COUNTY COMMISSIONERS APPROVE AMBULANCE CONTRACT

The Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved a subsidy plan for Pct. 1 which is expected to keep the ambulance service at Eastland Memorial Hospital in operation.

Monday's agreement for the Precinct, which includes the City of Eastland, was approved by a 2-1 vote. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1 and Reggie Pittman of Pct. 4 voted "Yes" on the proposal, and Calvin Ainsworth, Comm. of Pct. 2, voted "No." L. T. Owen, Comm. of Pct 3, was absent, recovering from recent heart by-pass surgery.

The court had previously given notice that all subsidies to Precincts for Emergency Medical Services would be terminated Sept. 30, due to the cost to the County. (Up to \$30,000 annually for each Precinct).

Hospital Administrator Marcia Carr replied by letter to the county and city, stating that the hospital could not offer ambulance service after the contract ended because the hospital did not own the ambulance.

Under the new agreement the City of Eastland and the County will each pay \$15,000 annually to help provide ambulance service.

We are not trying to make money - we're just looking for a break-even situation," said Attorney Bill Hoffmann, Chairman of the Hospital Board.

He explained that under the new plan the Hospital would agree to set up a fund to help provide future replacéments for the two ambulances, which are owned by the

city and county. Hoffmann did go on to say that if the hospital started going in the red under the new plan the county and city would be expected to give additional subsidies.

The decision by a majority of the Commissioners to support the new subsidy agreement for Precinct 1 was made after considerable discussion. County Judge Scott Bailey brought up this agenda item by first reporting on the effort to set up a new County-wide Emergency Medical Serv-

ices Taxing District. Judge Bailey said there were only about 85 names on the petitions, when 200 were needed.

Indications were that the project had not received the popular support needed to call for an election on County-wide funding for the service.

Commissioner Reggie Pittman suggested that a privately-owned ambulance service be allowed to operate in the county. He said he didn't believe the County should be in the ambulance business.

Richard Robinson said he had looked into the possibility of an independent ambulance service and it "wouldn't work." He told Pittman: "All these folks (ambulance owners) that have been calling me, I'll give you their telephone num-

Every one of them wanted a county subsidy, he added.

Marcia Carr gave the court information about the Ambulance Service out of Eastland Memorial Hospital. She said that contrary to recent publicity in some news media the ambulances offer excellent transportation,

including long-distance. "We have Basic Life Support Ambulances with the "Life Pack," she

If an IV or other special care is needed a nurse is sent with the ambulance, she explained.

As the matter of subsidies came to a vote Hospital Board members reminded the Commissioners that there was not


The City of Ranger and the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor a Clean-Up Ranger Day, Saturday, July 27.

JOHN MAY - HEADS A GROWING BANK, A NEW ERA



Citizens State Bank President John May reports that agriculture is a big plus for the Gorman bank.

John W. May, President of the Citizens State Bank in Gorman, has a smile that seems to come naturally. But the young Banker has extra things to smile about these days, and he wraps a lot of them up in the world "peanuts."

John May began work at the Gorman bank in 1987, and became President Jan. 1, 1991. He also serves on the Board of Directors, Chairman of this Board is A. G. Cum-

"The Holding Company for the bank is now based in Gorman," May says. But he goes on to explain that considerable shares of the bank stock are owned in Lometa, where a sister-bank of Citizens State is located. The group also has a branch bank in Lampassas.

Obviously these banks are all located where agriculture is important to the communities. It's important to May, too who comes from people who depended on farming and ranching for a living. He is a seventhgeneration descendant of early Texas colonists, with part of them with a group known as the "Old

John May's family was living in Burnett when he was born, but moved to. Brownwood afterward. His father had a cattle auction business in Brownwood, so he learned about the business aspect of ranching early.

John says he first became interested in banking when he worked in a mailroom at the First National Bank in Brownwood. At Texas Tech he studied General Business, then got a fulltime bank job in 1975 at First Comanche Bank, Comanche. He held several other bank positions before coming to Gorman. During that time he

married, and he and his wife, Lisa, have two chil-

When asked about his duties at Citizens State Bank, May says an important one is to oversee the daily operations of the bank. There are 12 employees here, and he is available to them or customers who need to discuss things.

