WE HAD AN UNUSUAL request this week concerning our football contest. It seems the coaches were upset in learning that some members of the Bovina team who enter our contest have picked their team to lose.

Seriously, we know that having to pick the score for the local team presents problems, because some fans will staunchly refuse to pick against the local bunch, regardless of the odds, while others take a more realistic approach.

Maybe all of the contestants can be more at ease in picking the Dallas score. We'll give it a try, and we'll even invite your comments. After all, we sponsor the contest for the football fans and part-time experts. Whatever the majority likes, we always try to do.

++++ SPEAKING OF OPTIONS, the Bovina School administration and leaders are circulating questionnaires dealing with the operation of the school cafeterias. If we get it set up in time, we plan to have a sample copy in this issue of the Blade.

Marvin Sartin, area economist for this district, will discuss the economics of harvest-aid chemical





Bible History

The thirty-nine books of the Old Testament contain God's covenant with the Jews (Deuteronomy 5:3). The New Testament's twenty-seven books contain God's covenant with Christians (Matthew 28: 19-20). Bible history divides into three periods. The Patriarchal Age covers Adam's fall, man's increasing sinfulness, God's punhishment of man through the flood, and the beginning of God's plan to save man (Genesis 1-12). In the Jewish Age God gave Abraham's descendants (the Jewish nation) the law of Moses to prepare the people for the coming of Christ (Galatians 3: 24, 25). However, Jeremiah prophesied that God would later make a new

miah 31:31). Finally, Christ came to

terminate the Jewish Age and inaugurate the Christian Age. Fulfilling God's promise to Abraham (Galatians 3:29), Jesus brought salvation to the sinful world and became the mediator of a better covenant (Hebrews 8:6-12). He nailed the old covenant to the cross, taking it out of the way (Colossian 2:14-17). Of course, the Old Testament still has value as God's word, for examples and admonitions (Romans 15:4; 1 Cor. 10:11). In the Christian Age, the last period, God speaks to all men through Christ who has revealed His will in the New Testament (Hebrews 1:1,2; 9:15). Lee Clark






