Marissa C. Rodriguez is the daughter of Oscar and Efigenia Rodriguez. Marissa played basketball for four years in high school and ran track her freshmen and

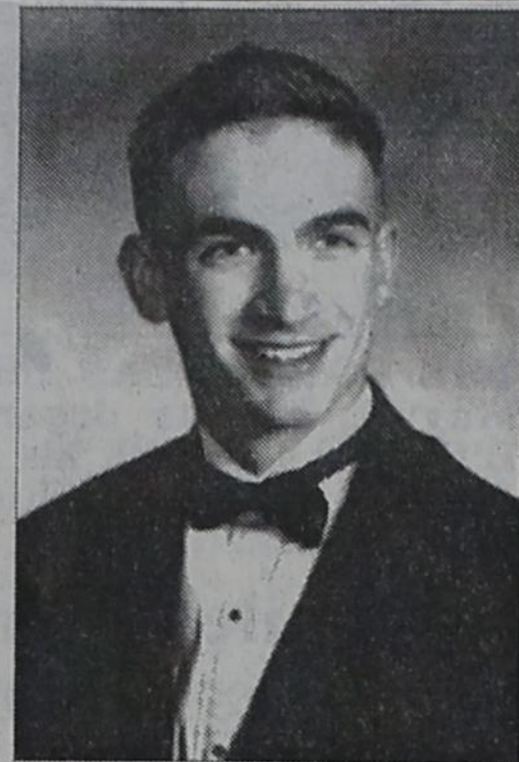

After graduation, she plans to move to San Antonio and attend the University of San Antonio majoring in physical therapy or medicine.

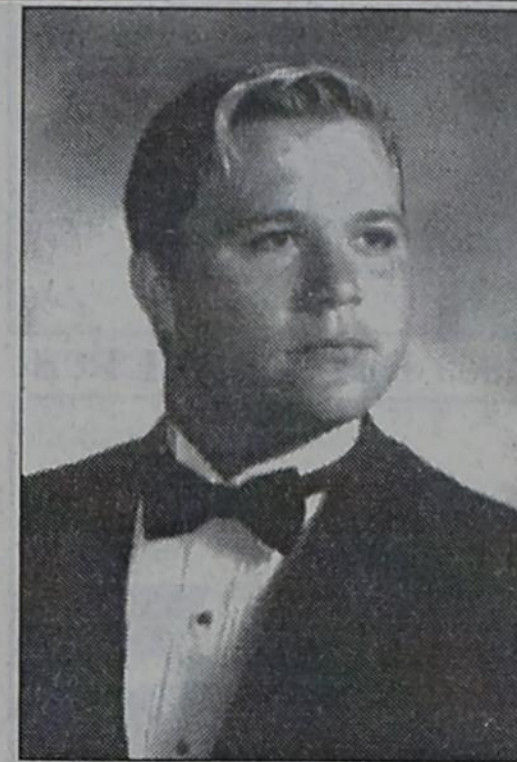

K'Leigh has been an active member of Student Council and National Honor Society

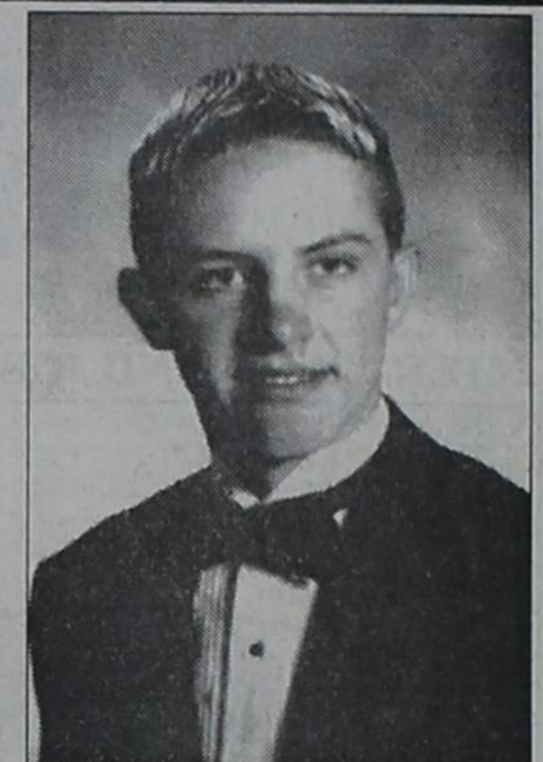

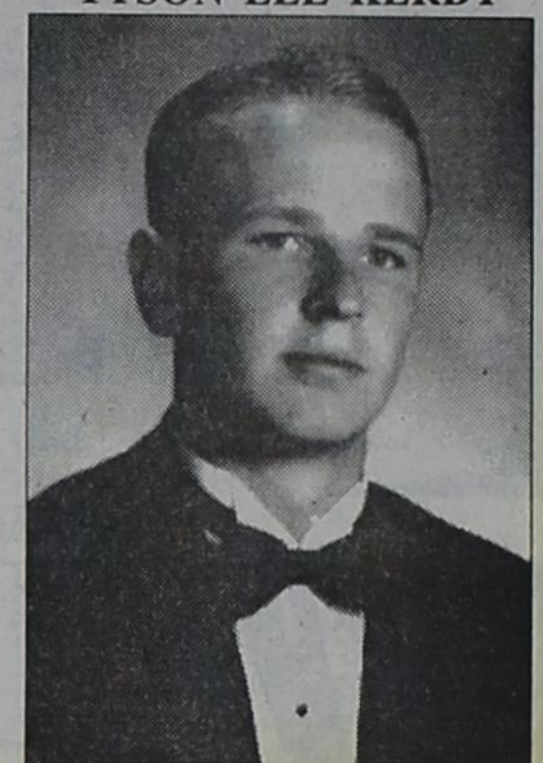

For the office of board secretary, Susan Kerby was elected by acclamation.

