

## Roosevelt Says Government Spending to End

### WAR OR PEACE IN TEN DAYS IS FORECAST

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Some diplomatic observers believed today the question of war or peace in Europe would be decided in the next 10 days.

The situation between Italy and Britain and other League countries is most serious, but many believe there is a good chance for peace.

The view is taken that Premier Mussolini would not be able long to combat such penalties as an embargo on oil, coal, steel and iron and that despite threats he is likely to sink long before adopting warlike measure involving him not only with Britain but with all League nations.

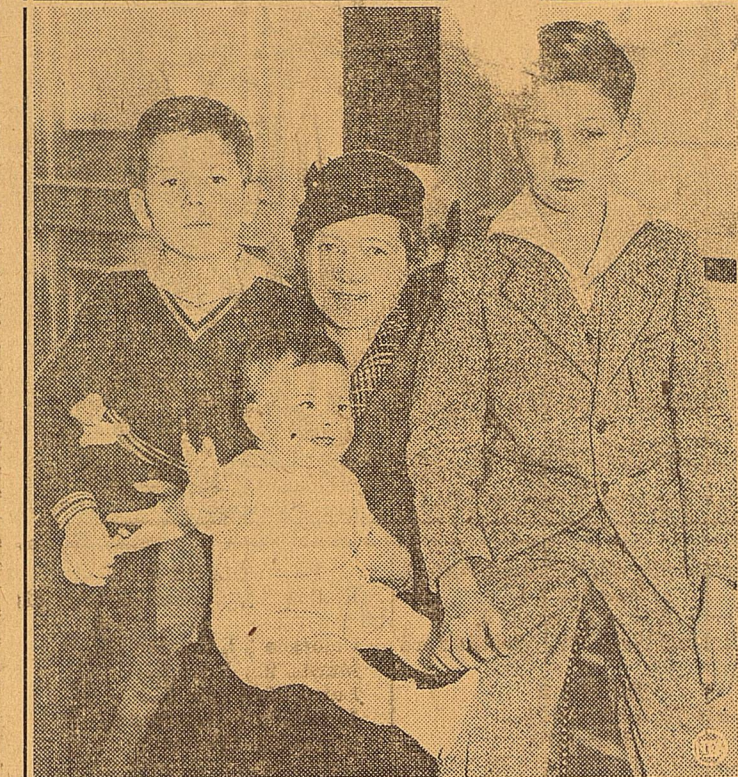

### DECREASE IN DEFICIT HAS BEEN PLANNED

Answer To Critics Made At Atlanta Before Gathering of 90,000 People.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 29.—President Roosevelt in an indirect but forceful reply to new deal critics, told 90,000 persons today that lavish government spending was over and the nation could "look forward with assurance to a decreasing deficit."

Political observers took his speech as an outline of his party campaign ammunition in next year's national election and therefore, as his most important public utterance in recent months.

He spoke before a throng that jammed Grant field, the stadium of the Georgia School of Technology, part of a "homecoming day" celebration, arranged by the Georgia congressional delegation in which about 250,000 persons took part.

While he mentioned no individual in his opposition by name, his references to condition when he took office were frequent and often pointed to their pointlessness in reference to criticism to his immediate predecessor, Herbert Hoover, was inescapable.

"The deficit of the government is today higher than that of any other great nation of the world, in spite of attacks on that credits made by a few individuals and organizations who seek to dictate to the administration and congress how to run the treasury and how to let the needy starve."

### France, Britain Seek Statement From Mussolini

### YOUTH IS SHOT BY MOTHER AS HE TOOK DRINK

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Nov. 29.—Jesse Livermore Jr., 16, son of the Wall Street stock speculator, once known as the "boy wonder of Wall Street," was shot down by his mother today as he tilted a quart of whisky to his lips.

"I'd rather see you dead than drinking," police quoted the mother as saying before she shot the boy.

Young Livermore protesting "That's all right; it's nothing," was removed to a hospital where some hours later he was in "poor condition." A .22 bullet pierced his chest and ranged down through his liver.

His mother, Mrs. Dorothea Livermore, found by her son's side on the floor of their home, screaming "I've shot my boy," was held on suspicion of assault to murder.

Let Us Not Be Fooled By Crocodile Tears

All-wise Mother Nature forgot to equip the crocodile with regular tear glands, so that when this rather terrifying reptile weeps he is generally supposed to be getting ready to bite somebody; and it is worth remembering that the same rule often applies in the big wide world of human affairs.

Just at present a great many tears are being shed by British statesmen about the deplorable condition of the British fleet. Since a big naval conference is due to be held in a short time, there is a natural suspicion that these tears are of the crocodile variety. Let's have a look at things and see.

