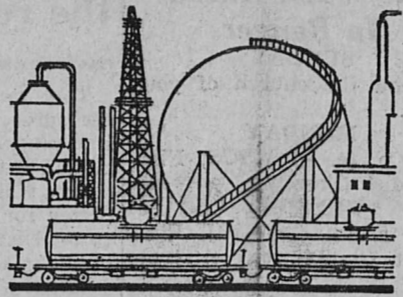

## Strawn Minister Dies In Ranger

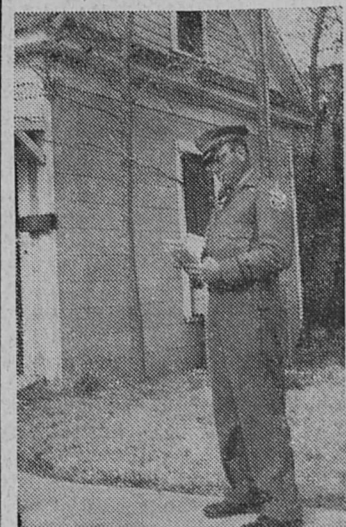
Rev. Charles H. Kueck, 37, pastor of First Baptist Church in Strawn, died at 6:45 a.m. Sunday in Ranger General Hospital following an illness of several weeks.

Funeral services were conducted in the church of which he was pastor at 3 p.m. Monday. Graveside services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the Yancey Cemetery with Hurley Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Born Nov. 15, 1929, he married Joy Jarrard Oct. 9, 1948. A graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and Southwestern Theological Seminary, he pastored churches in Robston, Abilene, Crane and Strawn.

He is survived by his wife; a daughter, Joy Elaine and two sons, Larry and Glynn, all of the home; his mother, Mrs. Nettie Kueck of Yancey.

## GEORGE FENGLER DIES IN RANGER HOSPITAL

George Fengler, 74, veteran Ranger grocerman, died Saturday morning in Ranger General Hospital following an illness of several weeks.

Funeral was conducted at 2 p.m. Monday in Killingsworth Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Emil Slovacsek, pastor of St. Rita's Catholic Church, officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Born June 18, 1892 in Detroit, Mich., he married Irene Leville on July 20, 1916 in Detroit. She preceded him in death July 23, 1964.

He came to Ranger in 1921 and had operated a grocery store here since that date, his being the oldest business in Ranger under one manager.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church.

Survivors include a son, Francis W. Fengler of Irving; four grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

The pallbearers were Carl Page, Henry Walton, Bill Bordeau, William Swaney, Lloyd Bruce, James Higginbotham, Charles Milliken and W. A. Robinson.

## RJC Basketball Season Ends At National Tournament

The Ranger Junior College basketball team completed one of the most successful basketball seasons in the history of the college last week; winning the conference and regional championships they advanced to the semi-finals of the National Junior College Basketball Tournament in Hutchinson, Kansas, before falling to San Jacinto in a close one by a score of 89-85. In the game for consolation honors the Rangers lost to Cameron 91-77 to end up in sixth place at the national tournament.

Rated fourth in the nation among junior colleges for most of the season and losing only two games during their regular play, they thrilled fans with their ball control, team play and showmanship.

Coach Butler will be losing five players through graduation, however, the nucleus of this year's team will remain intact, making next season look like the one that will carry the Rangers all the way to the National Championship.

Expected back next year are Robert Spivery, Solomon McMillon, Ulric Cobb, Stanley Thompson, Richard James, Jeff Haines, Fred Linden, Larry Wilson and Bob Tavernia.

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Hoffmann Jr. hosted a reception in the president's honor in their home from 6 to 7.

Approximately 225 Lions, their wives and guests gathered at the Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria at 7 for the 45th birthday celebration.

Bruce Gleason, dean of Ranger Junior College, led the audience in "America" and Eastland Club President Ed Ethridge led the Pledge to the flag. Joe Weaver of Cisco gave the invocation.

