NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

(S.J.R. 25) Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which: Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal prop-erty used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemp-tion would apply only to such property as is reason-ably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or water supply corporation or cooperative

The wording of the pro-posed constitutional amend-ment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply co-operative."


