I. J. A. Spears, County Clerk of Nacogdoches county Texas, hereby certify that at the regular August Term, 1909, came on to be heard the petition of B. L. Melton and others, praying for the establishment of an election precinct with a voting box at Mayotown, and that the commissioners court of Nacogdoches County Texas, granted said petition and established a voting box at Mayotown, Texas, and that said Mayotown election precinct No. 21, includes the following described territory: as shown by the petition, recorded in Book H, page 439 of Minutes of Commissioners Court of Nacogdoches County Texas:

Beginning at the Nacomiche creek at a point known as the Patterson bridge; thence up the said Nacomiche creek to a public road running from Holly Springs school house to Peach Tree school house; thence southwardly with said public road to the Garrison and Nacogdoches road, crossing said Garrison and Nacogdoches road, continuing south through a lane between Crawford and Honey to a ford on the Crawford creek; thence up said creek to the H. E. & W. T. R. R.; thence in a direct line to L. L. Hickey's residence of about 1 1/2 miles on the Appleby and Miller's Mill road; thence eastwardly with the said Appleby and Miller's Mill road to where it crosses the said Nacogdoches and Logansport road; thence up the said Nacogdoches and Logansport road to the place of beginning.

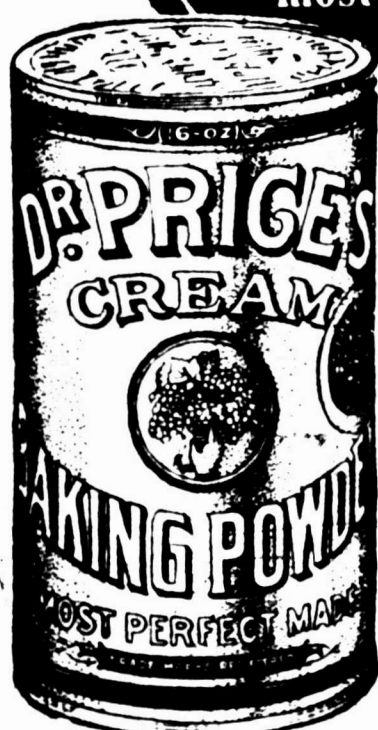

ALL talk for another extra session of the Legislature is out of place. The people of the Lone Star State have had enough of legislating to do them for some time, and the fellows who are clamoring for another whack at the pie counter, should be advised of the truth.

BEAUMONT and her people are doing some hustling these days for the Southeast Texas Fair which takes place next month. The exposition promises bigger and better than ever and extra efforts for extra attractions are being made. Luck to hustling Beaumont and her hustling citizens.

A FELLOW'S feelings must not be too near the surface if he expects to do any thing in this world. There are times maybe when patience plays truant and temper gets the uppermost, but after the flurry has passed, a reflection will find that it was all nonsense. Don't go off the handle too freely or too often. It is worth nothing but regrets after all.

THE Jeffries-Johnson proposed fight seems to be hatching, as far as press notices are concerned. Truly the Texan's life is a real one with all imaginary grievances left off.

A LITTLE mili dman and a big bayonet at the Dallas Fair on Tatt day, played the smart too freely and as a result one man is in his grave and the fellow with a blue coat is behind the bars. Clothes don't make the man, but lots of times they make a fool out of something that ought to be a man.

NORMAN E. MACK is out with an interview in which he states that William J. Bryan will never again be a candidate for President,—a fact possibly well known before the eminent gentleman said it. Bryan has sought the high position three times and has three defeats to his credit,—but with all that he is still a leader of the masses.

THE state of unrest in the old world is growing more bold and becoming more tangible. The eruption of governments of that country is not at all unlooked for, while the overthrow of some of the powers of ages is quite likely. History repeats its self indeed, and even the meekest slaves can be tantalized to the point of revolt.

The Confederate badge is too sacred a thing to even desecrate by hanging on the lapel of the President's coat, when that eminent person happens to be opposite in believe. Honor where honor is due, but don't forget pride and patriotism in an excitement of the hour.

THE committee investigating the penitentiary system and convict farms of Texas, seems to be uncovering things of a rather distasteful nature. The "powers that be" who are responsible for the terrible conditions that exist where unfortunate criminals are kept and worked, should side track some of their fool theories and get down to issues that will mean something to Texas and Texans. Probe it to the utmost and then let the man who votes know just what is what.