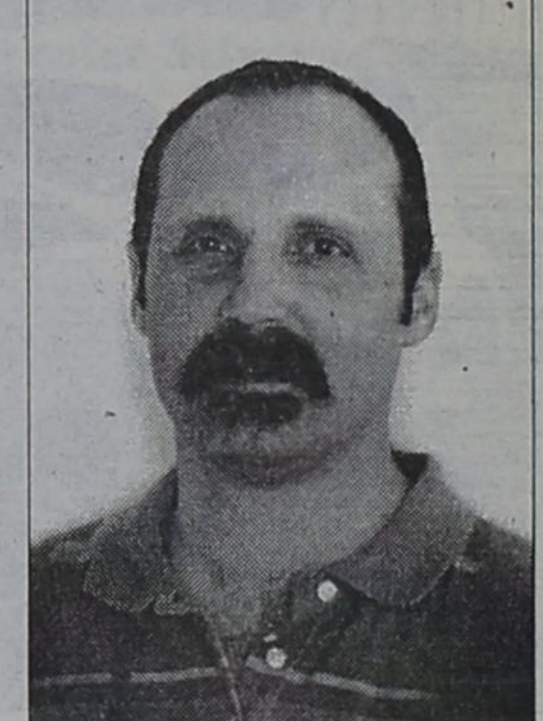
The board then took up official business of paying vouchers, approving previous

