Historical Society Issues Statement

(Ranger Historical Preservation Society) Central Texas Historical and Genealogical Preservation, Inc. was approved and chartered by the State of Texas on October 22, 1990. The society, recognized as a not-for-profit corporation with 501 (c) (3) status, became officially organized in April 1993 with fifteen directors and appropriate officers. Subsequent to that, the Society files a certificate to do business as Ranger Historical Preservation Society. The members constantly strive to work for the good of our community. Our motto is, "preserving Yesteryear for Tomorrow."

The Ranger Historical Preservation Society Board of Directors wish to reaffirm the Society's goals and mission: to foster the preservation of important historical sites and buildings; to research and preserve the history of Ranger, Eastland County, and surrounding areas; apply for and secure historical markers for sites and buildings where appropriate; to maintain a research center which will house genealogical and historical records for researchers interested in all aspects of history.



Of particular pride to the Society was the acquisition, by donation, of the building recently moved to the Society's Heritage Center." This building will be known as the Ruth Terry Denney Library, which will house the Society's many books on various history subjects and places, ethnic groups, family histories, reference books, various maps, and census records and other valuable resources on microfilm. Members offer assistance to researchers in an effort to help when possible and to direct to other resources when known.

Accomplishments of the Society include: acquiring, by donation, deed to the McCleskey No. 1, Discovery Well, with other donations to reconstruct the site; Ranger Diamond Jubilee Celebration

April 23-30, 1994; "Merriman Cemetery", Texas Historical Marker, dedicated May 15, 1993; and in 1991, prior to organizing, some members of the group were responsible for raising funds to paint the Roaring Ranger Museum by sponsoring the first "Old Time Country Festival", continued by the Society as an annual event the first Saturday in June; Texas Historical Marker, "Site of J.H. McCleskey No. 1. Discovery Well of the Ranger Oil Boom" and replacement of the Bronze plaque dedicated October 21, 1927. The Society sponsors the Ranger Community Clothes Closet, and has been honored to have responsibility of the overall "Ranger Hall of Fame."

Current projects include, but are not limited to: historical markers for the Ranger Airport, The Texas Ranger Camp (Ranger Camp Valley), from which Ranger derived its name, and Merriman, first county seat of Eastland County (site of First courthouse); development of the "Heritage Center" property into a focal point of the area, encouraging tourism and promoting Ranger and the County of Eastland; reconstruction of the historic "McCleskey No. 1 Discovery Well" on its original site in Ranger Texas and further intends to develop it into one of the principal sites of the area; and is working with other organizations to sponsor an annual night-time Christmas Parade.

The Society Board of Directors endorse and support the projects enumerated here and also support the current slate of officers. We invite visitors to our meetings, which are usually held the third Monday of each month, and we invite all of Ranger to support our efforts as we try to promote a positive image for our town, for Eastland County, and for our prosperity. EMS Trauma Teams Called To Action

April 4th, 1996 marked two important firsts for EMH emergency teams. A moving vehicle accident spurred the use of the Emergency Medical Services' MICU (Mobile Intensive Care Unit) for the first time and upon arrival at the hospital that patient was treated by the newly designed Trauma Team.

Our Ambulance service is registered with the Texas Department of Human Services as BSL (Basic Life Support) with MICU capabilities any time a Paramedic is present (in this case, Richard Bird, EMS manager). The ambulance crew (which also included Mike Powell of the Ranger Fire Dept., Tommy Johnson, and Scott Brinkley) utilized the MICU protocol for cardiac drugs and use of the defibrillator while in constant communication with Dr. Matthews over the radio. It is the opinion of several medical personnel that the patient would not have made it to the hospital had it not been for these capabilities.

The patient was brought to the emergency room which had been designated a Basic Trauma Facility as of March 29, 1996. Once again First Flight was on hand to continue emergency care on route to Harris Methodist Hospital. A letter from First Flight crew-member Jarret Wharton includes

these encouraging words:

"We would, however like to commend everyone's efforts from the Eastland EMS, to your wonderful E.R. staff, to Dr. Matthews in all your work and genuine concern. It was inspiring to see everyone work so hard and efficiently to resuscitate the patient. You are all a great group of professionals that we are proud to be associated with."

This patient, of course, is far from the first trauma case to receive this intensive treatment at our facility. But in order to finally be designated a Basic Trauma Facility, the ER department underwent extensive survey and review of past trauma records as well as showing active participation in the Regional Trauma Advisory Council.

