CITY COMMISSIONERS MEET: Accept Grant Applications, Declare June Clean Up Month

The Ranger City Commission met on Tuesday, May 28th for a regular bi-monthly meeting. All commissioners were present, and after reading the minutes they were approved.

The first order of business was a presentation by Patti Cozart of applications from the Department of Commerce. The applications are used for grant monies through the Commerce Department to help fund existing businesses so they can expand and hire more people. The plans will be looked into and studied carefully by the commissioners.

Darrell Fox presented a list of materials needed to equip a second ambulance in Ranger. The total price was \$1,856.40. The commission voted to fund these materials for the ambulance.

The matter of police vehicles was on the agenda. The commissioners voted to send four people to Austin to purchase 3 vehicles from the state surplus. After this purchase, the four-wheel drive vehicles will be sold. One of the new vehicles will be used by the Fire Marshall.

A First Reading of an ordinance for demolition was conducted and passed. The second reading will take place on June 10. The ordinance reads as follows: An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Ranger, Texas adopting the standard unsafe building abatement code 1985 edition, as published by the Southern Building Code Con-

gress International, Incorporated; Amending Section 105.1 of the Standard Unsafe Building Abatement Code to specify the composition and apportionment of members of the board of adjustments and appeals; providing a penalty for violation not to exceed \$200 and making each day a violation is permitted to continue a separate violation; providing a severability clause; providing findings of facts; providing an open meetings clause; providing for reading and publication by descriptive caption only; providing a savings clause and providing an effective date.

The commission moved to purchase 5 two-way radios at a cost of \$2,891.00.

The B.F.I. contract was tabled until the next meeting.

The Dumpster/Convenience Station was tabled until next meeting.

The commission voted to declare June as Clean Up Month. Free dumping at the landfill will be provided all month. In order to dump free, you must pay your water bill and bring your drivers license with you. If you are unable to haul to the dump or cannot afford to hire it done, contact City Hall.

The street lights will be back on in Ranger. The commission voted to turn them on from Marston to Commerce downtown. Commissioner Britt will be replacing the old bulbs with sodium lights.

The meeting was adjourned.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MEET:

Election May Be Called On Countywide Emergency Service

Eastland County Commissioners Tuesday discussed the possibility of calling an election Aug. 10 on a proposition to establish a countywide taxing district for ambulance services.

The county is currently subsidizing Emergency Medical Services at around \$1000,000 for the four Precincts. The Commissioners Court has given notice of discontinuing this Oct. 1.

District Attorney Leslie Vance told the Court that he would have a Petition calling for the Election ready for Judge Scott Bailey "Wednesday of this week."

The petition is expected to go to Cisco to obtain the 150 signatures necessary to call a referendum, and then a fee of \$200 will be paid. After these requirements are met the judge can call for an election, according to information at the court.

Shelley Henderson and Eric Pederson, Ambulance personnel from Cisco, told the court about their concerns about the needs of the community, whether the Ambulance Services would continue to be funded - and whether they would continue to have jobs.

Several Commissioners

agreed that - with the hospital in Cisco closed - Ambulance Service is needed there twice as much as it ever was.

The Commissioners advised the ambulance personnel to "talk it up" if an election was called.

Commissioner Richard Robinson said if the County increased taxes enough to continue funding the Ambulance Service it would be subject to a rollback, "and in the mood everyone is in, it would probably pass."

On another matter, Commissioner Pittman of Pct. 4 mentioned a bill for over \$200 someone had presented him. He said this individual had hit rocks in a county road in the Scranton area, and they had knocked holes in the gas tank of his car.

Attorney Vance said: "I would advise you not to pay it."

He went on to say that as a matter of policy the county could not pay for such damages.

The commissioners appeared to agree. Richard Robinson said: "When you take off down an unpaved road, you are taking a certain hazard on yourself."

In other business, Judge Bailey reported on plans to widen 2 1/2 miles of FM

570 S.E. of Eastland toward Lake Leon. The State Highway Department plans to spend about \$900,000 on this road work, but first the county must pay for right-of-way easements and moving utility poles. The cost to the county is expected to be around \$200,000.

Another item dealt with the addressing of rural homes. The commissioners hired John Davis of Jedco Inc. to catalog rural addresses for the 911 Emergency Service. The cost will be \$13,660, and this will be paid from county road and bridge funds.

The date of June 22 was set for an auction of surplus items. This sale will be at the Precinct 4 barn in Cisco, and details will be advertised prior to the auction.

The commissioners approved a Declaration to make the county a drug-free work place. Some details of this declaration were discussed.

Several commissioners gave reports on county affairs they were overseeing. The court thanked Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth for his work on the courthouse

grounds, and also for roof repair.

Ainsworth said he had one bid on a sprinkler system for the lawn. He also said that the roof over the County Courtroom was scheduled for repair, and he thought he could make it last a couple of more years.