The recent exchange of harsh looks between Mussolini and Stanley Baldwin is supposed to have revealed the pitiable weakness of England's sea forces. We are told that the British fleet is deficient in battleship, in cruisers, in submarines, in everything that makes an admiral's life worth living, and that the Mediterranean show caused the empire as a unit to quake in its shoes because of the fleet's weakness.

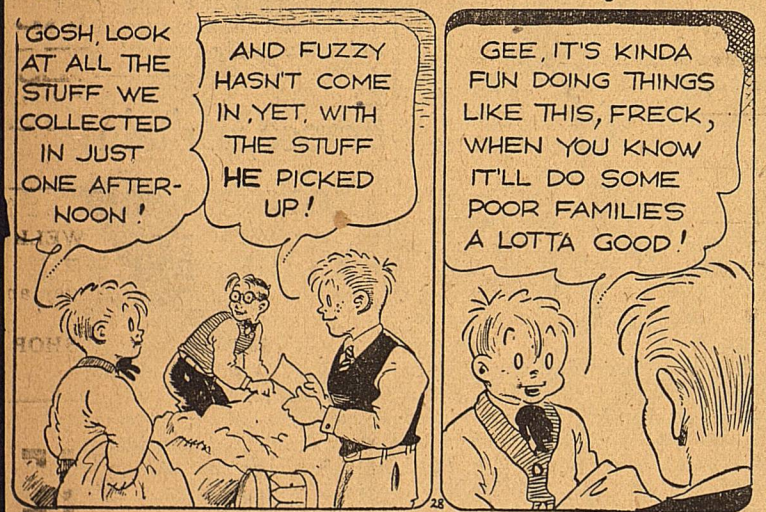
Now it happens that there are two prominent Englishmen, amply informed on naval matters, who don't agree with this diagnosis. They are Lord Stabolgi, formerly Lord ment, and the Right Honorable Albert V. Alexander, former First Lord of the Admiralty.

These men say bluntly that England's navy is still the strongest on earth. They point out that England has the two most modern battleships afloat in the Rodney and Nelson; that her Hood is the mightiest warship in the world; that the British navy is the only one which possesses battle cruisers, having three of these craft; and that when ships now under construction are finished, Britain will have 17 more cruisers than any other power on earth.

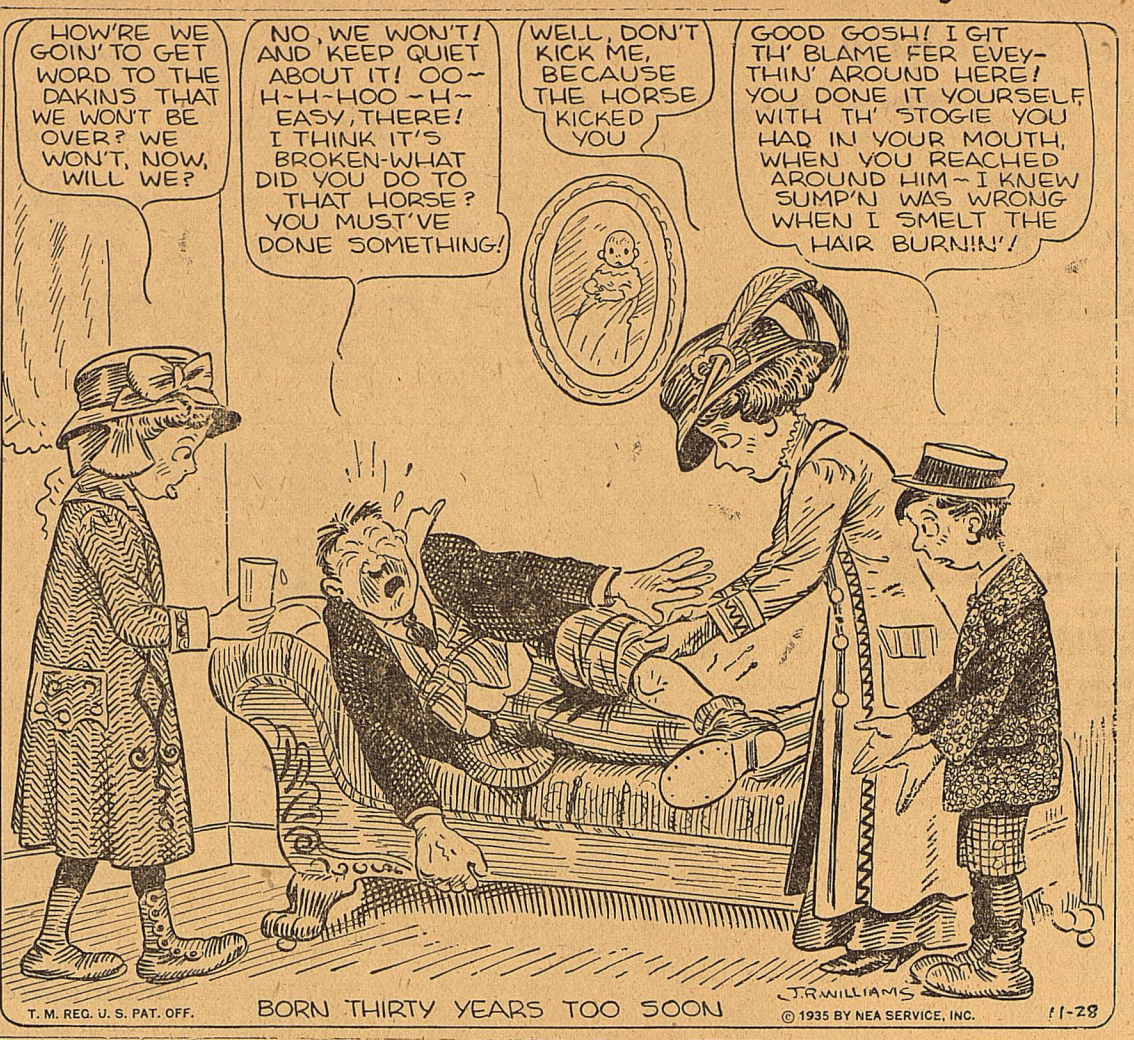
That is not a picture of a navy that is rotting away in the midst of heavily-armed enemies. It is rather a picture of the world's greatest sea power taking care that it remain the world's greatest sea power.