During the survey it was noted that Eastland Memorial evaluated approximately 1,436 trauma patients in ER over the past 12 months. The Emergency Room is designed to accommodate 2 serious or critical patients at one time with measures to provide care to additional less critical patients. The area is stocked with essential equipment necessary to provide resuscitation and stabilization care to geriatric, adult and pediatric trauma patients. Some of the strengths of this hospital were

noted in the survey and were listed as follows:

1. The commitments focus, energy and resources of the physician is excellent. He is to be commended. The institutional commitment and the dedication of DeVonna Wheeler, RN are impressive. Their efforts to improve and ensure all patients receive quality care by choosing designation as a Basic Trauma Facility demonstrates a commitment to the community and citizens served.
2. The commitment of the administrative staff to provide educational opportunities and foster hospital staff's continuing education is a strength. Although a new administrator is on board the leadership and commitment have gained in strength.
3. The cohesive relationship that exists between Eastland Memorial and Abilene is an asset.
4. The positive relationship maintained between hospital staff and pre-hospital personnel (EMS) is a strength.
5. The commitment from the support services and entire staff is impressive. No essential criteria deficiencies were identified. The entire four page summary is posted on the ER bulletin board and gives added perspective to the capabilities of the hospital as a whole.

Case Managers Do A Lot Of Coordinating In Helping Others

Education is the Number One need in the field of MH/MR work! And that refers to education of the general population that mental illness and mental retardation are conditions that deserve to be accepted for what they are. Persons with these conditions shouldn't be shunned and are not to be feared or avoided.

The stigma that is so often attached to these conditions is incorrect and unfair, and should be eliminated through edu-

cation.

So says Joan Kessinger, newest addition to the Eastland County MH/MR office. She is Case Manager with a case load of some 25 persons. Her associate, Dennis Noska, who has been a Case Manager here for some 20 years, has a case load of about 30 persons.

"If MH/MR wasn't here to help these consumers" Mrs. Kessinger says, "they would be in serious trouble, and many of them would be on the street." A native of San Angelo

where she completed high school, Mrs. Kessinger has three grown children, and went back to college later, receiving her Bachelor's degree from Howard Payne University in 1989, and her Master degree in Counseling Psychology from Angelo State University.

She joined MH/MR in February and because she replaced an employee that had carried a full case load, she had to "hit the ground running," launching immediately into annual case reviews and the entire program.

Q: What does a Case Manager do?

A: Whatever can be done to help consumers (clients) reach their full potential and live independently in the community. Meeting physical health needs.

It may be finding housing. Helping with job skills training. Medication supervision. Personal grooming. Social development. Working with families, employers and others to help provide the best possible opportunities and environments for those who have special needs.

These needs are the same needs that persons with physical disabilities have, but in these cases the individual may be a little slower in grasping instruction, have a little more problem putting their thoughts into words

and may be generally less efficient than one might wish. The fact remains that they are still warm, caring individuals who deserve the same respect and love as all others.

Ideally, MH/MR likes to consider that 60 per cent of a case manager's time is spent working with consumers, and the remainder in paper work.

"It doesn't always work out that way," Mrs. Kessinger says, "but we realize that the paper work is important, and as long as it's helping our people, it's okay."

She loves the people and the work, and in her eyes, there is no stigma in working with those who have special needs.

Education eliminates stigma.

In 1995, there were 508,000 Texans estimated to have mental retardation. Approximately 15 percent of the population - or 75,912 persons - were considered to be most in need. This comprises the department's priority population.

In 1995, of the 75,912 persons, the department served 39,985 persons (53%). Listed below is a breakdown of where those 39,985 received their services.

Served by Community MHMR Center & State Facility community services: 35,962* (47.0% of the priority population)

Served by State School/State Center campus facilities: 6,422* (8.0% of the priority population)

About 2,500 individuals receive both community and facility services.

Texas operates 12 state schools for individuals with mental retardation. They are in Abilene, Austin (2), Brenham, Corpus Christi, Denton, Lubbock, Lufkin, Mexia, Richmond, San Angelo and San Antonio. Five state centers located in Amarillo, Beaumont, El Paso, Laredo and Harlingen also provide services for these persons. Residential and community-based living opportunities are provided through the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, as well as educational, vocational, in-home and family support, and other programs.

Community mental health and mental retardation centers, which are joint efforts of local governments and TXMHMR, offer community-based living opportunities in addition to vocational and other programs. Community MHMR centers providing assistance to individuals with mental retardation are located in Abilene, Austin, Brownwood, Bryan, Cleburne, Conroe, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Denison, Denton, Edinburg, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Greenville, Houston, Jacksonville, Longview, Lubbock, Lufkin, McKinney, Midland, Plainview, San Angelo, San Antonio, Stephenville, Temple, Texarkana, Tyler, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.










