Mr. Eubanks, a retired farmer, died Friday, April 27 at 7:30 p. m., after suffering an apparent heart attack in Uvalde Memorial Hospital. He was admitted to a hospital there when he suffered the first attack while on vacation

He was born Dec. 12, 1905 in the Hart Community in Callahan County, and had lived in the Moran area all his life. He married the former Ollie Pence on Nov. 25, 1933 in Cisco