In that case, why the crocodile tears? Well, this naval conference is coming; and if the way can be paved properly, Americans will pat the mother country tenderly on the back and tell her for heaven's sake to go build a few warships before her fleet falls apart on her. Then, when the dust settles, they will find that they have kindly negotiated their own navy into permanent inferiority.

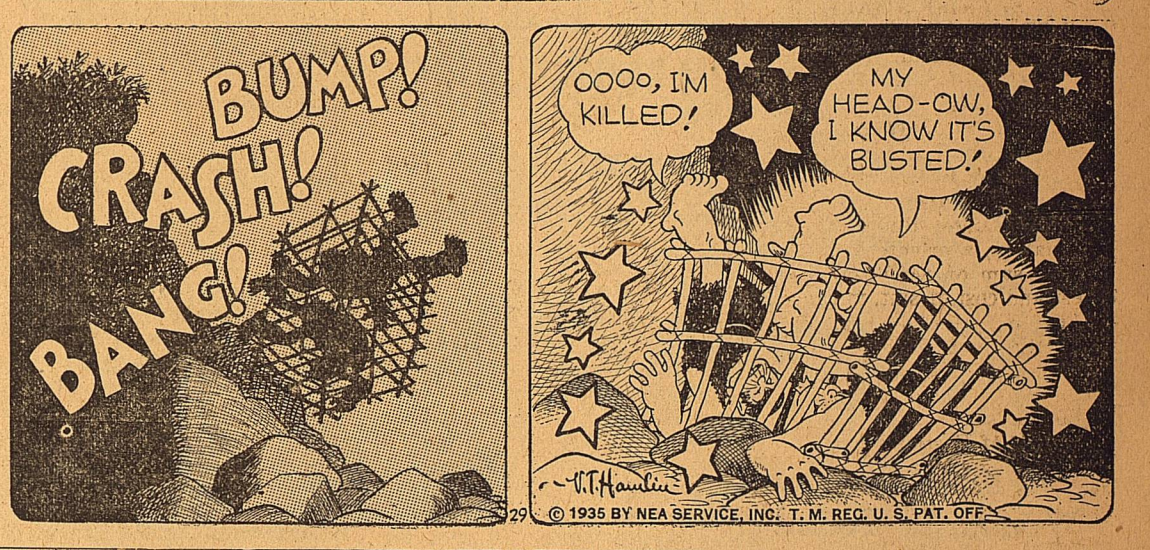
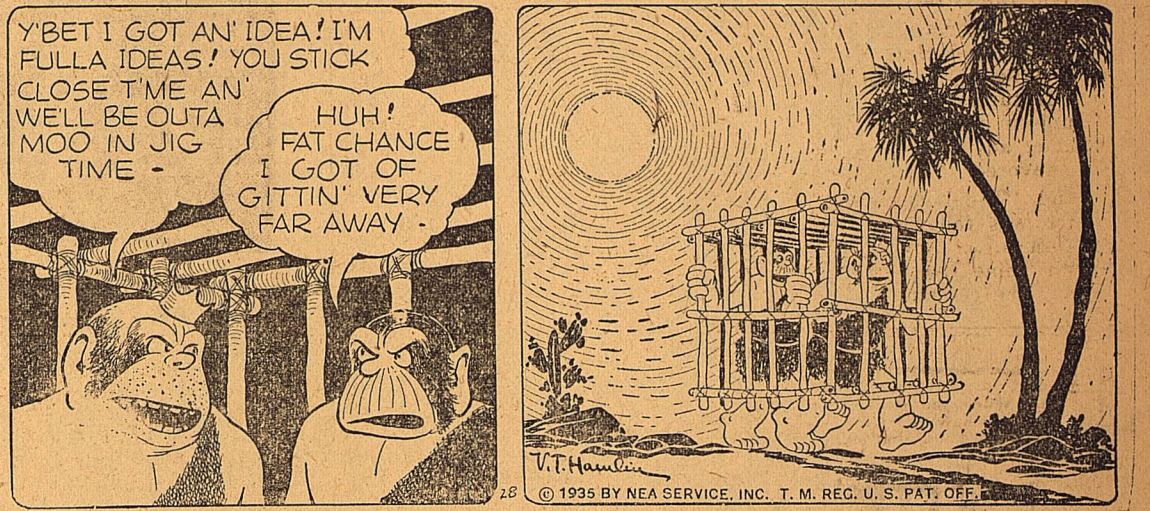
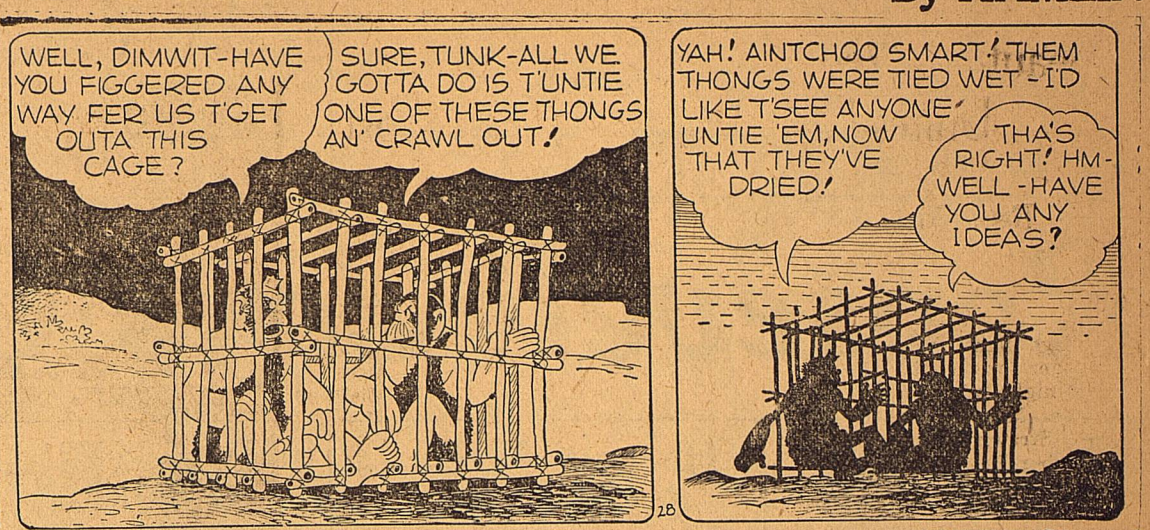

### Descendants of H. M. S. Bounty Crew Dub Grapevine Mayor 'Texas Uncle'

Descendants of mutineers in one of the most famous mutinies of the seven seas have found a friend thousands of miles from their home on Pitcairn Island in the Pacific. He is Mayor E. R. Wall of Grapevine, dubbed "Texas Uncle" by the grateful natives of that tiny speck in the ocean.

Mayor Wall became interested in these people about 20 years ago when he learned about them from sailors in Charleston, S. C. The sailors told him the natives appreciated gifts of newspapers and magazines so Wall sent them some. Gradually he began corresponding with various members of the colony of brown-skinned descendants of English and Tahitian stock. Then he began acting as legal advisor to some members of the colony, which numbers 205.

