



# Junior High Track Baird Cub Relays

The Ranger Jr. High track teams traveled to Baird on Saturday to run in the Baird Cub Relays. Four other teams were represented there. The Ranger teams performed very well. The boys team won the meet by two points. The girls team was second.

The boys division proved to be the most exciting of the day, because the Ranger team went into the final event, the mile relay, with only a six point lead over the host team. Both teams knew that the final results of the race could determine the overall winner of the boys division. The only thing the Bulldogs had to do was to stay close to the Cubs, and that they did all the way. Rising Star won the race by several meters, but there was a battle for second place between the Bulldogs and the Cubs. The Cubs edged out the Bulldogs on the last lap, but we were third, which was good enough for a two point victory.

An unusual thing happened during the day. Only one Bulldog won first place in an event. That was J. Speer who won the discus with a throw of 109'9". What racked up points for the Bulldogs were seconds, thirds, and fourth place finishes in many of the events. The 400 meter relay (Chris McClain, Cody Fox, Michael Linden, and John Chancellor) placed second with a respectable time of 51.20 seconds. Cody Jones was second in the 800 meter run with the time of 2 minutes 31.47 seconds. Scott Dunson also ran the 800 meter run and finished fifth. In the 110 meter high hurdles, Ronnie Bush finished second with the time of 19.75 seconds. Todd Cantwell was sixth with the time of 22.79 seconds. Willie Hamilton ran the 100 meter dash and won his heat with the time of 13.24 seconds. Willie was fourth overall. In the 400 meter run, Chris McClain and Cody Fox ran and placed second and fourth respectively. Chris had a time of 62.88 seconds, and Cody's time was 66.29. In the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, Ronnie Bush,

Todd Cantwell, and Cody Jones ran well. Ronnie was second with the time of 51.45 seconds. Cody's time was 54.59 seconds, and Todd's was 56.39 seconds. In the 200 meter dash, Michael Linden, Scott Dunson, and Artie Fron ran well. Michael was second with a time of 27.97 seconds.

Scott's time was 31.31 seconds, and Artie's time was 38.41 seconds. Cody Jones and Artie Fron ran the 1600 meter run. Cody led all but the last 150 meters and finished second with the time of 5 minutes 56.40 seconds. The 1600 meter relay team ran a time of 4 minutes 13.50 seconds.

In the field events the Bulldogs did well also. Besides winning the only first place ribbon, J. Speer was second in the shot put with a throw of 31'11 1/2". Chad Beighly and Rob Ewing also put the shot but didn't place. Todd Cantwell, fourth with 87'1/4" and Rob Ewing, third at 95'3" threw the discus. Chris McClain, Cody Fox, and Michael Linden competed in the long jump. Chris finished fourth at 15'4", Cody was third with 15'10", and Michael was second with 16'2". The same three competed in the triple jump, and Chris was second with a 33' jump. Cody was third with a 31'4" jump and Michael was only 1" behind and in fourth place.

In the girls division, the Lady Bulldogs won the 800 meter relay for their best event of the day. The team was made up of Tiffany Martinez, Lauren Erwin, Elizabeth Galindo, and Allyson Lang. Their time was 2 minutes 14.83 seconds. In the 400 meter relay (Kim Underwood, Elizabeth Galindo, Allyson Lang, and Carrie Braddock), the Lady Bulldogs ran a time of 62.10 seconds for a fourth place finish. Shay Hudson, Rita Vasquez, and Brenna Carey ran the 800 meter run. Shay finished fourth with the time of 3 minutes 29.07 seconds. Rita was sixth with the time of 3:34.02. Brenna's time was 3:48.23. April Williamson, Kim Underwood, and Shay Hudson ran the

100 meter hurdles. April was second with the time of 19.06 seconds. Kim's time was 20.97 and was third in her heat. Shay's time was 22.80. Carrie Braddock, Allyson Lang, and Amanda Wheat ran the 100 meter dash. Carrie was second in her heat with a time of 15.25 seconds. Allyson was also second in her heat with the time of 15.81 seconds. Amanda was fourth in her heat with the time of 16.24 seconds. Tiffany Martinez, Rita Vasquez, and Brenna Carey ran the 400 meter run. Tiffany placed second with the time of 1 minute 19.19 seconds. Rita was fourth with the time of 1 minute 26.47 seconds. April Williamson and Shay Hudson ran the 300 meter intermediate hurdles. April was second with the time of 61.50 seconds. Shay was sixth with the time of 73.55 seconds. Christy Spadoni, Lauren Erwin, and Amanda Wheat ran the 200 meter dash. Christy was fifth with the time of 34.36 seconds. Lauren was sixth with the time of 34.61 seconds. Amanda was fifth in her heat with the time of 40.70 seconds. Mandy Cunningham, Tiffany Martinez, Elizabeth Galindo, and April Williamson ran the 1600 meter relay and placed second with the time of 5 minutes 31.41 seconds.

