## Famous Sports Artist, Vernon Wells, To Be At Ranger College March 20

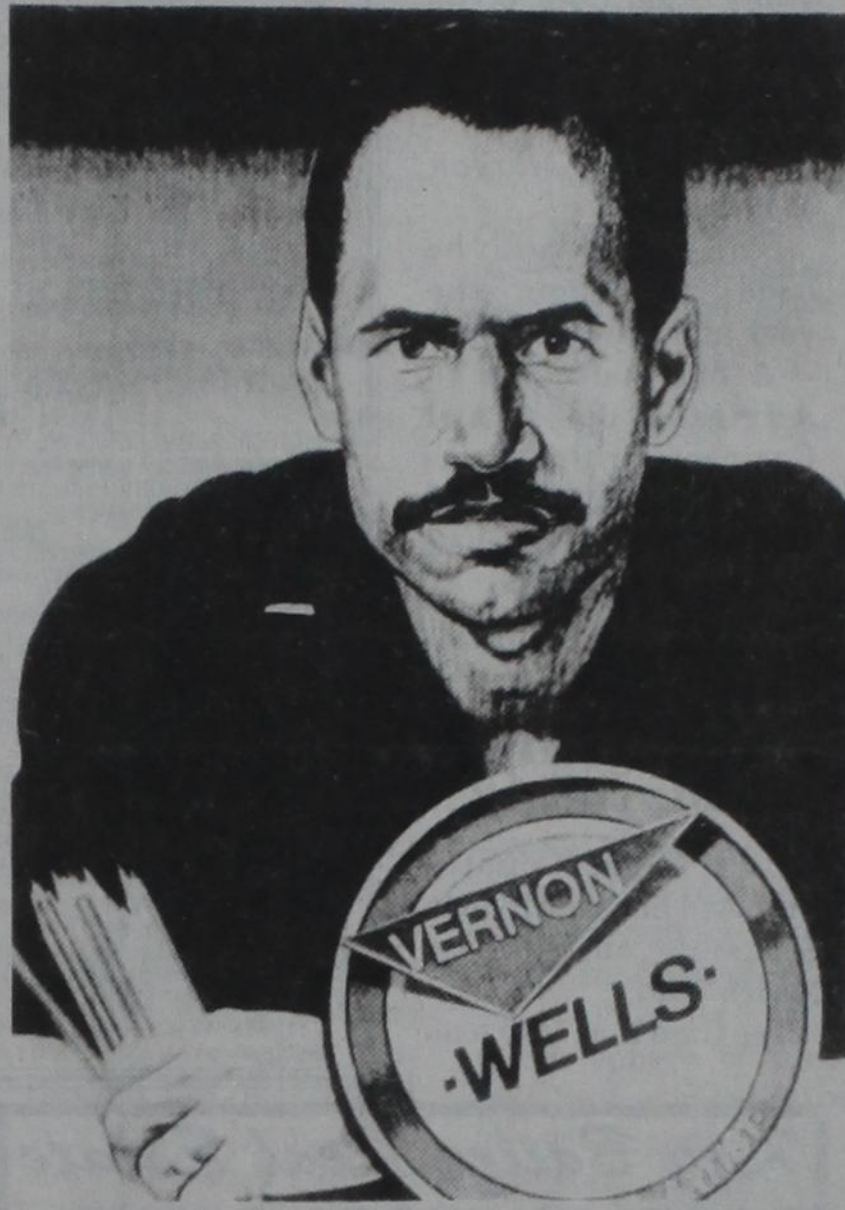
The public is invited to attend an evening with famous Sports Artist Vernon Wells at Ranger College at 7 p.m., Monday, March 20th.

He will discuss his work, show examples and be guest of honor at a reception in his honor, according to President Joe Mills, who extended an invitation to all throughout this area to enjoy this outstanding, free program of the college.

Vernon Wells was a student at Ranger College from 1973 to 1975. While at Ranger he was an outstanding wide receiver on the Rangers football team, was named first team All American and Most Valuable Player.

He had a unique talent for finding the open spot in an opponent's pass defense and a great pair of hands that caught just about everything that was thrown in his direction.

