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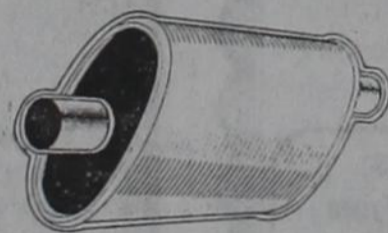
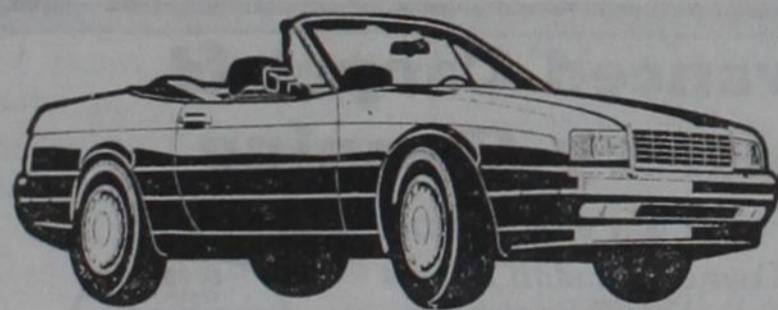
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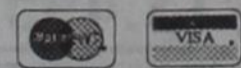

Time Extended For Walkway Brick Deadline McCleskey No. 1 Dedication Postponed

Due to possibility of needed parts being unavailable in time for completion of reconstruction of the well, it was decided at the March meeting of Central Texas Historical and Genealogical Preservation, Inc. (Ranger Historical Preservation Society) to postpone the dedication of the McCleskey No.1 during the annual Old Time Country Festival on June 3, 1995. In addition to other parts being unavailable, it was realized that a wooden derrick will have to be built. It was the feeling of the entire Society, that because of the importance of this well site to our entire nation, that it should be postponed until

such time as it could be complete. As news becomes available, it will be related to the public. Note that the walkway will still be the last to be in place at the site (after all the heavy equipment is gone) and all brick purchased until three weeks before actual dedication will be in place in the walkway. An update of purchased bricks will be printed soon.

Date of the 5th Annual Old Time Country Festival is June 3, 1995 and will be held on the grounds of the new home of the Society on Old Hwy 80 W near I-20 (the old B.C. Construction yard). Mark your calendar to be

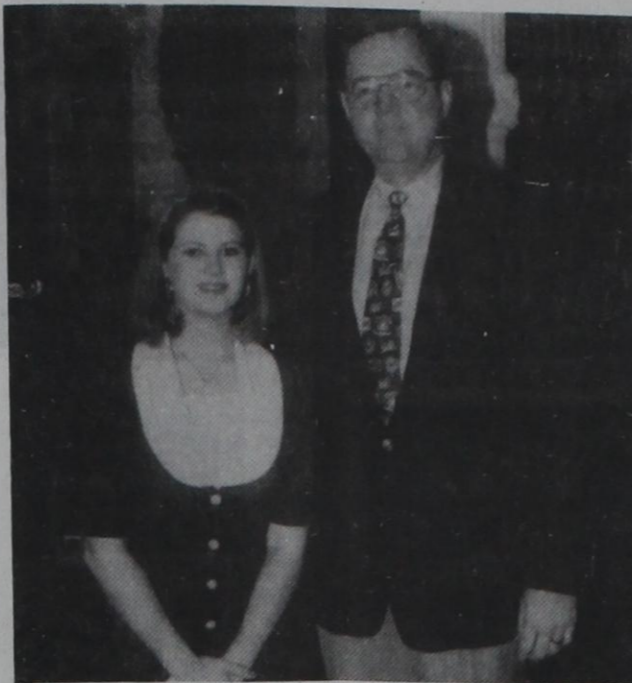

Senator Sibley Speaks At Gorman

As David Sibley, our Republican State Senator from Waco, spoke at the Gorman Chamber of Commerce Banquet, his Christian leanings showed in his references and examples, and he praised the Christian singers who entertained.

In his third session in the Texas Legislature after being forced to retire from being a dentist by a physical problem, Sibley encouraged citizens to become involved in politics, and be result oriented, not process oriented, he said. Then he defined result orientation as wanting to see justice done, while process orientation had no place for justice while carrying out legal technicalities.

Sibley praised Richard Watson, the State Education Commissioner from Gorman, and he said that Governor Bush appointed Jim Wright to the Eastland Court of Appeals because he was the best qualified man. Bush chooses the appointees, but gives me an opportunity to veto any appointment in my district, he continued.

Sounding much like a preacher, Sibley said that money doesn't

bring happiness, and encouraged investing in people instead. Plan for a lifetime of service to others for happiness, and hand values to our children, he continued. He mentioned a statue made to honor a pest, the cotton bowl weevil. Why? Because the weevil forced farmers to change from growing cotton to growing peanuts, which was more profitable.

Life and business are much like the game of Monopoly, says Sibley, everything goes back into the box when the game is over. He told about a meeting of the country's richest and most powerful men which once took place in Chicago. Later every man died a miserable death, some in prison and some by suicide. He referred to the Apostle Paul's statement that he had fought a good fight, finished the race, and kept the faith as a good example to follow.

Politics in Austin are now bi-partisan with Democrats appointing Republicans and members of both parties working together.
