Eastland Memorial tion and control of blad-Hospital will sponsor a free screening for women. Dr. Avi Deshumkh will present an educational program followed by individual screening beginning at 3:00 p.m. Friday, February 7, 1992.

Incontinence is embarrassing and socially restrictive. As a matter of fact incontinence is described as social cancer. Modern science has offered us tremendous insight into bladder funcder sphincter. Using this knowledge urologists are able to find reasons of incontinence in the female population in most instances. Nerve control of blad-

der function is very important. Any damage of nerves to the bladder will induce incontinence, and it can be identified with very specific tests. Nerve damage can be effectively treated with medication in many instances. Injury during child-

birth and aging in women can cause laxity of pelvic tient. muscles. Pelvic muscles are responsible for supporting the bladder and

culature the bladder neck

tend to leak. Coughing.

sneezing, minor activities, weight gain, and lack of exercise can all promote fall down of the bladder.

IT WASN'T until the very last night in Germany that we encountered a really foul native -- and even that couldn't dampen our zeal in all that we had seen and done, and the joyful thought of going home, after 30 days.

Two big things we had dreaded as the time drew near for our return home: the trainage trip from Bayreuth to Frankfurt; and coping with the giant Frankfurt Airport. We were pretty sure the two weren't going to be easy. We were half right. Amy took us down the hill through Bindlock and the train-commute wasn't bad; we saw some beautiful new German countryside and went through historic Wurzburg again. We had a mini-concern when an obvious neo-Nazi skin-head was among the passengers who got on the fast train with us at Nuremburg. Not to worry though, he was only armed with earrings and a boom box wired into his head with hard metal. The little towns are so neat, pretty and pastoral, whether on the flat farm lands or on the alpine slopes. Clean farms and fence rows.

But the airport was a nightmare, and actually it was mainly our own fault; well, actually the fault of a dying battery in a quartz alarm clock that had served us well but finally let us down.

But first the foul person. It was a German cab driver who picked us up at the train station (2 levels below the Frankfurt Airport), and blew his stack when he learned that we wanted to go to a little economical hotel had booked at Netterand which between the airport and Frankfurt, further from the more expensive airport inns. He fumed, stewed, cussed (not entirely under his breath), mumbled and we could make out a few word/phrases waiting two hours in ("...after line...I'm wasting my time on this fare...no possible pickup on return,. etc., etc.") while careering over autobahn at break-neck rain-swept speed...And SO, meekly, we and nervously, apologized as best we could, "Sorry, friend, but that's the way it is. We didn't mean to upset you; etc.") Finally, we arrive at etc., the hotel and he receives the exact amount of the fare. for the tip," and I say, "Thanks for the pleasant ride."

The hotel is nice, and even though it's raining, we want a little supper. We're told there's a little cafe just up the street. And so on a wet, night in the strange city of Frankfurt, we two umbrella-out, and find the little, warm cellar, neighborhood eaterydrinkery, and find a cozy little table where we watch the locals socializing. We order a bowl of gulash (stew) and a French baggette (sandwich) to share. The locals are friendly and treat us like regulars. It was cozy in its own right, but knowing that it was our last night in Europe, made it extra special. Much later, we found our way back to the hotel. Tomorrow we fly home.

The wakeup call was on time, but we doddled, eyeing the little clock with the fading battery. Finally with a look at a watch we realized that we must skedaddle for breakfast, taxi to the airport to catch the Delta flight to D/FW at 9:50 a.m. It was going to be nip and tuck at best. The terminal is a jumble of airlines and security quards carry machine guns on their shoulders. In our race to Delta check-in we get separated momentarily in the mob of people. I've got the luggage on a cart and the passports; Gaynell has the tickets, and it's after 9:30. Ours was a 30-day deal, with penalties for variations; so I'm thinking hey, maybe we haven't spent our last night in Europe after all.

Only with American, Texan, Eastland County logic, would we both know that to find Delta was our best chance of finding each other again. Praise be, it happened. We were reunited, and the real race began: Gaynell got the attention of an attendant who told us we might make it if we raced to Gate 35 (on the far side) with our luggage: "It closes in 5 minutes. After what seemed like 35 miles, we joined the large crowd bound for the same plane. We weren't the only late ones by a long shot. All boarded, it was a late departure, and as we sank into our assigned seats, exhausted from the ordeal, it was a joyous relief. Two meals, drink carts, duty-frees, an unwatched movie, no sleep, much reminiscence about all we'd seen and done. Ten and a half hours later, we arrive at D/FW; glad to be home, where pretty much everybody speaks English and we get ice in our tea. There's nothing like it.




