

Eastland County Turkeys

The following editorial appeared in a recent issue of the Abilene Reporter News which has taken recognition of Eastland County as one of the outstanding turkey growing sections in the

A new "cash crop", turkeys, has been moving up the economic ladder in West Texas the last few years, particularly since acreage allotments and the drought have disturbed the routine which had characterized farming for two generations.

An outstanding example of the development of this new source of income is found in Eastland County where the turkey growers have banded together to pool their information on both production and market-

The turkey association has a big function scheduled in Ranger on April 4, a "clinic" on growing and sellling the birds, first such a meeting on this scale ever undertaken in this area.

Eastland County 4-H boys and girls are being encouraged to get into the turkey business. For three years now an essay contest has been sponsored among the youngsters through the county agent's office with the prizes—turkey poults—donated by Kincaid's feed store and hatchery. A few days ago 14 young farmers were awarded 96 poults each. Under the rules, the 4-H'ers will feed and care for the birds and ready them for market. This fall each contestant will show three hens and three toms at the Dallas Fair. Last year they did quite well at the fair, collecting a total of over \$500 in auction and prize money.

During the three years of the contest the youngsters have averaged a net profit of about a dollar a bird as tangible proof of the cash value of their "crop."

tax deadlines. These are the cities of more than 5,000 population placed upon the unrendered tax which have incorporated under

In towns operating under the general laws property must be rendered for taxes between Jan. 1 and April 1 each year. A number of home rule cities set up the same requirements in their ordinances, while others prescribe different periods.

For state and county tax purposes, property must be rendered to the County Tax Assessor by April 30, and homestead exemptions must be claimed by the same time.

In some localities a third taxing unit is involved-the independent school district. In other places city or county. In addition, some localities have water, irrigation, or ines for rendition.

What property must be rendered for taxes? If Texas laws were strictly enforced, we would be required to render to all taxing units nearly every piece of real and personal property which we own, down to the very clothing on our backs. An exception is the constitutional exemption of \$250 worth of household furniture. However, no taxing unit carries their requirements this far, and it will be necessary to inquire of each tax assessor when rendering your property whether specific types property are ordinarily rendered in April 1 will be the deadline for that locality. One advantage of rendering your property is that you can set your own valuation .Then, if the county or city decides a higher valuation is in order, you will be given an opportunity to appear before a board to explain why the higher figure should not be used in computing your taxes.

Thereafter, an appeal to the courts is possible in some instances. Generally speaking, however, the courts are unable to strike out a valuation unless the agency or board has acted arbitrarily and placed on the property a valution higher than that placed on comparable property owned by others. 

Human Body Can. **Does Do Plenty About Weather**

AUSTIN -- If you think you can't do anything about the weather you're dead wrong. Ask the State Health Department. They'll tell you aii of us, assuming normalcy, are constantly doing someting about it.

We are all equipped with our own private thermostate. When atmospheric temperatures rise or fall from the 98.6 degrees which is normal body temperature, the thermostat goes into action.

This built-in regulator is a tiny

maze of nerve cells in the midbrain. If the day is hot, it re-routes blood from internal organs to skin capillaries, diluting the flow with fuids drawn from skin and muscle tissue and from the liver. Sweat glands on skin surfaces dilate and exude prespiration. Body temperature is reduced by the dilution of blood and exudation of sweat. When the sweat

evaporates your skin cools off. If the day is cold the thermost at concentrates the blood and diminishes the flow through skin capillaries. Sweating is minimal and the blood coarses through internal organs deep within the body. Result: you feel cold and have to put on a coat or an extra blanket to stay comfortable.