Reggie Pittman reported that jail inspection by the State was expected to come anytime, and Sheriff Ronnie White said the jail was ready. Currently there were 23 prisoners in the jail, Pittman said. Ten of them belonged to TDC, and 13 to the county.

Richard Robinson reported that commodities distributed this month included corn meal, canned green beans, canned pork, and butter. He told of some of the difficulties of transporting frozen butter in the summertime.

This concluded the morning session. The commissioners met again in the afternoon and considered several items.

They voted to join the association of counties in a registration that covers storm water runoff at maintenance shops. The fee will be \$500.

Tickets for donations will be printed early also, so they may be sold.

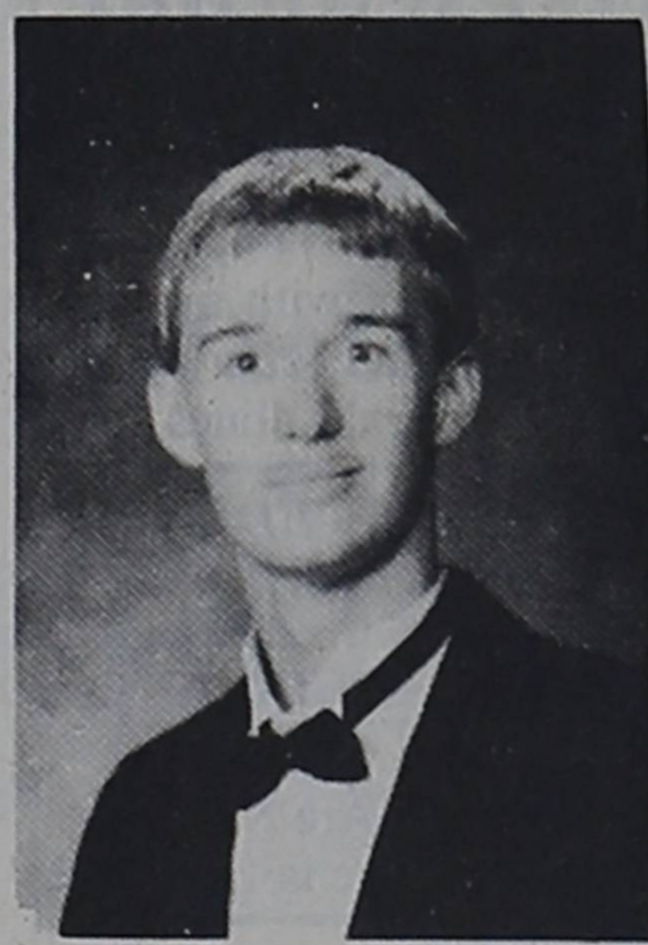

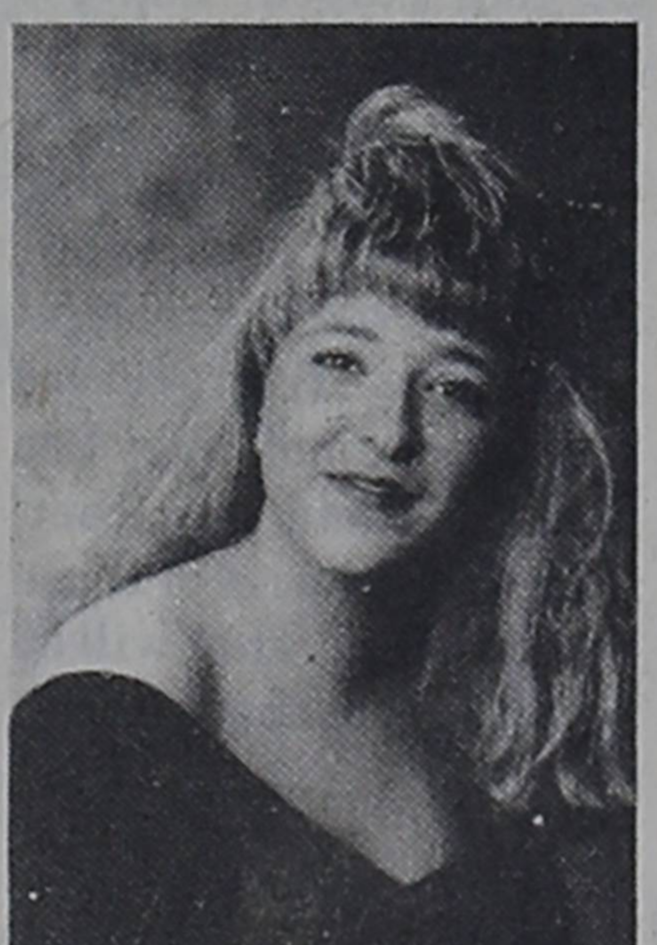
The meeting was adjourned.

