Ranger Makes 'Short List' On Prison Proposal Site

Ranger Mayor Pro Tem Delbert Cozart announced Monday that the City of Ranger site has been selected for the "Short List" of proposed Texas Dept. of Criminal Justice locations.

The site under consideration is on the southeast side of Ranger, fronting on the access road of the Interstate.

"It's good to know we made it this far," Cozart told area citizens at Ranger City Hall. "Now there's other work to be done."

"This facility could mean 300 new jobs for Ranger and Eastland County."

Cozart said the Department of Criminal Justice informed him of the selection that morning. He said

he did not know how many other sites in Texas were on the "Short List", but he was certain that Breckenridge was included.

He said there would be a public meeting about the Ranger prison location on March 30. The place and time of the meeting will be announced. Representatives from the Department of Criminal Justice will attend.

Several weeks after this meeting final selections are expected to be made for 1,000-bed prisons and 500-bed Substance Abuse Treatment Centers.

"We will have to make a proposal summary to them, at the meeting," Cozart said. "There will be a brief overview, and equal time for opposition."

When asked if there was

any opposition, Cozart replied that he didn't know of any. He said that people from throughout the area had supported the proposal in many ways.

He thanked the people of Ranger and others from the county who had worked hard to bring the Ranger site to the attention of Criminal Justice officials.

"I especially want to thank Wendy Erwin, Ken Parrack, Shawn Wells and Patty Cozart for working two whole nights and several days to write up the proposal," Cozart said.

"Thanks are due to Senator Bob Glasgow and State Representatives Bob Turner and John Cook for their help. All have agreed to be here for the Public Meeting March 30."

Cozart expressed appreciation to the Chambers of Commerce of Ranger and Eastland for Resolutions of Support. He also thanked Eastland Memorial Hospital, the Ranger Fire Department and Eastland Fire Department. There was special thanks to Sheriff Ronnie White and Frances Palmer, a Ranger teacher.

Mrs. Palmer's Gifted and Talented Class took on the project of cleaning up the town before the Review Board of the Department of Criminal Justice toured Ranger February 12.

The Mayor Pro Tem said he also wanted to thank the people who wrote hundreds of letters in support of the prison.

Ranger 1 Of 47 On list For 51 Possible Sites

Other "short list" cities still in the running are Big Spring, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Mitchell County, Snyder and two in Abilene.

Sixteen communities statewide eliminated Monday.

The Texas Criminal Justice Board announced the "short list" of 47 cities representing 51 potential prison sites that are still under consideration for new prison units.

Amarillo, Lubbock, Abilene, and Carrizo Springs proposed two sites.

The winners will be announced April 10 at a special meeting of the board. All competing cities will conduct public hearings with prison officials prior to then.

At stake are at least 21 and possibly as many as 36 new prison units.

Josh Allen, chairman of the substance abuse subcommittee of the TDCJ board, said the total number of new units to be built is yet to be decided.

The new prisons will include three 2,250-bed maximum-security units, six 1,000-bed minimum-security units and an undetermined number of units to house and treat 12,000 substance abusers.

Allen said the legislation funding the new pris-

ons suggested six 1,000-bed and a dozen 500-bed substance abuse units, but it also presented options of purchasing and renovating existing facilities, such as unused private prisons or state hospitals scheduled for closure.

While strictly incarceration facilities can be placed virtually anywhere in the state, there will be several criteria involved in placing the substance abuse units, Allen said.

"They will have to be built close enough to a metropolitan area to ensure the availability of qualified personnel to staff the facilities," he said. "There are also family and after care issues to

be factored in."

Prison board Chairman Selden Hale said he was leaning toward breaking up a maximum-security unit into four separate smaller "pods" to be scattered around the state but would defer to the recommendation of the prison system staff.

Abilene officials submitted proposals that would provide land, utility hookups and cash and geared their proposals toward landing a substance abuse facility. The cash incentive would vary from a low of \$1 million to as much as \$4.25 million according to the size and type of unit, as well as which of the two sites the state chose to build on.

Ranger wasn't able to offer the most lucrative incentive package, but its proposal may have received a political boost.

When TDCJ staff arrived in Ranger to visit the proposed site, State Sen. Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville, told the prison officials that if they were looking to help the most depressed areas, they couldn't find a better place than Ranger to build a prison.

Breckenridge has made the short list each of the three times it has submitted bids for new prisons.