In other action, the board

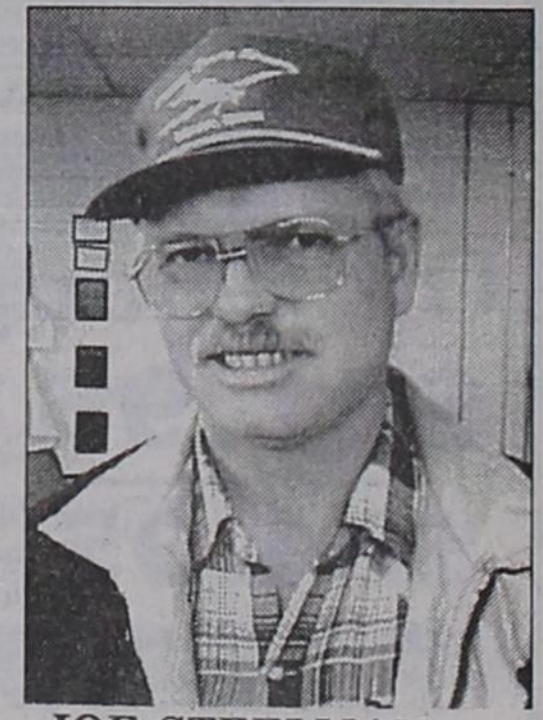

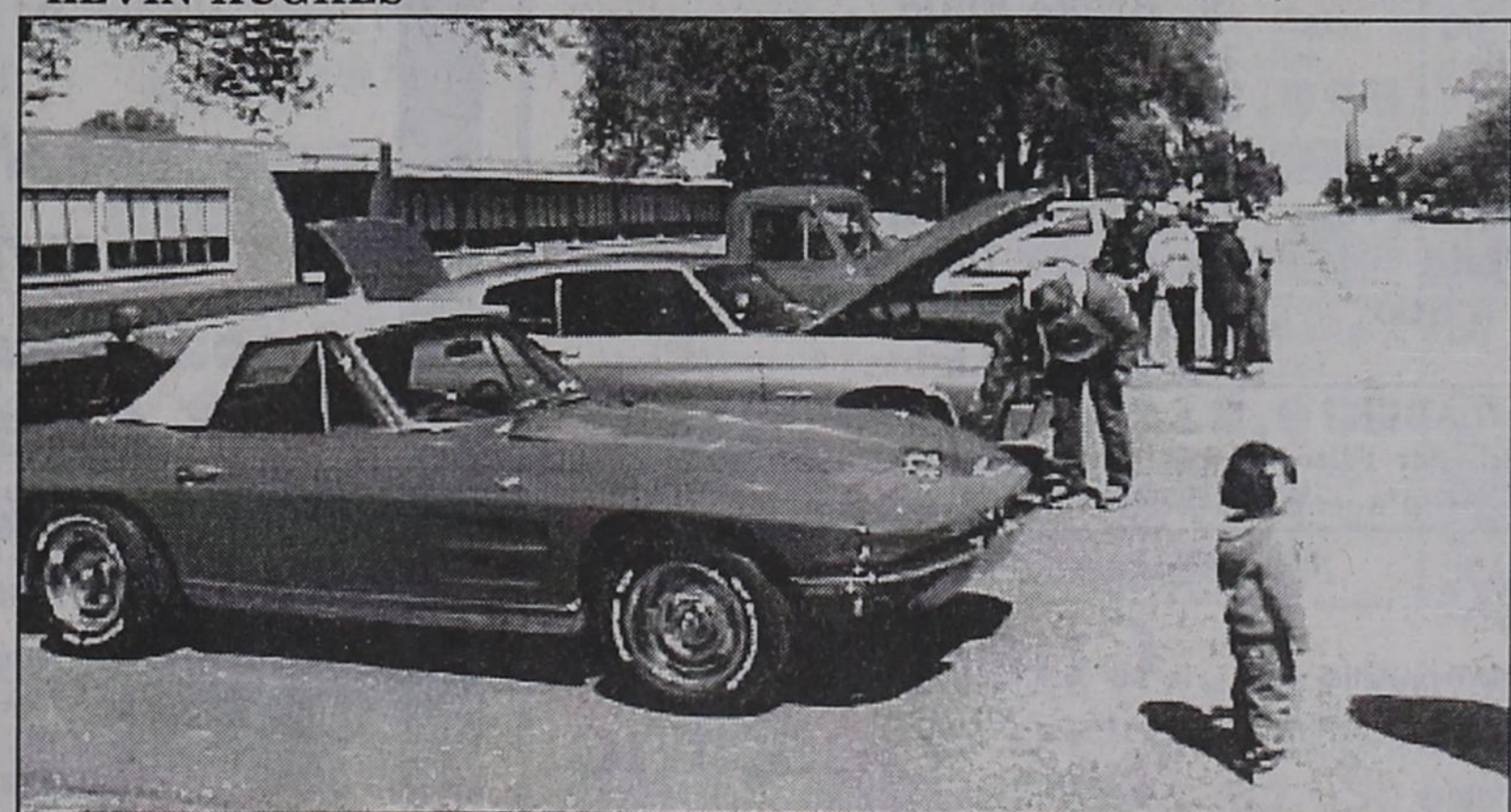
Previous experience: None required. On-the-job training offered on a continually exhausting basis.

