FHA Emergency Loans Available To Assist In 1972 Crop Damage

BAIRD — Farmers in Eastland and Callahan Counties, who had suffered crop or property losses during the drought and other natural disasters during the period January 1 through June 19 of 1972 and who have not received an Emergency Loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an Emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, 3rd floor of the Courthouse, Baird, on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday

afternoon, or many apply to the Farmers Home Administration County Office in Eastland, Room 420, Eastland National Bank Building, on or before May 8, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for Emergency loans at 1 percent interest.

In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that the uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

AUSTIN — A reminder on the State law about motorists stopping for school buses was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the law, which applies on city streets as well as rural highways requires motorists moving in either direction on the same roadway or street with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing red lights on the bus are in operation.

He said the problem is becoming more serious in cities due to increased use of school buses in urban school districts.

There are only two exceptions to the law on stopping for loading or unloading a school bus: Those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway, divided by median or physical barrier) are not required to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has topped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir said the problem of school bus accidents is of concern to law enforcement officials and educators throughout Texas. Only a few weeks ago, the Travis County Grand Jury urged the news media to publicize the law about stopping and not passing a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

The grand jury noted that serious criminal charges might

result if a motorist disregards this law.

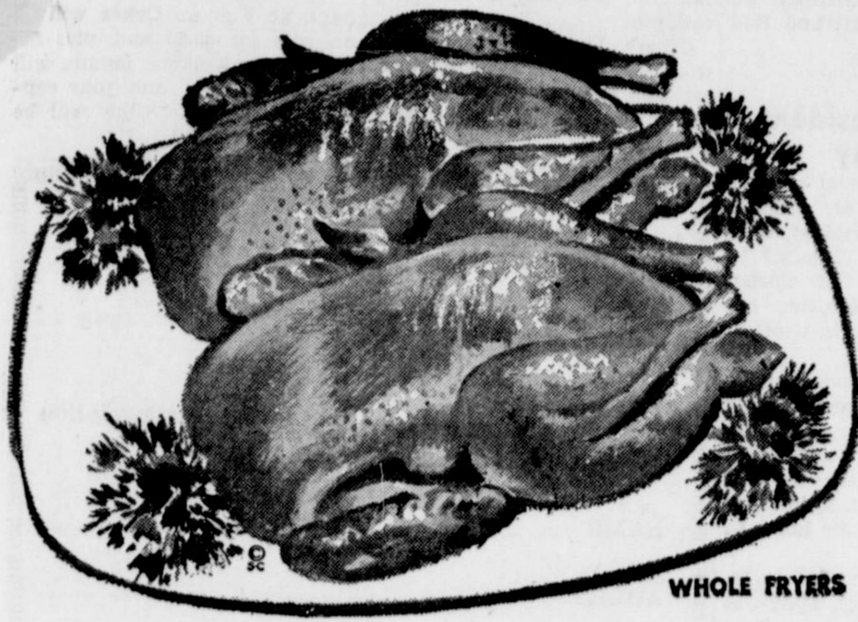

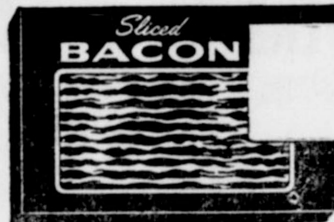
