Sutton County in new Congressional District

As of January 3, 1993, Sutton County will no longer fall in District 21. The entire county will be in the newly formed District 23. Due to a long drawn out redistricting process, the U.S. congressional lines in Texas have been redrawn by the Texas Legislature. A three judge panel agreed with the new legislative divisions.

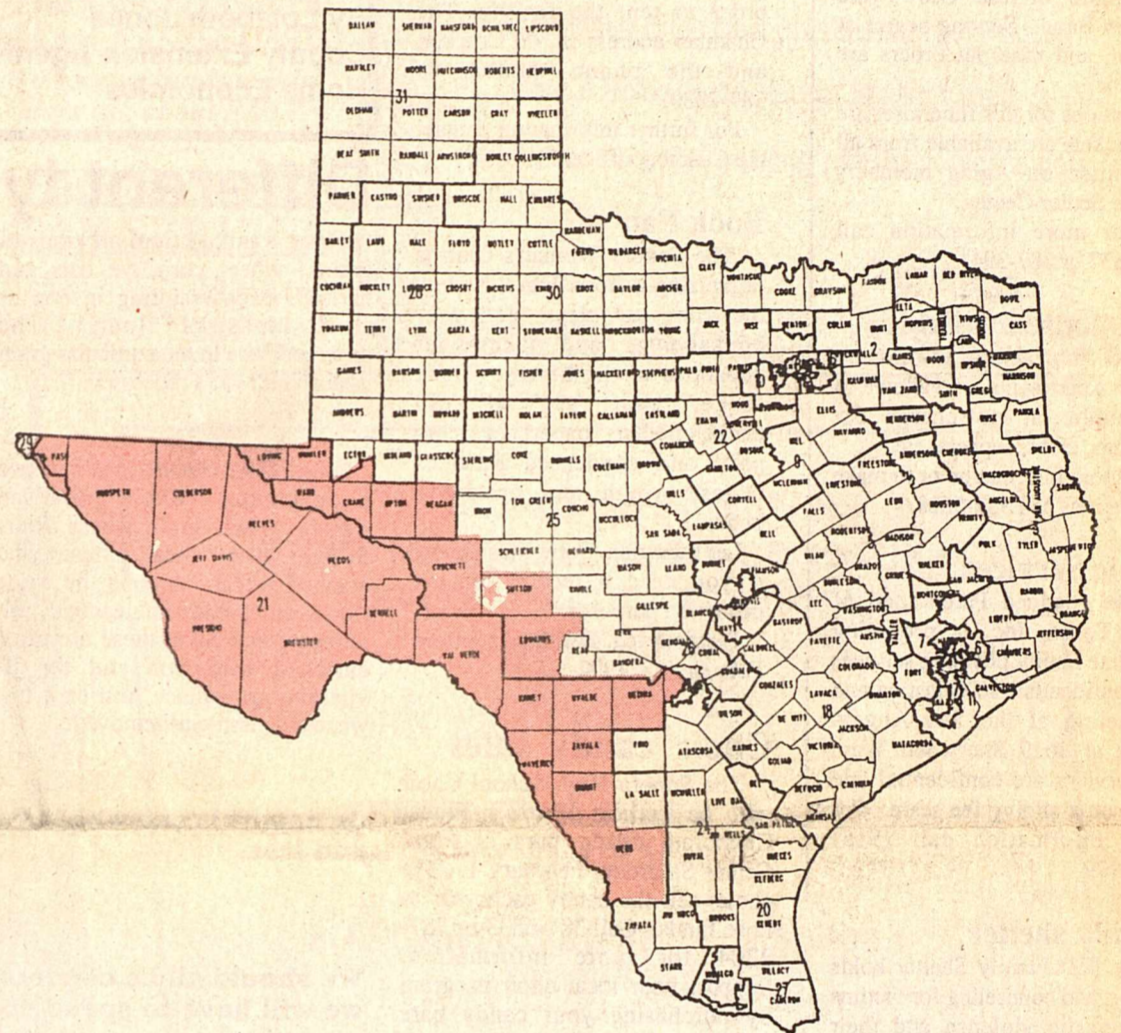
Our present congressman Lamar Smith will continue to serve the existing district through his term which ends January 3, 1993. The elections for the Congressional Representative of the newly formed 23rd district will be held in November 1992.

