Application Deadline For Congressional Page And Internship Is Near

Individuals interested in serving as a page or intern in Washington, D.C. have less than two weeks to get their applications into Congressman Charles Stenholm's office. Completed applications must be submitted in person or postmarked by January 17, 1992, to be considered for either position.

Pages perform a variety of duties, including delivering packages to offices within the Capitol complex, and answering telephones in the Members' Cloakrooms. The pages answer directly to the Director of Page Services and they are paid a monthly salary, which covers basic living expenses.

Pages are housed in supervised dormitories and study junior level curriculum at the U.S. Capitol Page School.

Page positions are open to students in the 17th Congressional District who will be juniors in September 1992. Pages must have a "B" average in four major courses, excluding electives.

Four interns are selected to work in the Congressman's office for one month intervals in June or July.

Interns are involved in the daily operation of the Congressman's office and will help research constituent inquiries.

College students from the 17th Congressional District or those attending college inside the district, teachers and administrators and residents ages 19-25 who have demonstrated an interest in government, are eligible for the internship program. The interns are paid a one-month stipend to cover basic living expenses.

Page and intern applications and information can be obtained by contacting Elaine Talley in the Abilene district office at 915-673-7221.

Applications are due by January 17, 1992. They will be forwarded to a Selection Committee who will notify finalists by February 21, 1992. Interviews for all positions will be held in Abilene on March 14, 1992, and selections will be made at that time.

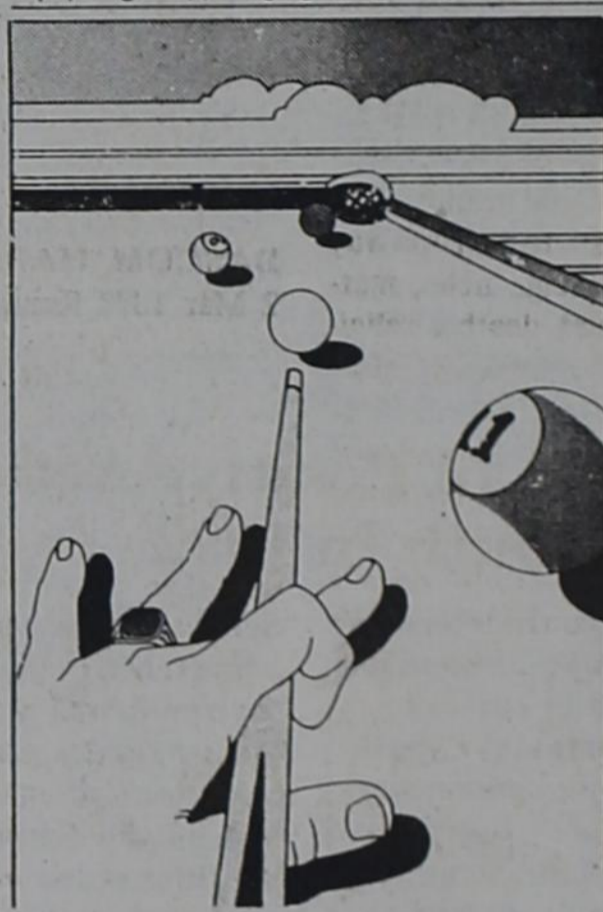

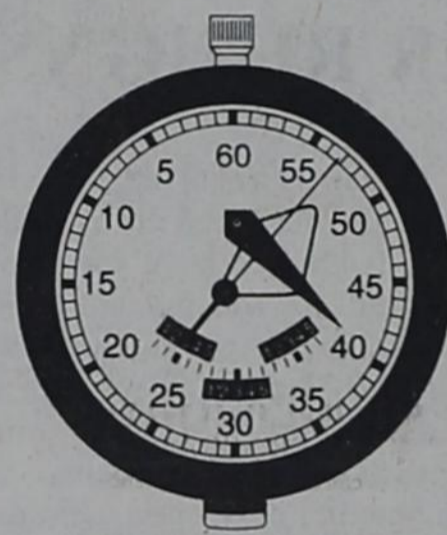

...THE WOODVILLE REPUBLICAN, Mississippi's Oldest Existing Newspaper, Volume 1: December 18, 1823 - December 17, 1839. Compiled by O'Levia Neil Wilson Wiese. Reviewer, Jeanne Pruett.

In researching Wilkinson County, Mississippi, for information on her mother's people, Ms. Wiese found that much of the information she needed could not be found in court records, but was recounted in the back issues of the oldest newspaper in the state, *The Woodville Republican*, which first appeared in December 1823.

Wilkinson County is perhaps the most historical county in Mississippi. It was the boyhood home of Jefferson Davis, had the first standard-gauge railroad in America, and in 1830 was distinguished by having at the same time a U.S. senator, a governor, and a lieutenant governor.

