NEW PHONE SYSTEM PURCHASED FOR COUNTY DISPATCH

The Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch Board declared an emergency Wednesday so that a new telephone system could be purchased from reserve funds.

A Nipon Electronic Corporation (NEC) system will be purchased from the Steven Company in Eastland at a cost of \$2,954. The new telephones are expected to be installed at the County Dispatch on March 18.

Dean Powledge, representative of the Steven Company, demonstrated the NEC telephones and explained the special features and one-year warranty. One of the features included with the system is a voice recording service, where incoming calls can be automatically answered.

This system will be separate from the 9-1-1 Emergency System, which is expected to begin

operation within a few months.

Several weeks ago Becky Holmes, Chief Dispatcher and Manager, told Board Members that the dispatch telephone system was not working well and needed to be replaced. It was agreed at that time that new telephones and their costs would be studied.

On another item, directors agreed Wednesday to hire former Rising Star

police officer Karen Posey as day call-taker at the dispatch. She will work fewer than 40 hours per week. Holmes reported that one dispatcher will attend a five-day school in Stephenville at a cost of \$98.00.

The Board discussed the 9-1-1 Emergency System and what needed to be done before it is in operation. It was stated that Gorman addresses are not yet in the computer system at the County dispatch. There are also a number of rural homes in the County which have not been addressed.

Glen Rose scored in the fifth when Wallace walked, advanced on a grounder, and scored on an error. Going into the sixth the score was 2-1 Glen Rose.

The sixth inning was the most profitable for both teams. Ranger started off the inning with walks by Todd Hatton (pitcher) and Russell Brister (first base). Jeff Rutledge, the catcher, then stepped up to the plate and hit a homer for the Bulldogs. After a fly-out, Shane Torrez singled, Tim Abila

hit out to center field, and Aaron Pattenau hit the second home run of the game for the Bulldogs. At the end of Ranger's bat the score was 6-2 in favor of the Bulldogs.

However, Glen Rose mounted a return, managing to string together four straight hits and an error in route to a four run rally. As time expired (the tournament games are played on time schedules), the score was tied at 6-6. In that case, the winner was the team with the most runners reaching third base. Glen Rose won the count and was declared the winner.

Although the Bulldogs lost, there were many bright spots in the game. Todd Hatton pitched very well in all innings. At the plate, Shane Torrez went 3 for 3 and was complimented by the two homers. All in all the Bulldogs played well in a very frustrating loss.

The Bulldogs also played Valley Mills later that Saturday. They seemed not to be able to get ready to play again after the loss to Glen Rose. The Bulldogs got a taste of heat by the Valley Mills pitching staff and turned on the fans, striking out 14 times. However, the combined effort of Shane Torrez and J.D. Johnson struck out eight batters from Valley Mills. Final score saw Valley Mills winning 7-0. Better luck to the Bulldogs at Glen Rose next year.

Novice Grad Completes Career At Peru State

PERU, NEB. — Novice High School graduate Matt Motley recently completed the 1991-92 basketball season as Peru State College's second-leading rebounder.

The 6-foot-5 senior forward pulled down 190 cars in 28 games for a 6.8 average per contest. Junior swingman Greg Snipes led the Bobcats with a 7.1 mark.

Motley led PSC in blocked shots with 17, placed second in field goal shooting at 52.4 percent (129 of 246), and also finished fourth in scoring with a 10.9 average.

His season highs were 30 points against Briar Cliff (Iowa) College on Feb. 18, and 13 rebounds versus Central Methodist (Mo.) on Nov. 22.

Motley, a transfer from Ranger (Tex.) Junior College in 1990, earned honorable mention All-District XI honors this season for the 16-13 Bobcats, who posted a 13-1 mark within the confines of the Al Wheeler Activity Center.

In two seasons at PSC, Motley averaged 10.9 points and 5.9 rebounds per contest. He was one of three seniors on the '91-92 squad along with center Garrett Mann of Burwell, Neb., and forward Michael Woolsey of Palacios, Tex. - also a Ranger JC transfer two years ago.

Matt is an industrial management major and the son of Paul and Wanda motley of Novice.

Perry Calls On School Districts To Review Bid Specs For Barriers Blocking Use Of Texas Foods

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry is urging Texas school districts to review their food purchase bid specifications and remove any barriers that discriminate against Texas goods and products.