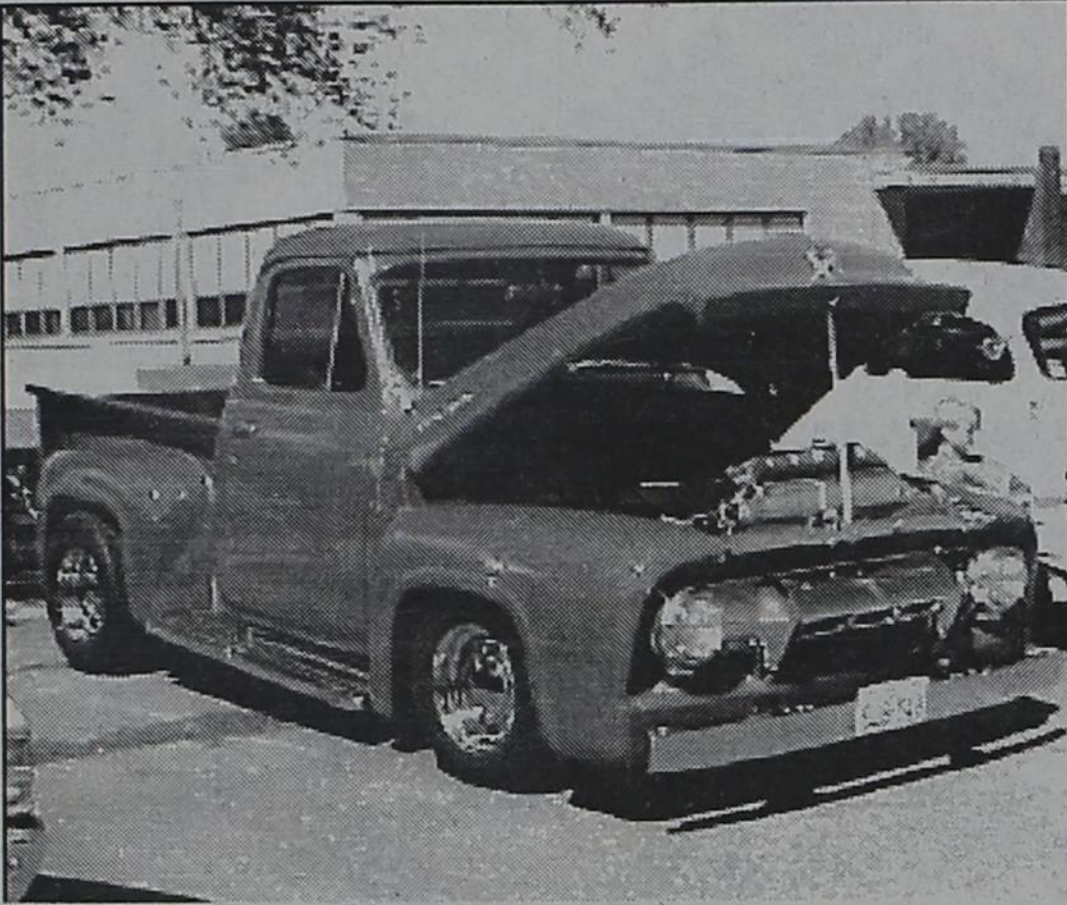

MIKE D'UVA AND HIS 1963 RED CORVETTE



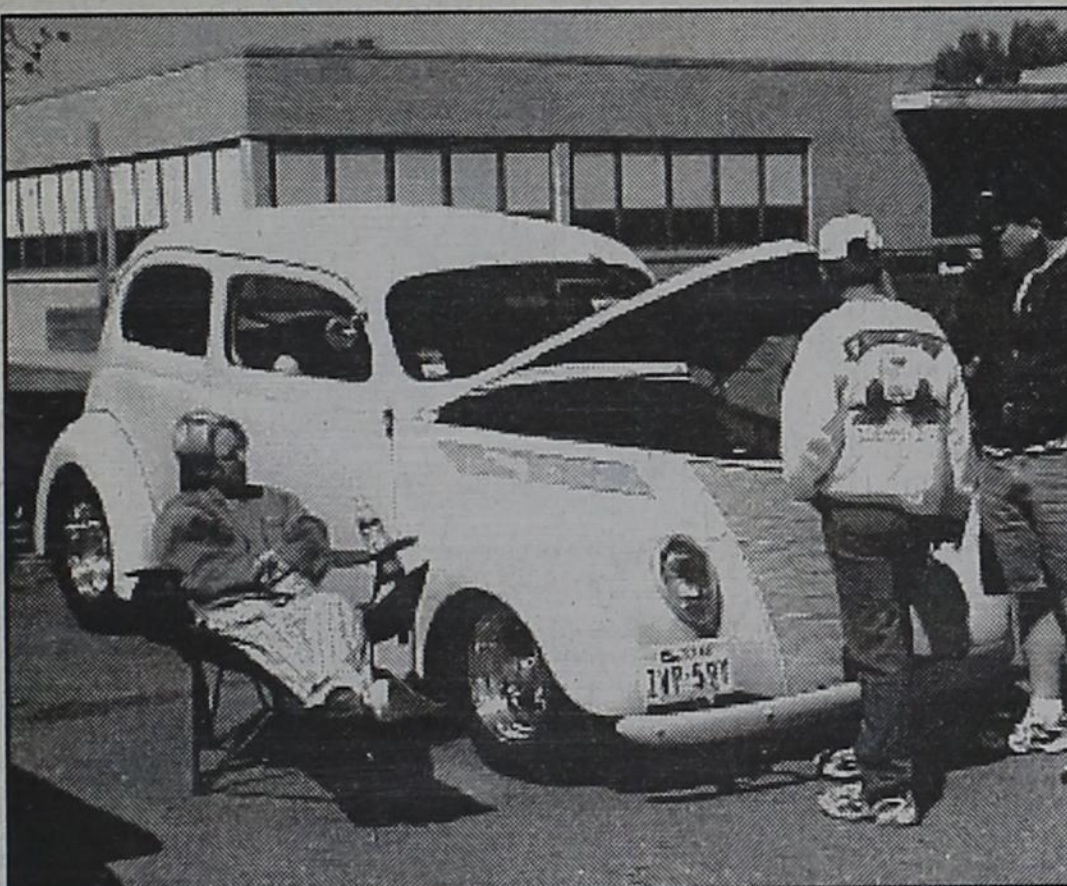

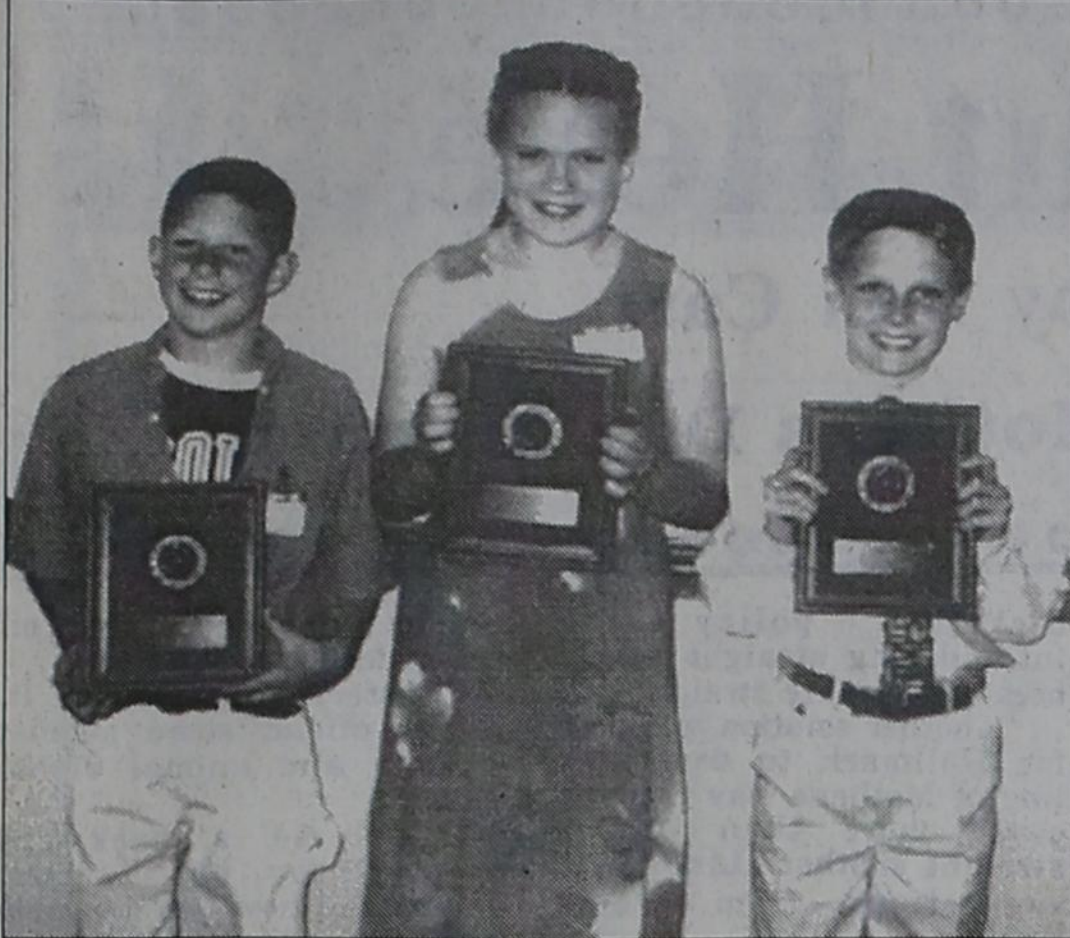

Members of the Plains Cotton Growers Executive Committee met via conference call with members of the House Ag Committee staff to discuss legislative options for consideration during development of the next Farm Bill.

Most of the points made by the PCG contingent consisted of refinements to concepts previously communicated to the House Ag Committee and other members of Congress.

PCG's positions reflect the needs and interests of cotton growers on the Texas High Plains and what they feel is necessary for survival in the short-term as well as what they feel would best provide the strengthened safety net that they need for the future.

Specific points made by the PCG group included the strongly held belief that the marketing loan program should be retained with two important modifications.

The first is the return to a formula derived loan rate and the second is an increase in the minimum cotton loan rate to not less than 60 cents per pound in recognition of the increased cost associated with producing the crop.

Also high on PCG's list was the importance of continued funding for Step 2 and availability of generic certificates to help keep U.S. cotton competitive and moving to market.

PCG's stance on the loan makes up the first of a three part method to achieve an overall level of support for cotton not less than 80 cents per pound.

The other key parts of the plan include development of a counter-cyclical support mechanism similar to the Target Price system used in the 1990 Farm Bill. Payment under the PCG version of the Target Price mechanism would be coupled to planting and paid based on modified payment yields reflecting the higher of a grower's current APH or the

frozen 1985 payment yield used today.

The third and last part of the safety net structure would be comprised of a fixed AMTA-style de-coupled payment in the 7-9 cent per pound range.

PCG also discussed the idea of developing a short-term, Resource Conservation Program that would allow producers to voluntarily set-aside less productive or higher-cost acreage in exchange for a payment based on a 1-3 year contract.

Staff representatives from the General Accounting Office met with representatives of Plains Cotton Growers to discuss the effects of payment limits on cotton producers struggling to survive.

The GAO inquiry, instigated at the request of Senators Tom Harkin (D-Iowa) and Thad Cochran (R-Mississippi), is charged with determining what effects payment limits have on producers.