"I'm the only loan officer here - I make the decisions on all types of loans," he says.

He adds that some good loans are available now.

"Of course I can't loan to everyone who walks in the door," he explains. "But basically a bank is supposed to serve the needs of the community."

He says there have been a lot of changes in banking just since his career began.

"Many of the changes are regulatory," he says. "There is increase in documentation - you have to conform to new banking laws. I'm afraid signature loans are out."

He calls the huge increases in FDIC insurance an "added burden." He does say that he feels that Texas Banking Industry is on the upswing, however, recovering from the drouth and collapse of oil prices in the 1980's.

He describes Gorman as a "hardy little town," and says this area has come out a lot better than some other places during the recent recession. It's the land that has again pulled people through - those fertile fields of deep loan and sand and oak wood-

lands. But he realizes the area needs more industrial base to go with the agriculture. May says he wonders sometimes about the future - what political decisions are going to do to the type of farming here. "Mainly it's what will be done about the peanut program and imports," he says. He, like other bankers in the area, appears to be wary of the GATT proceedings going

on right now. China is one of the biggest peanut producers in the world," he remarks. "What's going to happen if they get turned loose on our producers?

"I think if the peanut program fails the alternative would be to plant coastal Bermuda on the acreage here and run livestock."

He adds that what Gorman and Eastland County needs is some type of manufacturing industry. The Eastland County Economic Development group is working hard to secure companies that will bring jobs to the area, he says. He is a member of the group and glad to be associated with it.

"This is the way we're going to get things done all working together," he remarks.

MINGUS BAPTIST CHURCH CENTENNIAL A SUCCESS

Sunday June 23, 1991 was a special day in Mingus Baptist Church. There were over one hundred fifty people who came to relive fond memories, bringing the times past back to life. Dale Choate, a former member was moderator for the celebration. He and his wife Jo Ann, reside in Keller. Dale Choate opened the service with a solo, "The Wonder Of It All" and Tommie Choate led in prayer.

Thelma Speegle Lynn Foote was pianist for this event, this lady can make beautiful music and served as pianist in this church before moving to Ranger. In the years past, three young sisters, Lennie, Thelma and Bernice Speegle, took turns playing the piano for the church services.

BIRD CAGES maybe, but there's not a lot of fish wrapped around here anyway, but we in the newspaper business have come to accept that most people "recycle" our product as bird cage liners, fire starter and as a wadded up mass for keeping windows shiny and clean. There must be 101 uses for old newspapers. (We still get a kick out of movies, when a rural baby is going to be born, the midwife always asks for hot water and old newspapers.)

A new study has just been approved to see if newspapers can be used as cattle feed. Scientists are saying that as much as 20 to 40 percent of a cow's future diet could come from old newsprint, acting "dietary fiber kind of supplement." If the study works, there should be greater demand for discarded newspapers, and that could cause a shortage, so pet owners would have to find substitutes for puppies, kittens and birds.

More seriously the cattle manure jokes would multiply, and while it's often been called to our attention that some of our items were nothing more than a bunch of bull, now there might be physical evidence.

And of course more government studies would be necessary: to determine which papers were preferred. Would gossip columns be favored over "drier" stories about property taxes and political campaign appearances?

And what about the scandal-filled tabloids -- even the dumb cattle would find some of those stories "hard to swallow."

Some of the newsprint has soybean oil in its ink and many of us have been eating that for years in various forms of fast-food hamburgers, etc.

From the cows' point of view: they say it used to be easy, just standing around chewing cud. Then came milking machines, artificial reproduction, BGH drugs, and now their image on sweatshirts, mugs, etc.

Cut The Income Tax Talk And Start Cutting Government

By T. Boone Pickens Members of Governor Ann Richards' Task Force on Revenue recently put a hefty 6 percent personal income tax and a 6.5 percent corporate income tax on the legislative table to satisfy the Texas Legislature's never-ending appetite for increased spending.

Make no mistake: The merits of an income tax will be a focal point of debate in this summer's special session on state spending and taxes. And while a few Texas business leaders have joined hands with the freespending liberals in support of such a tax, you can an income tax will hamcount me out.

