Ray McCollister of Graham has been upheld by the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland. McCollister was con-

victed of capital murder and sentenced to life in prison for the Sept. 13, 1993 death of

his 23-month-old stepdaughter. The trial was held in Stephens

The trial court found McCollister guilty of killing the girl by causing trauma to her brain due to blunt force

injuries to her head.

The case was especially noticed because it was the first trial held in the state that provides capital murder prosecution in cases involving the

six years old.



### Dear Editor:

In my view the approaching election may be the most important in my life time. We have the opportunity of electing a **Republican Congress and** a Republican President for the first time since 1952. I don't know if you're allowed to mention specific products, but ZUD cleanser is good for rust stains and contains oxalic acid. Another suggestion might be to try muriatic acid. 

### **FORD F-150 PICKUP**

For 13 years, Ford's F-150 pickup has been the nation's best-selling vehicle. For '96, Ford's replaced the old F-150 with a new one, and I'm happy to report it's a leap ahead. It's the domestic industry's best, and its only true rival is Toyota's ultra-sophisticated T100. AUTOTALK tested both a base "6" and an extended cab V8 for this report. Read on for the no-holds-barred result!

The new rear drive F-150 is conventional in design. Styling differs from '95, but items such as overall and interior size, bed dimensions, towing capacity, and other measurements are close to the previous generation. In the Styleside Extended Cab, the twin cloth captain's chairs (\$488) are some of the best anywhere. Nook and cranny storage is abundant in both vehicles, power steering and brakes are standard, twin airbags encourage safety, the cupholders disappoint, power take-off points offer con venience, and locking tailgates on both vehicles make "Midnight Auto Supply" wholesalers unhappy The ups cale "XLT" featured a carpeted cab, the "6," rubber mats A painted rear bumper, cloth instead of a vinyl bench seat and a decent sound system will set you back a total of \$340 if you purchase base models



The V8 F-150 offers the American truck industry's only "non-pushrod" engine. Even non-techies will appreciate its quietness, smooth nature, and ultra-modern design. It's a 4.6 liter, fuel-injected unit that delivers 220HP. Zero to 60 times averaged 10.7 seconds in this 3,982-pound vehicle, about the same as last year's "small" V8. Fuel economy was observed at 13 city and 16 highway (EPA 16/21), about a mile per gallon better than what you could realistically expect from '95's extended cab. The 4.2 liter fuel-injected "6" delivers identical real-world mileage (EPA 17/22) as the V8 in the 300-pound lighter standard cab F-150. Not surprisingly, the 205HP "6" produces only marginally less forward motivation than the V8. The XLT utilized a smooth 4-speed overdrive automatic transmission (\$971); the "6" was mated to a mediocre 5-speed manual overdrive. The "Battle of the Powertrains" bottom line: the V8 betters the "6" in quietness, smoothness, and even fuel efficiency, but you lose little by choosing the base engine. It's a toss-up!

Ride and handling on both vehicles proved identical. Each approaches the smoothness and stability of a minivan. Still, compared to the standards pickups were previously judged by, it's a leap forward! The new F-150's turning circle still disappoints. It's 44-plus feet, but that's a six-percent improvement. The mud and snow radials shoeing both trucks were horrendously slippery, though the V8 was equipped with \$245 "upgrades.

At \$22,200 base for the XLT and \$15,200 for the "6," you get the most advanced American pickup. Don't bother looking at Chevy, GMC, or Dodge's offerings. The new F-150 remains king!







AUSTIN - Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer said last week the Texas Department of Insurance would take full regulatory control over health maintenance organizations this fall.

The agency presently shares regulatory control of HMOs with the Texas Department of Health.

Bomer said the Legislature will have to approve a plan to make the switch permanent, and meetings to discuss the issue were scheduled last week.

Jeff Wurzel, executive director of the Texas Health Maintenance Organization Association said the regulatory change could make dealing with state regulations easier for the 44 HMO programs that cover 2.2 million Texans.

"I think the change will be positive. We hope that at one agency, the process will be improved," Wurzel said.

> pealed to the U.S. Supreme Court last week to overturn a federal court order requiring special elections in 13 congressional districts in Texas.

> The attorneys raised many objections to the court order, arguing that special elections would be highly disruptive, that it is not necessary to redraw 13 districts to correct constitutional violations in only three districts, and that with less than three months until the general election, minority voter turnout would be lessened.

A federal court panel of three consideration. judges earlier this month redrew 13 of Texas' 30 congressional district boundaries that were declared unconstitutional because they were racially gerrymandered.

Attorney General Dan Morales is considering whether to file an appeal to stay the panel's order for special elections.

**Tobacco Trial to Stay Put** 

Texas' \$4 billion lawsuit against the tobacco industry will stay in Texarkana where Attorney General Morales filed it, a federal judge ruled last week.

U.S. District Judge David Folsom rejected arguments from tobacco industry lawyers who sought to move the lawsuit to Austin, which would have been more convenient.

Morales filed suit in March against the tobacco industry, accusing it of committing fraud and violating federal antitrust and racketeering laws. The suit seeks reimbursement to the state of the costs of treating tobacco-related illnesses.

Texas, the nation's leading cottonproducing state, is estimated to produce 3.65 million bales, down 18 percent from last year. It is only the second time since 1990 that the Texas cotton crop has dropped below 4 million bales.

Perry said more than 600,000 acres were abandoned on the southern high plains, the state's largest cotton-producing area.

"Brr, it's going to be a cold night! I can see my breath!" said Mr. Winklesneezer. Then he blew a big white cloud into the frosty air.