He went on to TCU where he continued to star at that position for the Horned Frogs.



He was drafted by the Kansas City Chiefs in 1978 but was eventually released. He went on to play in the Canadian Football League and fol-

lowing an injury while playing for the Calgary Stampeders, decided to take his destiny into his own hands: work to build a career for himself where

he would not be cut and, as he said on the Michael Irvin Television Show, "Get into a business where I had less chance of getting my head bashed in."

This was the beginning of his career as a sports artist.

Although his degree from TCU was in Radio-Television-Film, he had a natural talent for illustration and after working as a commercial artist, a graphics director for a television station, and art director for a publishing company that produced magazines for a number of professional and college programs, he went on his own, doing paintings of professional athletes for the players themselves.

Vernon has not only translated his love for sports into a means of earning a living, but he has continued to participate through an association with the Senior Professional Baseball League

## Senator Gramm's Aide Reports On Congress

By Richard Kurklin John Marlow, an aid to U. S. Senator Phil Gramm who has announced his candidacy for President of the United States, told the crowd at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce Quarterly Breakfast that a new congress was elected the last time with 87 changes in the House and 11 changes in the Senate. And the new congress has a reforming spirit.

Much of the congressional activity has been based on the Republican Party's Contract with America, and has been designed to give working people more of their own money to spend and to return more governmental functions to the local level of control.

Congress started the changes within itself by eliminating some tax funded committees and setting term limits for leaders of Congress. Allowing chairmen to cast the votes of absent members by proxy was also stopped. And Congress, which had so long exempted itself from the laws it imposed on others, has now been placed under those laws too.

Senator Gramm has been trying to get a balanced budget amendment passed for ten years, and it failed this time by one vote after seven senators who had previously voted for an amendment now voted against it. But Marlow assured us that Senator Bob Dole would bring the amendment up again.

\$581 billion was spent last year by local governmental bodies

and businesses to meet or carry out the requirements imposed by unfunded governmental mandates. In other words the government, on an average, told every household in America how to spend \$600 of their income. And they were ordered to spend the money for what governmental bureaucrats wanted rather than how they wanted to spend it. A bill has been passed to make it more difficult to pass unfunded mandates in Congress.

Regulation and paper work imposed by Congress have become so extensive that just the federal regulations on cabbage sales requires 26,911 words.

A crime bill was passed by one body of Congress calling for \$22 billion in spending and the one passed by the other body called for \$26 billion in spending. A compromise was made which required \$30 billion in spending, and by final passage of the bill, the amendment which required punishment for felons using deadly weapons had mysteriously disappeared. Marlow said that we can expect Congress to take action to put some teeth back into the criminal laws.

The Republican approach to health care is to make better, and less costly insurance available to everyone by requiring less paper work and liability litigation and by encouraging competition. And some other methods which have worked for others are to be stud-

## From Page One Gramm's Aide Reports

Medicare grew twelve percent last year with most of the increase due to increased paper work, so Medicare spending might be reduced without cutting benefits by cutting paperwork. An effort to repeal the tax on Social Security benefits was also promised.

We have seen federal taxes rise from one dollar out of every \$50. We earn going to the federal government to one out of every four dollars. And unless changes are made, it will soon be one out of every three dollars. Gramm is saying we should let the people who make the money spend most of it, rather than the government taking and spending so much of it.

The Senate is taking action to limit the President's power to send American soldiers overseas under the command of foreign officers.

America must decide where its priorities are, says Marlow. Our government is so far in debt that the interest payments on that debt are the second biggest federal expenditure behind Social Security benefits. It may hurt to cut some social programs, but we cannot continue to spend more than we have without inviting disaster. Congress will be looking for places where cuts may be made everywhere.

And in answer to some questions, Marlow stated that they believed that the value

of the dollar had dropped because of Congress' failure to pass the balanced budget amendment. That the Gramm team is looking forward to Wendi Gramm, Phil Gramm's wife, being in the national spotlight, and that they think she will steal the hearts of the American people. She is a very successful professional lady, and an American of Korean descent. Some media who claim to be champions for minority races have reportedly been treating her ancestry in a negative way. Marlow also said that control of our schools should be returned to the local level where people have a better feel for what is happening and what is needed.

