HERE'S A receipe to get us ready for spring: CAJUN DEVILED EGGS 12 hard-boiled eggs

t cup fat-free mayonnaise l jalapeno pepper, seeded and finely chopped

1 tablespoon ground cumin

1 tablespoon prepared mustard

1 teaspoon cayenne pepper

teaspoon salt paprika

snipped cilantro (if you like it)


Shell cooked eggs. Cut eggs lengthwise into halves. Slip out yolks and mash with fork. Stir in mayonnaise and next five ingredients. Fill egg whites with yolk mixture, heaping lightly. Sprinkle with paprika, and garnish with cilantro if desired.

BIG NEWS: The first, full-service emu processing plant in the nation is opening at Rosebud (20 miles east of Temple) and plans to process between 10,000 and 30,000 emus this year for their meat, oil, leather and feathers. Emu Prime (TM) is the low calorie, 97% fat-free red meat "similar in texture and taste to beef" but made from the "new American livestock" emu. The plant pays a minimum of \$300 for the 11-month or older birds. of Australia, the bird considered 95% useable.

WILL WE see a "flat tax" in our lifetime. Don't bet on it! It has been touted as a campaign ploy for many, many years. Now it's being advanced by Rep. Dick Armey of Lewisville with his straight 17%'er. Taxes could be filed on a postcard, avoiding six billion man hours and an estimated \$192 billion spent complying with the current code. (It'd save trees too; the IRS could reduce the eight billion pages of paper it now sends out.) No loopholes or tax giveaways for special interests; individuals would get personal allowance of \$13,100, (\$17,-200 for a single head of household and \$26,200 for a married couple, and the child deduction would be \$5,300. The Foundation estimates that the average American taxpayer's federal tax burden would be reduced \$1,000 per year under Armey's 17% flat tax. A family of our earning \$36,800 would pay ZERO federal income taxes. Biggest virtue: fairness. Sounds like a winner; where do we enlist?

Enterprise Zones Being Considered For County

Eastland County Commissioners Monday agreed to look into a plan to set up an Enterprise Zone (or Zones) in the county.

Emmett Lasater of TU Electric gave information on what an Enterprise Zone could mean to local businesses and the county.

County Judge Scott Bailey introduced this agenda item by saying there was an interest in making a more favorable economic climate here. One thing the county does not have is an E Zone, he said.

"This has to be set up with the Texas Department of Commerce," the Judge explained.

Lasater listed certain benefits, including a TU Electric reduction of 5 percent, and relief from the State Sales Tax, for firms in the zone.

He explained that forming an E Zone does not necessarily mean a local tax abatement that the County and City would have to do that.

A business has to qualify to receive E Zone benefits, and a Zone is not limited to one business, Lasater stated, also, a county is not limited to jut one

Lasater asked if the court would be willing to form an E Zone in the county.

He said there was a \$500 filing fee, but stated that TU Electric had

Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth said: "If we can get that EBAA Iron expansion it would be a lot of help to Eastland and the County. It could mean 40 more jobs."

Lasater remarked that future EDAA expansion might not be at the main foundry (5 mi. S.E. of Eastland) but could involve some other part of the County - possibly a location in the Ranger ISD area.

with many inmates sleeping on the floors. This has been the average for about four years

Cases seem to move through the County Court at a good pace, but are apparently slow to reach trial in the District Court.

Sheriff White reported that the last jail inspection by the State Jail Standards people on Feb. 28 found nine violations - the serious ones due to overcrowding. Others involved the smoke alarm system and the like.

Eight of the 40 prisoners being held are "paper ready" for TDC, so they are not counted on the census. But that still leaves eight over the 24 inmates allowed in the jail.

The Commissioners decided it might be best to transfer these eight to another facility and pay for their keep. Sheriff White gave offers he had gathered from various counties.

The best offer seemed to be from Palo Pinto County, where prisoners would be kept for \$37.50 per day each, with a \$250 medical allowance for each.

Toward the end of the morning two architects appeared on the scene, one right after the other. The first was Tom Harris of Harris and Lunow, Houston.

The second was James T. Wheeler of Abilene, who was the architect for the present jail (completed in 1980.)

Each submitted an informal proposal to enlarge the present jail by 24 beds.

Harris listed the expansion by his company as costing approximately \$1,130,000, and Wheeler estimated his additions would cost \$1,300,000.

The Commissioners said they would look into all aspects of the jail situation and come to some decisions.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsroad grader for \$119,442, including interest. Precinct 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman said he decided to reject all bids for a grader for his precinct.

THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT OF THE

IRISH REPUBLIC

TO THE PEOPLE OF IRELAND

IRISHMEN AND IRISHWOMEN; In the name of God and of the dead generations from which she receives her old tradition of nationhood, Ireland through us, summons her children to her flag and strikes for her freedom.