Other communities still in the running for a prison unit are:

Agua Dulce, Anderson County, Beaumont, Borger Bowie County,

Brownfield, Bryan-College Station, Burnet, Childress, Cuero, Dalhart, Dimmit, Edinburg, El Paso, Fannin County; Fort Stockton, Gatesville, Hereford, Hondo, Jasper, Karnes County, Liberty, Lufkin, Muleshoe, Odessa, Overton, Pampa, Plainview, Ranger, Refugio, Rusk; San Diego, Shamrock, Starr County, Upshur County, Wichita Falls, Willacy County and Wood County.

The 15 eliminated from contention include: Stamford, Aransas, Pass, Beeville, Brooks County, Hardin County, Itasca, Lamesa, Levelland, Littlefield, Lockhart, Marlin, Pleasanton, Seymour, Trans-Pecos, Woodville and Zapata.

Cisco Community Health Care Center To Offer Screening Service

One of the newest services in connection with the Cisco Community Health Care Clinic is the Breast Cancer and Cervical Cancer screening service available at no cost to those women who qualify economically.

The clinic is located in the E.L. Graham Hospital Building on West 8th Street in Cisco, and serves Eastland County with multi-purpose services.

Screening for cancer in women with x-ray and pap smears is done by registered nurses on Tuesday afternoons from 1 to 4 p.m.

The service is provided at no cost to women who do not have Medicare or Medicaid benefits, and fall in a category of moderate income.

Screening is sponsored by the Cross Timbers Health Clinics of De Leon.

Other services now available at the Graham Hospital building and available to Eastland County residents are the Head Start program for pre-school children, family planning, emergency homeless assistance, medical transportation, and commodity distribution, all administered by Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., which also supplies other services.

Counseling for adult and juvenile individuals and families is provided by Pastoral Care and Counseling of Abilene on Thursdays.

The Cisco Emergency Medical Service operates its two ambulance units from its office in the building with four qualified and certified EMT personnel providing emergency

transport of injured and ill area residents.

Appointments for the cancer screening services may be made by calling the E.L. Graham business office at 442-3951.

Major Highway Improvement Projects Set

The following list contains highway improvement projects by the Texas Department of Transportation upcoming in the near future.

Plans are being prepared to widen F.M. 570 from I.H. 20 in Eastland, 2.9 miles East to the intersection of F.M. 2214. The roadway is to be widened to a forty foot wide pavement and the alignment is to be improved. The County of Eastland is to begin considering the purchase of the additional right-of-way in March, while the construction is scheduled for the Fall of 1992.

The roadside parks on I.H. 20 West of Cisco are to receive improvements to aid in drainage and safety along the curb. Curbs are to be repaired, underdrains are to be installed to remove water from the roadway, and general aesthetic work is to be performed this summer.

Several preventive maintenance contracts are spread throughout the County.

Selected roadways will receive seal coats, hotmix overlays, and slurry seals.

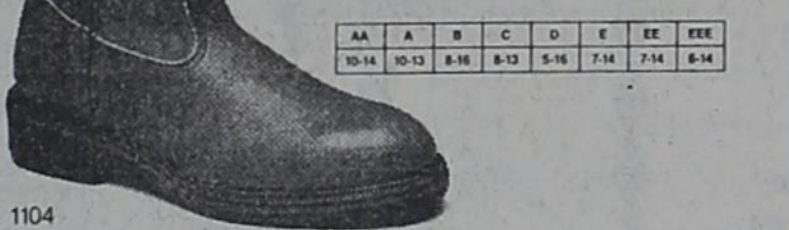

Texas Severe Weather Rules

Lightning Safety Rules

- When a thunderstorm threatens, move inside a substantial building or a vehicle.
- Inside a building, avoid using the telephone or electrical appliances. Lightning can strike near a building and travel through telephone or electrical lines into the building.

- Get out of and away from open water.
- If outside with no time to reach a safe building or vehicle, follow these rules: Do not stand underneath natural lightning rods such as tall, isolated trees in open areas. Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape as you would do if you were standing on a hilltop, in an open field, on the beach, or fishing from a small boat.

- If you are isolated in a level, open field and you begin to feel your hair stand on end, indicating that lightning may be about to strike, drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your heels. Make as low and as small a target of yourself as possible, but do not lie flat on the ground.

Flash Flood Safety Rules

- Know where high ground is and how to get there quickly.
- Watch for rising water levels.

- Do not try to drive through flooded areas.
- Abandon your vehicle if water beds rising over the road and head for high ground immediately.
- Be cautious at night. It is harder to recognize the danger of flash flooding then.

