The best wisecrack heard on the special last Friday was unintentional, if you know what we mean. The train stopped somewhere near Baird and everything in the coach was quiet. Suddenly the younger of the two Von Roeder children piped up: "What have we stopped for daddy? Do we have a flat?"

As we sat in the press box with Prexy Anderson Friday we heard more comments on the Bulldogs than we ever heard him make in the three years we have been sitting in press boxes with him. He commented on Britt's playing at end, especially the defense; Cole's blocking, particularly on one play where he took out a defensive half to let Briley make a nice gain; Anderson's ability to shake off tacklers and plunge through the line and Walsh's playing at tackle. About Walsh he said, "Bryan must be a whale of a tackle if Walsh is his understudy." And did he play a heads-up game.

And then he wrote: "When Abilene got the oval again, it was far up the field, and the Eagles lost ground instead of gaining, as Britt put on a one-man defensive show, to stop Brookshire and Cogdell for an aggregate of 13 yards loss.

"The ball game was a nifty from the spectator angle, and many of the boys came in for honors. You've got to hand it to the Ranger backfield—Anderson for his drive, stiff-arm and elusiveness that gets him places; Gray and Briley for their speed, and Cole for his blocking. The line was a power until it began to lose the jump with Britt making himself generally useful at end, and with Walsh at tackle, and with Love who divided his time between guard and center, starring."

The Pups, so we understand, would like to have a game this week in which all the reserves get a chance to play. We would like to see a game like that, too, and it might do a lot of good and might develop some good reserve strength, which might come in mighty handy later in the year. As we remember it Gray was a reserve until the Cisco game two years ago, when his shiftiness and ability to make nice gains developed suddenly as far as the fans were concerned. He snatched a short pass and raced something like 50 yards to help keep the Bulldogs in the running after the regulars had been unable to get anywhere. Another such player might be found among the reserves if they were given a game in which to show what they could do.

In the meantime the Ranger Junior College Texas Rangers are to play another home stand, this time with the Simmons university freshman team. The Simmons fresh have been playing more or less regularly and have developed a pretty good team, which should put up a nice game against the Rangers, as they, too, have a number of ex-high school players on the roster that will make the regular team next year.

So far we haven't received their lineup, though we have written for it and should have some dope on the team before Friday. And, when they play, we will guess that the score won't be another 0 to 0 affair, because the Rangers have played about all of that kind of games a team should have in its system for one year. We don't remember another team that ever played as many close games or as many games that ended in scoreless ties in one season. In two years only two teams have scored on the Rangers, unless the Daniel Baker freshman scored a few weeks ago, and we forget the score of that game. In 1932 John Tarleton scored one touchdown and kicked a goal and Bill Prep scored one touchdown. The records we have on hand are:

MEXICAN TIP CAUSED FOUR TO BE ARRESTED

EDINBURG, Texas, Oct. 30.—A tip from Mexico led to the arrest of four men held here on charges of murder in connection with a four-year-old murder, attributed to Hidalgo county's bitter political war.

Information obtained in Mexico three weeks ago led to the arrests. Charges were filed here against Cam Hill of El Paso, former Hidalgo county clerk; Julian Ybarra, Mexican resident of Mercedes, Texas; a Weslaco street sweeper, and George Beck, Dallas peddler.

They are accused in connection with the slaying of Claude Kelly, 31, who was fatally beaten in 1929 while he slept in the home of his father-in-law, County Judge E. C. Couch.

Couch at the time was a candidate for county judge on the Good Government party ticket. The party leaders interpreted the attack upon Kelly as an attempt on the life of Couch.

FARMERS ASK PROGRAM FOR AGRICULTURE

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 30.—A three-point immediate national program for agricultural recovery and state embargoes on export of all farm products was asked by the National Farmers Holiday association today at a conference of 10 mid-western governors and a representative of the agricultural administration.

THREE GUESSES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The question of the government's power to refuse contracts to firms not flying the Blue Eagle was disputed in a suit filed in District of Columbia supreme court today.

The suit filed by George F. Driscoll company of Brooklyn sought to restrain Secretary of the Treasury Woodin from awarding a construction contract to other than the low bidder. The construction company asserted that although submitting a low bid for construction of a postoffice annex in New York the bid was not accepted because at the time the company was not flying the Blue Eagle.

The suit will bring a legal test of the validity of such action as that involving the Ford Motor company for automotive equipment. General Johnson holds that Ford is not eligible to bid, having no Blue Eagle.

CITIZENS ARE PICKING SITE OF POSTOFFICE

Dr. P. M. Kuykendall, president of the Chamber of Commerce, today urged everyone who received one of the post card ballots to vote for a site for the postoffice not later than Wednesday in order that the votes could be counted by Thursday by a committee to be appointed for this purpose.

In making the request he pointed out that the Chamber of Commerce was remaining perfectly neutral in the selection of a site, merely mailing out the ballots to the Ranger in order that they might have a voice in the selection of the site. When all votes are in and the result of the election is announced, it was stated, the Chamber of Commerce will then promote the work for the site selected by the people, but until the voice of the people is heard the organization will take no part in the selection, nor will it sponsor any movement.

It has been pointed out by Congressman Thomas L. Blanton that until the people decide upon a site it will be impossible for the government to let any contract or do any work toward the building, but if 60 per cent of the people want one site it will be secured and the work started soon. For this reason the people were urged to center on one project in order that local controversies might not eliminate Ranger's chances of securing a federal building.

Post cards, on which the people might write in their preference, were mailed out Saturday night to all who have poll tax receipts in the city. Anyone who is entitled to a poll tax or who has not received one of the cards through the mail can secure one of the cards at the office of the Chamber of Commerce and cast his vote between now and Wednesday and the vote will be counted along with the others.

It was reported this morning that a few of the cards mailed out Saturday night had been filled in and returned to the Chamber of Commerce, and were received in the mail today, but no indication of the outcome of the ballot is to be made public until the committee canvasses the returns and announces the site selected by the largest number of citizens.