Perry said that bid specifications that favor other states not only thwart Texas agriculture but hurt the entire Texas economy.

"Although it may be inadvertent, bid specifications used by many Texas school districts actually require that certain commodities be grown outside our state," Perry said in a letter to school board members and other school officials statewide. "Some districts' bid requirements specify, for example, the use of Washington apples, Florida green peppers or California tomatoes.

"Yet, these same products — and many others — are grown right here in Texas in large quantities, of excellent quality and at competitive prices."

Texas' public schools spend some \$500 million on food purchases every year — a market Perry is working to open to more Texas producers through his Project TEACH initiative. Short for Texas Education and Agriculture Cooperating for

Health, Project TEACH is also aimed at enhancing the nutritional value of the state's public school meals and the agricultural literacy of youngsters. The effort was launched by Perry in September.

"When allowed to compete on a level playing field, Texas farmers can go head to head with the finest producers the world over," Perry said. "But when a school district effectively shuts out Texas products, they make the playing field anything but fair."

In his letter, Perry is encouraging school districts to review their bid specifications. "If they are unfairly written," he said, "I urge you to change them so that Texas producers have the same access to our school food service industry as do non-Texas growers."

Agriculture is the state's second largest industry, pumping more than \$32 billion into the Texas economy every year. One in five Texans is employed in farming, ranching or a related industry, such as food processing.

Texas' public schools produce some two million lunches and 600,000 breakfasts daily.

TDH Awards Local Grants To Improve EMS Service

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has announced grants totaling \$225,925 awarded to 52 local agencies providing prehospital emergency care in their communities. The agencies include volunteer fire departments, volunteer EMS, rural hospitals, EMS first responder groups and city and county EMS groups.

Most of the money will be used to match local funds to buy ambulance equipment such as defibrillators, state-of-the-art machines that shock heart attack victims out of life-threatening heart rhythms.

"State lawmakers gave TDH this money during the 72nd Regular Session specifically for improving local prehospital medical care," said Dr. Robert MacLean, TDH deputy commissioner. "This is the first time since 1980 we have been able to help local communities buy medical equipment for their ambulances." The grants also will help to buy training equipment.

Dr. MacLean said that last year the health department gave similar EMS grants to 14 local agencies, but certain rules prevented equipment purchases. "In many rural EMS systems, equipment purchasing is the costliest part of their operation," he said. "When the health department helps with this major expense, local funding can be used for other EMS needs, such as recruiting and training emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and paramedics."

Some 79 proposals requesting \$844,000 were received by the health department's Bureau of Emergency Management, the state program responsible for certifying EMS personnel and licensing EMS organizations in Texas.

In April, the health department will begin accepting grant applications for another \$250,000 available for local EMS grants. TDH and The University of Texas have announced a March 28 grant writing seminar to help EMS personnel complete their requests for funds.

Cattlemen Will Focus On Management, Information At San Antonio Convention

In the 1990s, cattlemen face global changes that will require management decisions based on the best available information, but the challenge will be knowing what factors to consider. More than 3,000 working cattle producers will examine those issues as presented by a nationally-known slate of speakers lined up for the 115th annual convention, trade show and silent auction of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association March 22-25 in San Antonio, says James B. Owen, TSCRA president from Tyler.

TSCRA, a 21,000-member livestock trade organization based in Fort Worth, represents cattle producers on state/federal legislative and regulatory issues, in theft prevention and investigation and other matters important to the Southwestern cattle industry, Owen said.

Major topics of discussion at the cattlemen's convention will include global and North American free trade, outlook for livestock prices, environmental regulations, water rights and the Edwards Aquifer dispute, animal health and care, wildlife and livestock interaction, livestock

identification, brand inspection and theft prevention, and the role of the judiciary in Texas.

"Texas ranks first in the nation in total farms and ranches, total acreage, cattle numbers, beef cows, value of cattle and calves and cattle on feed," Owen said. "Cash receipts from the sale of cattle and calves amounts to almost \$6 billion, about half of all agricultural production revenue in Texas."