Bustamante from San Antonio (current Congressman for the now existing 23rd District) will be running on the democratic ticket. In this election Bustamante will be facing Clayton H. The candidates for the Republican Primary ticket are: Henry Bonilla (from San Antonio), and Dick Bowen (from Alpine).

Any resident wishing to vote in the primary must be registered 30 days prior to the election. Prospective voters should register at the Sutton County Tax Assessor's Office in the county annex building before February 8 in order to vote in the March Primary.

Commissioners discuss changes at arena Hours could increase at county library

In a previous meeting of the Sutton County Commissioners, Sonora Woman's Club president, Sharon Holman, presented a plan to keep the library open additional hours without extra expense to the county. In this weeks meeting county librarian, Florie Mesa, presented a schedule for new library hours.

Cheree Fitzgerald, representing mothers of school age children, informed commissioners of the need for after 5:00 library hours, and the importance of Saturday access to the library. Several options were discussed.

County Judge, Carla Garner stated she and the commissioners would gladly view a schedule to accommodate the needs of the school and citizens of Sutton County. Mesa agreed to later hours as long as enough hours would be allowed. Another library time schedule will be presented and viewed in the future.

Commissioners were informed of a request made by Mickey Powers, representing the Sutton

County Days Association. The association would like to move the chain link fence to enclose the arena area only. This change would allow people to access the arena parking lot without any charge during arena activities. More facts will be presented on the matter at a later date.

In other business commissioners resolved to participate in the Texas Department of Commerce Title 2 Supplemental Housing Program. The program will consider receiving any rental property to qualify for supplemented renters. This will be a 5 year contract adding \$7,000 to the county funds with no tax increase.

Different types of flour

Flour is milled from all kinds of grains - wheat, corn, rye, oats, and barley - each resulting in one or more kinds of flour. The differences lie in the particular grain used and how it's processed.

Wheat flours are divided into two basic groups: whole grain and white. Whole-grain wheat flours include whole wheat, graham, and cracked wheat. Among the white flours are bread, unbleached, all-purpose, and cake; these are often enriched with iron and the B-vitamins to replace nutrients lost when the germ was removed.

Wheat flours also vary in protein content. Protein is important when it comes to how a flour performs during baking. When mixed with a liquid, protein forms a substance called gluten, which gives elasticity to batters and doughs, as well as provides the structure or framework for whatever you're baking. In addition, gluten affects the tenderness and volume of baked products. The white flours have more protein (more gluten) than whole-grains.

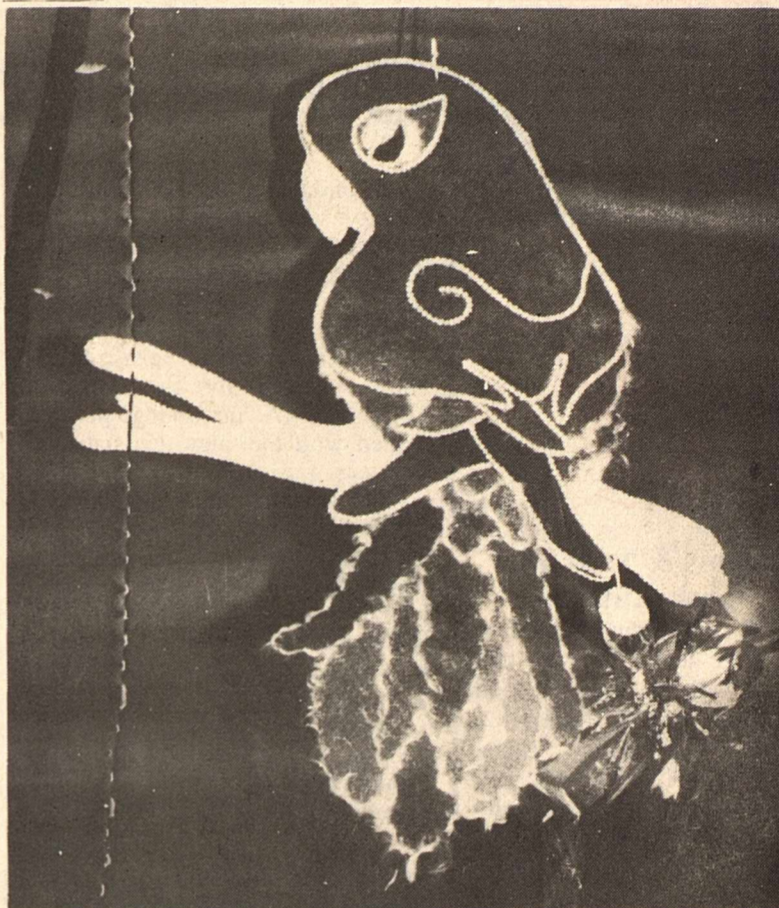
Bread flour is a hard-wheat flour milled especially for breadmaking. It can be hard to find, but all-purpose flour can be substituted.

