Band Students Score Big In Solo Contest

however 32 fifth graders and a handful of sixth graders were prepared and ready for the competition.

This group of hard working young people got Bovina off to a great start in the contest. All the morning participants received a rating

of "I", which is the best score.

THE WEATHER FOR the last couple of weeks has been a reminder to long-time residents of this area that you never put your heavy coats away until you at least see some buds on the trees.

After all, old "Parmer County Pete, the Prairie Dog" saw his shadow on February 2, which foretold six more weeks of winter.

"Well, that's okay with us," most folks said, since up to that time we really hadn't had much winter weather.

However, that wasn't the way Mother Nature (and apparently Pete the Prairie Dog) interpreted the rules as pertaining to this area's weather.

The third week in February featured more ups and downs than the New York Stock Exchange. For seven or eight days, we had a very strong wind, followed by a nice, windless day, then back to windy, then back to windless, and so forth and so on.

On that particular week, however, the wind was from its prevailing direction in the Panhandle-South Plains, of west/southwest.

When we got to the last week of February, Old Pete's prediction kicked in, and the wind-of-choice became right out of the Cold North, so that on the alternate days, the temps never made it back into the 60s or 70s, which we had enjoyed during much of January and February, to the 30s and 40s.

We had our first "single digit" temperature in more than three years on Tuesday, February 26, when we got up that morning to a low reading of six degrees. The last time that had happened was on December 21, 1998, when the low hit eight degrees.

In that 1998 cold spell, the mercury dropped to a bone-chilling 1-degree reading. We hit single-digits four straight mornings that week, which included Christmas Day, and never made it above the freezing mark for an 84-hour period.

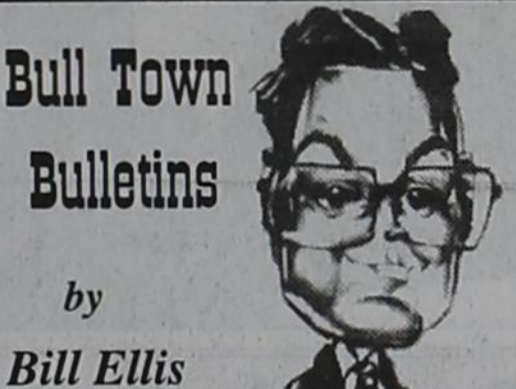
Our mercury dipped to a season's low of five degrees last Sunday morning, March 3. Some thermometers registered a reading of "3," and someone saw a "0," somewhere, but the official low was a chilly five degrees.

Farmers have always told us that we need a long period of temps below freezing during the winter, in order to get rid of our insect pests. You can always tell the years that we don't have this weather condition, since the flies arrive somewhat ahead of the first robins.

Guess how long it has been since our area had temperatures below zero? If you guessed 11+ years, you got it right. Not since the mercury dipped to two below on December 24, 1990 have we experienced a negative reading.

The temps fell below zero four straight days in the '90 cold spell, dipping to -7 on December 23. The "high" temperature only reached seven degrees on two days during that spell, which should've taken care of the bugs for a long while!

The month of February, 2002, ended with precious little rainfall, .14 inch to be exact. Farmers/ranchers with wheat for grazing are badly needing some moisture, and soon, if the dryland wheat is to be salvaged, if indeed it can be. Last winter's better-than-normal winter moisture produced one of the best wheat crops on record, as well as "setting the table" for the row crops' good start.

