R.B. White Trial Starts Monday 91st District Court

The misdemeanor trial of R.B. White, former Sheriff of Eastland County, is set to begin Monday, June 17, 9 a.m. in the 91st District Court in Eastland.

Visiting Judge Bill Burdock of Tarrant County will preside over the trial, which will get underway with jury selection.

The Attorney General's office, State of Texas, will reportedly be prosecuting the case. White's Attorney will be Gary Lewellen.

The charge against White will be Official Oppression, a misdemeanor. The charge states that on

or about Sept. 26, 1995 White, acting as Sheriff of Eastland County, intentionally subjected Mike McPhail to mistreatment and dispossession that White knew was unlawful, to-wit, the removal and destruction of a fence owned by McPhail that was located adjacent to County Road 483.

The charge does not state so, but this road is also known as the Alameda Cemetery Road.

White resigned as Sheriff April 1, 1996. This trial is expected to generate considerable interest in the county.

Potential Scam Halted In Eastland

Eastland Police, with the help of Eastland National Bank personnel, recently put a stop to a scam on a local couple.

Police Chief Cecil Funderburgh reports that about a month ago a stranger went to the home of an elderly couple on the southeast side of town, and offered to seal their driveway. The man indicated that he was from Clovis, New Mexico.

His "sealing" apparently consisted of just putting some oil on the driveway, probably used oil at that, Funderburgh says.

When the young man presented his bill the couple really had a shock - he had charged them \$4,300. And he told them if they didn't pay up he would get a lien on their house.

The couple gave him a check for the amount. He cashed it and lit out.

But that wasn't all. Then the man called back and told the homeowners that they owned him another \$2,400.

So they wrote him another check for that amount, but this time altered the bank to watch for the man when he tried to cash it.

When the individual reached Eastland National Bank, Jim Davidson detained him until the Police could get there.

The individual turned out to be Todd Capley of Dallas. Chief Funderburgh arrested him and he was fined \$267 for soliciting. Also, he agreed to give the couple back the \$4,300 he had previously obtained.

He did this by wiring to the MetroPlex, where some friends or Associates bailed him out of the Eastland situation.

The local homeowners decided not to file other charges.

This experience really points up the dangers in hiring strangers to do home repairs, Chief Funderburgh says. He warns everyone to not fall prey to scam artists.

 With Father's Day coming, we would like to have something one of our sisters wrote about our dad, put in the paper. She truly captured the image and charter of him. Our mom was so proud of it, that it is for her too that we would like to have it printed. It is simply called "Tuffy".

TUFFY

Since childhood he was known as Tuffy. Never Tom, Tommy, or Thomas. No one could recall why or how the nickname had come about, only that Thomas Nathaniel Rogers was and would always be "Tuffy".

He was a lanky man. His features were angular to the point of gauntness, the ruddy skin stretched tightly across high cheekbones. In his sixty-fourth year, time and a hard life had gently rounded his shoulders and roughened his hands and skin. Yet, pride with a hint of arrogance were projected not only in his bearing but in his walk as well.

His eyes were his most compelling features. They were pale blue, set under shaggy brows. When he smiled it was reflected in his eyes, giving them a twinkle and setting his face aglow with an inner radiance that only peace of mind could bring.

His yellowed, gap-toothed smile reflected years of cigarette smoking, coffee drinking, and dental neglect. Even so, it was infectious and the person on the receiving end of it its special quality.

His style of dress seldom varied. He wore light-weight denim jeans, a khaki shirt speckled with cigarette ash burns, worn brown work boots, and atop his thinning gray hair, a felt cowboy hat. The hat was a lot like the wearer, worn and tired looking, but resilient for what it had been through and endured.

He loved the simple things in life: his family, cooking, gardening, coon hunting, a

good cup of coffee, and roll-your-own Prince Albert cigarettes.

When it came to his family a person would be hard put to find another man prouder than he was of his. He always said he was blessed with his large family. Many a times he would laugh and tell his children, "I told your Mother that if she would marry me I would make sure she would always have a maid and a butler. Well, I gave her six maids and seven butlers."

He was a wonderful cook and took much pride in cooking for his family and friends. Holidays were his time to shine! Starting early the day before, he would plan and then cook the complete meal. He seldom ate much of what he prepared because, as he put it, "I filled up on the smells."

He possessed a heart and soul as bountiful as the gardens he tended and nurtured every spring. He loved all the intricacies of gardening: tilling the soil, sowing the seed, fertilizing, watering, weeding, and reaping the "rewards" of a job well done. "Rewards" that he invariably gave away because, "that's what you do when you have more than others." In many ways the gardens were a parallel of the man himself. As the gardens thrived and gave, so too did he.

He was rarely seen without a cup of coffee in one thin-veined hand, a smothering cigarette in the other, and a coon dog or two at his heels whenever he stepped out of doors.

It has been twelve years since he passed away, but very few days ever pass that his memory is not referred to by someone in his family. Memories that always bring sad smiles and misty eyes. He was a man of many facets, a man loved and respected by many, and remembered fondly by all who knew him.

SUMMER TAX UPDATE

The Tax Foundation recently announced that May 7 was Tax Freedom Day for 1996. That's the date on which the average American taxpayer had earned enough money to pay all his or her federal, state, and local taxes for 1996.

The Internal Revenue Service will begin testing a new tax collection program this summer. The Service will be using law firms and debt collection agencies to contact certain taxpayers who owe back taxes. Contacts will be made by phone or mail, not in person.

IRS interest rates dropped for the second quarter of 1996 (April through June). The IRS will assess 8% interest on tax underpayments, and it will pay 7% interest on tax overpayments.

1996 per diem rates have been set for lodging, meals, and incidental expenses incurred by employees while away from home on business. The rates will remain the same as 1995 per diem rates; however, additional localities have been added to the high-cost list. The 1996 list is available in IRS Publication 1542.

Also unchanged for 1996 are the depreciation limits for business automobiles first placed in service this year. The limits are reviewed annually and changed if inflation has been high enough. As in 1995, the 1996 limits will be: first tax year - \$3,060, second tax year - \$4,900, third tax year - \$2,950, each succeeding year - \$1,775.

The IRS is still hoping to perform some statistical audits. Its Tax Compliance Measurement Program (TCMP) audits were postponed indefinitely because of budget considerations. Now the IRS indicates that it would like to do audits of a smaller sampling of tax returns in order to obtain "at least some of the benefits that the postponed TCMP study was designed to achieve." It's estimated that the sample size for this scaled-down audit program would be 34,000 tax returns.