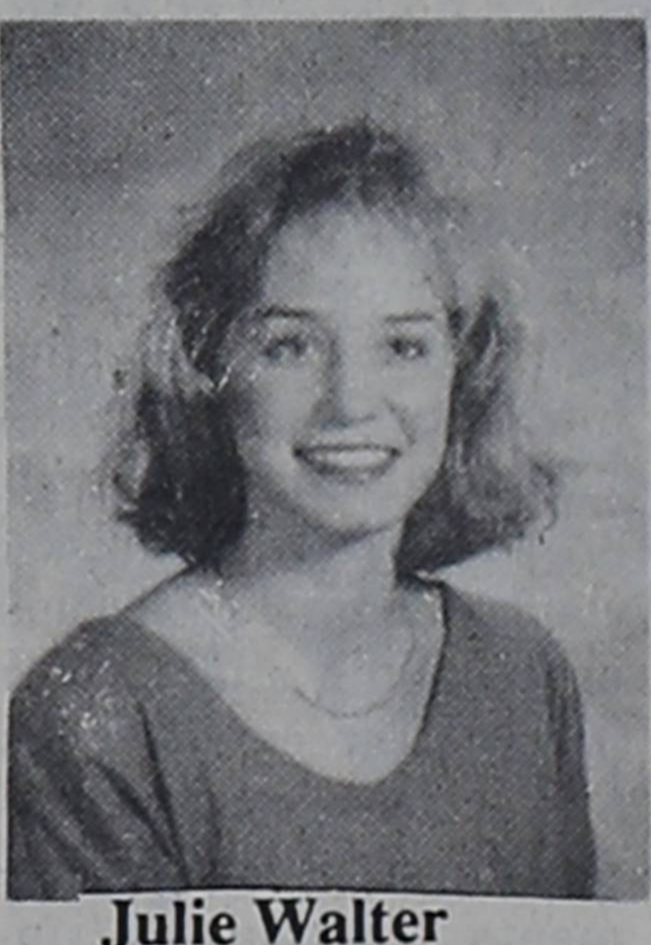

One Retires, One Returns To RJC Board Of Regents



Two people whose dedicated years to Ranger Junior College, if combined, would almost equal the number of years the college has been in existence, were once again seated at the board room table this week to help conduct the business of the college, but this time, one was retiring from the board and the other was returning.

Mr. Lee Russell, a member of the RJC Board of Regents for almost

twenty-eight years, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of V.V. Cooper at the meeting on June 13, 1963. Mr. Russell, during the almost twenty-eight years since that date, has been a continuous contributor to the development of the college.

Iris Hummel, returning to the board after a year's absence, was first appointed to the board in December 1969 to serve out the unexpired term of J.A. Bates who moved to Breckenridge. Mrs. Hummel served continuously from that time until 1990 when she chose not to seek re-election. This week, Iris was appointed to fill the remaining term of Tommy Brashier who resigned in April.

Both Lee and Iris have helped guide the college through much of the growth that has been necessary to help keep RJC competitive in the modern world of higher education. They helped plan the growth of the physical plant from a collection of brick-up army barracks to the present facilities which includes ten buildings constructed during their tenure.