State Rep. Burke Musgrove presented President Lindsey, a Texas House Resolution which said in part:

"The House of Representatives of the State of Texas join the members of the Eastland County Lions Clubs in expressing their appreciation to Lion Lindsey for this visit to Texas, in congratulating him on his achievements, and offering its support and best wishes for his continued success."

The bill, signed by Speaker Ben Barnes, was passed in the House Tuesday through interruption of the "feed - lot licensing" bill debate, Musgrove reported.

Entertainment was by The Cruisers, a Cisco Junior College girls quartet, which included Miss Karon Sittler of Eastland.

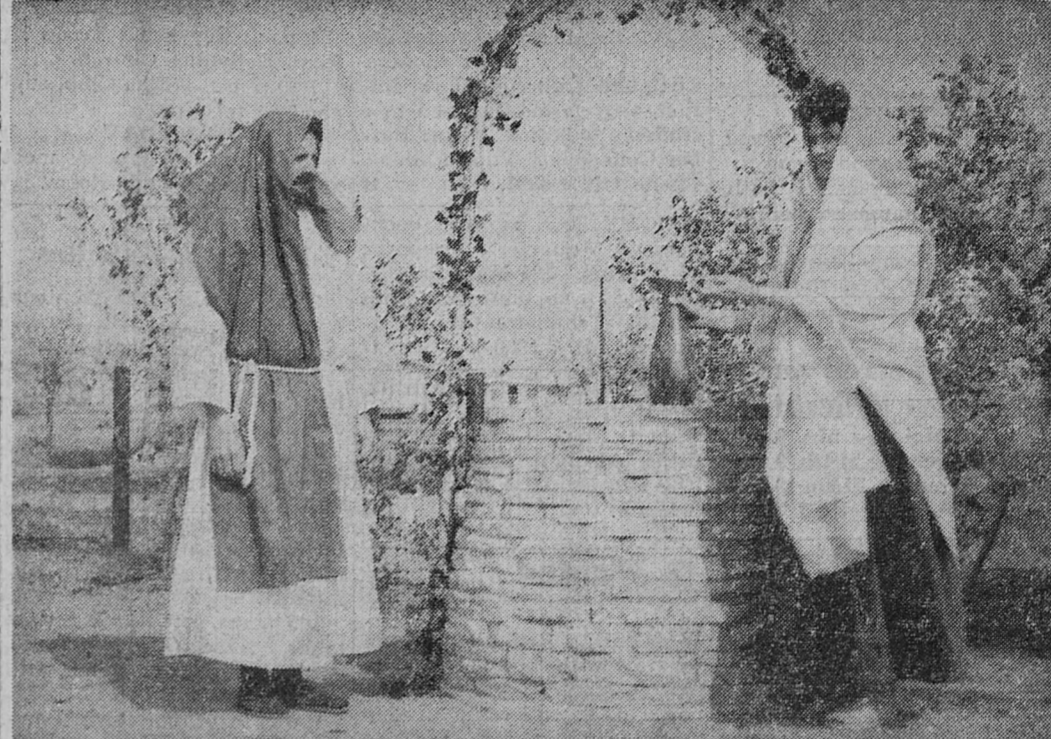

## Crowd Of 50,000 Due for Program

Arrangements are complete to handle an anticipated 50,000 people for the third annual Kendrick Easter Pageant at the family farm midway between Cisco and Eastland on Highway 80 on Sunday morning, March 26. The pageant will begin at 3:30 a.m. and end at sunrise.

This year's pageant, which will depict the Life of Christ from Birth to Resurrection, has 50 scenes - 10 more than last year - with a cast of some 135 people from cities throughout this area. The Kendrick Amphitheater has a complex of some eight stages, special lighting effects, sound system, a facsimile of the River Jordan, and other features to add realism to the production.

The Easter program is an annual presentation of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Kendrick and their family, which includes their three sons, Phil, Pierre and Bill, the wives of two sons, and three children. There is no admission charge.

The pageant was written by Phil Kendrick and he serves as the director, assisted by Mrs. W. S. Mitcham of Cisco. In addition, Phil and his mother will provide musical accompaniment on an organ and piano, respectively.