Almost all general farm organizations, including PCG, advocate elimination of payment limits on program benefits.

PCG's message to the GAO representatives was clear - payment limits unfairly impact growers. PCG pointed out that payment limits act mainly to keep growers from getting the full measure of protection farm programs are supposed to provide.

Also questioned list by the GAO team was how generic certificates affect growers, markets and the government. PCG noted that generic certificates simply allow growers to realize a minimum price level on 100 percent of their production.

PCG representatives noted that the marketing loan, in combination with certificates, act to save the government money by stopping loan forfeitures and preventing the government from having to market large

quantities of old crop cotton in direct competition with growers trying to sell their newly harvested crops the next year.

Old crop cotton that has been stored and forfeit to the government incurs additional costs and brings less money on the open market creating significant government costs.

Congressional leaders agreed Wednesday to a far-reaching 10-year budget package that should prove beneficial to an ailing U.S. Agriculture industry. The Budget Conference agreement is scheduled for a floor vote in the House on May 8 with the Senate voting on the measure following House action.

Of the \$79 billion approved in the deal \$5.5 billion will be available for assistance paid before October 1, 2001 while the balance of \$73.5 billion is earmarked for program spending in the 2002-2011 time frame. Current baseline budget figures allow \$65.8 billion for the 2002-2011 time frame.

What this means is that Agriculture programs for the period will be funded from a

pot totaling some \$139.3 billion from 2002-2011. In the agreement Congress also retains the ability to tap into the remaining \$66.15 billion Farm Bill Reserve as necessary between 2002 and 2011.

The \$5.5 billion earmarked for distribution in FY2001 is similar to the amount used to provide supplemental AMTA payments in FY2000. It is also important to note that any extra 2001 crop assistance that may be necessary would be provided from FY2002 funds.

The budget deal, which outlines Congressional budget baselines that determine government program spending levels, reinforced the often voiced commitment by legislators to develop long-term solutions for agriculture.

The final deal added 23 percent more than approved by the Senate in its budget package and is expected to meet the House Budget Committee's goal of providing adequate funding to create sound, legislative policy in the next farm bill.