BEEF COMMENTARY

Many folks keep asking me why is beef at the store remained the same price, while cattle are so cheap? No, there is not a big meat packing conspiracy to keep beef at a high level price and no there is no big killing at the retail outlets. The simple fact is the price of grain. World levels of grain are at a 40 year low, corn production areas have not made a good crop in the last two years and this one is not shaping up any better. Therefore, corn supply has pushed the demand and price to near record levels. Corn prices have increased 90% in the last year. With this in mind, consider what the price of beef would be in the store if cattle were not so cheap. Then consider what would happen to our market share. When the price

of corn rises, the price of cattle decrease to compensate the consumer. In either manner, either the farmer or the rancher takes it on the chin!

PROTECTING YOUR BEEF INVESTMENT

At the present time I am working with the Livestock & Forage Committee to develop a program I think many of you may be interested in. The pricing insurance of your calf crop. How can this be done, simple...through the commodity market. Think about this, with cattle cheap what's the other spectrum...high corn. So the possibility exists to capture a corn price that could compensate for low cattle prices. It is simply insurance on your calf crop. And, with all insurance you hope you do not need it, but it is good to know you have it.



Developmental Screening Set For May 15


On May 15, 1996 a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to three (0-3). This screening will be conducted at the Eastland County MHMR Center, 301 Pogue, Eastland, Tx. from 2-4 p.m.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents, and teachers.



Wooden shakes have been adorning homes since the pioneers discovered that cedar could be split by hand. Today, cedar shakes, with their rough grain and small, double-layered panels are prized for their rustic look and durability. With the right care, they can weather countless seasons.

Shakes can be finished in a number of ways: with stains, paints, clear coatings, or not at all. Left to weather naturally in harsh environments, the resulting layer of loose cells turns cedar an attractive gray. This outer layer stays in place and offers some protection to underlying layers. Left untreated, however, shakes can sometimes weather unevenly, creating a non-uniform appearance. They can also develop unattractive stains.

To preserve the beauty of cedar's natural color, shakes can be treated with clear coatings that penetrate the wood and require very little upkeep. Not only do they permit cedar to hold its original color and appearance, but many offer the added advantages of repelling water and protecting against wood rot.

Stains, often applied to shakes to achieve a more Colonial look, range from semi-transparent to solid. Semi-transparent stains allow both texture and grain to show through. Opaque stains obscure a bit more of the texture, but obliterate the grain, and do not build up a thick film the way paint does. Because they penetrate the wood rather than adhere to its surface, stains are also less likely to peel.

Paint is the coating of choice for a smoother, more contemporary look. Untreated cedar requires a base coat of primer before painting because the wood contains soluble materials which may bleed through to the surface. To avoid stains showing through the paint, one or more coats of a bleed-resistant primer must be used. Both oil and water-based systems are available for this purpose. Once the proper primer has been applied, painting is easy.

Over the years, untreated shakes eventually wear out and need replacing. Paint provides the most protection against deterioration, followed by opaque stains. Semi-transparent and clear coatings require more frequent reapplication.

MORE REASONS TO QUIT: As if smoking didn't do enough harm to smokers and those who inhale passive smoke, we now have evidence that smokers are more likely to have retarded children than other groups.

Dr. Carolyn D. Drews, an associate professor of epidemiology at Emory University, headed the research project that made the startling findings that were published in the April issue of Pediatrics, the Journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Smoking had previously been linked to low birth weight, infant mortality, and lower intelligence in children. Now, there's evidence that retardation in children can also be tied to smoking.

While it's true that not all smokers gave birth to retarded children, the fact that so many did makes the case for those who say pregnant women should not smoke. Period.

The Mayo Clinic conducted another study on smoking and found that alcoholics were more likely to die from cigarettes than from alcohol.

Dr. Richard D. Hurt of the Mayo Clinic's Nicotine Dependence Center in Rochester, Minnesota, noted the irony of many people overcoming their alcohol problems, only to die from the effects of nicotine dependence.

MORE REASONS TO LOSE — AND WIN: Obesity remains a serious health threat in this country. Forget the trash TV shows that trot out obese "guests" who prattle on about "feeling good about themselves," despite their weight. That's denial raised to an outrageous power.

Recent studies have shown that obesity, which has long been recognized as a serious factor in cardiovascular problems, may also be the cause of infertility in many women. Overweight can also create added problems for women who do become pregnant. Losing the extra pounds not only can improve health, but may also help a woman to conceive and have few complications in pregnancy.