In the field events, Lady Bulldogs also racked up some points. Jodi Thomas, Amy Pack, and Mandy Cunningham throw the shot put. Jodi was second with a put of 24'6". Amy was third with a put of 24'4 1/2". Mandy was fourth with a put of 22'4 1/2". Elizabeth Jackson and Jennifer Copeland throw the discus, but did not place. Elizabeth's best throw was 39'3", while Jennifer's best was 43'9". Allyson Lang, Amanda Wheat, and Rita Vasquez competed in the long jump. Allyson and Amanda tied for sixth place. Shay Hudson, Mandy Cunningham, and April Williamson triple jumped. April was third with a jump of 25'4". Shay was sixth with a jump of 23'3/4". Mandy was fifth with a 24' jump.

Next Saturday, March the 28, the Jr. High Bulldogs will be running at Gorman. The field events will begin at 8:30.

# Petition Filed For New Pct. 3 Commissioners Election

A petition for a new election for Eastland County Commissioner Pct. 3 was filed by Dick Burgess March 24 in 91st District Court.

The petition is styled Dick Burgess vs. L. T. Owen, who is the incumbent Commissioner of Pct. 3 Saul Pullman is the Attorney for Burgess.

Burgess and Owen are opponents for the Democratic nominee for Commissioner in the Party Primary Election held March 10.

The suit alleges, in part, that in the election for Pct. 3, 414 votes appeared to have been cast for Contestant (Burgess) and 426 votes appeared to have been cast for the Contestee (Owen), as shown by the results of said election.

It goes to say that "A recount was requested by the Contestant and was duly and legally held on the 16th day of March, 1992. That at the recount 413 votes appeared to have been cast for the Contestant, and 426 votes appeared to have been cast for the Contestee, as shown by the canvass of said recount."

The grounds stated for the petition are "that among the votes counted for the contestee upon the

canvass of the election, there were numerous votes cast illegally for the reason that many persons casting their vote were not qualified to vote in said election because they did not reside in Eastland County Commissioner Pct. No. 3."

The petition lists 31 names of individuals who are said to be in that group.

It continues by saying that the number of illegal votes is greater than the number of votes necessary to change the outcome of the election.

The Contestant (Burgess) requests the court to declare the March 10 election void and order a new election for Eastland County Commissioner Pct. 3.

L. T. Owen is cited to appear, and notified to file an answer to the petition. He is expected to file his answer soon.

Reports are that under the State Election Code a Judge who resides in Eastland County cannot decide on this case. The Judge who hears the suit will have several options: he can reverse the results of the March 10 election for Commissioner, he can throw out the appeal by Burgess, or call for a new election.



The Program leader will be Mary Lou Frost, with hostesses Mmes. Frost, Greenwood, Payne and Smith.

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

### PECAN BUDDING & GRAFTING SCHOOL

Budding and grafting wood will be available for sale by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

### LAWN CARE

Sound research over the past 25 years has helped expose some of the fallacies of lawn care. To help make your lawn care efforts more productive, here are some of the more common fallacies:

**FALLACY NO. 1:** "Shade is not a problem for a lawn. You can overcome the effects of shade with fertilizer and water." Unfortunately, shade very much is a problem with lawns. Sometimes parts of lawns will be affected for the first time because the tree canopy has become more dense over the years.

The leaf shape and leaf arrangement of grasses are such that they need high light intensities to absorb adequate energy (radiation) to carry on photosynthesis. At low light intensities, even so-called shade-tolerant grasses such as St. Augustine and tall fescue have low levels of photosynthesis activity. As a result, the grasses produce only minimum amounts of the carbohydrates needed for growth. Reserve carbohydrates stored in stem, crowns and rhizomes of grasses are utilized to produce leaf tissue. In grasses, root growth is secondary to leaf growth and roots suffer when energy (food) reserves are depleted.