The Woodville Republican recorded many of the activities which occurred in the county as well as surrounding counties. The paper included announcements of Masonic Lodge celebrations, legal notices and rewards for runaway slaves, foreign news, marriages and deaths, religious and community activities, court proceedings and legal disputes, personal estate and tax sales, military and public office elections, deaths from epidemics, illness, murders and suicides, information about river boats, river traffic, the building of the first railroad, etc.

Ms. Wiese abstracted the relevant genealogical information from existing issues of the paper. Only the year 1832 has no existing issues; the other years are nearly complete with only a few scattered issues not represented in these abstracts.

Examination of this volume shows a wealth of information available in book form that otherwise would take hours to research in person, not to mention, cost of a trip.

'Cape Fear' At Majestic This Weekend

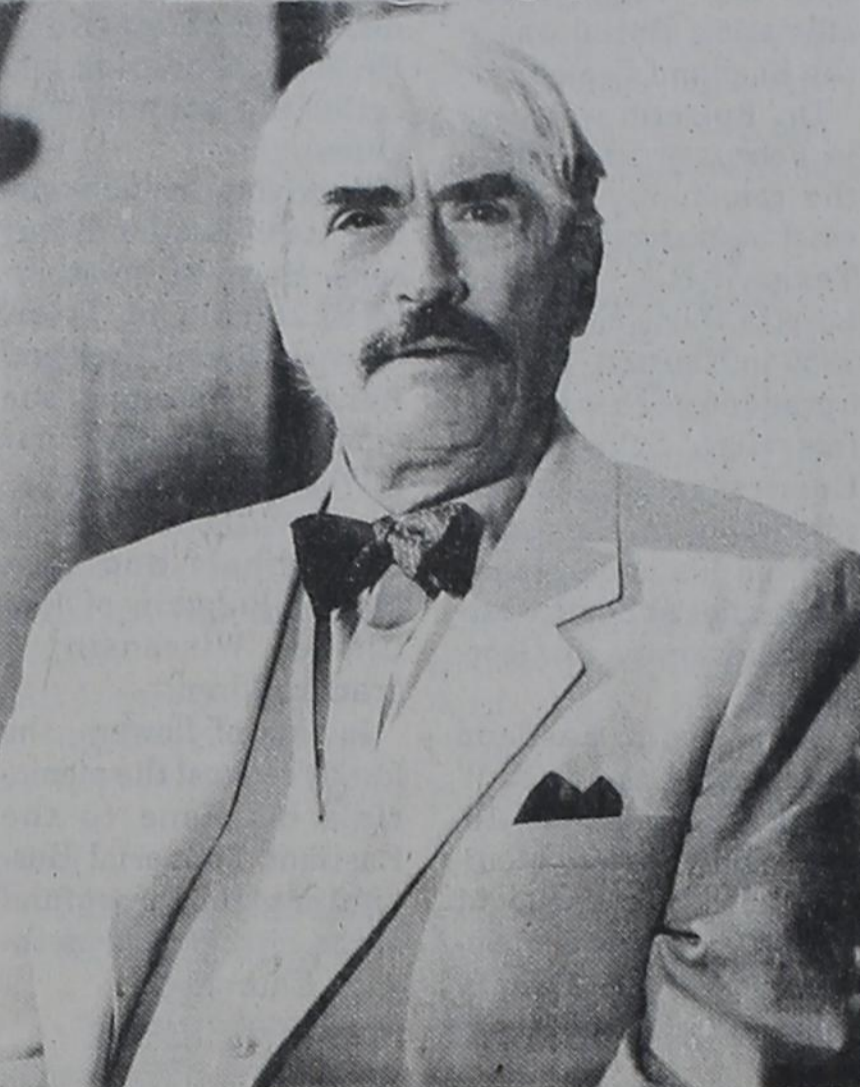

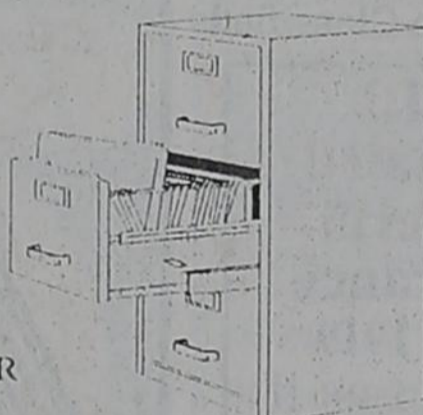
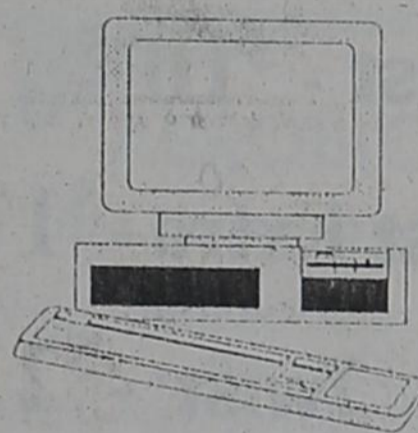

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by flooding are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices located in Eastland and Callahan Counties, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips said today.