Ten new scenes have been added to this year's pageant to portray the birth of Moses and his life through the Ten Commandments. Several of the pageant scenes will have real livestock in them, including a camel borrowed from the Fort Worth Zoo, a flock of sheep, and donkeys.

Bill Kendrick plays the part of Jesus.

Narrators will be Pierre Kendrick and Mrs. Roy Westfall of Cisco.

Many out of state people have written that they plan to attend, the Kendrick family reported. The grounds will be open all day Saturday for the benefit of those who would like to park their cars. Those attending were urged to take blankets and, if they like, folding chairs. A concession stand will operate on the grounds.

Highway patrolmen advised that cars may park on each side of Highway 80, but not between double-lane sections of the pavement.

Improvements to the amphitheater have been made during the past year to provide for more realism in staging the scenes, adding to the parking area, and providing more space for spectators. Dressing rooms have been added.

The Kendrick family has lived at their farm since 1938. They are well known for a quartet singing throughout West Texas for many years. The pageant was developed, in the words of Mr. Kendrick, as an effort to teach people the necessity of having Christ in their lives.

The family occupation is selling eggs. They have a modern egg farm with some 30,000 laying hens. Eggs are marketed mostly in the Abilene area. Cast members are from Comanche, Hamilton, Abilene, Rising Star, Cisco, Breckenridge, Mineral Wells, Carbon, Eastland, and the Kendrick family.

Tuesday, Chief Brymer of Cisco, Chief Ray Laney of Eastland and Sheriff Lefty Sublett of Eastland County, assisted by officers and highway patrolmen, combed this region for Mr. Ezzell. Helicopters from Fort Wolters and

the Cisco Flying Service airplanes aided the search with an aerial survey.

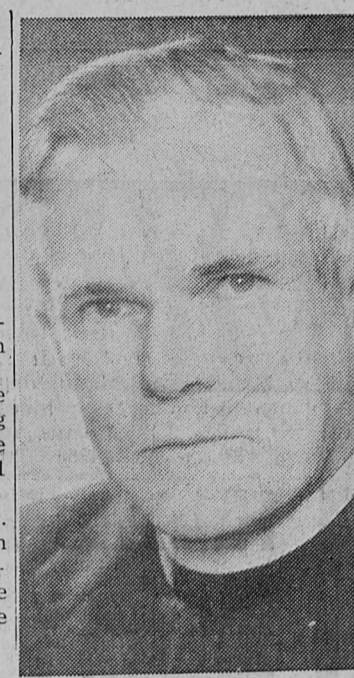
Mr. Ezzell apparently drove through Cisco and kept going as he did not recognize the scenery. He was in a 1951 green Chevrolet.

I read with interest the inscription on the Historical Plaque that will be placed on the First National Bank about the "Santa Claus" Bank Robbery. The last sentence reads as follows: "Later a mob lynched 'Santa' when he broke out of jail. This is a very BIG error. He had 'played insane for some time and never seemed to notice anything happening around him so 'Uncle Tom' Jones, who was jailor at the time, made the mistake of going upstairs one evening without his guns on, to give the prisoners their supper, so Ratliff (Santa) seeing he had no guns jumped him, severely beating him and took the keys to the jail but was caught downstairs before he could get out. 'Uncle Tom' was taken to the hospital but died the next day or perhaps the next day, but the night of the day he died a mob of 'hoodlums' took the law in their own hands, and went into the jail and took 'Santa' out and strung him up, near the jail. I was not at the scene but heard two people tell about being there. Ratliff never said one word. The young man, at that time, who did the most of the pulling of the rope that strung up 'Santa' was shot down in 'cold-blood', a few months later on the streets of Eastland. I won't call his name but you can check the records at Eastland County Courthouse and see that all this is very true. I was living there at the time and the time of the lynching was a day in November, 1929. So, for future generations that will read this plaque why not have nothing but the truth. Thank you. 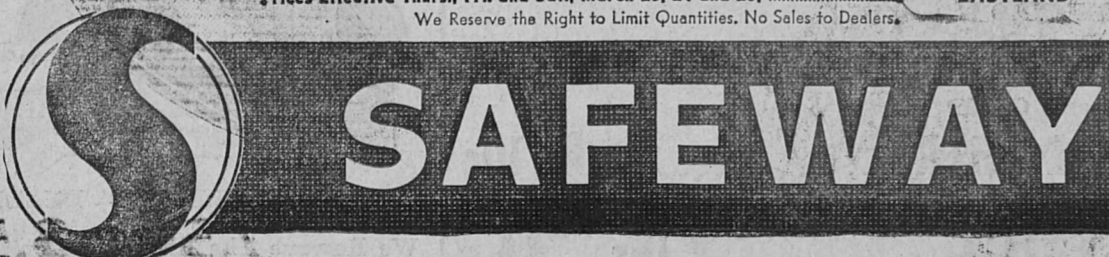