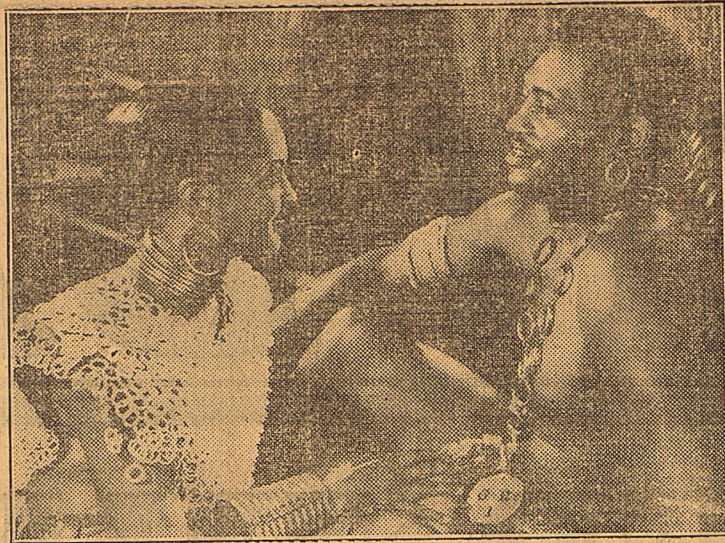
"They are a hobby of mine," he declared. "They still are a primitive people, but are highly appreciative of what is done for them."

Mayor Wall's friend in Grapevine will tell you the islanders have been a rather expensive hobby for him through the years, however. The natives send woven baskets and trinkets to Mayor Wall and he somehow manages to dispose of them and send money to the makers in return. He also sends clothing and other necessities.

Travelers are surprised to find watermelons growing on this volcanic island. They would not be if they knew that Wall sent watermelon seeds to the colony, as well as okra seeds and tomato plants.

"I receive letters from all over the world concerning the Pitcairn Islanders," Wall said. "Many magazine articles also have been written, as well as books. These people are descendants of nine members of the crew of the British ship 'Bounty' which set sail from England about 150 years ago. The vessel was sent to Tahiti to obtain bread fruit trees, which were to be

transferred to the West Indies.

"The Bounty was commanded by Lieut. William Bligh, an English naval officer, who was brutal in his discipline. The ship arrived safely in Tahiti despite much grumbling by the crew. After the trees were loaded, the Bounty set sail in April, 1789, for Jamaica.

"The crew mutinied several days later under leadership of Fletcher Christian, master's mate. Eighteen men who refused to join the mutiny were cast adrift in a small boat with Bligh. How these castaways finally arrived at Timor, near Java, after a 3,618-mile voyage is one of the most remarkable stories of the sea.

"The Bounty, in the meantime, went back to Tahiti. Nine mutineers, with 18 natives of Tahiti—six men and 12 women, then started in the Bounty for Pitcairn Island, which they reached in 1790. They took their valuables off the ship and burned her. The hulk of this famous vessel can be seen today in Bounty Bay and the rudder has been recovered from the sea and is on display in the colony.

"There was much strife on the island, but the community finally developed a religion of its own, later becoming adherents to the Church of England. The majority of them now, however, are Seventh Day Adventists.

"I never have visited Pitcairn Island, but I have talked with people who have and I have read much about the islanders. They are a hardy people and are gentle despite their rough appearance. Their strongest word is "please," a strong contrast to the language their mutineering ancestors undoubtedly employed."

"Mutiny on the Bounty," which will open an engagement Saturday at the Arcadia Theatre is based on a book of the same title by James Norman Hall and Charles Nordhoff, a best seller. Clark Gable appears in the film as Christian and Charles Laughton as Bligh.

"I understand," Mayor Wall said, "that the Pitcairn Islanders resent some of the incidents depicted in the book, just as present-day Indians might object to showing scenes of Indians scalping white men."

### Two More Good Matches On Elks Card for Monday

Claude Swindell, former wrestling coach at Nebraska University, who wrestled in Ranger some 10 months ago and always made a good impression on the fans, tackles the San Antonio speed ball, Charlie Heard. Heard is considered one of the fastest boys in the game at his weight, 152 pounds. These boys will keep you interested for 45 minutes.

The main event, best two out of three falls with a two-hour time limit will be between Alber Szasz, the Hungarian flash, who needs no introduction to Ranger mat fans for last week he subdued the tough Bloddy Chrane, and Sailor Watkins, the tough gob of the U. S. navy.

Watkins comes recommended as one of the toughest boys the navy has ever produced. He has met and defeated all comers, along the Atlantic and Pacific shores. This match should be well worth two dollars but the popular prices of 15, 25 and 40 cents will prevail. All who attended the matches last week were well pleased and an even larger attendance is expected Monday night.