Schleicher County Medical Center awarded institutional conversion grant

Schleicher County Medical Center was awarded a \$26,231 Institutional Conversion Grant. Exxon and the State of Texas funded the grant which will be matched by the county to total \$52,462. Schleicher County Medical Center participated in an Energy Audit determining a need to replace the existing heating and air conditioning units. Medical Center administrator, Jim Blum, estimates that these replacements have a total pay back of less than 10 years in energy savings.

Schleicher County Medical Center Board approved to expand medical services. The new applications that were accepted are: Dr. Don Cook-Urologist, Dr. Pat Gibson-General and Vascular

Surgeon, Dr. Bruce Heare-Gastroenterologist. Staff privileges will also be added for 2 Nurse Anesthetist. The medical center will be having special monthly clinics to further develop outpatient surgical service procedures.

Administrator Blum states, "Schleicher County Medical Center will be providing specialty services to a population of all ages that historically had to travel a significant distance. Now we are able to provide these services in a rural health care environment. Schleicher County Medical Center will continue to be on the forefront of providing quality health care services to the people of West Texas." These special services are scheduled to begin in February.

Medicare open enrollment in progress

Between now and April 1st, eligible people can sign up for Medicare medical insurance.

The open enrollment period is set aside each year to allow people to change their minds if they never signed up for medical insurance or had it before and dropped it.

Medical insurance helps pay doctor bills, outpatient hospital services not covered by the hospital insurance part of Medicare.

For people who enroll now, medical insurance protection starts July 1st. The basic premium rate

this year is \$31.80 a month. It is increased by 10 percent for each year a person could have had it but was not enrolled.

Questions about Medicare can be answered by calling the Medicare toll-free telephone number, 1-800-888-1770. To sign up for medical insurance or get other Social Security information, people should contact Social Security.

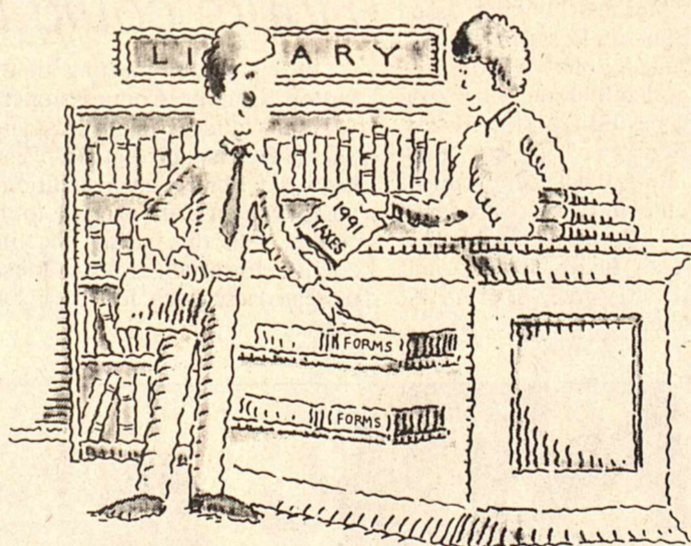

Choose the Form that Fits



Continuing tax changes make it possible for many taxpayers to file simpler returns. Although you may receive in the mail this year the same type of form you used to file last year, you should review your tax situation to see if filing a different form is necessary or more beneficial.

