

Mrs. Mary Kirchoff Announces State Senate, 30th Senatorial Dist.

PLAINVIEW — A Plainview school teacher who has been active in area and state Republican Party circles for many years has announced her candidacy for nomination as the Republican candidate for state senator from the 30th Senatorial District in the May primary.

Mrs. Mary Kirchoff, who presently serves the 30th District as state committee-woman for the GOP, made the announcement in her hometown of Plainview.

Having lived in Texas 40 years, Mrs. Kirchoff is a native of Missouri and a graduate of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, and has attended Wayland Baptist College and Texas Tech University. Mrs. Kirchoff is an instructor in Speech and English at Coronado High School in Plainview. She will take a leave of absence to campaign for the state post.

Discussing her candidacy on the Republican ticket, the 47-year-old Mrs. Kirchoff said, "I don't believe party lines really make any difference if the candidate is someone the people can trust, who has their confidence, who is interested in our area, and who will speak out for us in Austin."

The first woman elected to serve on the board of directors of West Texas Chamber of Commerce, she organized and served as chairman of the Woman's Activities Committee of the WTCC, which covers 132 counties in the western half of Texas.

Mrs. Kirchoff also assisted in organizing the West Texas "Small Towns task force" for the WTCC. Her instructional material is used on the local, state and national level.

Active in District Girl Scout Work, the Plainview Junior Service League and a life member of the Parent-Teacher Association, Mrs. Kirchoff also has served as president of Plainview Classroom Teachers' Association and was elected teacher of the year for Coronado in 1972. She has served the District and State in many capacities, including advisory to the Constitutional Revision Committee.

An active member of Plainview's First Christian Church, she was among the first women to serve on the board of directors in 1953, and at various times also served as a deaconess, choir director, president of the Christian Women's Fellowship, and youth director.

A steady worker for the GOP since the early 1960's, Mrs. Kirchoff has been a delegate

to the state convention six times since 1964, attended the 1964 national convention as an official guest, and served as a delegate to both the national and state Federation of Republican Women since 1971.

She also has served as campaign chairman for numerous GOP candidates, and her daughter, Karen, seems to be following in her footsteps. Karen, a sophomore at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, served as a page representing Texas in the 1971 National Federation meeting in Washington, D. C.

Her husband, John, is a farmer, stockman and investor, and her son, John E. is also a farmer and stockman.

J. D. Black Attends Training Institute

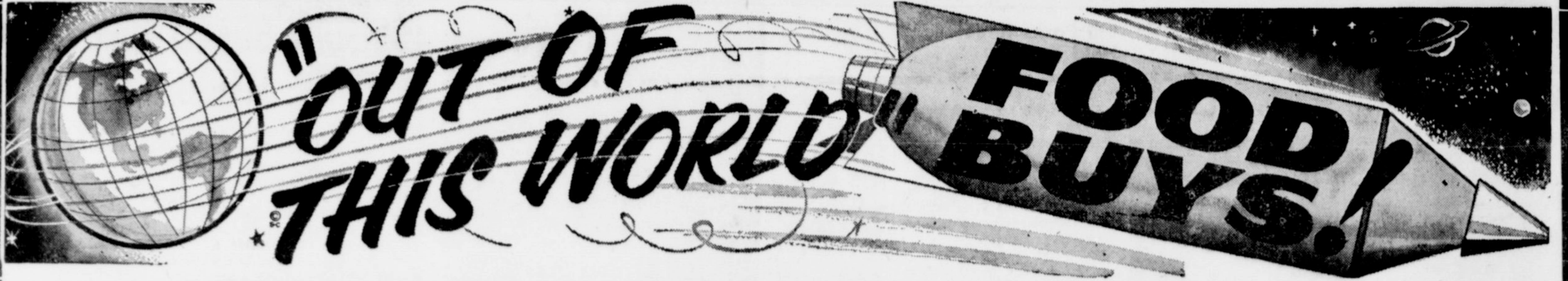

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

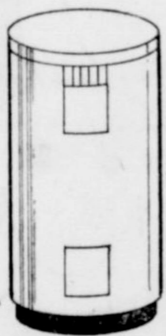
Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

4. It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute, will waste 300 gallons per month.

5. The thermostat controlling the water temperature is pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150°F. This setting has proven most satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.

6. The thermostat can be adjusted to provide warmer or cooler water temperatures. The thermostats are clearly marked for easy adjustment to increase or decrease the water temperature.