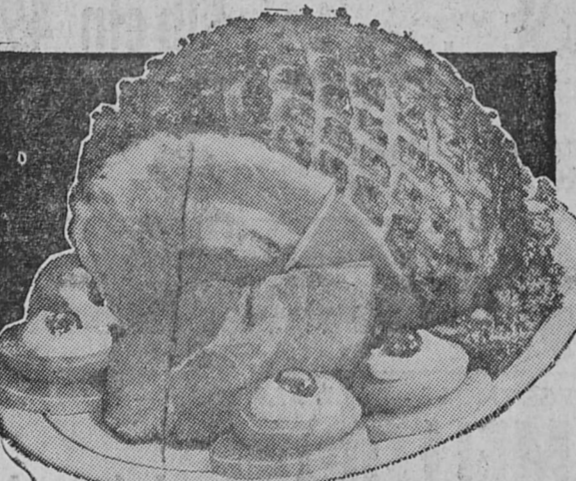

**CAPITOL COMMENT**

by State Rep. Burke Musgrove

Abilene sympathizers continue to pressure the Judicial District's Sub-Committee HOLDING their bill which would move the ELEVENTH COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS to Abilene, if passed. I will join with this subcommittee to fly to Eastland on March 30th for a firsthand look at the modern facilities that Eastland County taxpayers have provided since 1925.

Opposition to this greedy attempt by Abilene to gobble up this court has been classified a NUMBER ONE PRIORITY in our office since the bill was first introduced at the beginning of the session, and will continue to be so until this measure is defeated once and for all!

At the request of local community leaders in RISING STAR, I have introduced House Bill 1106, which will allow those living in the Rising Star School District to vote on whether or not they want to establish a Hospital District for the purpose of reactivating the hospital now in existence there.

A hearing will be conducted on March 29th by the House Urban Affairs Committee on a bill I have introduced to free BRECKENRIDGE from a 1941 court order which sets an excessive tax rate that is no longer needed, and if enacted, would free the city of a financially paralytic situation.

A long petition in opposition to legislation designed to prohibit bow and arrow hunting in Texas has been forwarded to me by residents of MINERAL WELLS.

LIQUOR-BY-TH E-DR I N K letters continue to pour into my office — some 1,128 to date on this subject alone — and the trend still exists for about 85 per cent to be in opposition to the measure. And, the effort to legalize sale by the drink seems to be running into trouble in the House... so the grapevine talk goes.

Following the hearings on my LSD and drug abuse control legislation, a barrage of journalistic attacks has been directed at me from extreme liberal publications.

The Texas Observer — a widely circulated weekly newspaper of political orientation — literally raked me over the coals this last week with their number one article entitled "Morality, Patriotism and Suff Like That." The Rag, an off-campus newspaper at the University of Tex-

as, compared me to a "quixotic moralist in virgin's underwear," and in a later issue called me a capitalist on a witch hunt.

Bearded, long-haired, placard-carrying demonstrators last Wednesday chanted from the gallery that I, among others, would be removed from office!