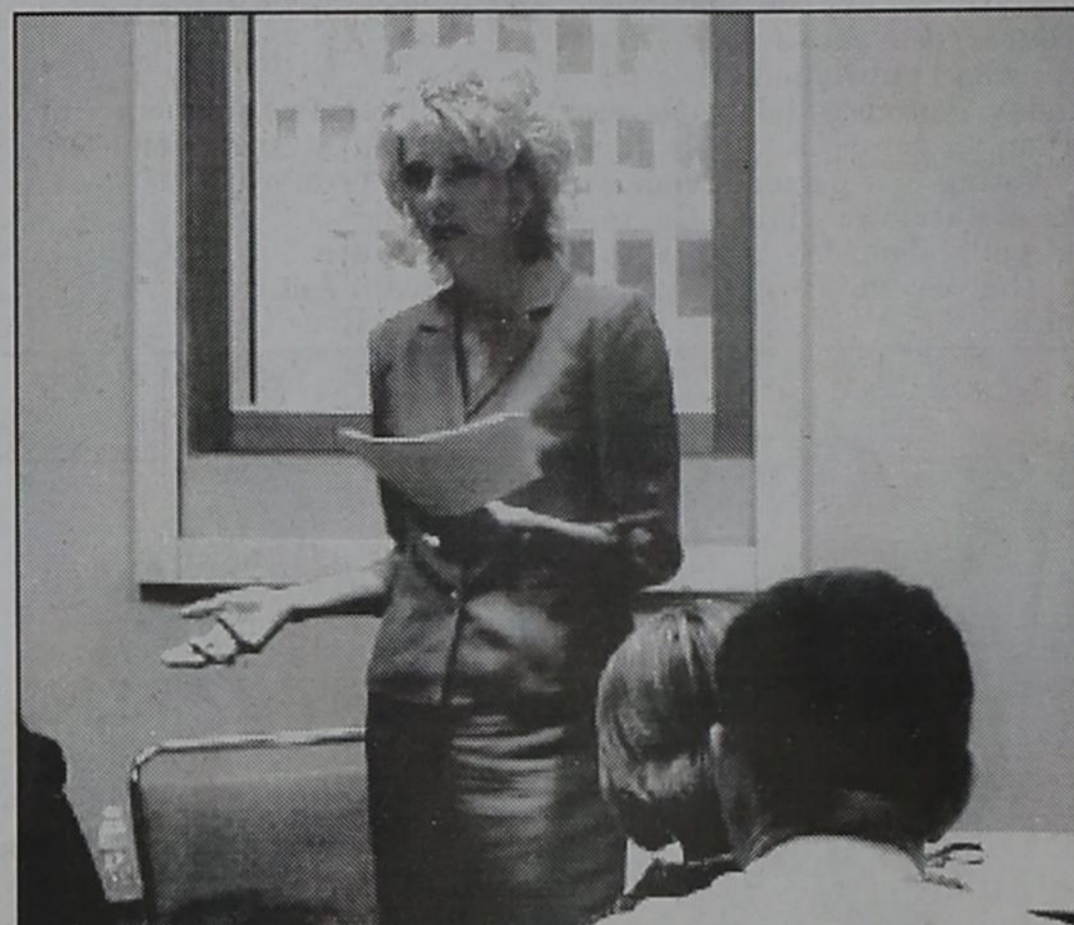

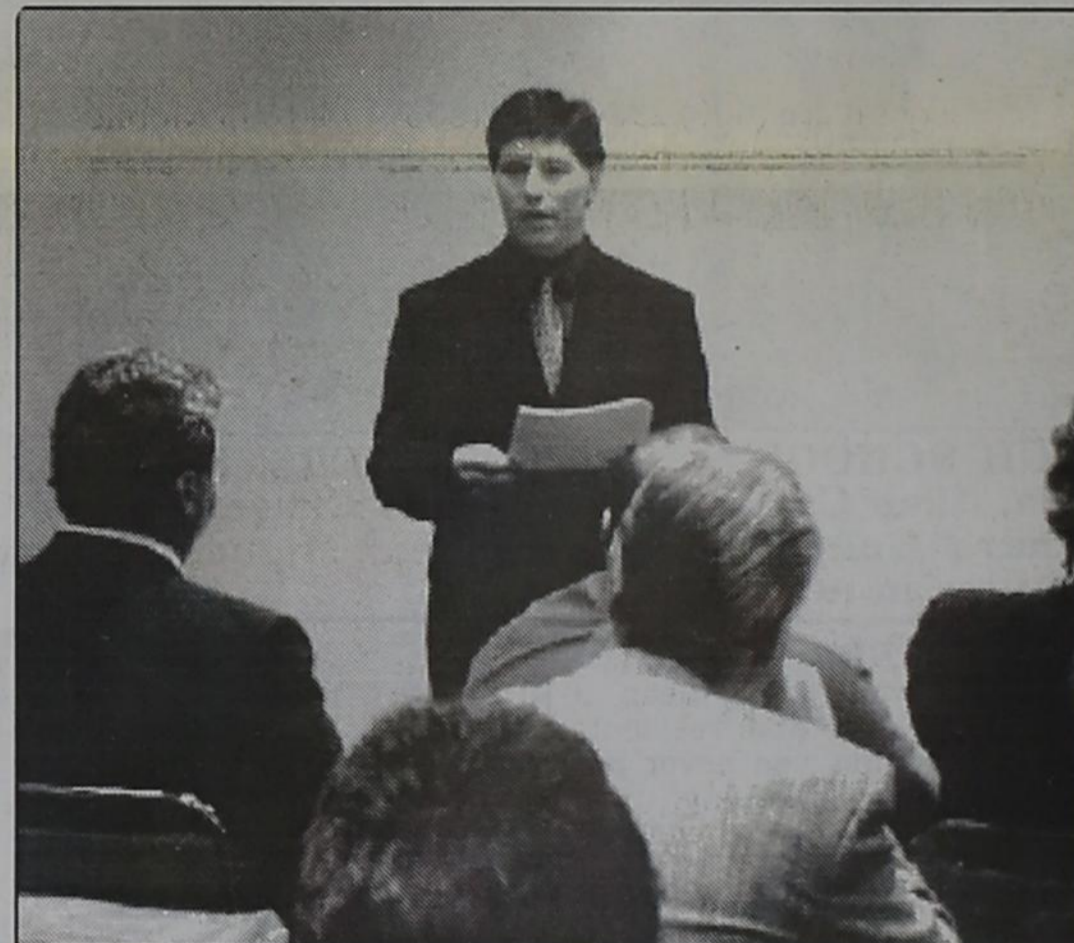
He gave session participants information on grants that have allowed BHS to be part of HSTW and that are available to other districts.