Generally, use the green "EZ" form (1040EZ) if your filing status is single; you are under 65; you are not blind; you claim no dependents; your taxable income is less than \$50,000 and is only from wages, salaries, tips, taxable scholarship and fellowship grants, and certain interest of \$400 or less; and you do not itemize deductions, claim any adjustments or credits, or owe any other taxes than amounts from the tax table.

If you do not qualify to use Form 1040EZ, use the pink "short form" (1040A) if your income is only from wages, salaries, tips, taxable scholarship and fellowship grants, certain interest, dividends, pensions, annuities, IRAs, social security and unemployment compensation; your taxable income is less than \$50,000; you do not itemize deductions; your only adjustment to income is for certain contributions to an IRA; your only credits are the credit for child and dependent care expenses, credit for the elderly or disabled, and the earned income credit; and, your only other tax is for advance earned income credit payments.

From a tax savings standpoint, use the blue "long form" (1040) if you have itemized deductions that exceed your standard deductions and have adjustments to income or credits that you cannot take on Form 1040A or Form 1040EZ. You must use Form 1040 if your taxable income is \$50,000 or more; you had certain types of income such as capital gains, self-employment earnings, rents or royalties; you itemize deductions or claim certain tax credits or adjustments to income; and you owe other taxes or claim certain additional payments.

Choosing the simplest tax form that fits your tax situation:

- may save you time if you are able to use one of the shorter forms,
- reduces the possibility of errors,
- could get you a faster refund if you can file Form 1040EZ, and
- can put your tax dollars to better use; filing simpler tax forms helps the IRS reduce the cost of processing and storing the returns.

See your tax package to help you choose the best form. If you have not received a tax package in the mail, you may order forms and instructions by calling 1-800-829-3676. For recorded information, call the IRS Tele-Tax service at 1-800-829-4477 and select topic number 152, "Which Form—1040, 1040A or 1040EZ?"

February 2-8 designated as Public Health Week

February 2-8, 1992 has been proclaimed as Public Health Week in Texas. Public health focuses on preventive health care strategies including education, surveillance, and intervention when necessary.

The Texas Department of Health has been providing these services in our community for many years. The health department has programs for environmental health, dental treatment and education, nutrition education, communicable diseases control, Chronically Ill and Disabled Children, Emergency Medical Services, health education, medical facility licensure and certification, and nursing services.

The Sonora Field Office is an important provider of valuable public health services for the community. Some of the services provided include child and adult health, family planning, maternity care, nutrition and education programs for women, infants and children (WIC), sexually transmitted disease testing and counseling, education, and vision-hearing and speech-testing.

Family violence: what can you do

If she decides to leave
The first place your friend should contact is the local domestic violence hotline or battered women's shelter. Shelter workers can help her examine her options. If she decides to leave, a shelter may be the safest place she can go. The sad truth, however, is that not all communities have shelters of safe houses. Sometimes shelters don't have enough room for all the women and children who need their help. The ICD Family Shelter never turns down anyone who needs their services.

If you decide to offer your home
be very careful. The battered women frequently faces the most physical danger when she attempts to flee. Be very discreet and talk to domestic violence program staff about the best way to handle this.

When to intervene
It cannot be overemphasized that domestic violence is a crime that can result in serious physical injury and even death. If you are a neighbor or otherwise know that a battering incident is occurring, call the police immediately. Calling the police does not always mean the abuser will be put in jail. It is simply the most effective way to protect the woman and her children from immediate harm.