Under continuous low light intensities reserve carbohydrates are depleted, roots deteriorate, leaf blades elongate and

enlarge to absorb more light and the growth of the grass (new shoots or runners) slows significantly. Under those conditions any additional stress such as disease, drought or severe cold may kill the grass. As an example, the freeze in December, 1989, killed most of the St. Augustine grass in shaded lawns (unless it was protected from the north wind).

Fertilizer, water or anything else you can put on the lawn will not overcome the effects of shade. Increasing light penetration by thinning trees or removing trees in the only practice that will help the grass.

Grasses differ in their tolerance to shade. Among the warm season grasses, St. Augustine grass is the most shade tolerant. Tall fescue, a cool season turfgrass, will persist under deciduous shade trees where St. Augustine grass dies out. Even though the shade tolerance of the two grasses are similar, tall fescue rejuvenates in late winter and early spring before the tree canopy recovers.

**FALLACY NO. 2:** "Grass clippings cause thatch." Many people routinely catch and remove grass clippings because they think the clippings are the cause of thatch. Grass clippings produced by mowing consist primarily of leaf blades that readily decompose if left on the lawn. Clippings from lawns that are mowed at least once a week during the growing season contribute very little to thatch. The exception might be on lawns that are excessively fer-

tilized. The abundance of clippings on excessively fertilized lawns can lead to thatch problems.

Thatch consists primarily of plant tissue that is high in lignin (fiber) such as stolons (stems), roots, crowns and leaf sheaths (the lower part of a grass leaf that is not removed by mowing). Those tissues accumulate over time as a function of growth rate. Grasses that produce abundant stolon (or tiller) growth such as the hybrid bermudagrasses, zoysia and bluegrass should be fertilized only moderately to reduce thatch accumulation.

Regular mowing (5 to 6 day intervals) and moderate fertilization reduces potential thatch problems and eliminates the need to remove grass clippings.

**FALLACY NO. 3:** "You can mow too often." Some people think that mowing too often wears out the grass. Not true.

The best looking and most functional turfgrass is found on golf greens - sites that are mowed daily. Some, twice daily. The more often grass is mowed at recommended heights, the more dense it becomes, the greater residual leaf area becomes and the less stress the grass suffers. The only things frequent mowing wears out are the people and equipment during the mowing.

Mow your lawn every day and you will have the best-looking lawn in the neighborhood. A more practical schedule however, would be to mow at 5- to 6-day intervals.

# Heavy Africanized Honey Bee Swarming Season Predicted

Like corn kernels in a popper, Africanized honey bees will begin to spill out of winter hives as warm weather arrives.

Because Texas has had excessive rainfall and a temperate winter, a heavy increase in Africanized honey bee populations is expected, officials who monitor the bee said.

"We expect the amount of swarming activity to be a nightmare," said Elba Quintero of Harlingen, head of the South Texas AHB program for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. "We've already had a positive (AHB) identification 15 miles southwest of Corpus Christi."

That AHB find comes about two months earlier than expected. The first AHB swarm last year was not found until April. Honey bees tend to swarm, or leave a hive en masse to find a new nesting site, mostly in the spring.

More than 450 AHB swarms have been detected in Texas since the first migrating swarm from Mexico was discovered near Hidalgo in October 1990, according to APHIS documents.

Paul Jackson, Texas Apiary Inspection Service chief, expects the increase in swarm numbers to begin in late March.

"After the weather breaks into warm temperatures, it usually is about three weeks later that we begin to see a lot of swarming," Jackson said.

With warmer weather, honey bees begin to rear

brood which needs about three weeks to hatch, Jackson explained.

"Colonies begin to get crowded as the bees bring in a lot of pollen and nectar and new bees hatch out," Jackson said. "That's what starts the swarming."

Scientists at the USDA-Agricultural Research Service in Weslaco also believe South Texas is in for "a real boomer this spring."

"We are preparing for March to be wild in terms of collecting swarms," said Dr. Anita Collins, lead scientist. "If we get a hard freeze that kills the blooms, then it would delay the swarming for a while."

In the ARS research bee yard near the Rio Grande River, Collins said, recent samples showed that about 2 percent of the 122 colonies contain some level of AHB genes. She explained that regular honeybee queens marked in those colonies last

spring have been replaced by daughters who had mated with some AHBs.

