withhold further action pending study of county finances with the possibility of voting additional revenues to solve the problem. This became necessary and was voted mid-year. This project should be given consideration in 1969.

Consideration was given on additional paving, however this could be worked out. Information is on hand, prepared the past year and should be updated and used to start this work early in 1969. We feel contractors can be secured. Some have called at our office and Paving Committee should be appointed to confer with the City and work on this project.

A most successful Christmas activity was implemented and executed by your Chamber, starting December 7, and running through December 24. Cash prizes were offered by the chamber for a downtown window contest with six prizes and your Board of Directors endorsed closing December 26, as an extra holiday in 1968.

Worked on improvement of tourist facilities, conferring with two National Motel and Restaurants operations along with two individuals who visited our office on this matter.

Your manager and others attended several regional and district meetings on various matters. Two outstanding were an Industrial Conference and Legislative Seminar in Fort Worth, conducted by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Leading the Industrial Conference was U. S. Secretary of Commerce, C. R. Smith. Leading the Legislative Seminar was Governor-elect Preston Smith and Lt. Governor-elect Ben Barnes. We feel it most important that Baird be represented in meetings of this type.

We have made contacts on various matters and answered numerous inquiries on Baird and Callahan County. Many day to day activities are given attention and your chamber office serves with others in any capacity needed. Rental listings are maintained to serve owners and others seeking housing and this service is used continuously.

It has been our pleasure to fully cooperate with our Rodeo, Clubs and organizations in their activities in behalf of our community and we express our appreciation to them.

We gratefully acknowledge the splendid cooperation from our City officials, County officials

and so very many individuals. Their assistance is most gratifying.

Our financial position was revised, changes made in staff assignments and remuneration on July, 1968, with considerable savings for the Chamber, which made possible to clear up deficiency carried from 1967 and 1968 with all accounts paid. Other nominal changes should be made in early 1969, which should create some balances available for Special Projects.

As most of you know, your manager also serves as Housing Director. This requires time and consideration with the completion of our new Project's completed April 1, 1968. The Board of Commissioners is considering an application for additional Housing for the Elderly. We are now doing the preliminary study and preparing requests for consideration. This Project will include a Community Center Building, owned and operated by the Housing Authority. Please allow me to request your indulgence in the division of responsibility as the new undertaking will be quite demanding on my time.

We are not satisfied with 1968 results and we should never be satisfied or complacent on community matters. Many complex problems affecting our Schools, City, and County face us and I strongly urge everyone to involve themselves actively in the challenge. Nothing just happens. It is dreamed, created and nurtured into reality by dedicated and ambitious men and women. Let us, here and now join in resolve to do the important and necessary service to our community today, 1969.