Eastland and Callahan Counties are 2 of 31 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the flooding.

Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent 1055 of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Phillips said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 26, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recog-

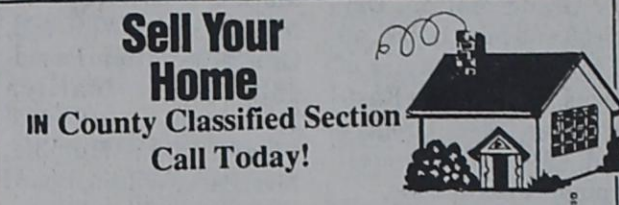

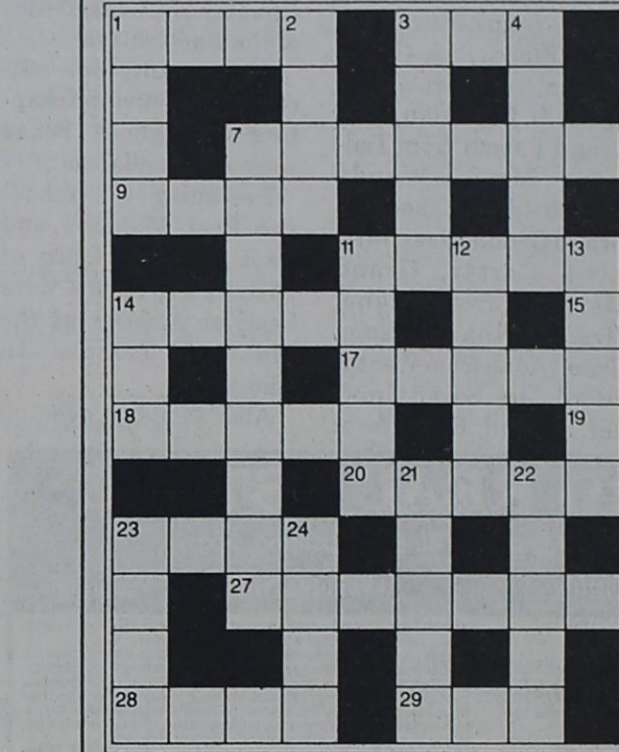

RJC Update



By adding the drug analapril to standard treatments for heart failure, a common condition among senior citizens, doctors have been able to cut sharply the risk of hospitalization and even death. The study was sponsored by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.

Omega-3 oils from fish offer more health benefits than Omega-3 found in vegetable oil, Tufts University nutritionists say.

Vitamin C may help protect against some forms of cancer, the Journal of the National Cancer Institute indicates. It may play a role against stomach, colon, breast and cervical cancers.

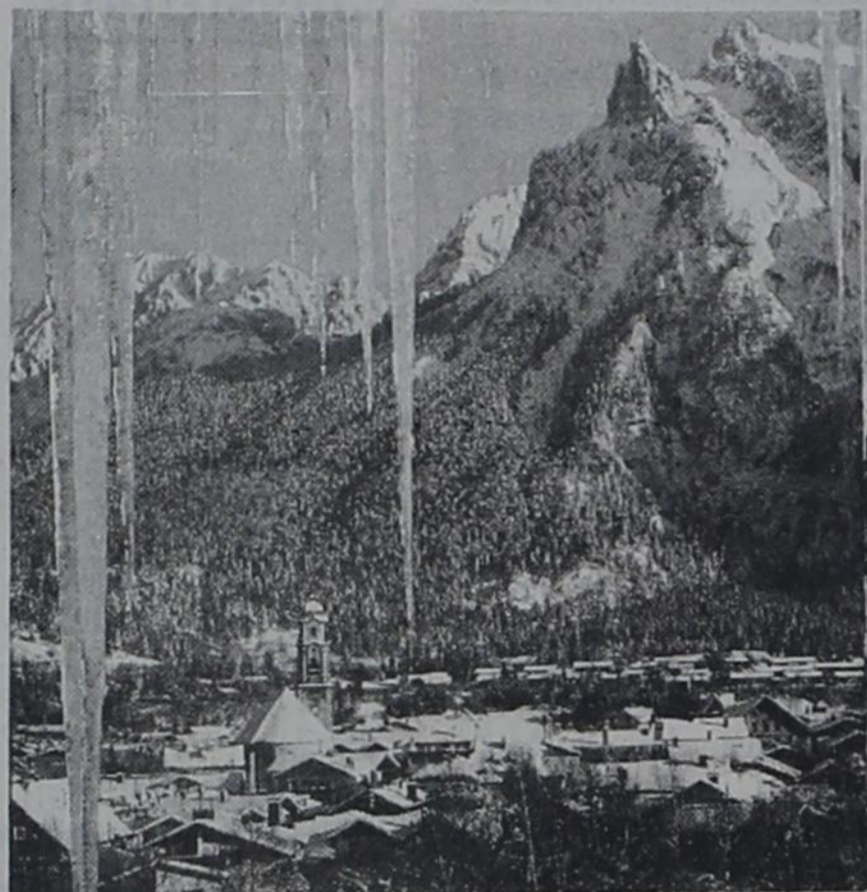
TRAIN SAMPLING was what it turned out to be, coming out of Venice, bound for Garmish-Partenkirchen, the military resort center in the German Alps. It's a tucked-away place and you've got to really want to go there because you don't accidentally get there. We did our infamous four-minute change in Verona (cheered by locals who didn't think we were going to make it [and for a brief second or two, we weren't too sure ourselves]). Next change was at Innsbruck, Austria, and bear in mind, with each change we were "stepping down" from the deluxe to the smaller lines that transversed those mountains, hauling locals, dedicated tourists, milk cans and nanny goats. Next switch was Mittenwald, the violin capital, and then at another little place that's not even listed on the maps, we were told that if the last local had gone, we'd have to hire a hack. It hadn't, and we were greeted at Garmish-P by a cab-driver who helped with the bags and took us graciously to the Gen. Patton Hotel, one of two military rest-and-recuperation centers that provides recreation facilities for off-duty service people. It had been a German officers club prior to the occupation of American forces, and its timbered, tall ceilings and other decor fairly be-speak the German Bavarian culture.