"Other states were carved and born, but Texas grew from hide and horn," the lifelong cattleman said. "That is an old saying, but a true statement. And, today, the cattle industry continues to play an important and vital role in Texas. The men and women who attend this convention are leaders, not only in their industry at the state and national levels, but in their cities and communities. What they learn at this meeting will be invested at the grassroots level."

Congressman E. "Kika" de la Garza, D-Mission, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, has been invited to give the keynote address at TSCRA's kickoff luncheon Monday noon, March 23, in the San Antonio Con-

vention Center.

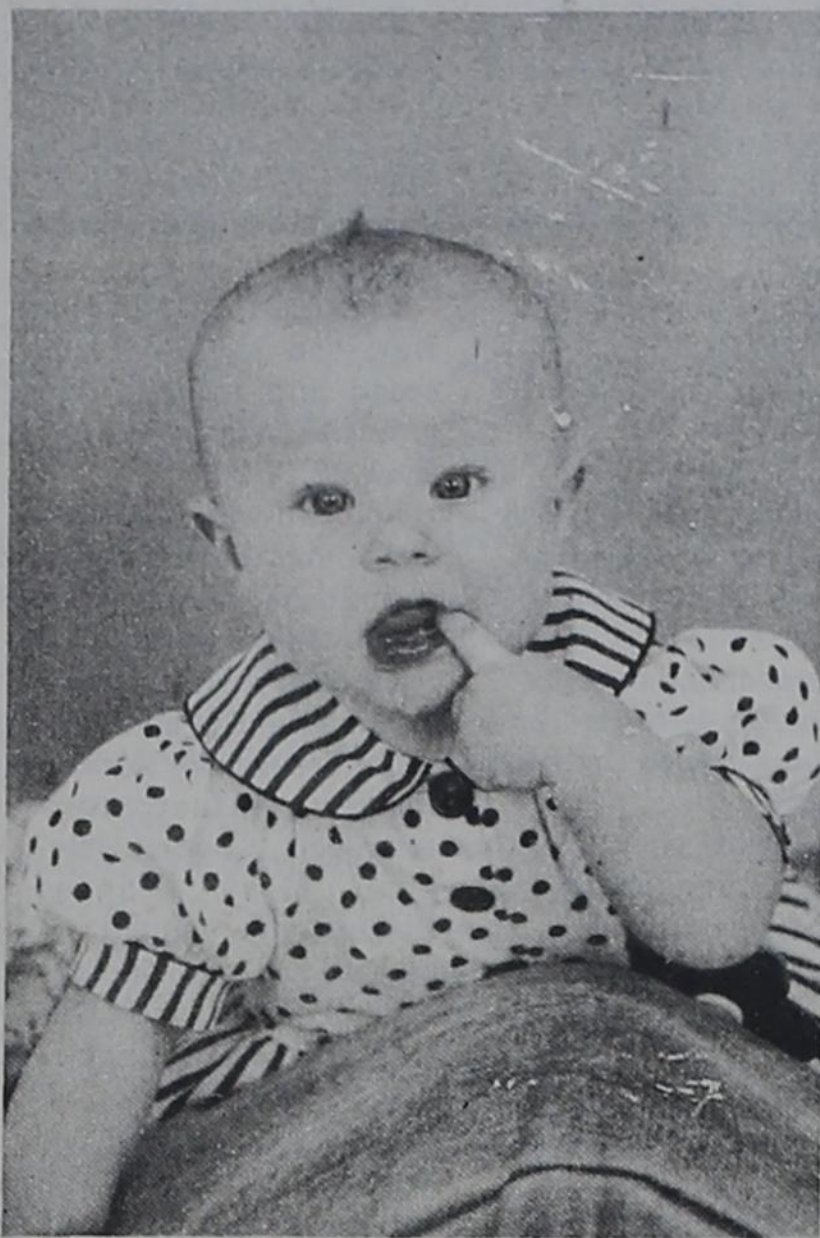

Wilson, president of the National Cattlemen's Association from Trout Creek, Mont.; Congressman Jimmy Hayes, Democrat from Lafayette, La., and a national leader in the movement to reform federal wetlands laws; and Dr. Ray Daniel, internationally known economist with Merck & Co.'s MSD AGVET division in New Jersey.