A personal and corporate income tax couldn't come at a worse time for most Texans or Texas businesses. If instituted, an income tax will further erode the earnings of the average Texas family and Texas business, and ultimately derail Texas' sputtering economic recovery.

As head of one of the nation's largest independent natural gas producers, I can testify that the pinch is still on. Texas is still picking itself up off the mat after the oil bust of the 1980s and the recent savings and loan debacle. The real estate, insurance, banking, oil and petrochemical industries remain depressed. The collapse in natural gas prices continues to impede the recovery of our state's energy industry. Small businesses, responsible for 92 percent of all jobs in Texas, have suffered greatly during this economic recession, and will suffer another blow if the income tax - or any other business or personal tax - is implemented.

Earlier this year, state lawmakers approved a reduction in state taxes collected from Texas' struggling horse racing industry to spur economic growth. Texans will no doubt have a hard time swallowing the notion that the reverse approach - increased state taxes

In the eight states that have most recently instituted an income tax, state spending increased to record levels at a record pace. New York and California have income taxes. Currently, those states face a \$8 billion and \$13 billion budget deficit, respectively. Their predicament is hardly a ringing endorsement of the income as a cure-all for budget ills. Conversely, three western states that lack either a corporate or personal income tax are among the few states on a sound fiscal footing.

Texans do not want more taxes, more spending or more regulatory interference. The Legislature would do well to listen to what the people are saying.

Unfortunately, most of the liberals in Austin have never experienced what the business owner confronts every day of the week. Running a business is tough work. State government should make starting a successful business easier, not harder. An income tax will point Texas in the wrong direc-

The free-spenders and special interests have been hungering for a state income tax for a long time. This is their best opportunity to siphon more from the taxpayer for their pet projects. They have successfully painted the picture of a state perched on the precipe of financial disaster, and that is simply not the case.

More taxes means more spending, not fiscal stability. It's a vicious and unseemly cycle. Pulling in the reigns on spending in Austin is the only solution. State agency performance reviews are on target, but more must be done. Concerned taxpayers must begin to demand tax and spending accountability from their legislators. The income

The first restaurant was established ln 1966 by parents Pedro and Dionicia Pulido and three of their sons, said Robert Pulido Sr., company president.

Today, the family owns restaurants in Fort Richland Hills, Hurst, Arlington,

Irving, Stephenville, Weatherford, Mineral Wells, Cleburne, Brownwood and Eastland.

The family also owns Pulido's Catering Service in Fort Worth and a tortilla and chip factory in Benbrook, where they produce some of the food products used in their restaurants.

In 1990, the 10,000square-foot factory was expanded to include a 4,800-square-foot warehouse.

Within the next five years, the Pulido family plans to open several restaurants and expand its retail operations, he said. As part of their 25th

anniversary celebration, the Pulido family is presenting their customers with pesos they can use to purchase free dinners, appetizers and non-alco-

holic beverages. It started humbly a quarter of a century ago. The parent's dream became a family goal: start one family-owned, familyoperated restaurant.

The Pulido's Mexican Worth, Benbrook, North Restaurant chain began in Fort Worth at 2900 Spring Street, said Robert Pulido Sr., company presi-

> The dream belonged to his mother, Dionicia, and father, Pedro. It began years before when Pedro worked for the railroad and she prepared his lunch. They quickly learned the spicy aroma of her fresh, home-made tamales and tacos were so enticing to his co-workers they would ask Pedro to trade lunches. Soon he was selling them at work and Dionicia began sell-

ing them from their home. Their dream seemed nearer when three of their seven grown children took a cart of tamales and tacosto the railroad and sold

old chairs and booths and reupholstered them. It wasn't that we were cheap, we just couldn't afford them.

and pedestals. We bought

"One guy in the upholstery shop would help us, Ralph Mendez. There wasn't any pay, but he'd work on through the night with us. It was hard work, and, he didn't expect anything. Other people would tell him what a fool he was to help us. But after we opened we gave. him a percentage of the business," he said.

Later Mendez accepted a job with Pulido's. He still works for the company.

While building the restaurant, all of the Pulido's worked other jobs. Robert Sr. apprenticed at a Mexican restaurant which was managed by a brother-inlaw.

