TREE ARMY CAMPS FOR TEXAS

FARM MORTGAGE LOANS ON THE WAY

According to Washington advices the farm credit administration is issuing farm mortgage loans at the rate of \$1,000,000 a day, "and that even this high peak will be exceeded within another month." According to the federal statisticians the mortgage indebtedness carried on American homes having a value of less than \$20,000 totals the huge sum of \$21,000,000,000, and the mortgage indebtedness of American farms represents an indebtedness of many billions of dollars. There are 12 federal land banks. There is one at Houston. It is said to be the most successful of all the farm loan banks established in the long ago by the federal government.