Tornado Safety Rules

A **TORNADO WATCH** means that tornado development is possible. Keep a watchful eye on the sky for threatening weather, and stay tuned to radio, television, or NOAA Weather Radio for the latest weather information.

A **TORNADO WARNING** means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Persons in the path of the storm should seek shelter immediately, preferably on the lowest floor of a substantial building.

IN HOMES: A basement offers the greatest safety. In homes without a basement, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, and in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Stay away from windows. Do not attempt to open windows.

IN SCHOOLS, HOSPITALS, AND SHOPPING CENTERS: Move to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floor are best. If the building is not of rein-

forced construction, go to a nearby one that is. Stay out of auditoriums, gyms, and other structures with long, wide free-span roofs.

IN YOUR CAR: Do not try to outrun a tornado. If available, leave your car and get into the nearest ditch or depression until the tornado passes. Cover your head with your hands.

IN MOBILE HOMES: Mobile homes and trailers are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds or tornadoes are possible. Mobile home communities and trailer parks should have a community storm shelter. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer and take cover in a ditch or depression.

Thunderstorm Downbursts

Downburst. You may have heard this fairly new term tossed around lately. What exactly is a thunderstorm downburst? Simply put, a downburst is the outrush of wind from a mature thunderstorm. So if you have ever felt a wind gust from a thunderstorm, you have

experienced a type of downburst. But usually, downburst is applied to a sudden and violent outburst of wind from a thunderstorm.

A mature thunderstorm has two main areas. One is the updraft where large amounts of warm, moist air are drawn into the storm. The other area is the downdraft. This is an area of rain and downward moving cool air. The rain cools the air around it making it heavier. This rain cooled air accelerates downward producing a potentially damaging outburst of wind.

Typically, a downdraft from a thunderstorm will reach a speed of 30 to 40 miles an hour, but they have been clocked around 100 miles an hour. Strong downbursts are often mistaken for tornadoes. They can produce extensive damage and are often accompanied by a roaring sound similar to a tornado. Downbursts can easily overturn mobile homes, tear roofs off houses, and topple trees.

Downbursts are usually subdivided into macrobursts or microbursts

according to their horizontal scale of damaging winds. A macroburst is a large downburst with damaging winds extending in excess of 2.5 miles. A microburst is a small downburst with damaging winds extending only 2.5 miles or less. Downbursts are quite

common in North Texas, some of which have been quite strong. For example, on August 2, 1985, a downburst produced wind speeds of 81 MPH at DFW Airport and resulted in the fatal crash of Delta Flight 191. On May 24, 1986, a downburst produced wind

speeds of 91 MPH at KXAS-TV in Fort Worth. On this same date, apparent water loading and strong downburst winds

caused the roof of a Fort Worth bowling alley to collapse, injuring 14 people.

Aspirin with caffeine was 23 to 44 percent more effective than aspirin alone for patients with sore throat due to acute tonsillitis, in a study reported in Archives of Internal Medicine.

The sweet smell of heliotropin, similar to vanilla, seems to relax patients so that they can more easily stay still for a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) test, doctors found at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York.

Vitamins and minerals should be locked up, just like other drugs. Children are at risk for accidental-overdose poisonings from them.

Three ounces of oatmeal or two of oat bran a day - every day - do help cut cholesterol, when used as part of a low-fat, low-cholesterol diet, the Journal of the American Medical Association reports.

Women who take estrogen after menopause can cut their risk of heart disease almost in half, a large-scale, long-term study at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston found. Benefits outweigh risks, doctors say.

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Sadowski Says Stenholm Is "Out Of Touch" With People

Jeannie Sadowski, Republican nominee for the 17th Congressional district, says Congressman Charles Stenholm's role in the check-bouncing scandal is another sign he is out of touch with the people back home.

"This episode is another example of members of Congress living by different rules than the rest of us," Mrs. Sadowski said. "When you and I bounce a check or have an overdraft, we're charged for it. If we bounced as many as Congress did, we might go to jail."

Last year, when news about the scandal first became public, Stenholm issued a statement saying he did not bounce any checks at the special House of Representatives bank in Washington. Then, a week later, he admitted he did bounce checks, she said.

Last week, Stenholm said he bounced 50-100 checks but did not release the exact amount of checks or the total dollar

amount, she said.