Having organised and trained her manhood through her secret revolutionary organisation, the Irish Republican Brotherhood, and through her open military organisations, the Irish Volunteers and the Irish Citizen Army, having patiently perfected her discipline, having resolutely waited for the right moment to reveal itself, she now seized that moment, and, supported by her exiled children in America and by gallant allies in Europe, but relying in the first on her own strength, she strikes in full confidence of victory.

We declare the right of the people of Ireland to the ownership of Ireland, and to the unfettered control of Irish destinies, to be sovereign and indefeasible. The long usurpation of that right by a foreign people and government has not extinguished the right, nor can it ever be extinguished except by the destruction of the Irish people. In sovereignty; six times during the past three hundred years they have asserted it in arms. Standing on that fundamental right and again asserting it in arms in the face of the world, we hereby proclaim the Irish Republic as a Sovereign Independent State, and we pledge our lives and the lives of our comrades-in-arms to the cause of its freedom, of its welfare, and of its exaltation among the nations.

The Irish Republic is entitled to, and hereby claims, the allegiance of every Irishman and Irishwoman. The Republic guarantees religious and civil liberty, equal rights and equal opportunities to all its citizens, and declares its resolve to pursue the happiness and prosperity of the whole nation and of all its parts, cherishing all the children of the nation equally, and oblivious of the differences carefully fostered by an alien government, which have divided a minority from the majority in the

Until our arms have brought the opportune moment for the establishment of a permanent National Government, representative of the whole people of Ireland and elected by the suffrages of all her men and women, the Provisional Government, hereby constituted, will administer the civil and military affairs of the Republic in trust for the people.

We place the cause of the Irish Republic under the protection of the Most High God, whose blessing we invoke upon our arms, and we pray that on one who serves that cause will dishonour it by cowardice, inhumanity, or rapine. In this supreme hour the Irish nation must, by its valour and discipline and by the readiness of its children to sacrifice themselves for the common good, prove itself worthy of the august destiny to which it is called


Social Security

Beneficiaries who must report excess earnings on their annual earnings reports due by April 17 should note that not all earnings count toward the annual earnings limits. If the earnings qualify as "special payments," they may be excluded from the annual report, according to Ken Hargis, manager of the Abilene Social Security office.

"Special payments are earnings you received after you began getting Social Security benefits for work you did before," Hargis stated. "If you worked as an employee, earnings received after retirement count as a special payment if the last thing you did to earn the payment was completed before you stopped working for your employer."

Beneficiaries under 65 who earned at least \$8,040 in 1994 and those aged 65 to 69 who earned at least \$11,160 must report their earnings to Social Security by April 1, 1995. Earnsings over the limit reduce benefits \$1 for every \$2 for beneficiaries under 65, and \$1 for every \$3 for beneficiaries 65-69. Beneficiaries 70 and older are not subject to the earnings limits.

Some special payments to employees include: bonuses, accumulated vacation or sick pay, severance pay, back pay, standby pay, sales commissions, payments on account of retirement, or deferred compensation reported on a W-2 form for one year that was earned in a previous year. These amounts may be shown on your W-2 in the box labeled "Nonqualified Plan."

"Nell" To Show At **Majestic Theatre**

"Nell," a drama starring Jodie Foster, Liam Neeson and Natasha Richardson, will open at the Majestic Theatre in Eastland on Friday, March 17. It will show nightly at 7:30 through Monday, March 20. It is rated PG 13.

Recently Jodie Foster won the "People's Choice" award for her role in this movie, and the picture also won high ratings.

Raised in a remote cabin in the woods and speaking a strange language, "Nell" (Foster) is a source of great wisdom and inspiration to the doctor (Neeson) and psychologist (Richardson).

Their lives are unexpectedly transformed as they decided whether to bring this mysterious young woman into contemporary society.

In the narrative, Nell was raised by a reclusive mother whose speech patterns were damaged by a series of strokes. Subsequently, Nell was forced to invert her own language.

The process of translating this piognant drama onto film, without making it seem overly melodramatic, required a director who would approach it with integrity.

Foster and producer Rene Missel were attracted to Michael Apted for his visual style, and his expertise as an awardwinning documentarian.

"I am always attracted to stories with strong female characters, and this story stayed with me," says Missel. "I see Nell as a soul-cathcer. She reconnects people with their souls, with the disowned aspects of their personalities."

Missel knew she needed a dynamic performer to bring this story to life, so she took the property to Jodie Foster. The actress not only wanted to star in the film, but wanted to produce it with Missel.

To illustrate the seclusion of Nell's existance, cast and crew traveled to Graham County, North Carolina, and set up residence near Fontana Dam, nearly two hours from the nearest city. Housed in rustic cabins, crew members lived for months without the "luxury" of phones or television.

Nell's cabin was located in an idyllic cove situated at the edge of a flooded valley. Cast and crew were transported to and from the site daily by boat.

After considerable research, a cabin was constructed and carefully stocked. The exterior and interior were rich with

historic and personal detail.

