





A broken red line of reflectors to it. indicates to the driver that he is traveling the wrong way on the freeway. A red arrow pointing at the driver from the pavement as he begins to enter a freeway ramp indicates that he is entering the wrong way.

These reflectors, in extensive use for about a year, are made of acrylic plastic- red on one side and white on the other. A driver going in the right direction sees the white side. A wrong-way driver sees the red. So red means "wrong way."

You even see a certain amount of surfing on inland lakes in the form of "riding the wakes." This is nothing more than riding the wave created by a large slow moving powerboat. As long as the hull remains displacement and throws up a wake. you can ride the board. However, such a wake vanishes if the boat operator speeds up the craft enough to get it on plane.

But back to surfing on Gulf of Mexico waves. It doesn't compare with the surfing you'll find in Hawaii or on the Pacific Coast where breaking waves are of huge size. You won't get quarter-mile long

rides on Gulf waves as do the folks in Hawaii and the Pacific. Coast. Gulf Coast breakers will run three to four feet in size as compared with Hawaii's eight to

Even so the Gulf waves are big enough to sustain exciting rides of about 100 yards.

On summer days it's common to see several thousand surfers riding the waves in front of the Seawall at Galveston. Dead of inter doesn't stop them either If the waves are there you'll find several hundred hardy souls out riding the boards. Their protection against the weather and cold will be wet suits.

This sport has blossomed to the extent that surfboards now are standard items in sporting goods stores. One Houston concern-Nil's Products Co.-had turned to making boards specifically designed to give maximum rides on the small waves typical of the Texas coast.

Called the Gulf-Flite board and due to a change in materials used, it averaged about 15 pounds less than other boards. Cutting down the weight has in no way sacrificed any strength.

Surfing on the Teaxs coast is also leading to competition. Most of the competition to-date has been between clubs from various cities. But there's already talk about state and regional meets.

Since its advent on the Texas coast, the surfboard has found an additional use other than surfing. Some fishermen are using them to get to out of the way places on placid water.





### Lakes to Provide Amistad with Fish

Extensive fishery surveys just completed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department indicate fish life in the new Amistad Reservoir on the Rio Grande will get off to a flying start.

Abundant desirable game fish were found in upstream reservoirs that will be inundated by the mammouth impoundment.

Significantly the recent fishery surveys also reversed previous fishery decisions calling for selective chemical renovation in Lake Walk and Devil's Lake on the Dev-


George Henderson, fishery biologist in charge of the survey project, determined that the two lakes support many more desirable game fish than previously

These fish, he said, can serve as brood fish in Amistad when water levels rise and inundate Lake Walk and Devil's Lake.

Game fish, approximating 50 per cent in the two lakes, would be lost in the event of chemical treatment, said Henderson.

Detailed fishery surveys showed 62 crappie, 20 channel catfish, and 66 black bass per surface acre in both lakes. Such densities. Henderson said, equal national averages for good fishing lakes.