King, TSCRA secretary-general manager of Fort Worth; John W. Jones, chairman of the Resolutions Committee from Brady; and James L. Powell, chairman of the Nominating Committee from Fort McKavett; and Owen.

Waste Water Treatment Funding

Washington—The city of Eastland has been awarded a \$350,000 grant and a \$1,600,000 loan to expand its waste water treatment facilities, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm announced today.

The funds are provided by the U.S. Farmers Home Administration, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Specially, the senator said, the FmHA assistance will enable the city to add a secondary clarifier along with additional sewer lines and a modified emergency overflow.

The loan is for 40 years at 5 percent interest, the senator said.

"I deeply believe in assuring that the funds which Texas taxpayers send to Washington are returned by the federal government to make permanent improvements which will benefit Texans," Gramm said.

FmHA operates a broad range of low-interest lending and grant programs designed to protect and develop watersheds, to finance waste disposal projects and to improve the economic climate of rural communities.

**County Resources Reports:
"America The Beautiful" Seed
Planted; Food Pantry Serves Many**

County Resources members at the March meeting heard a number of reports on community services.

There was good news from "Operation Green-plant" sponsored by the America the Beautiful Fund. Ruth Cowley, in charge of the free seed program, said that only six packets of seed remained in the Library. More than 400 other packets of vegetable, flower and herb seed had been given to 71 individuals and several organizations.

These will be used to raise vegetables for sharing, and flowers for beautifying homes and businesses. Four troops of Girl Scouts took seed to plant tubs of flowers at the trailer holding the Food Pantry. Six residents of the Rock House took seed to plant there.

America the Beautiful has its headquarters in Washington, D.C., Mrs. Cowley said. This organization would welcome reports as the plants grow from the seed, and also photographs of the gardens.

Lois Robinson, Volunteer at the Eastland County Food Pantry, gave a report on activities at this facility. Mrs. Robinson said the families served 31 families in February, with 99 in the households. The February Volunteers were: Ruth Cowley, Tina Ford, Doris Hockins, Maybelle Trout, Renee Jackson, Brooksie Hodges, Ruben Gaeta, Jr. and Lois Robinson.

"The First United Methodist Church of Eastland donated us a freezer," Mrs. Robinson said. "We have needed one a long time. Now we need meat or anything that will go in the new freezer."

She said the Food Pantry could also use some macaroni and cheese dinners, or staples of that kind.

The Clothes Closet, in the building with the Pantry, also has some needs Mrs. Robinson reported that volunteers have taken down winter clothing and put out an assortment of summer things.

"It is a rather depleted supply," she said. "We could use some children's summer clothing, all ages."

On another matter, Corrie Cowley told of the Positive Action for Youth (PAY) conference held February 28-29 at the Eastland School. She said that 160 attended, ten more than had registered.

"It was very good, with exciting speakers," she reported. "Their talks were uplifting, with good things that can be done for young people. They told of practical steps you can take to solve problems and build confidence."

A report was heard on the Cancer conference held in Eastland February 29. It too, had good attendance and an uplifting atmosphere. There were excellent speakers from M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston.

In other business, the

Association looked over the new vouchers and guidelines for their use. These vouchers use County Resource funds, but can be authorized by Twyla Senterfitt at Central Texas Opportunities, or Rhonda Pipkin, Kay Petree or Patty Matthews at Texas Department of Human Services.

The vouchers can be used for utility bills and other emergency needs. The County Resources Association has a separate Travel fund for ill and disabled children.

The Association raises funds through local contributions. Some pay a membership of \$10.00 per month, others contribute when they receive the annual fund-raising letter.