# 1927 - Connellee Hotel - 1995

This project involves the historic restoration and total renovation of the old Connellee Hotel property in Eastland, Texas. The development will result in the conversion of the property into 42 units of elderly housing in Eastland's downtown core. It will also include significant common area space for tenant activities, seniors programs, and recreational facilities, using the former roof-level ballroom, the first floor lobby area, and other spaces left over from the Connellee's grander days as a premier hotel facility in West Texas. All apartments will have full kitchen facilities. Individual basement storage units for the tenants will be provided. The project will create 28 Home units using the Home formula rents, plus 14 units which will use Section 42 tax credit rents.

In addition to providing affordable housing to elderly residents, the property will be rehabilitated in compliance with the Secretary of the Interior's historic preservation guidelines, for eligibility for the Historic Tax Credit.

The developer for the property is Community Development Properties Eastland, Inc. ("CDP Eastland"), a 501(c) (3) corporation and a pending CHDO. CDP Eastland was recently formed to carry out affordable housing and economic development activities in Eastland by its sponsoring organization, NDC Housing and Eastland by its sponsoring organization, NDC Housing and Economic Development Corporation. Housing and Economic Development Corporation ("NDC-HEDC"). It has a purchase option for the property. For financing purposes, CDP Eastland will become the managing general partner of a limited partnership, which will be formed for the purpose of syndicating the historic tax credits and low income housing tax credits ("tax credits") for the project.

CDP's sponsor, NDC-HEDC and its parent organization, the National Development Council ("NDC") are national 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organizations that have created hundreds of affordable housing units for low and moderate income persons. They work extensively with units of government and other community non-profit organizations. NDC and its nonprofit financing resources, program experience, financial analysis skills, and access to the public private partnerships that cause affordable housing projects to get built and into successful operations.

In the summer of 1994, The City of Eastland, the Eastland Industrial Foundation and the Eastland Economic Development Committee asked the National Development Council and NDC-HEDC to assist them with the Connellee. For many years, the city was vitally interested in preserving the building, but did not have the answer to what to do with the building, nor the resources to do anything about it. The community had been aware of the progress of the nearby Windsor Hotel in Abilene, which was fully renovated and converted to affordable housing in 1994, by an NDC-

affiliated nonprofit corporation, through the use of tax credits, a bank loan, HOME dollars, and CDBG financing. Since Eastland is a much smaller city (population 3690), it does not have the same level of resources, but it asked NDC to look at project feasibility and its development options, to see if it would work as affordable housing. After performing a detailed feasibility analysis, NDC-HEDC recommended the project as affordable housing. Based on its financial requirements, a combination of HOME and tax credit equity financing was recommended.

The Connellee, constructed in 1927, is one of Eastland's most important (and largest) historic structures. Many years ago, the building was abandoned, and it has deteriorated over the years, as time and lack of use took their toll. It has been vacant for almost twenty years. Fortunately for Eastland, this once beautiful historic building

was rescued from the wrecker's ball in the 1970's, when a civic-minded local family "saved" it at the courthouse steps, with the hope that the community could one day bring the building back to life. Since it is located in the heart of Eastland, on Main Street across the square from the County Courthouse, it claims a very important place in this small city, and the community has been vitally interested in its preservation. The local family that purchased the building in the 1970's has granted CDP Eastland the option to purchase the property, and has been actively involved in helping the project get started.

The City and the Eastland Industrial Foundation have made a financial commitment to the project, and are providing funding for architectural programming and schematic design, structural engineering, cost estimating, environmental studies, and feasibility analy-

sis (\$17,500 from each for a total of \$35,000).

The City is also providing general administrative assistance to the project, including assistance with gathering information for project feasibility, assisting with data and material for the submission of this HOME application, and general project predevelopment assistance.

The conversion of the Connellee into decent, quality elderly housing requires the complete renovation and reconstruction of an eight story building that is in fair shape on the exterior, but inside is dilapidated, partially gutted, and full of debris.