"Will this be an issue in the campaign? You bet it will," Mrs. Sadowski said. "The check-bouncing, along with Stenholm's vote for gun control, and his vote against the flag amendment, are signs he is out of touch with the people back home."

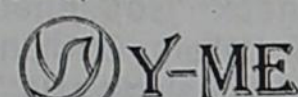

AUSTIN - House Speaker Gib Lewis last week proposed massive, forced consolidation of school districts to satisfy a court order to equalize education funding.

The lame-duck speaker's proposed legislation would reduce the number of independent school districts from 1,066 to 188. The new megadistricts would use the boundary lines of the year-old county education districts.

"Consolidation is the ultimate, permanent solution to the issues of equality and school finance," Lewis said, endorsing the idea that is viewed by many as politically risky as a state income tax.

Gov. Ann Richards is expected to call a special session in mid-May to overhaul the present system of school funding which was ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court.

Balance Rich and Poor

Lewis said consolidation would not require a constitutional amendment, would balance funding among rich and poor districts, and save an estimated \$422 million next year by trimming bureaucrats.

Lewis said his plan would probably close some rural schools. But he said it would provide every child in Texas with equal access to education funds.

The last forced consolidation of school districts occurred in 1949, when the Gilmer-Akin education reform law eliminated 2,000 school districts, leaving 2,800.

Opponents of the idea fear it will diminish local control of school districts; in metropolitan counties, it could lump 300,000 to 500,000 students into one district.

"I don't like it myself," said Lewis, "but at the same time we have to realize that we must move on. Nothing else would be as fair."

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock reserved judgement on Lewis' plan, explaining that he is working on one of his own. But Bullock said Lewis' plan is "a real solution to the school finance problem and it will solve the problem. People in Texas are in no mood for taxes. It doesn't raise taxes."

Buchanan Warned

Days after the eye of the primaries passed through Texas, both parties tried to bring the inner-healing process.

National GOP chairman Richard Bond, touring the Astrodome where Republicans will hold their national convention, warned challenger Pat Buchanan to quit bashing President Bush or risk being shunned.

"It's time for the healing to begin and the fighting to stop," Bond advised. "Turn out the lights, the party's over."

Bond also said David Duke wasn't welcome at the convention. "He's a racist and a bigot, and we don't want him."

Buchanan wasn't warning; he told the press he would not endorse President Bush if Bond stayed as party chairman.

Clinton Likes Bentsen

Meanwhile, Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said Democrat front-runner Bill Clinton would endorse U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, if Clinton's own campaign is derailed.

Mauro, who is Clinton's campaign manager in Texas, told party leaders at the Texas AFL-CIO headquarters that Clinton has twice given Bentsen that same message.

Should another scandal knock Clinton out of the race, which Mauro said was not going to happen, it is a real possibility that Clinton would ask his delegates to endorse Bentsen.

Castration Request Halted

A Houston sex offender who asked to be castrated in lieu of a life prison sentence has changed his mind, a lawyer for the man's family said last week.

Steven Allen Butler said that instead of undergoing the surgery, he wants to go to trial on a charge of aggravated sexual assault of a

13-year-old girl, according to his lawyer, Charles Freeman.

Earlier, State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, said he would seek the impeachment of Judge Mike McSpadden if the castration took place.

Butler, 28, was on probation for molesting a seven-year-old girl when he was arrested last April in connection with assaulting the teen-ager. He is in jail without bond.

Wilson and other black activists said McSpadden's decision was racist; Butler is a black man.

McSpadden responded: "Based upon Mr. Wilson's performance in the Legislature, he'd better get some help in drawing up an impeachment order."

Other Highlights

■ The 3rd Court of Appeals upheld a lower court ruling that the state's sodomy law — which outlaws gay and lesbian sex — is unconstitutional because it violates the Texas right to privacy. Attorney General Dan Morales said he would probably appeal the decision to the Texas Supreme Court, but Gov. Richards applauded the ruling, saying the law "hasn't any business being in the statute books."

■ Texas could lose up to \$105 million in federal highway funds if it doesn't remove 9,000 billboards which do not comply with the Highway Beautification Act. Owners of illegal signs are supposed to remove them by June 18.

■ Comptroller John Sharp said the new lottery operator, GTECH Corp. of Rhode Island, will hire 500 employees for 11 regional offices to conduct the state lottery, starting before July 1.

Mobile Cancer Unit To Be In Eastland

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman for Transamerican Diagnostic Services, Inc. in Midland, Texas "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women.