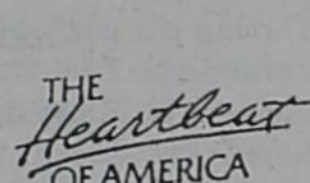

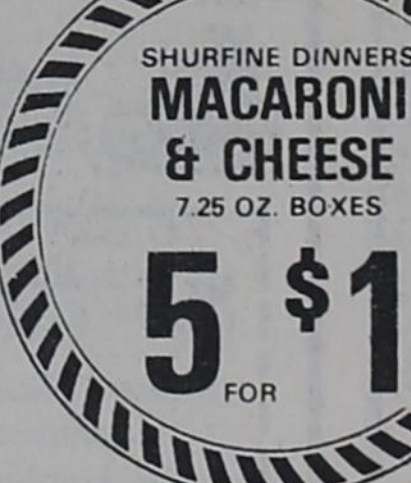

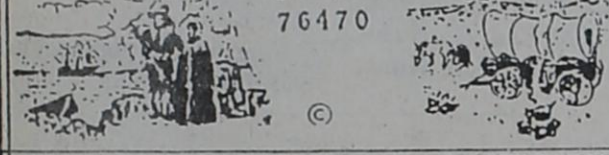

This Plymouth County town was first created from public lands on 4 June 1686. A portion of the town was included in the new town of Wareham on 10 July 1739, and another piece was annexed to Fairhaven on 9 April 1836. Subsequent to the date of these records, additional parts

of the town were taken in the creation of Marion and Mattapoisett in 1853 and 1857 respectively. This master compilation of births, marriages and deaths was compiled from town records, church records, cemetery inscriptions, returns to the County Court, and some Bible and other private records. 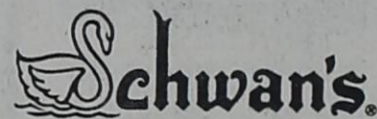

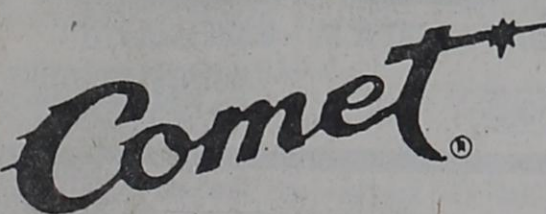

Fishing Outdoors

BEDDING BASS

The big bass bite is back at Lake Leon. Really is it probably never let during our last big rise in water levels. According to anglers who have been visiting Leon and other local lakes the big females seem to be holding around 4 feet of water. Some say their fish are bedding and I believe most are on the beds. Lizards, Slug O's, spinnerbaits, and jigs are producing best and the most honest seems to be the fastest action.

During the spawn an old discussion always seems to surface. Should anglers fish for the bedding fish? Of course, a fish caught any other time of the year affects the population in the same way. The key here is, any time of year is the disposition of the fish, released or kept. A fall female kept hills just as many future fish as does a bedding bass.

O.k. many of you are saying but look at tournament anglers pulling this fish of the beds, hauling them miles down the lake to weigh-in. Will they go ahead and run back up to the original bed? Some will, most will not. Studies indicate most of these females will be herded to new beds by male bass along the way.

However, after spawning studies show most will return to the area they were originally caught from. Tournament anglers do need to handle these females with great care as with all fish. Chemical treatments on the market today do help towards our goal of "catch and live release."

