Explosion Kills Three, Seriously Injures One

CLYDE — Tragedy occurred about 5:50 p. m. Monday as the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department answered a call for a grass fire. As firemen began trying to extinguish the flame, a tremendous explosion occurred, destroying the equipment truck, the Clyde fire truck and a pickup belonging to Clyde fireman, Art Rody. The explosion scattered debris over several acres in the area. The tragedy occurred 6 miles north of Interstate 20, on FM 604, on the ranch operated by T. C. Guy.

The fire was first reported by Michael Warren, who was working nearby on another ranch.

Fire Chief Don Haley stated Tuesday morning "the accident is still being investigated, a de-

finite cause of the fire has not been determined."

Killed instantly were Roy Lee Goin of Clyde, Michael Ronald Warren of Rt. 1, Clyde, and a student at ACC, and Ira Roy Akers, also of Clyde.

Still listed in critical condition at Hendrick Memorial Hospital is Marc Kent Gilmore of Clyde. Art Rody received treatment at the hospital and was released Monday night. Sid Saverece of Abilene, who was working on a ranch near there, was also treated for injuries.

Funeral services will be held for Roy Lee Goin at 10 a. m. Wednesday in Bailey Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Jesse Dea, pastor of the First United Methodist Church officiating. Burial will be in Clyde Cemetery, under direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Mr. Goin was born Sept. 4, 1918 in Oregon. He married Dorothy Sue Simpson April 1, 1944 in Abilene. He was in the U. S. Army for four years during World War II, serving in the European Theater. He was a member of First United Methodist Church, Clyde Volunteer Fire Department, V. F. W. and the American Legion. He owned and operated Roy's Trading Post at his home south of Clyde, and was employed by Ash & Summers Building Contractors in Abilene for 20 years.

Survivors are his wife, Sue of the home; one daughter, Leah Mosley of Baird; a son, Gary of Waco; seven grandchildren; one sister, Jewell Cornutt of Central Point, Ore.; a step-father Frank Wallace of Washington; one step-brother and one step-sister, both of Missouri.

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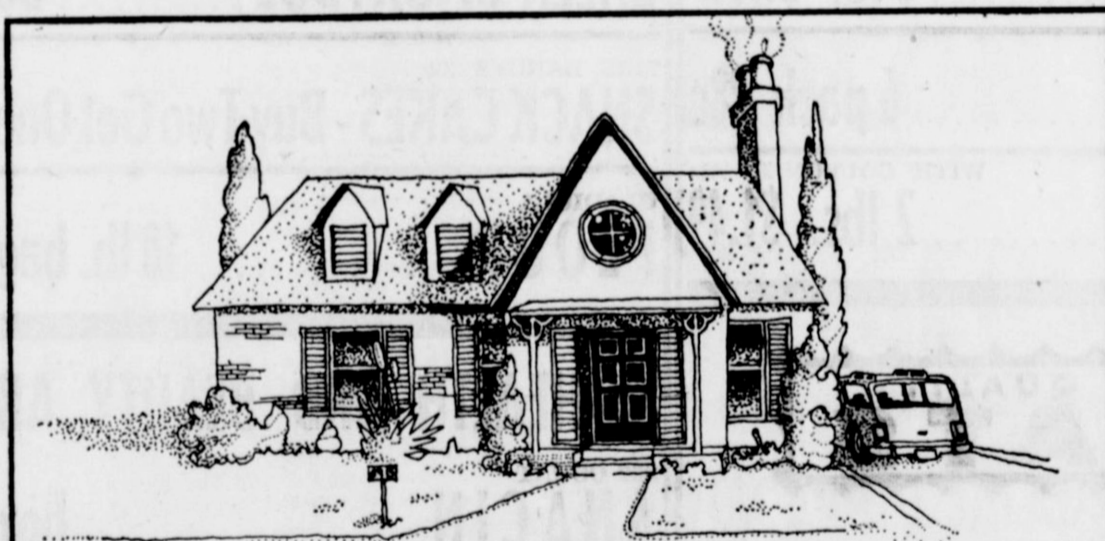



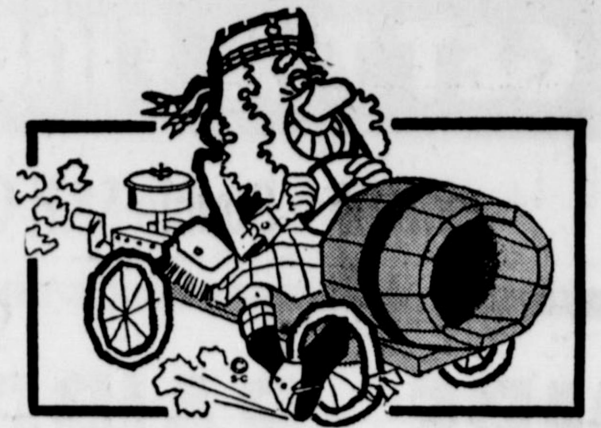