Lubbock Woman Candidate For State School Board

Joyce Herron of Lubbock is a candidate for the State Board of Education, subject to the action of the Republican primary on March 12.

She was brought to the campaign trail through her love of the children of Texas and the tragedy of last September 11.

"I was watching television about 3 a.m. and a lady came on TV who had just lost her husband in the September 11 attack," Mrs. Herron related. "She said, 'Do something for your country.' I had just retired and I love school with a passion. I said to myself this is a good way to do that, so I called the next day and signed up to run."

Mrs. Herron is running



after current state school board member Judy Strickland of Plainview

announced she would run against Pete Laney (D-Hale Center) for the District 85 seat in the Texas House of Representatives. Mrs. Strickland is finishing the fourth year of a four-year term.

Mrs. Herron is running in the Republican primary against Bob Craig, also of Lubbock, in the 15th school board district, which takes in 75 counties from the Panhandle south to San Angelo.

Fifteen people serve on the state board of education, and about 1.4 million people are in District 15.

Mrs. Herron taught school for nine years and worked as an administrator in California. She came to Lubbock in 1974 and helped found Trinity Christian School.

She was also involved in the rehabilitation of a charter school in Dallas by introducing the peace program, and has extensive training in education in Europe.

Mrs. Herron wants to focus on discipline in the classroom if she is elected.

Maintaining the state's \$18 billion Permanent School Fund is also a priority.

She also wants to re-evaluate high school graduation standards and place an emphasis on individual students' performance in standardized tests such as the TAAS.


"How TAAS is set up focuses on the test and not enough on teaching," she said.

She believes parents are the missing link in schools today.

"We need to come together again with teachers and administrators and work on a school-wide discipline system. We will teach the system to parents and it stays the same from three years old to 12th grade.

Mrs. Herron has three children and five grandchildren. Her husband, Bill, died in 1991.

Ione Deaton Submits Her Life Story For Publication

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Ione Deaton.

I was born on June 13, 1919, in Jacksboro, Texas, to Robert "Bob" Leslie Pickens and Emily Elizabeth Solomon Pickens. I was the oldest of five children. I had four sisters: Vi, Naomi, Bobbie Raye and Barbara Jean.

My parents were farmers in Spur, Texas. We girls had to help with the farming. Daddy grew cotton and maize. We helped with the cultivating and planting. There was also 20 cows we had to help milk.

Mother always had a big garden that was watered from a water well. We did a lot of canning. There was a cannery in Spur. The ladies

in the community put the lids on and steamed the jars so they would seal. The kids had to help out by snapping beans.

On Sunday afternoons we got to play ball with our cousins. We always had a lot of fun when we got together.

I went to a country school in Dry Lake; then went to Spur for high school. My cousin, Evelyn, and I graduated the same year. I went to St. Draughon's Business College and she went to Texas Tech. After finishing business school I worked at Reese Air Force Base, for the city of Lubbock and then for the Federal Housing Administration in Lubbock which I retired from after ten years.

I married Lewis Hickman at McAdoo, Texas, in 1940. Lewis farmed the land his dad had bought in 1915. His dad started the farm by planting a patch of potatoes.

We had three children: Bobbie Jo, Lela Beth and

Lewis Lee. Lewis Lee died in a farming accident when he was four years old.

