circus.

At 1 o'clock this afternoon Sheriff Blackburn read the death warrant to Bailey, and in a few minutes he was led to a bus at the jail door and the march to the scaffold was taken up.

When the officers arrived at the scaffold with the prisoner they found an immense concourse of people waiting in suspense to witness the execution.

Bailey walked firmly up the steps to his doom, escorted by Sheriff Blackburn and his son, Merten. At the request of the condemned man old Uncle Wiley, a well known colored preacher, went up on the scaffold and talked and prayed with him.

Just before the black cap was placed over his face, Bailey made a brief talk, in which he admonished all colored people to never gamble, and in no case to gamble with white people. He said that he and he alone killed Dee Owens, but that the Lord had forgiven him for the deed. He quoted several sentences from the 23d Psalm, and asserted that he was going straight to heaven.

Sheriff Blackburn sprang the trap at 2:03, and at 2:12 Dr. A. A. Nelson pronounced life extinct. As the body dropped through the hole in the scaffold, a yell went up from the throats of more than

a hundred men, who could not suppress their gratification that the law had been vindicated.

The body was cut down, placed in a coffin and carried to the county farm for burial.

The crime for which Dock Bailey paid the extreme penalty of the law today was one of the most dastardly murders ever committed in Nacogdoches county.

On August 31, last, D. D. Owens, a highly respected, honorable, hardworking young man, residing with his widowed mother near Linn Flat, in the northwestern portion of Nacogdoches and secured marriage license to wed Miss Maggie Wilkerson, daughter of a well to do farmer residing in the same community. Thursday evening following was set for the wedding ceremony, and a number of the relatives and friends had assembled at the home of the bride-to-witness the happy union. To the surprise of all, the groom failed to appear, and after waiting until a late hour in the night it was decided to send messengers to his home and ascertain the cause. On arriving at the home of the young man's uncle, Jack Owens, it was learned that the last time he had been seen was on Wednesday morning before, when he passed along the road riding horseback. It was also called to mind that he was met near Mr. Owens' house by a negro man, and that the two went up the road together.

A searching party was then formed, and with lights the search was kept up until about 1:30 o'clock Friday morning, when the dead body of the intended groom was found lying in an old tree top, 200 yards from the road. There was a bullet hole in his breast and his skull was crushed almost to pulp. He had a piece of rope about four feet long tied to his neck, and there was a trail leading from where Owens was found to a point in the road where he was killed, showing that after the murderer had slain his victim he had dragged the body to its hiding place. There were also evidences of a struggle in the road, and a piece of pistol handle was found on the ground.

In the mean time Dock Bailey, a negro man who lived in the community, was arrested at Rusk by Sheriff Norward on suspicion of having sold a stolen horse and saddle to a citizen of that town. Investigation followed and it was ascertained that the horse and saddle belonged to D. D. Owens, the murdered man, and was the animal he was riding when last seen on Wednesday morning. Bailey also had on Owens' coat when

arrested, and he had a pistol on his person with a piece of the handle broken off. The piece of handle found at the scene of the murder fitted exactly on the pistol found on Bailey.

Soon after his arrest, the negro confessed to the murder of Owens, but contended that they were engaged in a crap game when a difficulty arose between them, and in the scuffle, he shot Owens. He also stated that he tied a rope around Owens' neck, wrapped one end of the rope around the horn of Owens' saddle, and with Owens' own horse dragged his body in a lope through the thick underbrush and concealed it in the top of an old pine tree that had been felled.

The murder was committed September 4; Bailey was arrested September 5; he was indicted by the grand jury September 18; was tried October 4 and found guilty of murder in the first degree with the death penalty; October 5 the defendant waived his right to apply for a new trial, and Judge Perkins sentenced the culprit to be hanged on Thursday, October 7.