THERE are some things in this world that don't smell as well as some others. For instance,—the dead chickens and dogs and cats that people put in Banita creek give out anything but a pleasant odor to passersby. It does look as if any person would have more sense and decent respect for others than to put such things in the creek,—and especially where hundreds pass every day. And if the officers could find out who is guilty of these filthy acts, the perpetrators ought to be assessed the heaviest penalty,—for it is strictly against the law.

CREAMERIES are being established in nearly every section of Texas, but the Eastern portion. JUST for information, we'd like to know why it is that every railroad entering Houston is giving greatly reduced rates to the Carnival there next week, excepting the H. E. & W. T., which has on "convention rates." This same thing occurred with reference to the State Fair and the T. & N. O., and people are wrathful over it. This section is being discriminated against,—as plain as day.

THE Mount Enterprise Herald is dead,—the result of a lack of proper food and raiment. The attention given the paper by Editor Shook was all that could have been desired,—and even more,—and under ordinary circumstances would have made it live. But attention is not the only thing a newspaper needs and must have. Those things can be furnished only by a live, up-to-date, hustling business citizenship,—and from the tone of the "Farewell", it was sadly lacking in Mount Enterprise. ## WONDERFUL EAST TEXAS.

WITH cotton selling around thirteen and a half cents a pound and a pretty full crop for this county, farmer folks are living off the fat of the land and adding materially to their bank accounts. It is a good thing to live in the best country in the world.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

But cotton has done better than that; it has gone to 14-14 with the expectation that within the next few weeks it will go to 15 cents when prospects will look as fat as squirrels in pecan huntin' time down in the brush in old Nacogdoches country where since the locust have sought their rest the woodpecker beats his monotonous tattoo upon the tree trunks and the screech owl cries, "who cooks for you," to the strains of the fiddle in that log house over yonder in the pines where busy feet are going through the contortions of an old-fashioned "hoe-down" as the caller cries: "gents, take your partners," "form a circle," "all hands round," and "alameda to the left" or something like that, while the darkies outside are "cuttin' pigeon wings" instead of robbing chicken roosts. Of course, the folks down in Nacogdoches are happy with their fat bank accounts, with corn in the crib till the boards begin to creak and persimmons on the trees for the gathering and possums fattenin' in the cane brake and sandy land yampers till you just can't rest. ## Busy at Packing House.

A visit was made today to the tobacco packing and curing house of Robinson & West and where the process of preparing the product for market is now being undergone. J. W. Gill, who is in charge of the house, has a tuff crew at work, sorting, arranging and tying into hands, while in the sweat room some six or eight thousand pounds in curing. The product is very fine too, and much of it will grade wrappers. The tobacco on hand is all sun grown but from the appearance of the wrappers one might think they were grown under a shade. Some of the tobacco has already been put through one sweat and is being arranged for the second, while lots of it is now in the steam room. Mr. Gill has selected some extra nice samples of the product, — grown by himself, — and will send them to the Beaumont and Shreveport Fairs. To the former he expects to go himself, while Messrs. Robinson and West will attend the Shreveport Fair. It is possible too that samples will be sent to the San Antonio Fair, — as Mr. Gill has annexed blue ribbons there on two former occasions with his tobacco. He is very much encouraged over the tobacco out look in this county and predicts a big increase in acreage, and which will be necessary to accommodate the ever growing demand.

## The Good Roads Work

County Road Supervisor W. E. McMillin was in the city today, having come in to look after some business matters. He reports everything on the good road moving along nicely and people in that section well pleased with it. There are something like a thousand or eleven hundred feet yet to build, and with possibly another week's work it will all be completed. The crew is not so large as it was some time ago, though about two hundred and fifty feet per day are being constructed.

## OLD "EAST TEXAS" EXCELS.

W. T. Wilson Returns From an Extended Trip Through the Western Portion and New Mexico. Enthused With This Section — No Other Part Can Equal It.