"What this means is that beekeepers need to be looking closely at their colonies and right now," Collins advised.

More of the swarms detected this season probably will be AHB, said Dr. John Thomas, Texas Agricultural Extension Service entomologist, and that is normal as the insect infests a region.

"That probably will be the case for about three years, because it'll take that long for the insect to reach its carrying capacity for the region," Thomas said. Carrying capacity refers to the nesting sites, food and water necessary to support the existing population.

Although a heavy swarming season appar-

ently is on the way, Jackson said, people can take some precautions in adapting to life with the AHB.

"We aren't going to stop the swarming," Jackson said. "But people can keep their eyes and ears open and report swarms to local officials."

Jackson said people can call exterminators to remove swarms, but a key is to not delay.


"If a swarm enters the walls of a building, for example, don't let them stay for two or three weeks before reporting it," he said. "By that time, the colony will have brood, and they always are more defensive with brood."

The AHB has been found in 18 counties in South Texas and may reach San Antonio and approach Houston this year

### PROJECT WILD OPENS DOOR TO OUT-DOOR CLASSROOM

Project Wild offers teachers and educational program that can take them and their students outdoors to experience conservation and environmental concepts firsthand.

## And There By Hangs A Tale

A brief essay on software, firmware, and hardware from an "Oh my God!" Humanistic point of view.

As we ponder and observe the onrush of the 'end of days' on this tiny island in God's immense Universe, does anyone else stop and think about the absurdity of all the people who seem to spend their time looking for someone to blame their misfortunes on? It seems to me that television has produced at least one undeniable change in our civilization: the fiction and fancy produced by Hollywood writers of great (and sometimes not-so-great) talent have become so deeply engraved in the individual subconscious of even the most educated and actuarial of minds, not to mention the vast majority of just-along-for-the-riders in the game of life, that everyone has a pat answer:

Its "the government's fault" or "those damn Japanese" are to blame or it's the "Liberal politicians" that are ruining us. As a point of information, life has rarely dealt me or

anyone else I know, a pat hand.

Problems seem to attach themselves to just about everyone, whether he be the President of the still-most-powerful nation on this planet or an ordinary "working stiff" like me. Pain and suffering never seem to be in short supply.

In fact, quite the contrary, the problem of pain is something that has defeated many an aspiration, poisoned many a worthwhile dream. Yet folks still look for a villain, for someone or something to blame because things just don't ever seem to turn out like the Hollywood happy ending they've come to expect.

These so-called answers are a desperate bid to avoid that most painful of procedures: facing oneself. What I mean by that is, well, whenever I look in the mirror, that funny-looking creature that stares back at me has got to be someone's idea of a joke! I mean, that can't be me... well if it is me, then who, who, who can I blame it on? Maybe if I pray real hard, God will send me some help to make every-

thing all okay again and I won't have to acknowledge the truth, assuming I can even start to separate out all of the lies. Or else if they (you know, THEM) happen to have fewer atomic warheads than I do perhaps I can go over and stomp 'em into the ground. That'll certainly put an end to their meddling. And make me feel much, much better.

All of which is an attempt to point out that fundamental truth: If a person regularly fills his or her mind with garbage, eventually that will be all it contains.

While it is quite true there are "bad" people (thought they never see themselves that way) who enjoy pain, especially another being's pain, and there are those who have become so isolated they don't even care; most of the time misfortune is the result of an event chain so complex that the ordinary person can't even begin to see all of the "links."

Something similar is true in computer programming. Not being omniscient, the programmer must deal with a very small, closed system in order to define all of the combinations of events his

solution must be able to address. This is why most computer programs are eventually found to lack some capability we think is essential to the task they were designed for. Either the programmer never finished his/her work because of time/money deadlines, or he was basically inept, or time and use demonstrate the obvious lack that wasn't quite so obvious back when the programming process was under way. There are few better examples of tedium than trying to explain to an idiot-savant (the computer) how to perform an involved series of tasks. This is at least one way to describe what a programmer does. Curiously enough, it has been demonstrated that instructing a machine to play chess is far easier than teaching one to answer the phone in an acceptable manner or pick up a nickel off the floor.

The extent of one's own limitations is never more obvious than when attempting this kind of process and may be why many programmers tend to carry a chip on their shoulder: they're afraid someone else will discover

how limited their work actually is. A more appropriate response might be to offer sincere and humble thanks to God when the thing they've labored on relentlessly finally works (sometimes)!