Costume designer Susan Lyall carefully researched the rural garb and applied a bit of psychology to devise Nell's garments. It was decided that Nell and her mother would not own a sewing machine; everything would be made by hand.

In reflecting on the movie, Jodie Foster says: "I think we can all learn from Nell. She has a kind of tranquility that comes with somebody who is free and doesn't judge. There's a lot to be said about living at peace."

Admission to this new movie will be the usual \$3.50 at the box office. with balcony seats available at \$5 to adults.

in Texas it was sometimes referred to as State Highway No. 1, but the state system of numbering highways was later changed by the time the Federal Government numbered all of the highways that federal funds were spent for maintenance. This was a Federal Highway and was known

as Highway 80 until the

Interstate System of su-

per highways was pretty

well established.

As to what happened to this highway the answer to this question is "nothing." It is till there and is in continuous use all of the time. I shall attempt to explain. So we will follow this highway from Ranger to Cisco. Beginning at the railway station in Ranger going west on the street just to the west of the railroad the red brick paving, which matched the paving of the streets in downtown Ranger, the highway paralleled the railroad all of the way out to the west side of Ranger. After clearing the town it turned under the railroad at an underpass, which is still there and the road as far as I know is still usable at this point, then immediately followed along side of the railroad to the corner where the old loading rack stood. This was at the bottom of the hill where the sharp curve in the railroad came around the old loading rack. At one time there was a plant operated by Lone Star on top of this hill. At the curve, the highway did not make as steep a turn as the railroad did and it moved away from rail-

Very little of this highway was discarded but about 1932, in the depths of the Depression, the highway department did a little work on this brick road in the form of straightened some of its curves a little. This task was accomplished by removing the brick, peeling all of the asphalt on them and then relaying them in the new positions. The going rate for employment for this type of work at that time was 35 cents an hour. Labor was hired to peel the asphalt from the bricks as mentioned. A good strong arm and a good hatchet was used for stripping these bricks. As one worked each day the worker first worked himself onto a good stout seat of brick and then spent the rest of the day peeling away. I worked on this project for two weeks. That was all of the time a single man could get in. I made enough out of two weeks of work to buy a good suit.

The red brick crossed Colony Creek at the same spot the I-20 Highway now does. The north access road here is the old red brick road. It has been covered but it is still there. It came up hill to Olden and turned into the town of Olden. All of this is visible and in use today. The road formed then and still does form the Main Street of Olden. However a lot of people don't seem to know it, but until this road was paved, Olden's business district, which included at that time a bank, was on the north side of the railroad tracks. With the construction of this red highway the town slowly moved to it. And when Magnolia built their district offices and their housing units for employees all of this was on the north side of the railroad. As the road came out of Olden it made a sharp curve, which is still re-

ferred to as Dead Man's Curve, as there has been a death or two at this point. The pavement then went west a little further south of the railroad but north of present I-20. About a mile or so west of old drive-in theater it turned south and came out right behind the business first of a motel and a steakhouse. Then it went west into Eastland. The righthandlane is covered, but it is base for the highway along the Magic Mile as it sometimes called on the east side of Eastland between the I-20 and the courthouse square. At the courthouse square the road moved over one block south and used Commerce Street as the outlet to Cisco. The middle part of the pavement on Commerce Street today is the red brick highway. About the only changes that have been made on West Commerce since those days were the paving of the strips to each curb on the side of the brick. Also there was dip in the old road just west of the Fred Davenport house or about where Marcus Odell's place now is, or was, that has been leveled out with a culvert.

After one gets to just past the city limits on Commerce beyond the radio station and at the curve next to the old Frank Spark's place one can see where a slight curve was straightened somewhat. The old red brick outcrops on the north side of the present curve. From that point on west the right lane or the westbound lane was the old red brick. It is now covered with paving material and would be hard to locate without a close inspection.

A little west of the Finley place some one a long time ago built a place that was called the El Morrocco Club. I don't know what it was. At that time I was too young to go into a road house, if that is what it was, and I never did know what sort of operation took place there. It was on the south side of the highway and there was a persistent rumor here in Eastland that the place was financed and operated by gangster money. I don't know about that. And as far as I know I have no idea if any of this gang related rumor was founded in fact or not.

When the state started to make a four-lane highway out of U.S. Highway 80, Ed Castleberry, who was the county commissioner for this precinct at the time began to make arrangements for right of way land from the landowners on each side of the road. It seems that the

There are still remnants of this oil plant now being used as private homes. At one time earlier I referred 13 to this as a gasoline plant. but I think it was a full refinery that made gasoline by the cracking process used by the larger refiners. For several years Van

Gardenhire was a gasoline wholesaler in Cisco. I remember once asking 6 him years ago if he remembered the refinery in Cisco. Do I, he answered.

"That's where I made my first good money. I don't know how he defined & "good money" but he was st well aware of this small w refinery.