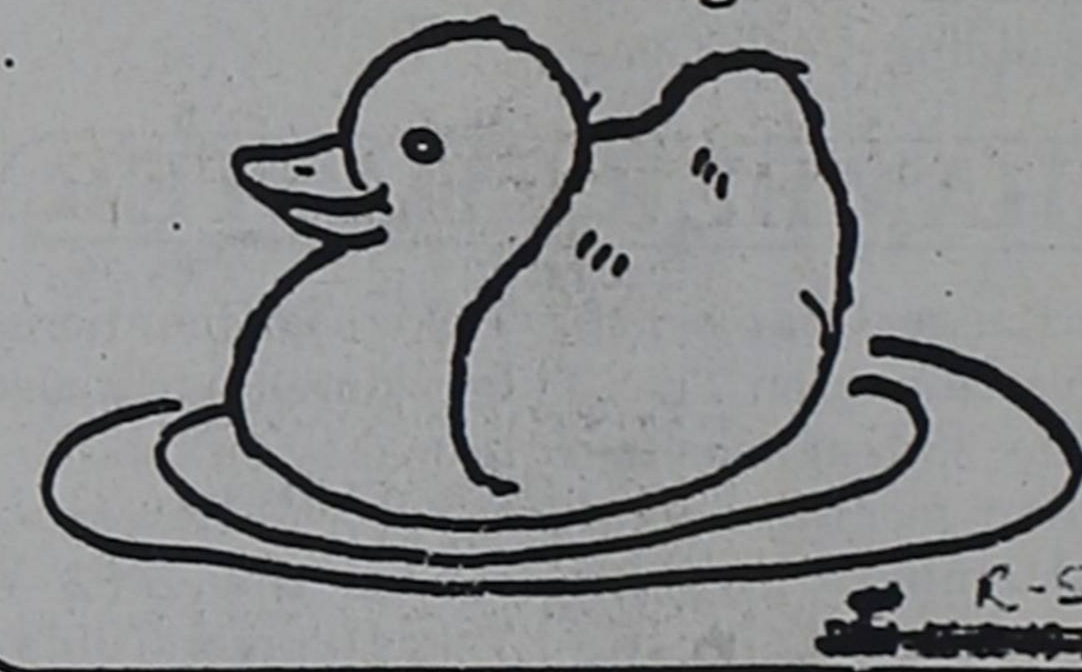

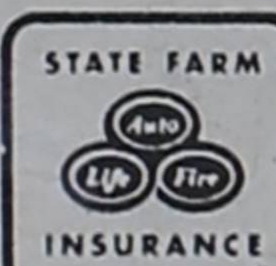

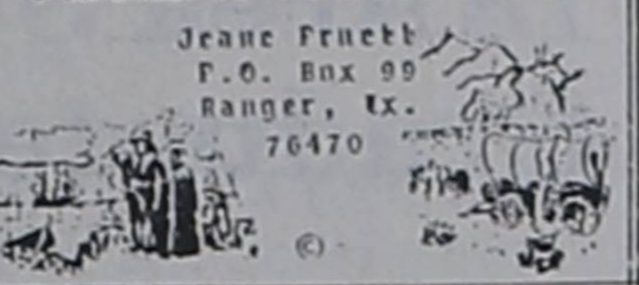
First Baptist Vacation Bible School has been postponed from this week to June 24-28 because of so many conflicts and Bro. Joe's health condition.

EIGHT EASTLAND COUNTY 4-HERS ADVANCE TO STATE 4-H ROUNDUP, TEXAS

A&M UNIVERSITY
More than half a million dollars in scholarships will be awarded to outstanding young people at the 1991 Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University June 4-5.

The biggest 4-H event of the year, Roundup brings together more than 2,500 young people who learn by demonstrating skills and leadership in competitions.

Gayle W. Laine, 4-H Youth Development Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that \$592,000 in scholarships sponsored by the Texas 4-H Foundation will be awarded during Roundup.

Texas has the nation's largest 4-H scholarship program, an effort that continues to grow with tremendous support from the private donations.

"We have over 200 applicants this year and 91 scholarships to award," said Dr. Lance Bullard, Extension 4-H Youth Development Specialist and Executive Director of the Texas 4-H Foundation. "Selection is a difficult process that takes a seven-person committee five days to complete."

The young people are judged on their 4-H experiences, leadership skills, projects, community service, personal needs and other qualifications pertaining to high school academic performance and college entrance exam scores, Bullard said. Scholarships are granted in agriculture, life sciences and unrestricted categories.

Another part of Roundup is the 4-H Food Show. Contestants enter their favorite recipes in

one of four categories — nutritious snacks and desserts, fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals and main dish. Judged on their knowledge of nutrition, each first place winner receives a \$750 scholarship from the Morrison Milling Company. Cathy Thomas, Eastland Sr., will be competing in the Fruit and Vegetable Division. Congratulations Cathy!

In 40 other contests ranging from entomology to safety and accident prevention, young people will be judged on method demonstrations and illustrated talks.

Other Eastland County contestants are: Range Evaluation - Ricky Agnew, Tommy Thompson and Jackie Powledge; Livestock Judging - R.W. Daskevich, Jeremy Keith, Brian Bailey, Kerstin Gerhardt.

Adults attending will include Daryl Eckert, Noble Laminack, Shelly Bailey, Louanne Gerhardt and Extension Agents - Janet Thomas and David Tunmire.

"Four-H Roundup is a time for recognition of outstanding young people as well as adult leaders, alumni and sponsors," Laine said. "It's an excellent educational and learning opportunity for thousands of youth in our state."

Farms And Gardens

CONTROL GRASSHOPPERS EARLY

Lately I have received a lot of telephone calls about grasshoppers and what they did last year to a garden or fruit trees. Now is the best time to take action to control grasshoppers.

Each year heavy grasshopper infestations develop in parts of the area. Often heaviest infestations develop in fence rows and on rangeland. Weather conditions play a major role in determining the development of large grasshopper populations and the level of damage they cause. Dry weather after hatching limits the development of plants on which grasshoppers feed, concentrating grasshoppers on the available forage.

Most grasshoppers have only one generation each year. Winter is passed in the egg stage. Egg pods contain from four to 40 eggs, and an individual female may commonly produce from 100 to 200 eggs. However, as many as 500 eggs may be produced.

After hatching, grasshopper nymphs develop through a series of five or six molts. The rate of development is governed by temperature and food quality. Most species attain the adult stage in 30 to 50 days. Heavy rainfall kills first-instar grasshopper nymphs.