All this does provide some amusement to the rapid pace of a legislative day and, believe it or not, their action — I feel — only helps the legislative gain support.

I look forward to being back in the district Tuesday night, March 21st, for the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Banquet and also on Friday night in Baird for the Baird Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Harry Clark, Executive Director of the Texas Industrial Commission, will speak in Eastland, and Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon will speak at the Baird activity.

## Report On Russia Trip Given At Rotary Meet

A spontaneous "God Bless America" was spoken in chorus by 35 Texans as they recrossed the iron curtain to begin a return trip last summer after six weeks in Russia and other Communist countries, according to Mrs. James P. Morris of Ranger in a talk Monday night at the four-city Rotary Club dinner at Lone Cedar Country Club.

### Plaque Is Fixed To Bank's Front

The second annual dinner of the Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland and Ranger clubs attracted some 135 Rotarians, their wives and guests. Gary Beauchamp, Ranger Rotarian and minister, served as master of ceremonies.

President of the four clubs — E. P. Fambro of Breckenridge, Standlee McCracken of Cisco, Roland McFarland of Eastland, and Dr. Luther Gohlke of Ranger — were presented. Each club introduced its members and guests.

Roscoe Blankenship of Abilene, the district governor, was a guest and he spoke briefly to urge attendance at the district conference at the Inn of the Six Flags, Arlington, on April 20-21-22.

Mrs. Helen Murrell of Eastland introduced the speaker, who is a member of the faculty of Ranger Junior College, teaching history and literature. Mrs. Morris made the Russia tour last summer as a member of a TCU study group.

Slides of places of interest in the various countries were shown by Mrs. Morris to illustrate her talk. She found little that would compare favorably with the necessities and luxuries of the United States. Typical was a hotel that was new but "nothing worked," Mrs. Morris said, noting that the floors weren't level, the plumbing worked if you called a plumber and so forth.

Communist was described by the speaker as "total inefficiency." Commenting on Russia's claim of no unemployment, Mrs. Morris reported that they have two workers for each job — one to work and one to watch him. Much of the manual labor is done by women, she added.

Virtually all industry belongs to the Communist states, Mrs. Morris found. With an absence of personal initiative mass confusion is the obvious result, she noted. Drunks on the streets of Russia were numerous.

Mrs. Morris learned that of Russia's 230 million people, only 11 million are communists. She enjoyed visits to museums, to the theater, found a real modern subway transport a t.i.o.n system, and much construction of apartment buildings everywhere.

The average Russian feels that America's contribution to the Allied victory in World War II was negligible, Mrs. Morris found. The Russians had 20 million people killed in the war.

"Our final impression was

certainly one of appreciation for the American way of life," Mrs. Morris said. Arrangements for the dinner were handled by the inter-club steering committee composed of Eris RRitchie of Cisco, John Foster of Ranger, Grover Hallmark of Eastland and Edgar Cain of Breckenridge. Rotarians and wives were present from the four clubs as follows: Cisco 39, Breckenridge 17, Eastland 33, and Ranger 22.

