WINTER BATTLE IN THE SOVIET BRINGING TWO HUGE ARMIES TOGETHER

Endurance Campaign Seems Assured As German Blitzkrieg Fails In Early Weeks of War

After 10 weeks of perhaps the most terrible slaughter in the history of warfare, some 10,000 Russian and German soldiers face the prospect of a winter campaign in bitterly cold weather on an incomparably desolate and vast battleground.

From the Arctic to the Black Sea and perhaps beyond, Russians and Germans will fight rain and mud and snow and ice as well as each other. On an 1,800-mile battle-front they will pit endurance against endurance, and the probability appeared to be that when the spring and summer thaws come again, they will still be fighting.

In the first two months of struggle on the Eastern Front the Germans failed to accomplish their first objective—annihilation of the Soviet armed forces. They drove deep into the vast U.S.S.R. with its 200,000,000 inhabitants, but the Red army fought back, returned in fair order and managed to keep itself intact in a dozen sectors. As they retreated, the Russians left only a "scorched earth" to the advancing Germans wherever it was possible to destroy railroads, power plants, factories, buildings and equipment of all kinds.

Neither Country Exhausted
Losses on each side were unprecedentedly large, but each side appeared to have vast reserves and resources left on which to draw. The Russians claimed that they still had a powerful air force and that their naval fleets were still a major weapon against the Germans.

What the actual losses have been may not be known until the war's end. But each side has made its report on the other. The Russians, according to the Germans, have lost 5,000,000 men—killed, wounded or captured; 15,000 tanks, 14,000 guns and 11,000 airplanes.

The Germans, on the other hand, according to Russian figures, have lost 2,000,000 men, 3,000 tanks, 10,000 guns and more than 7,200 planes. Each side said the other's losses were the heavier.

On June 22, Germany attacked from the Arctic to the Black Sea with Finnish, Hungarian and Rumanian allies. In its initial phase the German attack carried the legions of Adolf Hitler through all the territory annexed by the Soviet Union from Finland, the Baltic states, Poland and Rumania in 1939 and 1940.

Three Major Drives
From the old boundaries of Russia proper the Germans smashed on in tremendous multipronged drives against Leningrad, Russia's second city and shrine of the Bolshevik revolution, and against Moscow, the capital, and against the Ukraine, the Soviet Union's richest province in farm products, industry and natural resources.

The Germans, paced by their devastating dive-bombers and fast-rolling panzer divisions, drove rapidly in a multitude of pincer movements, encircling masses of Russians and driving on. In two months they conquered territory in European Russia more than half as large as Greater Germany.

But the Russians fought on behind the German spearheads and guerrilla bands sprang into existence to cut communications, destroy bridges and harry the Germans at a thousand places. And most important of all, the Russians threw the Germans off their blitzkrieg timetable and made a winter campaign in the mud and snow inevitable, forcing Hitler to keep on fighting a two-front war.

Four or five weeks from now blizzards will begin to sweep down from the north and by mid-October all northern Russia will be in the grip of winter. The Germans say they have anticipated every demand that winter can make and that they will keep up the pressure without pause, making it impossible for the Reds to reorganize their military strength for next spring and summer.

Germany Plans Ski Troops
The German high command is organizing and equipping ski troops and cavalry for operations in the snow. As for the Russians, they proved in the 1940 war with Finland that they could fight in the winter and that they had the

4-H CLUB AND FFA RULES FOR THE FAIR

Rules and premiums for Eastland County Boys 4-H Club and FFA department of the Eastland County Fair to be held in Eastland September 26th and 27th have been announced by Joe M. Glover Jr., assistant county agent, and Lonnie Smith, vocational agriculture teacher, Morton Valley, serving on the committee for this department. The 1941 rules and premiums are the same as those used in 1940 with the exception of a few minor changes.

Rules and premiums are as follows:

Rules

1. Premiums offered in this department are open to Eastland County 4-H Club Boys or FFA Boys. Only exhibits selected from actual club demonstration or FFA projects are eligible for entry.

2. Awards will be paid members who have kept complete records of demonstrations, and completed records or records up to date must be handed in at the time the entry is made.

3. 4-H and FFA Educational Booths must teach a definite lesson in agriculture, such as livestock improvement, farm or ranch management, or any other improved method of farming or ranching. Exhibits will be judged on their educational value.

4. Club members or FFA members who cannot bring in their entries may mail them to the Assistant County Agent by September 17th.

Ribbons must be exhibited until end of show. The registration certificate must be presented with each entry in the beef breeding class.

Only dry lot calves will be shown in the baby beef class. A dry lot calf is defined as one that has not suckled a cow since August 1941.