Memorial services for Gwendolyn (Lynn) Chitwood Armstrong, 76, were conducted Wednesday, May 9, 2001, at Our Lady of the Assumption Catholic Church in Decatur, with minister Gonzo Morales officiating.

Burial was in White Chapel Cemetery, Wichita, Kansas.

She passed away Sunday, May 6, 2001, at Newark, Texas.

Gwendolyn was born July 9, 1924, at Dodge City, Kansas. She was a retired word processor for the Veterans Administration Hospital in Denver. She was a previous owner of the Friona Hotel and later the

Sands Motel in Bovina.

A member of the Catholic Church, Mrs. Armstrong was also a pilot, and was a member of the "99ers Club."

She was preceded in death by a grandson, Phillip Jesko, and a brother, Louis B. Seaton, Jr.

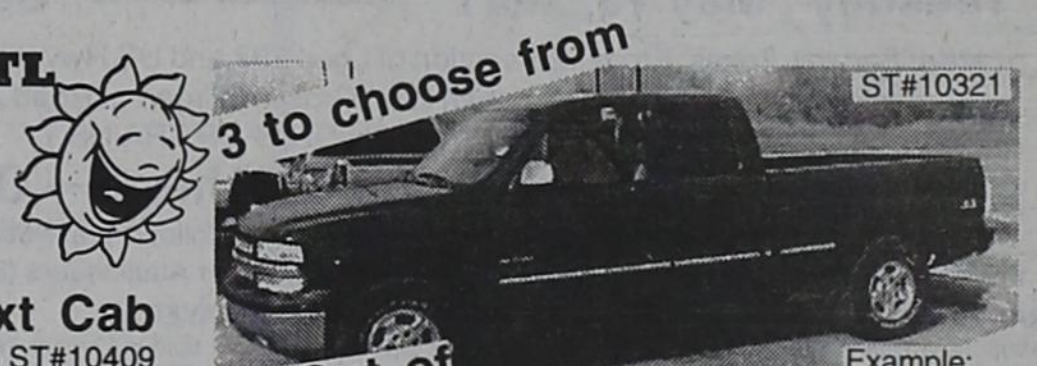

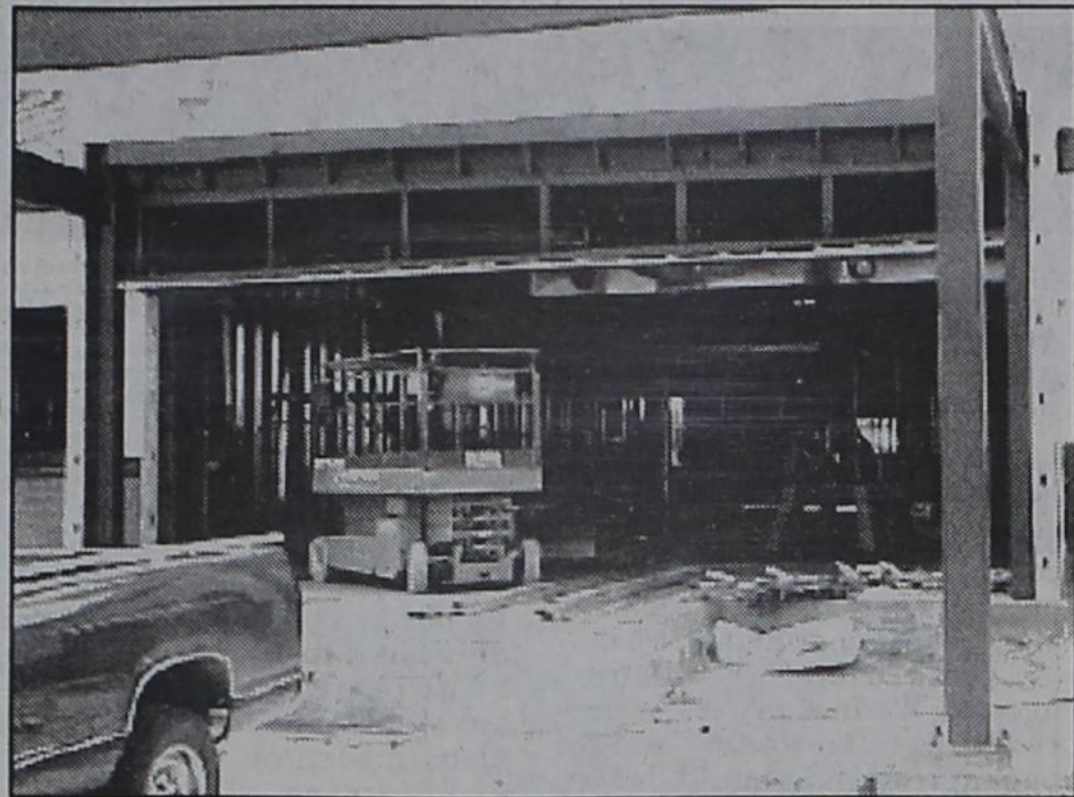

Area Gets Wonderful Rain--Helps Outlook

The local area received a "picturebook" rain last Friday, measuring from four to six inches, with most places getting at least five inches.

The measurement at Parmer County's official gauge in Friona came to 4.64 inches. That total boosted the year's rainfall to 10.55 inches, and boosted confidence in the area's farming community.