Widespread heavy grasshopper infestations are usually preceded by several years of gradual

population buildup associated with mild spring weather and low incidence of diseases, parasites, and predators. These conditions, along with late summer rains that provide food for egg-laying females, are most likely to result in the development of damaging populations.

For grasshopper control to be most effective, control programs should be conducted in late May or early June before grasshoppers have developed wings. After grasshoppers develop wings, control becomes much more difficult. Insecticidal applications should be directed at areas where there are large numbers of grasshopper nymphs, 24 or more per square yard.

To reduce damage to crops, a buffer zone might be treated around the field. An insecticide might be applied to weeds and grasses on the border of the field. The larger the buffer zone, the more effective it will be. Insecticides should be applied to the foliage of plants; treating bare ground will not provide effective control.

Suggested insecticides to treat a buffer zone for homeowners are Sevin, malathion, and diazinon. Check the label of the product you are using closely for any restrictions if there is a chance of drift onto a vegetable garden, fruit trees or pasture area where livestock will graze. Also look for restrictions if children or pets have access to buffer zone. Always read and follow label instructions.

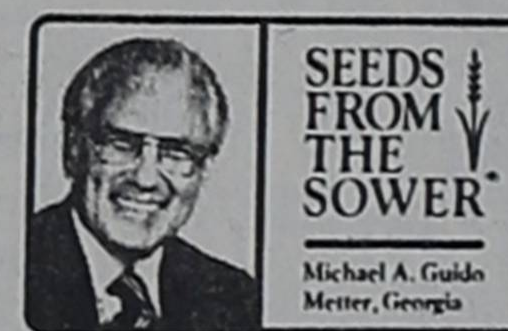

RRC Assesses Pollution And Well Plugging Penalties

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$15,000 in administrative penalties this week to five oil and gas operators for violations under Commission well plugging and pollution rules.

Thompson Bros. Oil Co. of Lueders was ordered to pay \$4,000 for one inactive and unplugged well leaking small amounts of gas, saltwater and drilling mud on the James Baxter lease in Jones County; Merimac Investments, Inc. of Fort Worth was penalized \$2,000 for one inactive and unplugged well on the Mandeville lease in Eastland County; and, ADCO Oil & Gas Inc. of Coleman was assessed \$2,000 for one well on the Stockton lease in Taylor County.

In addition, two operators agreed to pay penalties without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Kinney, Inc. of Andrews was ordered to pay \$4,000 for dumping 2 barrels of waste oil onto Allbright Rd. in Andrews

County; and, Cardinal Well Service, Inc. of Conroe was penalized \$3,000 for discharging saltwater and oil into unpermitted pits located near Conroe Yard in Montgomery County.

To date in 1991, the Commission has levied over \$201,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed more than \$836,000 in such penalties.

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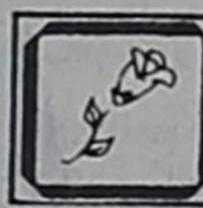