FROM THE NOTEBOOK: The University of Pittsburgh is growing liver cells through a unique culture system. This means the groundwork is being laid for the development of liver devices, treatments for acute liver failure, and gene therapies.

The University of Texas at Houston has started a program to train dentists to look for signs of child abuse. Many injuries show up in the head, neck, face and mouth — areas seen by dentists when they're treating patients.



A NEW LAW AFFECTS PENSION BENEFITS

Suppose Joe spends all of his working life in State A. Upon retirement, he moves to State B and begins drawing his pension, which he earned in State A. Should State A (the "source state") be able to impose income tax on Joe's pension? Before President Clinton signed H.R. 394 into law early this year, a number of states were doing just that. Effective January 1, 1996, however, states are prohibited from taxing most of the pension benefits of non-residents.

This issue has been relevant to many retirees, especially those who have moved from high-income tax states, such as New York and California, to states which have no income tax, such as Florida and Texas.

Protected by the new law from source-state tax are all benefits paid by qualified retirement plans and by state and local government retirement plans. Benefits paid by nonqualified retirement plans are protected if they meet either a "payout" or "excess plan" test.

The "payout" test is satisfied if the nonqualified benefits are payable in substantially equal amounts at least annually over the life or life expectancy of the retiree (and of a beneficiary, if designated), or over a minimum of 10 years. The "excess plan" test is met if the nonqualified plan is designed solely to provide a participant with benefits that could not be provided in a qualified plan because of statutory limits. For example, only a limited amount of compensation may be taken into account in determining an employer's contribution to an employee's qualified plan. If the employer makes up the difference by providing a highly-compensated employee with additional benefits under a non-qualified plan, that would be the type of "excess plan" covered by the new law.

Much Information At Program Council Executive Meeting

The May 6 meeting of the Extension Service Program Council Executive Committee was filled with information, plans and discussion of projects.

Present at Harry Jordan's Restaurant for the business session and luncheon were the hosts, County Agents Davy Vestal and Janet Thomas; Mrs. Vestal (LaChelle), Gerry Zummer of Carbon, Linda Caton, Abilene, and Patricia Hardin of Advance Home Care, Eastland.

Others were Charles Walker of Eastland, Gregg Goode, Gorman, Ronnie Ledbetter, Cisco, Pete Jameson, Ranger, Wanda Hernandez, Cisco, and Viola Payne from *The Eastland Telegram*.

The meeting was called to order by Gerry Zummer, Chairman of the Executive Committee.

The guest speaker, Patricia Hardin, told about the County Resources Association, which she serves as Director.

She said the main purpose of the group is to coordinate help for people in the county whose needs are not being met.

The organization meets the second Thursday of each month, September through May, 12 noon, at Eastland Memorial Library, Mrs. Hardin said. This non-profit group depends on donations for support, and volunteers for any work done.

The group helps the Eastland County Food Pantry, has helped the Ministerial Alliance on critical needs, and provides a clearing house for the Texas Ill and Disabled Children's Service.

The Association has also

sponsored CPR classes at Eastland High School, and infant car sets at the hospital.

Mrs. Hardin said that one of the main services of the organization is to compile a booklet with a list of all available help in the County. This booklet has been distributed to County Officials, agencies and churches.

She passed around copies of this latest Directory, and presented several of them to county leaders present.

Turning to Executive Council programs, County Agent Davy Vestal announced plans for a one-day computer training course at Ranger College on June 13. The time will be 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Vestal said this would be an Introductory Course, a "Quicken" pro-

gram. It will deal mainly with record keeping such as tax information, cash flow, profit and loss, etc.

The cost of the one-day course will be \$20, and this will include a meal and handouts.

Vestal said that next year the Extension Service might offer an Advanced Computer Course. He suggested that persons who taken the Introductory Course should use it for several months before going on to the advanced training.

There was a discussion of the date and place for the annual Executive Council meeting. It was decided to have this meeting sometime in early November. More details will be announced when plans are worked out.

Davy Vestal asked for reports from various

committees, and the response was excellent.

Gregg Goode, Chairman of the Crops Committee, reported that this group is putting out herbicides and fungicides in an effort to kill nematodes. Also, demonstration plots of watermelon, cucumbers and squash are planned. The committee will have a meeting this year, probably in Rising Star.

Charles Walker, head of the Pecan Committee, reported that the latest budding and grafting demonstration was successful. Around 50-60 pecan growers attended.

Other demonstrations are underway, dealing with herbicides, soil fertility and irrigation.

Walker reported that the pecan outlook is good this year.

Pete Jameson of Ranger, Chairman of the "Pasture to Packer" Committee, explained about this program. It is designed to teach young people how to run a more