The German share in the mighty Alps is not very large. They stretch from Lake Constance to the Salzburg Alps, but they include the Allgau Alps, Karwendel and Wetterstein, culminating in the Zugspitze (9,724 ft.), Germany's highest peak. The mountain actually belongs to two countries for the border between Austria and Germany runs directly over the peak. The mountain was first conquered in 1820. These and others are popular hiking and climbing centers, and this whole area is a tourist mecca. Garmisch-P was the site for the 1936 Winter Olympics; Mittenwald is known around the world

for its famous violins; Oberammergau is famous for wood carvings and the scene of the passion play presented only every ten years; Berchtesgaden, Hitler's famous Eagle's Nest mountain retreat, is nearby; as is the Austrian festival city of Salzburg. Structured tours are available including the three castles built by King Ludwig, the "Sound of Music" out of Salzburg and others.

Mittenwald was originally a key trade center and prospered when goods coming up through the famous Brenner Pass and Innsbruck from Verona were transferred to barges to be taken on to Munich. When that trade went to a different route, the town suffered, but was renewed in 1684 when a farmer's son, Matthias Klotz, returned as a master violin maker after 20 years of study, and turned the town into the center for stringed instruments, with the wood coming from nearby forests, and now violins, violas and cellos are shipped around the world.

Our tour choices were for an

on-our-own Oberammergau for the three of us and a guided Ludwig's Neuschwanstein Castle for Gaynell and I since Amy had already seen it. She trained on back to Bayreuth to preside at a wife's club meeting leaving the parents to fend for themselves.

Der Fuhrer's favorite mountain retreat where many top-level Nazi staff meetings were held during WWII has given Berchtesgaden a bad image problem; it had been a resort long before Hitler's time. Members of the ruling Wittelsbach dynasty started coming here in 1810 and their ornate palace stands today and is one of the town's major attractions, along with the former Nazi complex and a working salt mine.

Winter sports rank high at Garmisch-P: more than 62 miles of downhill ski runs, 40 lifts and cable cars and 93 miles of cross-country tracks. They ski from November-May and major races held every January.

The Germans speak lovingly of their Zugspitze and two main ways up the mountain: 10-minute hoist by cable car or 75-minute cog railway.

Near Garmisch, Kloster Ettal, a monastery founded in 1330, where the Ettal liqueur, of 70 mountain herbs, is still distilled.

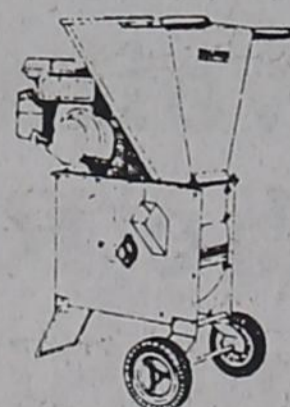

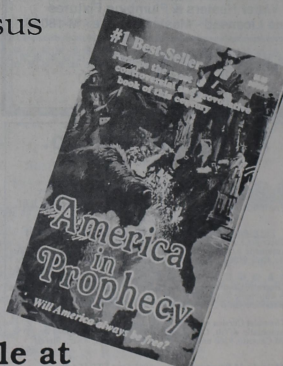