We moved to Lubbock and the girls went through school there.

Lewis passed away from cancer in 1965.

In 1970, Beth and her husband, Jerry Shelton, moved to Friona in order for Jerry to teach. I sometimes came to stay with their kids while Beth and Jerry worked. That is when I met Leslie Deaton. Businesses Have April 15 Deadline

The state Comptroller's office has reminded Texas businesses to render their property with county appraisal districts by April 15. To render is to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 2002.

Business owners and operators are required by law to render, but any property owner—including homeowners, farmers and ranchers—may render their property with county appraisal districts. Rendering allows property owners to record their opinion of their property's value and ensures that the appraisal district sends them a notice before placing a higher value on their property.

"Property owners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," said Buddy Breivogel, manager of the Comptroller's Property Tax division. "They ensure that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills."

Even if the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus late payment penalties.

Businesses annually report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property. Appraisal districts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render, the chief appraiser estimates the value

of the business property.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office. One appraisal district may appraise a property for county tax purposes, while a neighboring appraisal district may appraise the same property for school taxes, if the school district is in both counties.

The Comptroller's office also announced that owners whose property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. Property owners have until April 15 to file the decreased value report, which indicates their property's condition on January 1, 2002.

Property owners who can show good cause may ask the chief appraiser to extend the rendition deadline to April 30. The chief appraiser must grant owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Railroad Commission a filing extension to April 30, and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owner's request is in writing and shows good cause.

Taxpayers may contact their county appraisal district office for rendition forms, or they may e-mail the Comptroller's property tax division at ptd.cpa@cpa.tx.state.us or call the property tax hotline at 1-800-252-9121 for general property tax information. In Austin, call (512)305-9999.

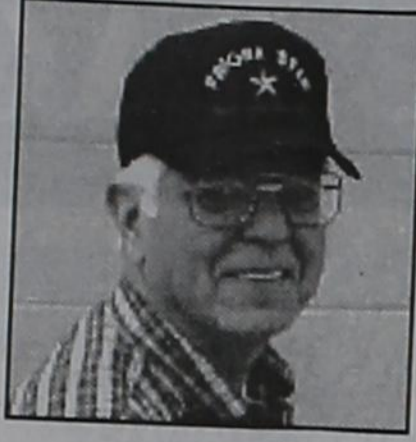

"Don't Forget Your Vitamin E"

When I was a kid in Hillsboro, we bought toilet paper by the roll.

At Barnard's Grocery, in the mid-50s, Mr. Barnard ordered toilet paper by the case. Each roll was individually wrapped, with about 100 rolls to the case.

One of my jobs was to keep the shelf stocked. Trying to stack the rolls so they didn't fall all over the store was a challenge.

As I recall, we stacked them like a pyramid to add some stability and to keep some snotty-nosed little kid from careening out of control and scattering rolls all the way back to the meat market.

I'm not sure now but seems like Mr. Barnard sold toilet paper back then for a nickel or a dime a roll. If you only needed one roll, no problem. Or two or three or four? Just throw 'em in the basket.

Which I did on occasion, launching a roll across the little store into a slow moving shopping cart.

I also recall the rolls being big and fat. Must have had a thousand sheets per roll or more. And you could have any color you wanted as long as it was white.

There were no birds, flowers, or teddy bears on

those ancient rolls of wipe. No blue, yellow, or beige colors to choose from.

I reckon folks in those days didn't take the decorative value of toilet paper too serious.

And the texture of the paper wasn't exactly soothing to the chapped edges of one's soul, but it was a luxury compared to a page out of a catalog.

Many times during my career at Barnard's grocery I saw folks buy just one roll of toilet paper. Never thought much about it at the time.

I figure most of the houses inhabited by the common folk in Hillsboro only had one toilet, thus one roll was all they needed at a time.

You can't buy one roll of TP today, at least not where I shop. The minimum you can get is 4 rolls, isn't it? I usually buy a six-pack. Now that I think about it, I don't know why I do that.

The only reason this toilet paper thing came up is because over at Wal Mart last Sunday, I realized that people were actually shopping and reading and studying on the toilet paper aisle, which is approximately 100 feet long and 50 feet high.

You can buy 4-packs up to 20-packs. You can buy regular rolls or big rolls. You

can buy Charmin, Cottonelle, Scott, Sparkle, or any one of a dozen brands. All of them offer their own reason for buying them: softer, firmer, smoother.