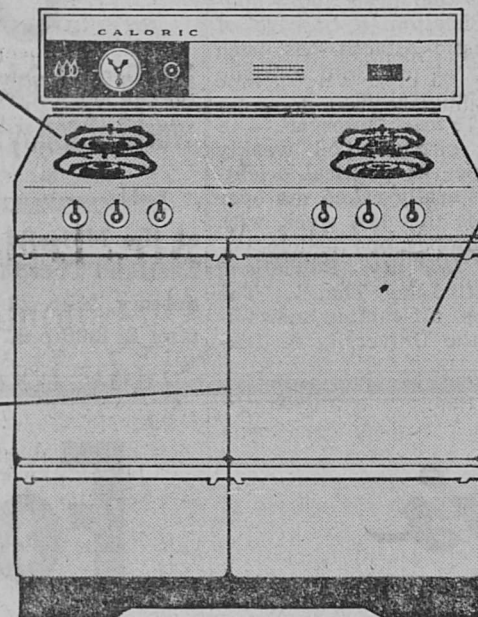

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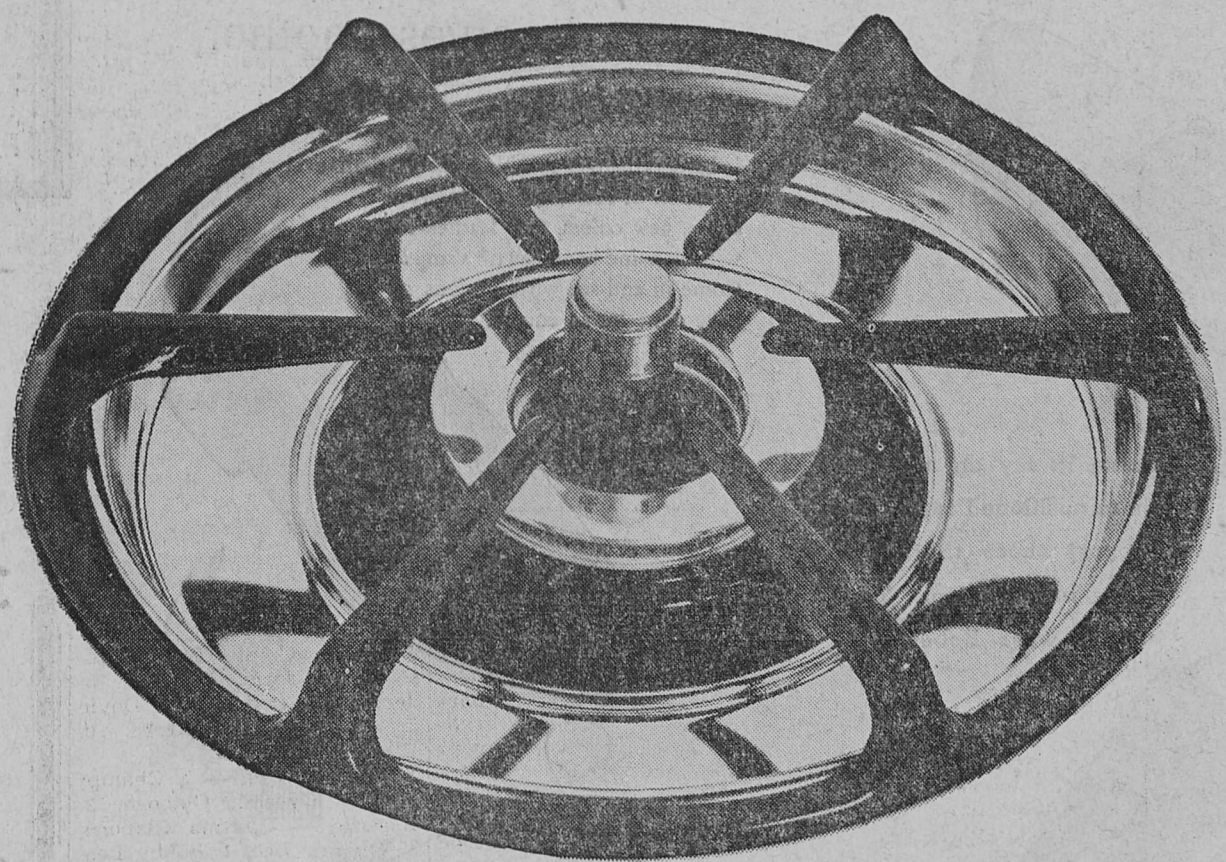

## THE GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon

Eastland County Extension Agent

Now that the fruit trees are in bloom several people have called wanting to know when to spray the trees. If you have only a few peach or plum trees, there is a simplified spray schedule suggested. Use methoxychlor or malathion insecticide. The trees should be sprayed according to the following schedule: (1) When 75 percent of the blossom petals have fallen. (2) Ten days after the first spraying. (3) Ten to fourteen days after the second spraying. (4) Fourteen to twenty-one days after the third spraying.