W. T. Wilson, President of the W. T. Wilson Grain Company of this city, has just returned from an extended trip through the Western portion of Texas and the Eastern and Southern sections of New Mexico. He has been gone several months, spending about ninety days of the time in the Barstow and Pecos City country, and other alfalfa sections of the Lone Star state. Mr. Wilson returned to old East Texas enthused, — and believes, in words as he expressed it, "that this part of the world is God's own, and no other can compare with it, much less excel." In that Western country, — extreme West we term it down here, — the conditions are described as rather severe, very dry, no feed stuff to amount to anything, and the out-look, to an outsider at least, indeed gloomy. But, according to Mr. Wilson's report, those folks are still boosting and booming and ask as much for their holdings as if conditions were as bright as a sunflower. The Nacogdoches gentleman did buy some alfalfa however while out there, but not in quantities he desired, nor at prices he thought for. Feed-stuffs are all very high in that country, — above the prices here, — and the demand seems to be increasing with rapidity. "In some respects that country may beat East Texas," said Mr. Wilson, when seen by a Sentinel man, "but I would not give this county for it all. I came here nine years ago from West Texas, to make my home, — I am here yet and will be here the next time. That section of

I spent considerable time in New Mexico, South and East, and things are no better in the territory than in West Texas. This is not knocking, — it's bare facts. But I will give the West Texas citizen credit for one thing, — he is the greatest hustler in the world. He excels in that, — but for the choicest place in the biggest state in the union to live, — I choose at once the wonderful, though neglected, East Texas.

## Nacogdoches County Pecans.

Nelson Beaver, who lives about ten miles Northwest from this city, was here today selling pecans. He brought in six bushels, — 252 pounds, — for which he received twelve and a half cents per pound. Mr. Beaver has one hundred trees and reports a fairly good crop. He is not thrashing but merely picks them as they fall. The pecans are of the paper shell variety and are very fine. He had no trouble in disposing of his first picking and at the good price of a bit a pound.

I was in the Philippines Islands twenty-four months (too many) and as I see them they are a bunch of trouble on the horizon of civilization. They are bounded on the north by rocks and destruction, on the east by typhoons and hurricanes, on the south by cannibals and earth-quakes, on the west by sharks and smugglers.

The interior of the Islands is composed of mud and mountains.

The population includes 9,000,000,000 carabous (water buffaloes) and three times that many roosters. Of the people 8,000,000 are Amigos (friends at the muzzle of a 45) and the balance are Chinese gamblers and caromat drivers.

The Philippines Islands make a nice bouquet for a dead fly enemy.

The climate is pleasant and healthy — for mosquitoes, ants, lizards, bats, scorpions, snakes, carabous, and roosters.

Malarial fever is so prevalent that on many occasions the Islands have shaken by the vibrations of the inhabitants in their chills.

chow, I will name some of the simpler, such as beri-beri, small-pox, leprosy, adoby-itch, bubonic-plague, and cholera, all of which are guaranteed to give entire satisfaction.

The soil is very rich and produces large quantities of rice, sugar, tobacco, diseases, insurrection and odor. The natives are very industrious, their chief industry being cock fighting and stealing.

Their marriage ceremony is very impressive especially that clause in the contract which provides for the wife the privilege of laboring for her husband as much as he desires. The home dress of the Filipino is artistic and attractive, consisting of transparent outlines.

The native costume is flour sacks tied around the body (certain brands being preferred). Children under fifteen (15) years of age wait until the next year for clothes.

The towns are aggregations of shakes full of fleas, cur-dogs, chickens, bed-bugs, pigs, monkeys, and the families all live on terms of equality.

The beast of burden is the carabou. On a three mile journey only thirty days ration is required. The Philippine Islands as a whole, are a forsaken, cannibalized, infested blot on the earth.

I thought so when I had twenty-four long months to stay there.

## Extend Lumber Railroad.

Nacogdoches, Texas, October 29.—Citizens of Chireno are negotiating with the Angelina County Lumber company for an extension of their railroad, which, it is said, will be connected with the Santa Fe railroad northeast from Chireno, if they get this railroad to go to their town. The Angelina County Lumber company has large pine timber holdings in the county and is building a bridge over the Angelina river, and has a large force of men cutting the right of way and following is the construction work on the roadbed in the county. The bridge is being erected near Ratcliff's Bluff, which is less than twenty miles from this town. The country penetrated by this line of railroad is a fine agricultural country which will be developed when the road is extended. The farmers in that part of this county known as the fork of the rivers, Angelina and Attoyac, are among the most prosperous in the county, and at no distant day a prosperous little town will spring into existence in the region. The Angelina County Lumber company's road is already connected with the Cotton Belt system at Keltys, near Lutkin and by the extension of the line of railroad to connect with the Santa Fe system will give them an outlet at both ends of their line.