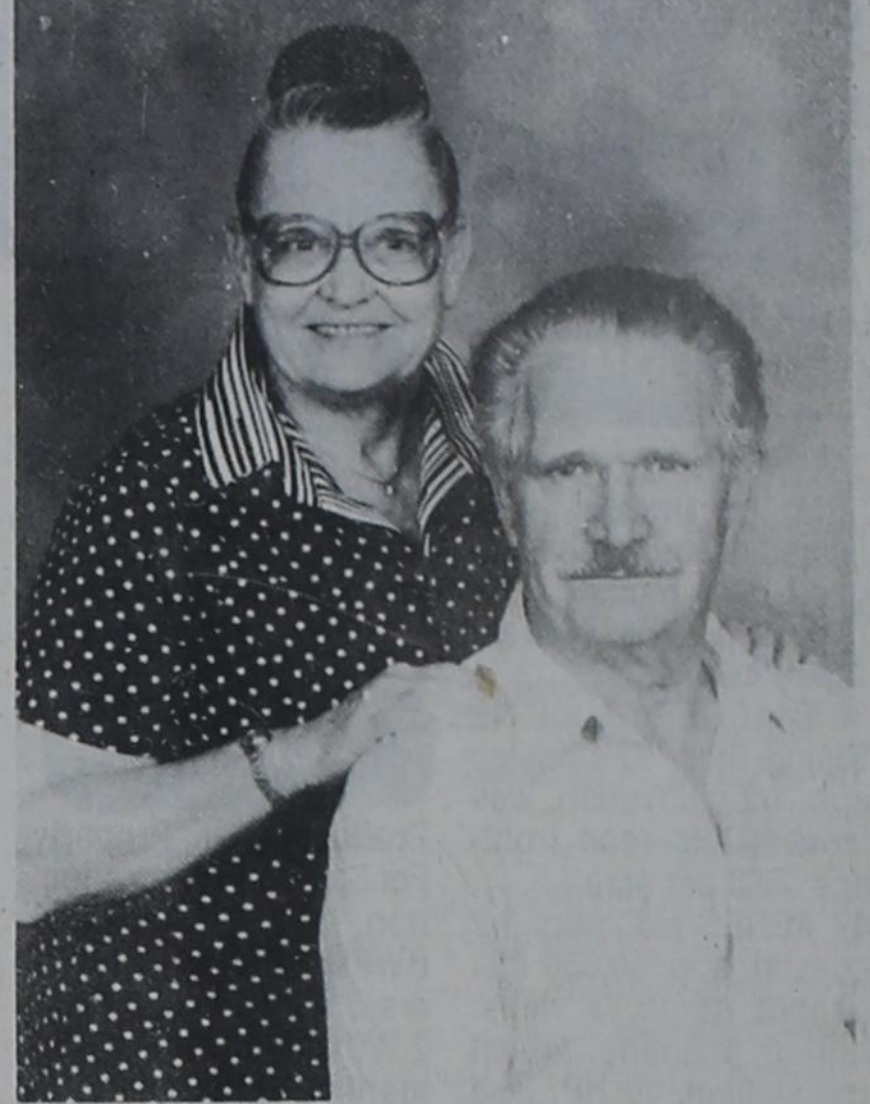

Virgle Clyde Stillwell Sr. and Drusilla Allen Phillips were married March 22, 1942, in Kilgore, Texas. Mr. Still-

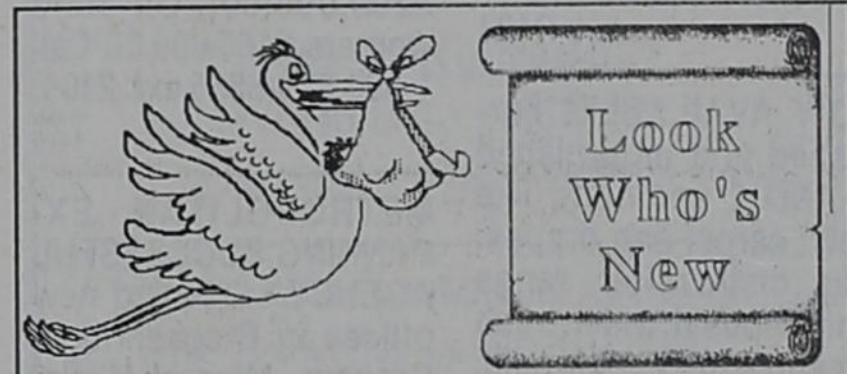
well served 20 years in the Air Force and retired in 1961. He then worked 23 years in civil service before retiring in 1985.

Final Peanut Totals Reveal Surprises

"The 1991 crop of peanuts in Eastland County will be remembered as the crop with many surprises," reports David W. Martin, County Executive Director, of the Eastland County ASCS Office. Although the 1991 crop had been termed a disaster crop, the yield of 1,598 pounds per acre set an all time high yield. The previous high yield was in 1979 when the county averaged 1,597 pounds per acre. This record held for eleven crop years.

This year's peanut harvest was plagued with problems from the start. First, a freeze on September 30, which is six weeks earlier than normal, killed the vines. Then six to twelve inches of rain kept farmers from the field when they needed to dig the deteriorating vines in preparation for combining. The rest of the harvest was further complicated by record yields that delayed buying points and the complications involved with marketing

segregation 2 peanuts. "Over five million pounds of peanuts, which represented twelve percent of the total crop, were graded segregation 2 due to freeze damage," Martin said. In most years, less than one-half of one percent is the maximum amount of peanuts that are graded segregation 2.

Initial notices of the 1992 poundage quota for each farm are scheduled to be mailed on March 20, 1992. Final notices which will include prior year undermarketings allocated to the farm are scheduled to be mailed on March 30, 1992.