If infestations of fruit-damaging insects occur following the completion of the above schedule, Sevin can be used effectively up to within one day of harvest.

Those who have commercial orchards will use a slightly different spray program. The Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases

on Fruits and Nuts will be very helpful to fruit growers.  
Have you ever thought of feeding cattle popcorn? It sounds ridiculous, but this idea may not be too farfetched. The latest method of preparing grains to increase feedlot cattle gains involves popping sorghum grain.  
Not enough research has been conducted to form any conclusions, but this method may improve cattle gains.  
A new leaflet, L-697, "Rotations for Growing and Finishing Cattle" has been released by the Agricultural Extension Service. It lists information on starting cattle on feed and recommendations for using protein supplements, roughage, additives and minerals in rations. Copies of the leaflet are available at the County Agent's office for persons wishing more detailed information.

fly to the West Coast Thursday en-route for an extended tour of Australia and New Zealand.

The 135 years of Lionism in Eastland County represents some \$6 million contributed, even at the minimum wage, the President said, and he congratulated the clubs for their achievements in time and in service.

Extended to the some 800,000 Lions around the world the contribution of time and self amounts to some \$84 million, he said, but in this day, more is needed, when the need is so great.

"All we do fades into insignificance compared to the challenges we face to day," he said. Citing the expenditures in Viet Nam, the starvation and need around the world calls for more. Even with the average increase of 1,000 new Lions Clubs a year, the challenges remain great, he said.

"Size is not enough," he said, "pointing out the many changes since these clubs were organized in 1922." Lionism is celebrating its 50th, Golden Anniversary this year.

The President humorously described a "typical day" in one of his recent tours, which took him 415 miles, six speeches, many dedications and ceremonies through Africa, from 5:30 a. m. to 1 a. m.

Reporting on India, he called it the most interesting, and with its 477 million people, the country most in need. "Thank God, Lionism is in India," he said. And through the help of the CARE organization, Lions are doing good work there, he said.

In spite of his high station in the Lion Hierarchy, his appearances, his address and his warmth were all marked by humbleness. He and his wife were presented a silver dish and a hand-nacel gavel, made from the root of a mesquite stump by Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Merket of Cisco.

The president is an executive with a firm which manufactures institutional furniture, mainly church pews, distributed throughout the South-eastern part of the nation.

## RISD Enrollment Shows Increase

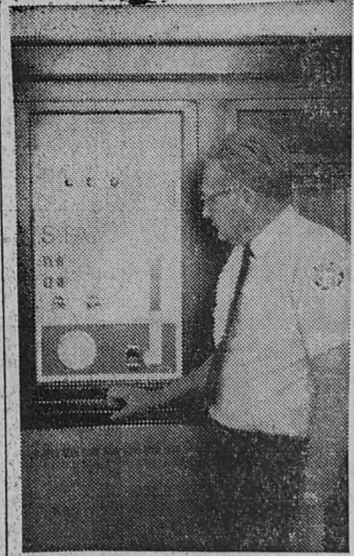
The average daily attendance in the Ranger Public Schools since Sept. 1 has averaged 564.43 whites and 14.3 Negro.

## Vending Machine Now Installed In Post Office

Ranger continues to update its public service. The local post office announced the installation of a stamp vending machine, located beside the letter drops in the front lobby. Operation of the machine began Tuesday, March 21.

In explaining the convenience of operation, Postmaster Ross Hodges made the following statements:

"There are no levers to pull or buttons to push. Simply insert a coin and receive stamps. The machine takes nickels, dimes and quarters. A nickel buys a five-cent stamp; a quarter buys five five-cent stamps and a dime buys two four-cent stamps and gives two cents change. This is for use on air-mail letters. A red light shows when a stamp or coin slot becomes empty."

Hodges pointed out the fact that since the Post Office lobby is open 24 hours daily, the machine will be particularly convenient during after-office hours and during weekends.

Garrett Hise will be in charge of machine operation and render assistance to customers having difficulty during office hours.

One thing — no longer will Rangerites have the well-worn alibi, "I couldn't buy a stamp."