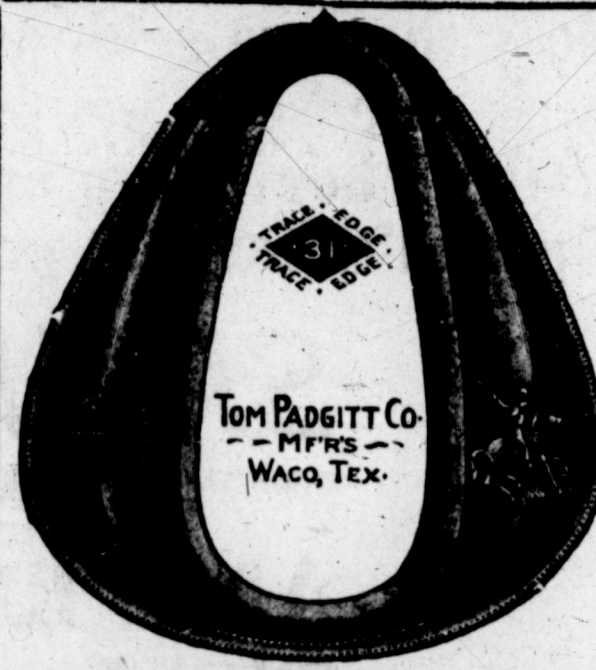

### BROOM CORN POSSIBILITIES.

The Chamber of Commerce is organizing a broom factory for Beaumont. The amount estimated for the proposed industry has been subscribed or is in prospect. A substantial citizen who has become interested will leave shortly for an extended trip of inspection of broom factories and methods. The Chamber of Commerce this year distributed broom corn in order to determine the growing possibilities in this section and the results obtained offer convincing evidence of the practicability and profit of growing broom corn in the Beaumont country. Therefore the following correspondence and comment will be interesting to our people since it serves to suggest the value of a broom factory to a community in not giving employment to labor in the factory but enabling the growing of a profitable crop by the farmers.

A correspondent, writing from Oklahoma City, on Sept. 22, says:

"Broom corn reached a high mark in Oklahoma the past week. The quality of the brush this year is much better than previous years on account of the favorable weather to cure it.

"The high price was reached at Sayre when A. A. Kahon sold his entire crop of five acres for \$150 per ton. This is realizing \$120 an acre off of \$15 land. It was claimed that brush brought the same price at Woodward.

"At Guyman the price reached \$150 per ton and a large amount of it changed hands during the past week.

"Shattuck, which for two seasons held the world's record for the largest yield from any single point, and which produced a lot of the brush this year marketed a large amount of excellent brush this week at \$140 per ton."

The editor of the Beckham County News, published at Elk City, Oklahoma, took issue with the correspondent and proceeds to give some additional information about broom corn that should interest the people of Southwest Texas, where it is believed as much or more can be grown per acre than in Oklahoma. Here is what the Elk City editor had to say:

"The reporter who sent in the above overlooked the largest inland broom corn market in the world. Elk City claims that distinguished honor and our buyers pay the highest prices obtainable anywhere in Oklahoma.

"J. F. Lewis of Brantley sold his broom corn in Elk City for \$175 per ton. Arthur Booker of Brantley received \$180 per ton for his crop and C. I. Caddel, within five miles of Granite, sold his crop of broom corn in Elk City for \$180 per ton.

"We hope the reporter will come to headquarters when he wants to give a reliable market price for publication. Elk City market is to the broom corn market as Liverpool is to the cotton market." —Beaumont Enterprise.

**To Put in Brick Floor.**

Brick are being put on the ground for the new floor in the city hall, and work is expected to commence at an early date. The original contract called for a cement floor, but on account of the nature of the dirt etc., it was feared that such would prove impracticable. A new contract was then made calling for a brick floor, and Contractor Herring will likely begin the construction within a few days.

**To The Farmers.**

I wish to urge all who take part in the farmers cooperative demonstrative work under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture, to run the stalk cutter over all lands which has any weeds or stalks, and as soon as land has enough moisture, to begin plowing with disk or turn plow at least eight inches deep. Ground should be well pulverized as fast as plowed, or as soon after as possible. This applies to all soils except clean, loose, open land which would not be benefited unless a cover crop should follow, such as rye, oats or barley with a small amount of winter vetch or crimson clover mixed. This crop may be pastured and turned under in the spring. Deep fall breaking is beneficial on all soils except loose clean sandy hills, and when followed with a cover crop is good for all soils. The winter cover crop is very beneficial to all soils. In conclusion I repeat that as a rule deep fall plowing, not deep spring plowing, is one of the essentials to good farming.