Social Security

Anyone who receives Social Security benefits and who continues to work has to report his or her earnings to two government agencies—the Social Security Administration (SSA) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Earnings must be reported to IRS for tax purposes and to SSA because they may affect the amount of benefits payable.

The fact that both SSA and IRS have and April 15 filing date apparently cause some confusion about the need to file both reports," said Glyn Hammons, district manager. "Sometimes, Social Security beneficiaries think filing an income tax return takes care of the Social Security earnings report requirement," he said. "And while the IRS does share tax return information with SSA, the return does not provide all the information that SSA needs."

A second confusing

area, according to IRS officials, occurs when Social Security beneficiaries think that they do not need to file an income tax return if their income is under the Social Security earnings limit—in 1991, \$9,720 for people 65 through 69; \$7,080 for people under 65. But there is no connection between the Social Security earning limits and the requirement to file an income tax return.

A third confusing area arises when Social Security beneficiaries request an extension of the filing date for their income tax

return and assume that they will also get an extension of the filing date for their Social Security earnings report.

"Again, the two reports to our two agencies are not related," said Hammons. "And any action taken by one agency does not affect what is required by the other. However, we always try to do all we can to clear up this confusion and anyone with a question can call Social Security's national toll-free number—1-800-772-1213 or call our office. Our number is 698-1360."

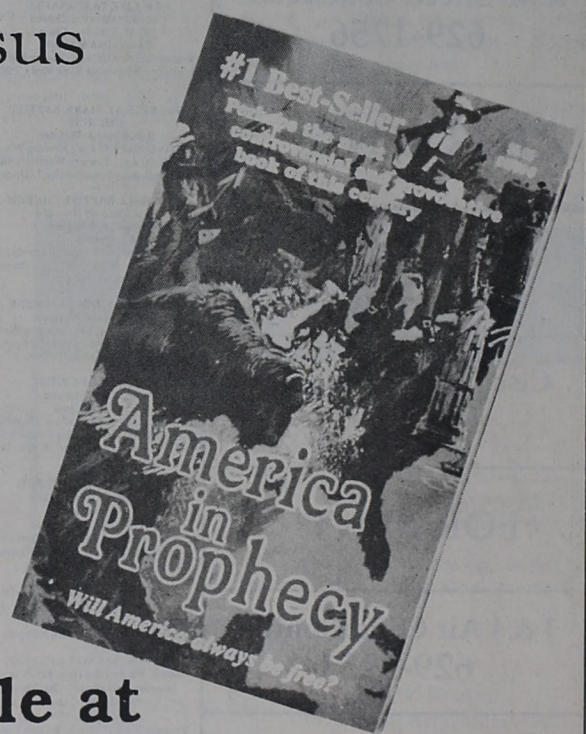
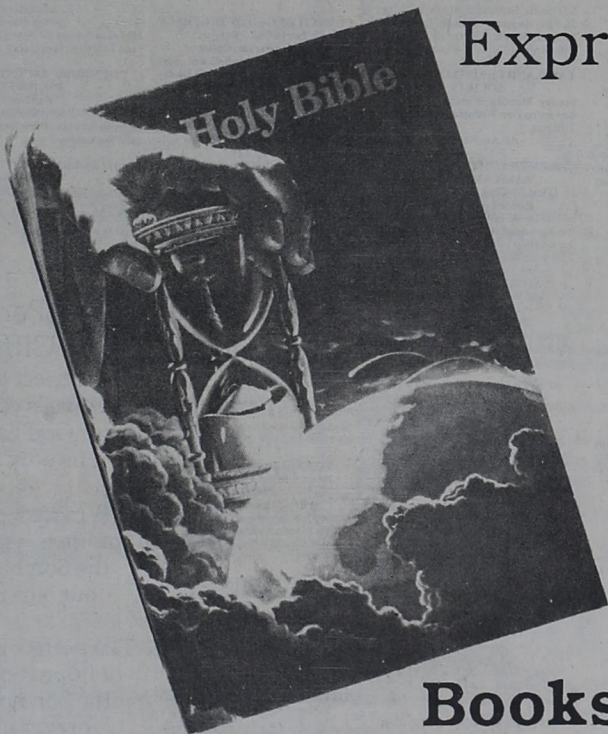