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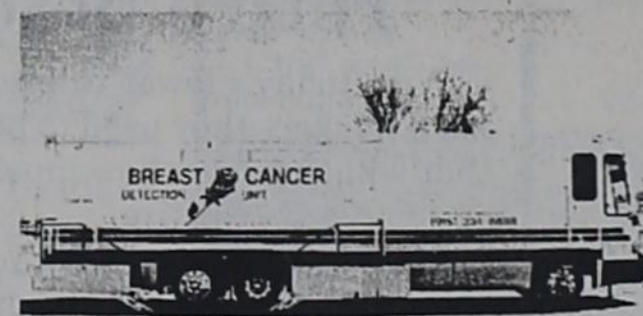

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$70.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

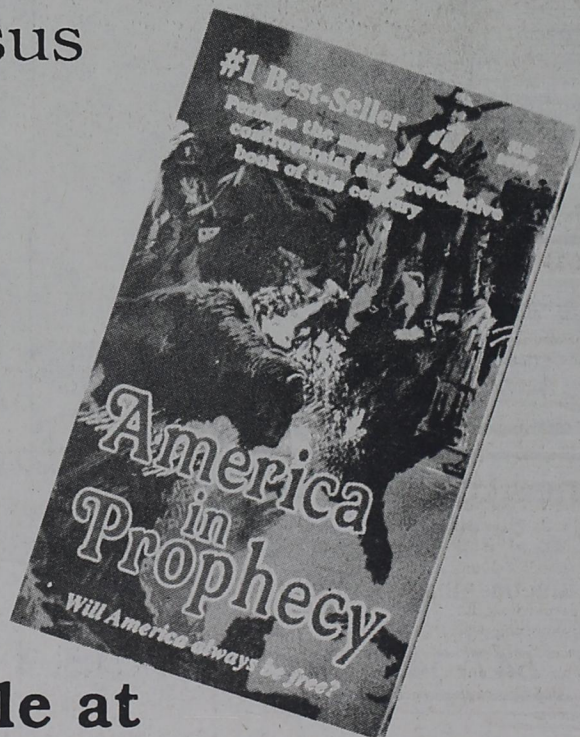
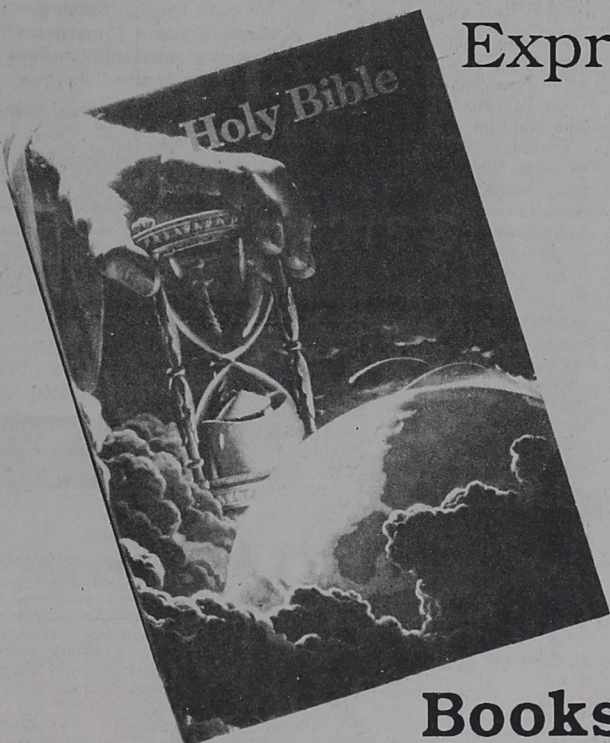

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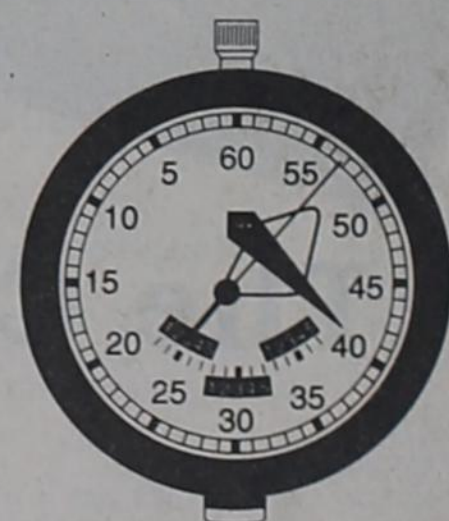