Human institutions such as family, schools, churches, hospitals, commerce, or government are the framework that define our society because they constitute the majority of peaceful day-to-day human interaction. Keeping in mind the imperfect nature of all such institutions, we find their inertia to be at best both a blessing and a curse. Competition gives rise to change... as resources-per-competitor continue to shrink, both the competition for them and the accompanying rate of change increase geometrically. Our institutions, when they work as intended, act as a stabilizer to everyday life. We are being tested: can our institutions adapt to change and still keep stable? Only if we support them, take a hand in their reforging. They are the channel, the "firmware" we must rely on yet never take for granted.

If you think that you don't have time for any of this, you're already beaten. Instead find a way to contribute; the situation won't improve unless you improve it. Just

because it's hard doesn't mean you should give up; I submit to you that the only realistic way to approach a really big problem is to simply start in. If you fail, learn from it and hit it again. A practical approach, but this is where secular humanism invariably fails, just like a computer program fails when the task is begun without initializing essential variables. Before you start, and at every re-try: remember to pray. As I implied before, asking Him to make everything alright is garbage—it's not up to us to say how things would turn out. Instead, ask Him to guide you; ask for strength and inspiration.

As we approach the anniversary of Texas' independence perhaps each of us should consider the faith in God and the strength He gave them, of those 'simple' people, farmers and businessmen, their wives and precious children, faced with ruthless oppression by a distant alien government; who made some hard choices to die rather than surrender—to fight rather than submit.

I leave with a quote from Temple Houston Morrow, grandson of General Sam Houston: "God grant that we may hold to the faith of our fathers in spite of all the foreignisms, false philosophies and atheistic doc-

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## LBJ Eulogy

(ED. NOTE: The following was delivered by Mr. I. W. Ussery as a funeral eulogy at the American Church in Teheran, Iran, Jan. 27, 1973, upon the occasion of the death of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson.)

Friends,  
Your friend, and mine - and my Fellow Texan, Lyndon Baines Johnson, 36th President of the United States of America, whose untimely passing on the twenty-second of January removed from the ranks of world-renowned statesmen an outstanding leader, and left the United States for the first time in forty years without a living former President was born on a farm between Stonewall and Johnson City, Texas on the twenty-seventh of

August, 1908. His father was a farmer and a state legislator, and was of British ancestry.

The late President Johnson received his elementary and secondary schooling in the public schools of Texas, and was graduated from Southwest Texas State Teachers' College.

Following a short career as a teacher, Mr. Johnson entered politics. "LBJ," by which nickname he liked to be known, and by which he became known to the world over was once heard to say in a campaign speech in the earlier years of his political career - "Politics is a profession. It is a profession of service. In no other field do I know a greater opportunity of service to one's fellow citizen than in that offered

by dedication to politics." If that was LBJ's philosophy; he lived up to it. He served his fellow man to the greatest extent within the range of his capability. It was reflected in his foreign policy during his presidency.

Odd thing, his attitude toward politics. LBJ and I were rural school teachers during the same period of time. I chose to leave teaching for the field of engineering - he went into politics, and became President of the United States.

Elected to the House of Representatives in the Congress of the United States in 1936, he served with distinction throughout the twelve years he held that office.

At the outbreak of hostilities in 1941 Mr. Johnson, who was a Naval Reservist was the first Congressman to enter the armed service of his country following Pearl Harbor.

At the end of his military service he returned to his seat in the Congress which he held until his election to the Senate in 1948.

In the United States Senate he became known to many Americans as one of the most outstanding Majority Leaders of all time. He left the Senate in 1960 to win election to the office of Vice President - running with his fellow Senator, John F. Kennedy.

Within an hour of the assassination of President Kennedy in November, 1963, Mr. Johnson took the oath of office as President under dramatic, tragic and trying circumstances unequalled in the history of the country. Elected to the office of President by an unprecedented majority in 1964, Lyndon Johnson continued vigorously with the programs to which he had devoted such effort during his service in the Senate; civil rights, equal voting rights, medical care for the aged, education

and the war on poverty. Having been a leader in the space exploration program, during his Senatorial service, he continued in his efforts to keep the United States in the position of leadership in that field.