Costs are on the high side for a combination of reasons. As an old building, it has a significant asbestos problem that has to be remediated. Large amounts of debris (which has asbestos mixed in with it) will have to be carted. Also, the historic features of the building have largely deteriorated, and will be restored. As a vertical building, construction costs are high.

As a building located

right in the middle of the downtown commercial district, special construction issues arise which impact cost. Many of the contractors will not be available locally, and will have to be recruited from around the region. Also impacting cost are the large amounts of common space in the first floor, and in the old "penthouse" roof garden. These will be renovated for seniors program areas, activity centers, and office/conference spaces for the local senior citizens programs.

A large part of the cost is offset by private deferred loans and the availability of historic tax credits and low income housing tax credits. In addition, further cost saving may be achieved as the scope pricing documents are completed and final construction bids are negotiated.

It is estimated that the impact of Davis Bacon, which will be used for the project, is a 10% increase in the overall construction budget. That is based on a 55% labor factor, and a 19.8% labor cost increase with Davis Bacon. The sponsor has also added a 15% contingency, because

this is a particularly difficult and often unpredictable type of renovation.

NDC-HEDC has retained the services of Good Fulton & Parrell, a Dallas-based firm providing architectural and construction services. Good Fulton & Parrell has provided assistance to NDC-HEDC in the predevelopment phase of the project, including cost programming and schematic design. The firm will also provide ongoing project management and liaison with NDC-HEDC from their Dallas base. Good Fulton & Parrell extensive experience with commercial and residential renovation and reuse, elderly housing, and with historic renovation construction standards.

The property will serve 100% elderly residents. When completed, the first floor of the hotel (formerly the hotel lobby) will be restored with a serious common area and some street-side commercial space. The cost allocatable to the commercial space has been separated in the project development budget. The "penthouse" level, which includes the

former roof garden, will be restored and renovated as an activity/common room. All residential units will have full kitchen facilities. The basement will include a storage area for individual tenants, general building maintenance space, and general "back of the house" space.

The residents of the Connellee will have the benefit and convenience of the nearby supermarket (1 block), movie theatre (1 block), drug store (same block), county courthouse (across the street), restaurants (within one block), and other services within walking distance of the building. The owner will coordinate with the county and the West Central Texas Council of Governments to extend available senior citizen service programs to the Connellee.

HOME funds needed for the project represent 38% of the total cost of project development. Private equity funds represent 55% of the funding, and deferred and subordinated private sector loans represent 7%.

Since rents are very low

in Eastland compared to operating costs, cash flow dictates that all of the project loans to the project be deferred. Operating reserves, required by the equity partners, have been included in the capital budgets; replacement and operating reserves are included in the operating budgets to insure long term project stability.

Total project costs are relatively high, but the amount of HOME funds requested is below the maximum per unit cost allowed. The overall higher cost per unit of the project were described in the previous section, and are the result of many factors.