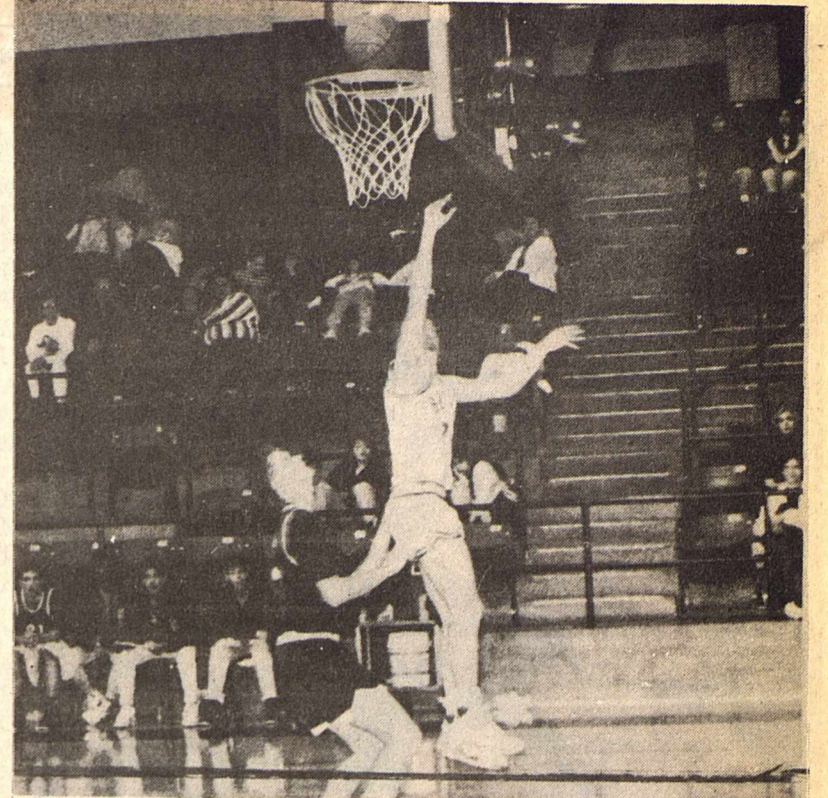

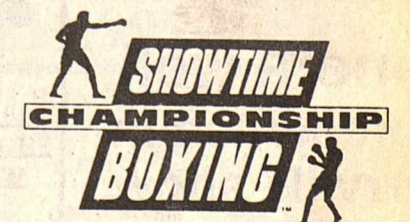

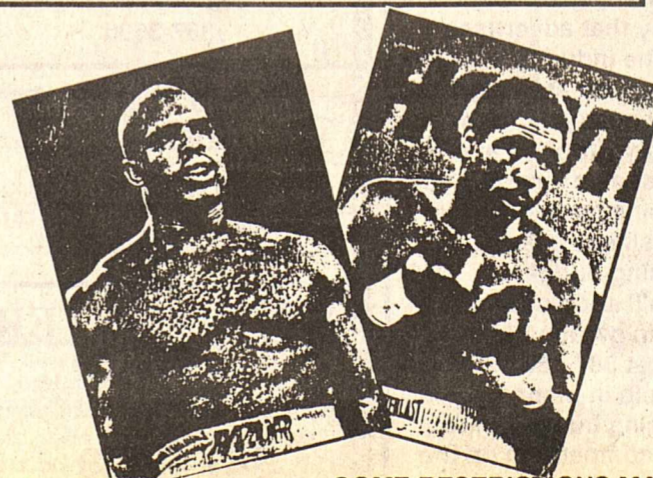

ASCS to administer crop disaster assistance program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood, and other natural disasters in either 1990-91.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said county ASCS official, "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

Producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. (He/She) said that farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. "If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS office."

A producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS office.

Mrs. Brown was preceded in death, by her husband, Eddie Albert Brown, on November 3, 1964.

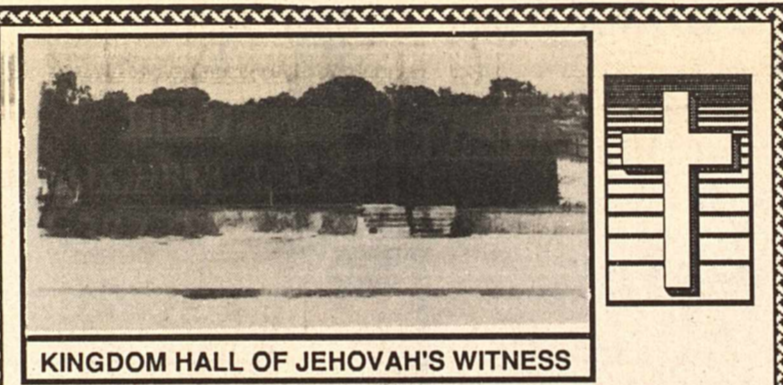