Mr. Johnson was a leader of unquestioned courage, and a president with a depth of sincere feeling for his country and for its people. Known as having introduced "shirt-sleeve politics" by virtue of his insisting upon removing his coat in tropical climates and mixing with the people along the roadsides. This personal interest was demonstrated in his travels which made him the most traveled president until his time.

When he visited Iran some twelve years ago, he insisted upon leaving the urban centers for a tour of the countryside. "I want to get into the boondocks. I want to have a feel for the people who make the country." Was his comment.

Along the road which took him a hundred and fifty kilometers from Teheran, he stopped to visit with two men who were excavating a qanat. Farther along the way he asked to be allowed to stop and to talk to a shepherd who was tending his flock near the roadside. That was the LBJ who became known to the people of the world as "the ordinary man's leader." The story of the Pakistani camel driver is well-known.

Lyndon B. Johnson left the American people a legacy of leadership in the general field of human welfare, of concern for one's fellow man; and he left to the nations of the world the challenge to follow that leadership. It is unfortunate that he could not have lived to see the realization of one of the outstanding goals of his career...the end of the war in S.E.A.

Let us consider this quotation from the comments of President Nixon... "Many of our people, when Johnson first took office, doubted the very future of this Republic, and many people abroad were fearful about the future of the American Democracy. Lyndon Johnson rose above the doubt and fear to hold this nation on course until we rediscovered our faith in ourselves."

In Epilogue:  
It is my opinion that the personal creed of LBJ was expressed by Alfred Leigh Hunt in his immortal poem in which was said... "Abou bin Ahmed (may his tribe increase)

Awoke one night from a deep dream of peace,  
And saw, within the moonlight in his room,  
Making it rich, and like a lily in bloom,  
An angel writing in a book of gold:-  
Exceeding peace had made bin Ahmed bold,  
And to the presence in his room he said,  
"What writest thou?" -  
The vision raised its head,

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
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
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

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## Ranger Junior College Band Announces Spring Concert Season

## Texas Department Of Human Resources

The state spent a total of \$9,609,245 last year for major welfare programs in Eastland County, according to Ray L. Dunavant, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$1,163,535 spent for families and children and \$1,034,488 for the aged and disabled for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, X-ray and other services. Also, \$65,809 was spent for families and children and \$441,348 for the aged and disabled in Eastland County for prescribed medicines. Nursing home costs of approximately \$4,742,432 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care

for Aged and Disabled spent \$485,696," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$1,420,544 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$255,393. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

In addition to services and assistance to low-income residents of the county, the department extended protective services to 24 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger to children.

There were 61 investigations in adult protective services. These investigations concerned reports of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of elderly or disabled adults.

## Statements From TXMHMR Commissioner Dennis Jones Regarding Task Force Decision On State School Closure Issue

The following is a statement from Dennis Jones, commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, regarding the announcement that Mexia State School and Travis State School have been recommended for closure. The announcement came from the Facility Review Task Force, which was appointed by Gov. Ann Richards to recommend which if any state schools for persons with mental retardation should be closed. Gov. Richards will have up to 20 days to either reject all or part of the task force's recommendation or take no action, in which case the recommendation would take effect.

The following is Commissioner Jones' statement

"The announcement today stirs a host of mixed emotions. On one hand it moves the Department forward in resolving a long-standing lawsuit and closer to being in control of our own programs by removing the federal court's intervention. On the other hand if the Governor approves, there will be the closure of two state schools and that is a distressing thought for families and employees.

"The next step is for the final recommendation to be reviewed by the Governor, and we will wait for her response before pro-


ceeding with closure implementation. In the meantime, we will focus our efforts on responding to the concerns of the residents, their families and the employees. Within the next day, I will be meeting with employees at Mexia and Travis state schools to talk about the closure possibility and to begin discussion about things that they would like the Department to put in place as part of any closure operation. People from throughout our system have already begun to strategize regarding resident relocation, support for employees and support for families. We are approaching this as a systems challenge that will take the teamwork of everyone if we are to do it well.

"A letter will be sent to the families of the residents at Mexia and Travis explaining the next step. Later we will hold meetings with families.

"Regardless of her decision, our obligation and commitment is and will remain to provide for services to the more than 6,800 residents who live in all our 13 state schools.

"As for the task force, the members have completed a difficult assignment under enormous pressure. They are to be applauded for their openness, hard work and sensitivity to this difficult task."

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