Although the rain, good as it was, came too late to benefit much of the dryland wheat crop, it re-charged the ground moisture, and laid down enough moisture for planting rowcrops, and should be more than enough to get a crop up and growing.

The best part about last Friday's rain was the fact that it fell so slowly, with virtually all of the moisture being beneficial.

Most folks agreed that the rain began to fall at about 2:30 a.m. on Friday. By 8 a.m. in Friona, an even three inches had been measured. The rain was the hardest as it first began to fall, as is usually the case with thundershowers, and the early-morning hours were

punctuated with lightning and thunder rolling.

The rain continued to fall very slowly, stopping for awhile, then starting back up until finally quitting at about 2 p.m.--almost exactly 12 hours from the start. The official gauge caught another 1.64 inches of rain from 8 a.m. to the end of the rain.

Last week's rain was the most moisture to fall in a 24-hour period in quite some time.

On October 31-November 1, 1998, the county's gauge recorded 4.52 inches, but that rain came in a shorter period, and was not nearly as beneficial, besides the fact that it delayed harvest activities, particularly the cotton crop.

The recent rain raised the total for Calendar 2001 to 10.55 inches. At this point in the year 2000, the rain totaled just 4.02 inches, or 6.33 inches less. In fact, the 2000 totals were still less than ten inches, at 9.13, through the month of September. The year's total finally came to 15.22 inches, bailed out by a wet October

which produced 3.61 inches of moisture.

Here's how the rainfall breaks down for 2001 as follows: January: 1.66 inches; February: .83 inches; March: 2.55 inches; April, .04 inches, and May: 4.64 inches.

It's been a mostly mild week since the rain, finally topping out at 88 degrees on Thursday. The week's temperatures were as follows:

Friday, May 4: 52-41; Saturday, May 5: 69-45; Sunday, May 6: 75-48; Monday, May 7: 71-51; Tuesday, May 8: 74-54; Wednesday, May 9: 85-55; Thursday, May 10: 88-59.

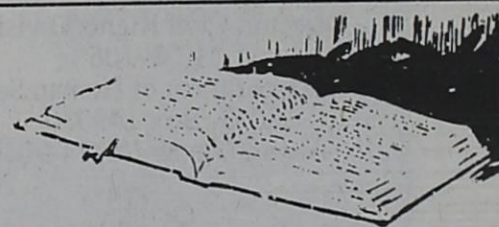

Frank A. Spring Rites Set Here Saturday

Memorial services for Frank A. Spring, 93, will be held Saturday, May 12 at 11 a.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Friona, with Rev. Don Boren, pastor, officiating.

A private burial was scheduled at Friona Cemetery.

Spring passed away Wednesday, May 9, 2001, at his home in Friona.

He married Ethel Ruth Collins October 3, 1937 in Canyon. She died March 15, 1995.

Spring was a charter member of the Friona Evening Lions, (1941), and had been a member of Friona Masonic Lodge for 65 years.

He had been a member of Friona's First United Methodist Church since 1925. He was president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce in 1962.

Spring held the distinction of having the first registered birth certificate in Parmer County, which was organized the year he was born.

Frank Augustus Spring was born October 9, 1907, on the family's farm eight miles north of Bovina. His father, Frank Lewis Spring, rode the train to Parmer County at the invitation of Southwest Land Company of Chicago, which was one of the companies involved in selling off plots of the old XIT Ranch after the sprawling ranch had sold.

Spring was the first child of F. L. and Ocie Adams Spring. In 1916, the family moved into Bovina, so the children could attend school more easily.

The Springs had four more sons, Edward (1908), Paul (1916), Floyd Lee (1919) and Thomas Lewis, who died shortly after his birth in 1913. They had daughters Mary (1911) and Lydia Marie (1921).

After graduating from Bovina High School, Frank enrolled in the new college at Lubbock, Texas Tech College, which was beginning its second year. He graduated in 1930.

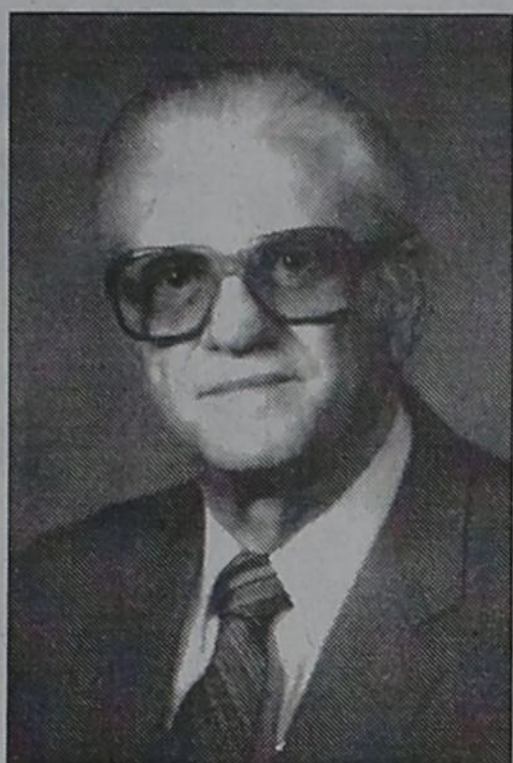
He began his banking career in the early 1930s at Friona State Bank, where he said he did everything from bookkeeping to janitorial work.