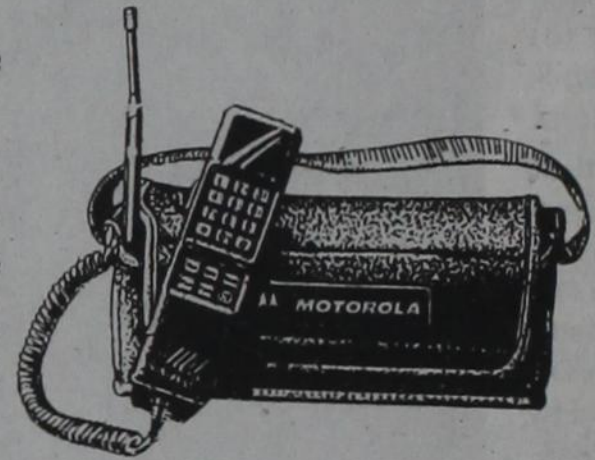

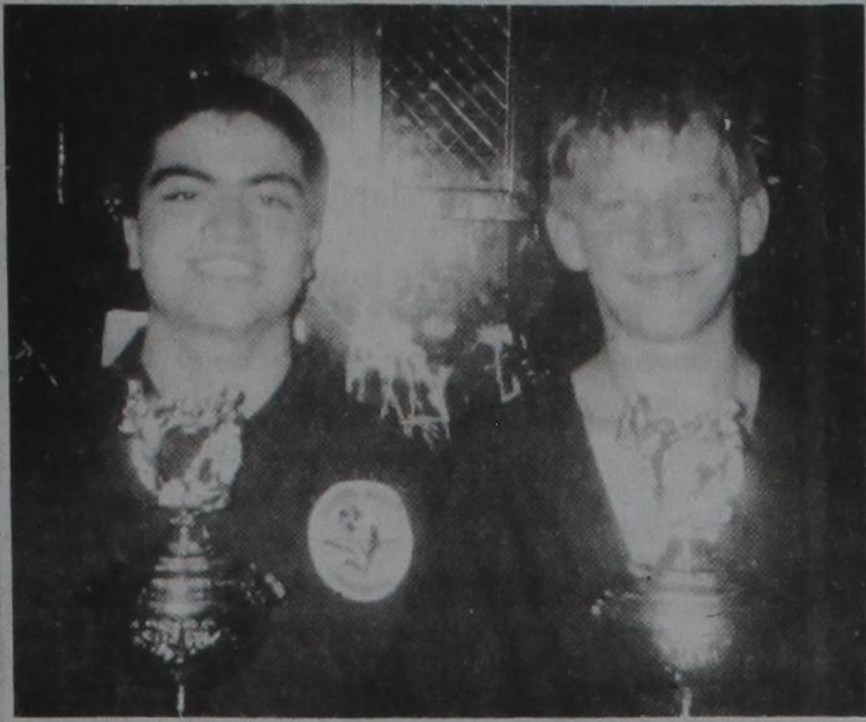

### Roll-Over Convincer

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in conjunction with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), now has a roll-over convincer available to demonstrate to people how vehicle occupants can be tossed about or even thrown from a motor vehicle in a roll-over crash when they are not wearing their safety belt.

The Convincer is available for county extension agents, law enforcement personnel, traffic safety specialists, or other traffic safety personnel to use at health fairs, county fairs, automobile shows, etc. The convincer is a pickup cab mounted on a trailer. An adult dummy and a young child dummy are placed in the vehicle and are not belted to illustrate what happens to occupants when they are not belted. The dummies are then belted and the roll-over is operated again to demonstrate how the occupants are held in position in the "safety cage" during the roll-over crash.

Many Texans wear their safety belts and insist that their children are belted on every trip (>70% in urban and suburban areas - Texas Transportation Institute, 50% or less in rural communities - Texas Agricultural Extension Service Study of 25 Rural Communities in Texas). However, many injuries an fa-

talities still occur due to the fact that occupants are not wearing their safety belts. 60% of the occupants who died in traffic crashes in vehicles covered by our Texas Seat Belt Law and the Child Restraint Law were not restrained. Convincing people to buckle up and secure their children in child safety seats can save lives and injuries. Child safety seats used correctly are 71% effective in preventing fatalities. Safety belts are 45%-55% effective. Air bags, combined with safety belts, are up to 65% effective.

The economic costs to families, communities and Texas from traffic crashes can also be reduced. Unbelted crash victims incur two to seven times the medical costs of buckled victims (NHTSA, 1994). That plus the economic loss due to fatalities becomes a societal problem, not just an individual problem. The 1993 economic loss to Texas for the 3037 lives lost in traffic accidents is estimated to be \$11,784,000,000 (based on National Safety Council formula for cost of accidents based on the number of fatalities.)

### Human Services Funds \$8 Plus Million In County

The state spent a total of \$8,315,203 last year for major welfare programs in Eastland County, according to David Maberry, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$1,664,646 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$320,341. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal government share in the cost of AFDC to families

where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

"Nursing home costs of approximately \$4,074,063 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$607,557 for Medicaid related services and \$143,767 for non-Medicaid related services," Maberry said.