"I did everything. There wasn't much pay, but everyday I was learning something about the restaurant business," he said.

In 1966, the restaurant opened. Some members of the family kept their fulltime jobs and worked at the restaurant during their "off" hours. Others, like Robert Sr. and his wife, worked full-time at the restaurant. Dionicia

cooked. The restaurant was an outstanding success. In 1967, the Pulido's dream of the family operating one restaurant expanded. The Pulido's opened their second restaurant off High-

way 377 in Benbrook. With the advent of the new restaurant came the need for written recipes. Then, as now, Dionicia created all the recipes.

As a child she had learned to "cook by ear" and it became one of the families more humorous task to write out the reci-

"Mama measures everything by handfuls and pinches, so at first we had to chase her around and get exact amounts on all the ingredients so we could write down the recipes," said Robert Sr.

Within the next 24 years the Pulidos added nine more Pulido's Mexican Restaurants for a total of 11. They also added Pulido's Catering Service, a Mi Hacienda in Hurst lington.

Parkway. The factory is capable of daily producing 9,000 pounds of chips and 4,000 dozen tortillas. The factory also produces tamales, pralines, salsa and all other items used

in the restaurants.

"We are one of the few companies that make everything. Most companies have to buy some items," said Robert Sr.

In May of 1990, the 10,000 square-foot factory was expanded to include a 4.800 square-foot warehouse. The public may purchase tortillas, chips, and salsa directly from the factory weekdays from 7 a.m. - 4 p.m.

A quarter of a century after its introduction, the original Pulido's is still standing. In 1986, in honor of their 20th anniversary the street name was changed from Spring Street to Pulido Street, said Robert Sr.

And, most importantly, it's still a family-owned business. Pedro, 84, operates the factory and Dionicia, 80, still prepares the tamales and creates new items for the restau-

The family owns 100 percent of the stock in the \$8 million company and all six directors are re-

Brothers Robert Sr. and Rudy work for the company, as does brothers-inlaw Edward Gamez and John Rodriguez, Robert Sr.'s son Robert Pulido Jr., two cousins Dionicia "adopted," and several other cousins, in-laws and relatives.

During the summertime, they try to place children and grandchildren who want summer jobs in the factory or restaurant. However, the children are expected to work.

"They have to work from the bottom up. They must learn all facets of the business and be good at it before they move up the ladder," Robert Sr. said. "It can haunt you if you promote someone in business just because they are

related." All of the managers at the Pulido's restaurants have been with the company more than 10 years, as have their factory employees.

"We treat them like members of our family. We've known some of them for a long time. Some of them came to our wedding. We went to their wedding. problems faster."

Robert Sr. says it's the challenge that keeps the family in the restaurant business.

"The hours are not the prettiest hours in the world. You never know what to expect in the restaurant business. It keeps you thinking. You can plan for a big crowd and have a small crowd or vice versa. There are so many variables. That's what I like about it. It's always different. It's a challenge everyday. When it stops being a challenge, I'll go do something else."

Although that seems unlikely, he says. "It gets in your blood."





Dr. Cathy Collins has conducted extensive research in cogitation instruction and predicts the United States will lose its leadership role in the international community unless American children learn to create new ideas.

"We need to get them ready for the 21st Century by teaching them how to think more effectively," she said.

Although Collins concedes funding, and time constraints would limit the teaching of thinking skills, she sees opportunities to integrate such instruction into daily curriculum.

The educator indicated a preference for a combined effort over the creation of separate studies, which she believes would defeat the purpose of teaching child thinking

"One reason we can't add thinking as another subject is because it's philosophically wrong," Collins explained. "What we want to do in our schools is to really transform the entire structure. We want children to come to school to learn how to think about reading, writing, math, science and problems in the world and about themselves and other people."

While Collins stressed the future benefit of such skills, she said her research shows that enhanced thinking skills also can help children boost exam scores now.

"Students become better processors of information, better decision makers, better thinking and problem solvers," Collins said. "Therefore, they do much better on standardized testing."

"We have to teach children to think - not teach children to read, write or work the computer," she said. "What is going to sustain is the creative idea that solves the problems."