I get the regular rolls because those "big rolls" are too fat for my holder. There ain't enough space between the wall and the roller to fit a big roll so it will pull down easily.

And I hate to yank down on the roll and have one sheet tear loose. The most useless thing in the world is one little old sheet of toilet paper. You have to have at least a half a dozen sheets to fold over before it does you any good. Oh, and never, ever, settle for less than 2-ply paper. You'll be sorry if you do.

Shoppers were reading and comparing the various toilet paper selections. It was kind of embarrassing actually.

I just wanted to grab a pack and get the heck out of

there before someone saw me hanging out with a bunch of toilet paper perverts.

So I went for the Charmin. As I tossed it in the cart and spun out toward the lunch meat counter, I noticed that the toilet paper I chose, right there on the pack, said "NEW! With aloe vera and vitamin E."

Friends, what is vitamin E doing in toilet paper? Why do I need vitamin E, well, you know, back there. Couldn't I use vitamins A, B, & C in there too, just to be safe?

I felt guilty the rest of the day. Those folks in Afghanistan and Sudan don't even have much toilet paper and here I was with paper soaked in vitamin E, basking in the comfort of aloe vera.

No wonder they don't like us over there. Those arrogant, elite, Americans with their smooth and healthy rear ends. What a bunch of spoiled brats.

Toilet paper with vitamin E. What will they think of next. God Bless America!

AT WATER FORUM

T. Boone Pickens' Attitude Concerns Agri. Secretary

(Editor's note: The following article appeared in the Tuesday, March 5 edition of the Amarillo Globe-News, as a followup of a meeting in Lubbock on Monday)

LUBBOCK - T. Boone Pickens, president of Mesa Water, says the only way he can market the water beneath his ranch is to sell it. However, others are concerned that the sale of that water may jeopardize the future of this region.

Pickens was a guest speaker at the "High Plains Water, People and Economic Enterprise: A Forum for Discussion" in Lubbock, co-sponsored by the Texas Tech University College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, the High Plains Underground Conservation District, Second Baptist Church of Lubbock and the Christian Life Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

A standing-room-only crowd of approximately 300 filled the Texas Tech International Cultural Center to express their concerns about the future of water in Texas.

Pickens said he's no state water expert, only a one-county expert and that's because he has had to become one. And he personally has no water for sale, except that beneath his ranch in Roberts County.

He can't market the water in the Ogal-

ala Aquifer beneath his ranch through irrigation, as many others do with an available water supply, because of the ruggedness of the ranch land.

The same, he said, goes for his neighbors in Roberts, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties.

That's why he joined together with his neighbors to form the Mesa Water group.

"I need to sell the water. It's stranded surplus water," Pickens said.

Being in the oil and gas business, Pickens said, he knows if he doesn't sell it, the city of Amarillo and the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority will pump it out from under the water group. Both entities have water rights that are nearby or adjoin land owned by the Mesa Water landowners.

"I'm not that much of a philanthropist that I want to give it away," he said.

Pickens said he proposed to sell the water first to Amarillo or CRMWA, but neither entity said it needed it. Now he is proposing to sell it to the San Antonio, Dallas/Fort Worth or West Texas areas. He even has a meeting set up in New Mexico next week to talk about a water deal.

"I'm not planning to buy other water rights. I have not purchased water rights. I have options and agreements with my neighbors," Pickens said of the 150,000 acres of water rights involved in the water deals he offers.

"I think water should be first offered and first used where the water is, but if it is deemed surplus water and it will be

drained otherwise, you have to go to the best market," he said.

That kind of attitude, however, has Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs and others concerned.

Not only does the de-watering of an area pit neighbor against neighbor, Combs said at the forum, but it jeopardizes the future of agriculture in this region, the cities that depend on the economic input from agriculture and the general public who enjoy a safe, dependable food supply.

If this country wants to maintain a strong food system, she said, it must realize the importance of protecting its adequate, affordable water supply. If the United States ever has to go overseas for its food supply, there are no assurances of its safety and supply.

"Anybody that makes a permanent sale of water does so at their own peril," Combs said. "You don't know today truly what the future will be like in 20 to 30 years. The permanent transfer of water may have grave consequences that you can't know of today."

Without a way to predict the next drought, Combs said, selling water off may mean selling off the future of this region.

Combs said if the water is worth \$5 today, it will be worth more later. Lease or partial sale of the water may be a consideration, she said, but that's why she likes the local water conservation district option.

"It gets people at the local level to talk about things" and to decide what is best for themselves.