Spring's wife Ethel Ruth had begun teaching in Friona in 1933, and was a bank customer. At the time he married, Frank was working for the International-Harvester Co., and later managed a Chevrolet dealership in Muleshoe.

Spring returned to Friona to operate an insurance agency which later became Ethridge-Spring Agency, with the late Dan Ethridge.

In 1944, Spring joined Fred Carson, J.G. McFarland, Sloan Osborn and J.R. Roden in purchasing Friona State Bank. He was elevated to president of the bank in 1948, and held the position until his retirement in 1973.

Very active in civic work,

Spring was honored as Friona's "Man of the Year" in 1964. He served as a member of the Finance Commission of Texas in 1953, appointed by Gov. Allen Shivers, and was a member of the Rural America Committee of the American Bankers Assn.

Since his retirement, Spring has spent a lot of time traveling, and pursuing his favorite hobby--fishing. His son Frank L. Spring II has accompanied his father on many fishing expeditions,

particular to Alaska. Salmon has been his main catch in Alaska, where he returned home each time with enough iced-down fish to share with relatives and friends, as well as re-stocking his own freezer.

Spring had just returned home from fishing at Ute Lake at the time of his death.

He also fished in the ocean and had caught halibut between 15 and 40 feet long.

Preferring to eat at home rather than eating out, Frank had to "hone" his cooking skills after the death of his wife, but stuck with his routine.

In a 1997 interview with Bill Ellis, on the occasion of his 90th birthday, Frank said "I have been blessed with wonderful health. If the doctors were depending on me for their support, they would have been bad off."

Survivors include a daughter, Mary T. Isaac of Colorado Springs, Colorado, a son, Frank Lewis Spring of Albuquerque; a sister, Lydia M. Silvester of Pine Top, Arizona, and a brother, Dr. Paul Spring of Friona.

Also surviving are four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

with Prime Time Christian Broadcasting of Midland (Channel 18 here).

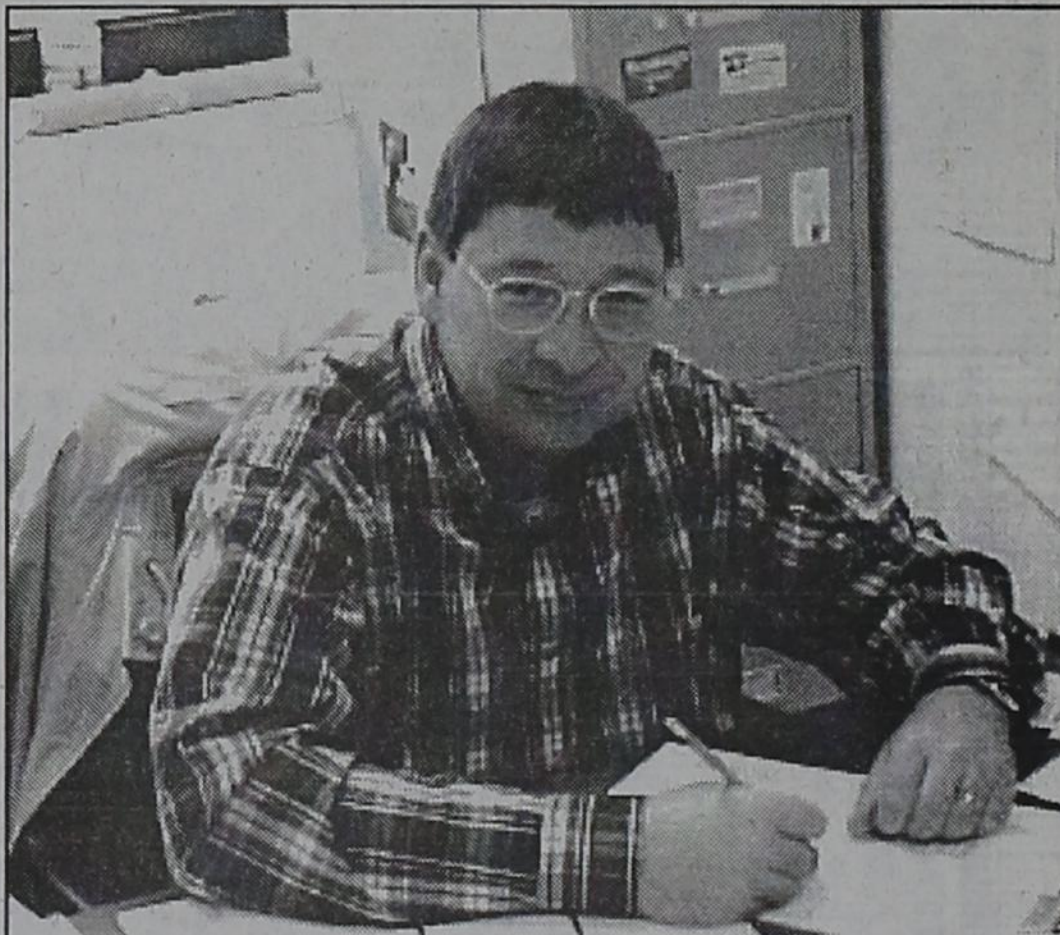
They did Bible studies and toured Israel. Sue said she would never read her Bible the same way after being to some of the actual places where the events took place.