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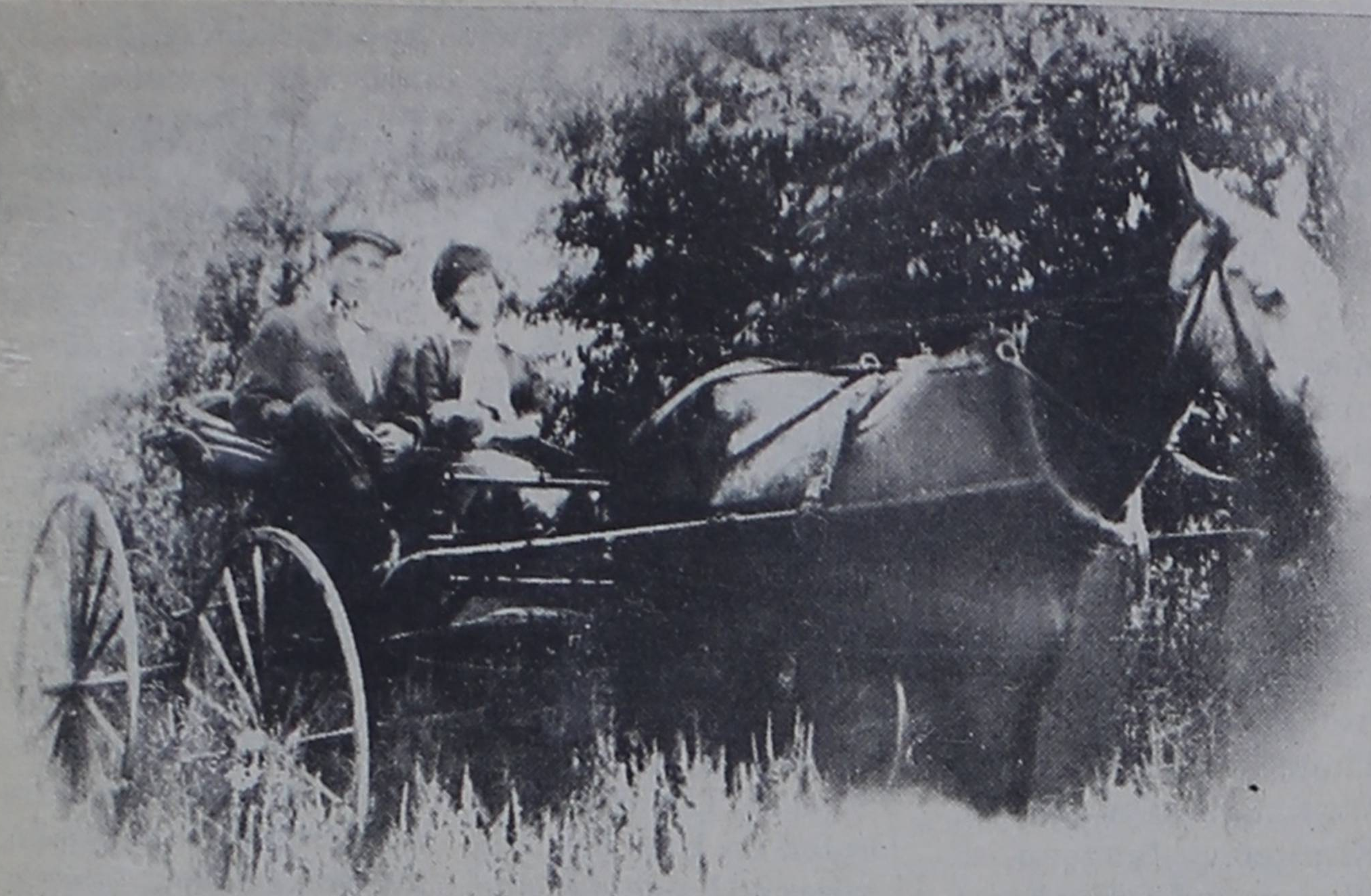

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Open Records: Playground For Gossips?

Is your name buried in a county file somewhere in Texas - just waiting to be dug up? Or a city file? Or the file of some state agency? Is there something there you wouldn't want everybody to know?

Few Texans realize that private, sometimes highly personal information about them in city, county, or state files may be available to anyone who asks for it - just for the asking! That unsettling situation results from the operation of the Texas Open Records Act and the way it has been interpreted by an "Opinion Committee" in the Office of the Texas Attorney General.

There are two villains in this story: The Texas Open Records Act and the Opinion Committee. On second thought, maybe only one. It is the interpretation of the law that has done most of the damage.

An Attorney General does not have time to personally research the

meaning of each statute about which he is asked to write an opinion. Every Attorney General delegates that task to subordinates. Starting with the administration of Attorney General John Hill, it has been assigned to a permanent group of Assistant Attorneys General called "the Opinion Committee." Though the Attorney General usually (but not always) reviews their work, he tends to rely on them and sign the opinions they prepare.

The Open Records Act became law in 1973 as part of the reaction to the Sharpstown scandal. It declares that all information collected, assembled, or maintained by or for governmental bodies in Texas is "public information" and available to the public with only certain exceptions. The legislature has directed that it be liberally construed "in favor of the granting of any request for information."

That phrase has caused trouble because the At-

torney General's Opinion Committee has used it to unbalance the equation between the "right to know" and the "right to privacy."

The purpose of the Open Records Act is laudable: to make available to people full and complete information about the affairs of their government. But many ordinary people find their privacy endangered because of its provisions - as interpreted. Private information is found in many governmental files. The files may contain credit information, reports of blood tests, or perhaps entire investigations that include witness statements and the identity of informants. Some will disclose inspection reports, discrimination or harassment claims, jail records, job evaluations, and host of other things.

A determined gossip might find enough news to keep tongues wagging for months.

There are, thank goodness, exceptions to what is available to prying eyes, but the exceptions are not always given effect. The Open Records Act does not apply for the judiciary (but judicial records are often available from the county or district clerk). Among others, there is an exception for "unwarranted invasions of personal privacy" in personnel files. But your idea of what constitutes an "unwarranted" invasion of personal privacy may differ greatly from the ideas of those on the Opinion Committee who decide whether the information must be released.

For example, in Open

Records Decision No. 579 (1990) the Attorney General ruled, on the advice of the Opinion Committee, that the details of an investigation regarding claims of sexual harassment on the job had to be released, including the statements of a large number of employees interviewed - who almost certainly didn't know that what they said would later be given the press for their neighbors to read. Neither they nor the people directly involved were given an opportunity to object to the release of the file or any part of it. It was in the hands of the public before they knew it.

The snoops don't win all the battles. If proper legal objections are made in time, it is often possible to defeat those trying to get information that is covered by one of the exceptions, but you must act fast. A governmental body that receives a request for information has only ten days to ask the Attorney General to decide its availability. If it doesn't ask, the information is "presumed public."