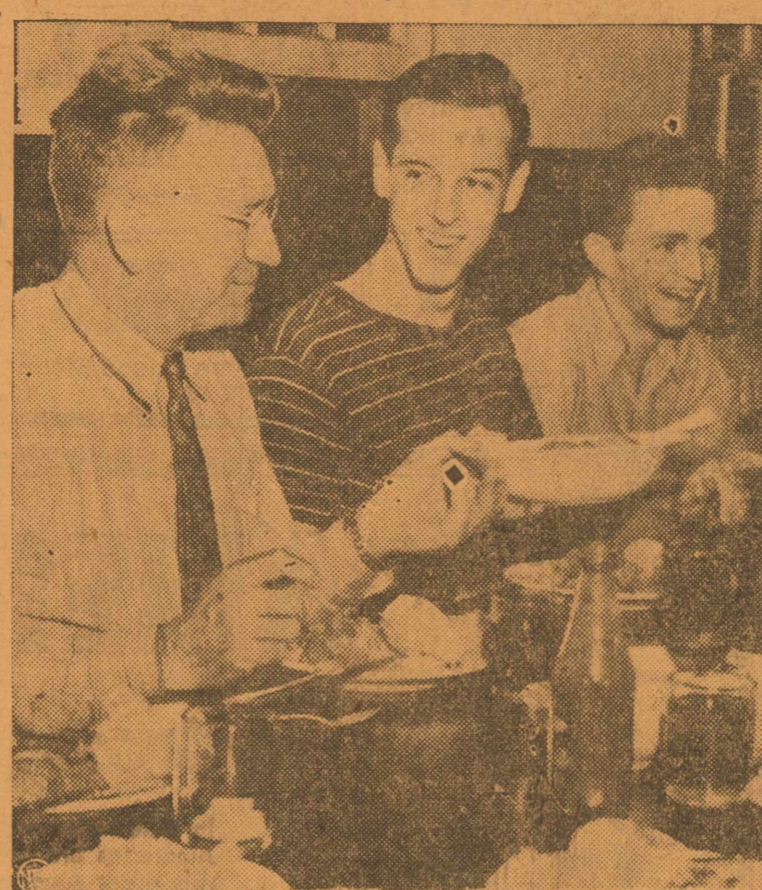

CANADA'S TIES WITH AMERICA DRAWN CLOSER

OTTAWA—Canada steadfastly has remained out of the Pan American Union, despite the fact that a chair has been held vacant for her. And while there have been indications it might join soon, exigencies of war have increased interest in hemisphere relations.

For the first time, the Dominion has established formal diplomatic relations with a South American country, opening a legation in Rio de Janeiro, while negotiations are under way for a similar exchange with Argentina and perhaps Mexico as well.

Always close to the United States economically and culturally, relations of the two northern neighbors have been stronger than ever, due in no small part to the long personal friendship of Prime Minister Mackenzie King and President Roosevelt.

Canada Restricts Travel

While Canada has prevented residents of the country from making other than necessary visits to the United States, Americans have less trouble than ever in getting into the Dominion.

Ottawa and Washington officials pass back and forth between programs—war, in Canada, and defense, in the United States—heads toward something new in collaboration. Respective legations have been strengthened, with military and naval branches conspicuous for the first time.

The two national leaders are entirely different types—to Mr. Roosevelt the Canadian chief is "MacKenzie," but to formal Mr. King, the American executive is "Mr. President."

When Mr. Roosevelt and Prime Minister King arranged the former's Hyde Park declaration, they saw to it that Canada's adverse trade balance would be helped. Under the plan, Canada, at war and with little in the way of a military machine is to provide its stronger neighbor with between \$200,000,000 and \$300,000,000 in defense materials.

Whether any of those materials has been developed is defense information, but it was announced consignments could include such items as small guns, ammunition, certain explosives and chemicals, corvettes, minesweepers and some "secret devices."

Imports Near Billion

But most of the border-crossing of war goods is from south to north. For the year, imports will total \$953,000,000, about \$428,000,000 of which will be for direct war materials, with Canada doing a standard export business of \$479,000,000.

While Canada is eligible for assistance under the Lease-Lend act it has paid in American dollars for all United States purchase thus far.

To keep the trade balance from getting too far out of hand, imports of many non-essentials have been banned and Canadians cannot make casual trips across the border.

Government sources say that together, Canada and the United States "will become one stronger team, working and producing according to a carefully planned program which will insure the most rapid possible supply of war materials to Britain and other embattled democracies and the most efficient of defense articles for North America."

O'Daniel Hints At Frameup In Coast Shortage of Oil

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—Senator W. Lee O'Daniel of Texas, a member of the special senate committee investigating the eastern seaboard oil shortage, today hinted that the shortage had been manufactured to insure construction of a pipeline from Texas to the east coast.

His statement followed testimony of Ralph Budd, defense transportation chairman, who said there were 20,000 oil cars, able to take 200,000 barrels of Texas oil eastward daily.

He introduced a bill in the Senate to guarantee them a minimum monthly pay of \$40. Johnson recalled that a similar proposal was defeated recently by only one vote.

Price Fixing Plans Called Inadequate By U of T Professor

AUSTIN, Sept. 4.—The administration's price fixing program was described today as inadequate by Dr. James C. Dolley, University of Texas banking professor, who called for immediate anti-inflation measures to keep purchasing power and available consumer goods in balance.

In June there were 16,437 Texas boys in Civilian Conservation Corps Camps—8,592 in Texas and the remainder in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming. In that month these boys returned to their families over \$230,000 and the Government estimated they earned wages in the amount of \$986,197.

Pennsylvania ranks next to Texas, having 13,006 boys in camps; Arkansas third with 10,403 and Oklahoma fourth with 9,941.

Training in National Defense Work has been increased and all enrollees have greater opportunities to prepare themselves for employment in private industry than ever before.

Low Income Bracket Approved In Senate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The United States Senate voted today to lower personal income tax exemptions in the new revenue bill, in accordance with recommendations of the Senate Finance Committee.

The measure lowers exemptions on incomes of married men from \$2,000 to \$1,500 and for single persons from \$800 to \$750.