There is a famous road paved with good intentions. The intent of those who enacted the Texas Open Records Act was entirely benign, but unintended consequences make it a burden for those it was intended to benefit. It is a little-known law that can have an enormously adverse effect on the lives of ordinary, unsuspecting people.

Tiny balloons pushed by catheters have been effective in clearing blocked fallopian tubes to combat infertility, doctors at Mount Sinai Hospital Medical Center in Chicago found.

Sleep apnea is a risk factor in heart attacks, Australian research found. Apnea is treatable; even weight loss may effect a cure.

Special cochlear implants are permitting deaf children to hear and learn to speak after training. The Food and Drug Administration has approved their use on children over two.

New imaging test uses carbon dioxide instead of contrast dyes to check out the condition of the arteries. It's safer, especially for diabetics at high risk for complications from the standard dye, say surgeons at the University of Southern California.

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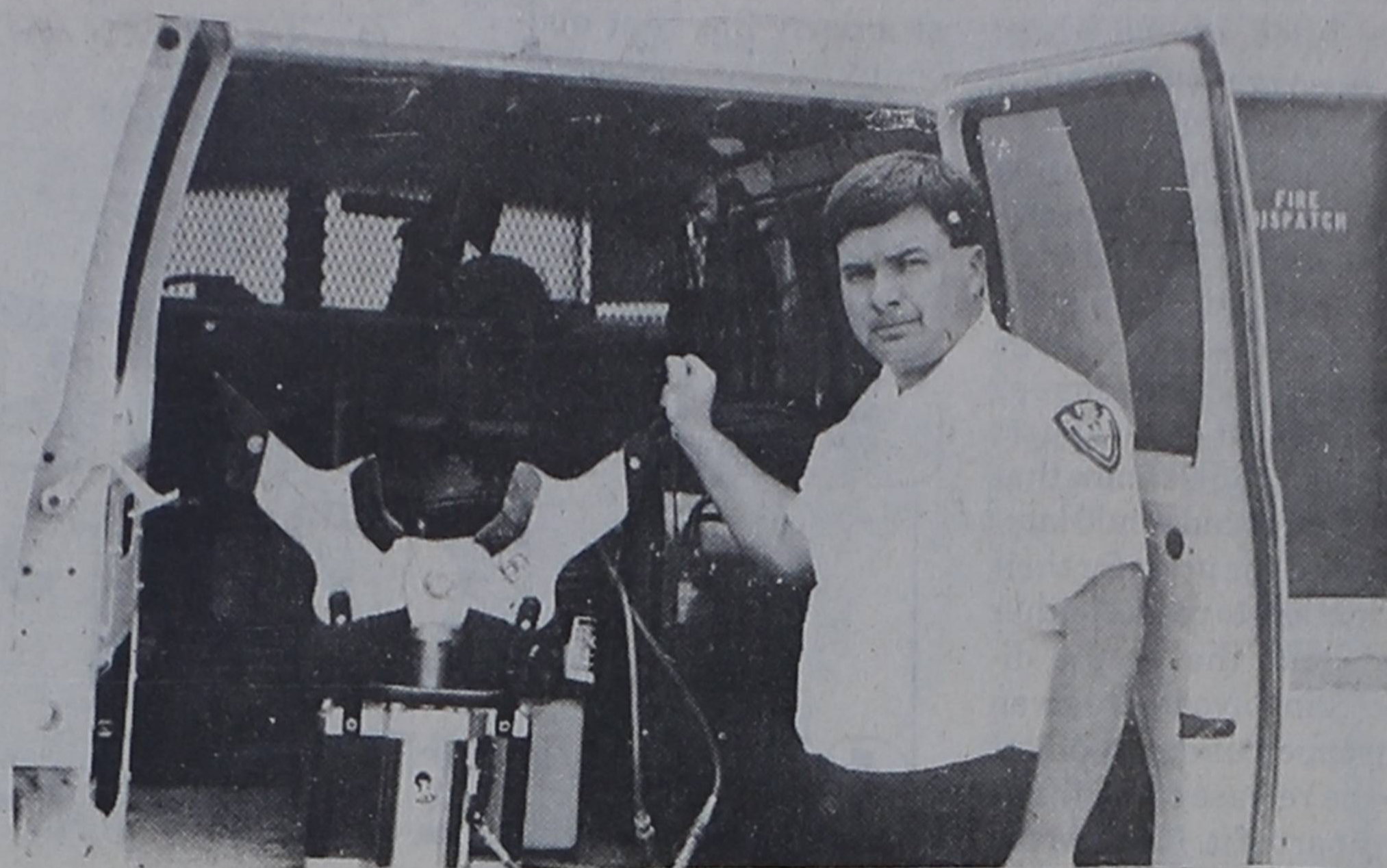
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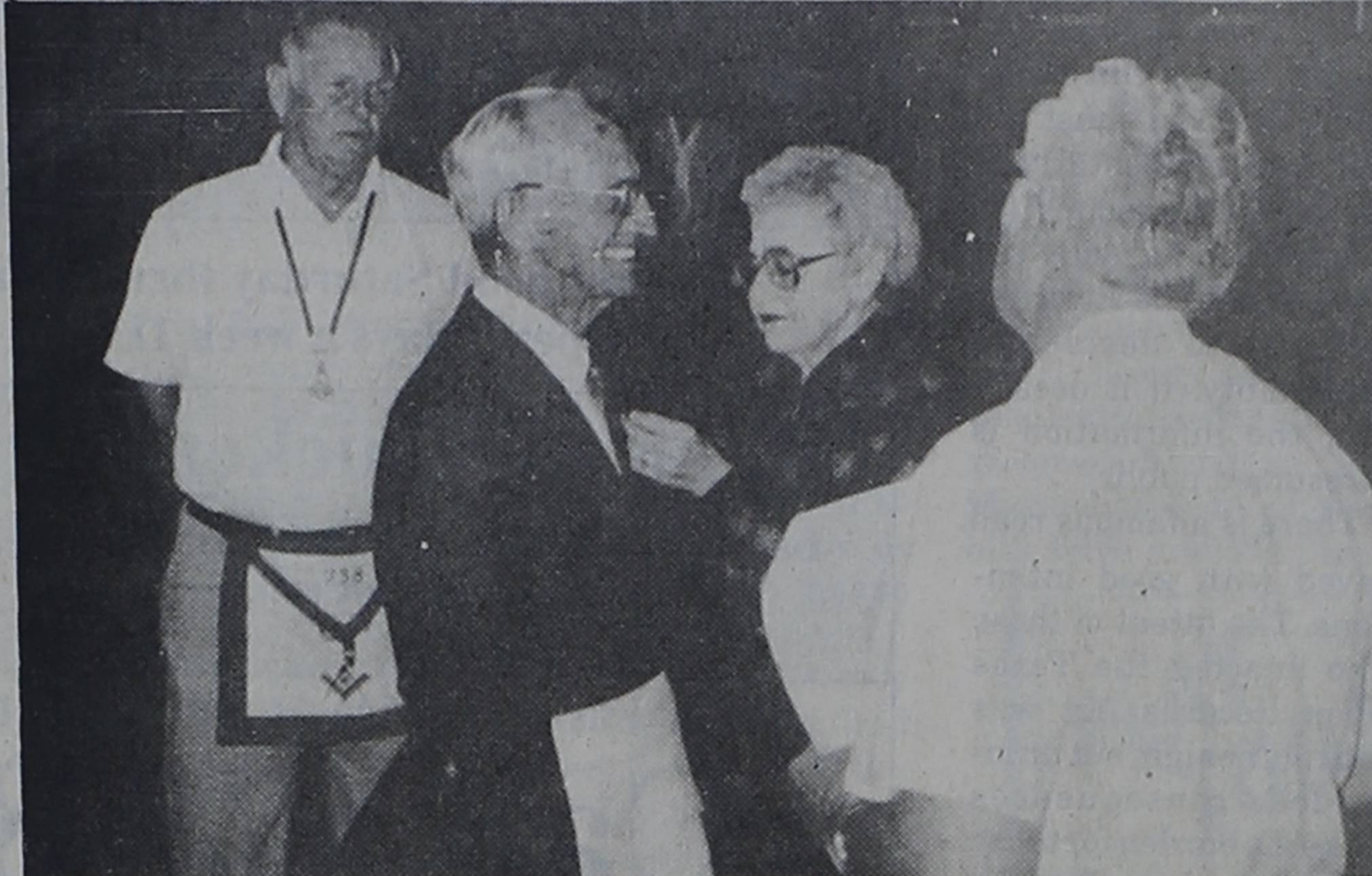
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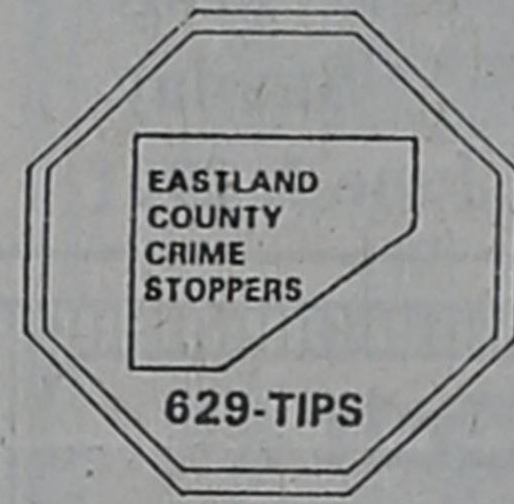
