


"Old Sonora Town" paves way for tourism

If one were to read the papers and listen to the news, you would think our local state and national economy were headed toward disaster. If that's true, we should try to turn our steering wheel one direction or the other and avoid the impending wreck. The tourist revenue that we have available via Interstate 10.

A comparative analysis of what a merchant of Sonora faces:

We have 2600 people in Sonora and 1/2 of these people are children. This leaves 1300 adults - 1/2 of which are married to the other 1/2. This makes 650 households. Slightly over 2/3 of our population purchase the major portion of their goods in San Angelo. Therefore Sonora merchants are looking at less than 200 potential customers a

The Interstate has 5,000 vehicles a day passing through Sonora - each and everyday the full potential would be 5,000 vehicles x 2.3 people x 365 days a year = 4,197,500 potential customers a year. If we could get 1% to spend the night in Sonora, this would be 41,975 new customers a year at going to existing Sonora businesses.

It appears there are nearly 1/2 again as many vehicles on highway 277. At this time, consideration for the route of Insterstate 27 is under consideration. If Sonora should be the intersection of two major interstate systems, this would even be better.

With the Free Trade Treaty coming into effect, it seems that the logical route for Interstate 27, after it leaves San Angelo, would be to link up with the nearest active Maquilladora Program which would be Acuna. The main consideration is currently through Eden and Junction. It looks like someone better present some logic to the interstate powers.







Childers attends convention

John R. Devil's River News of people from Sutton County involved in World War I as extensive as the coverage that was given to the Desert Storm troops?

American active participation in WWI began after President Wilson's "War Message" on April 2, 1917. Congress immediately declared war. The Senate approved this declaration on April 4th and the House on April 6th. On May 18, 1917 the Selective Service Act was adopted.

An Armistice was signed, in a railroad car, at Compiegne, France on November 11, 1918. The final peace treaty, called the Treaty of Versailles was signed in June of

We have on file, only 2 papers for 1917 and 1918. We have almost all of 1919's papers. In the 1919 papers we find many letters from servicemen telling their war experiences. Some go into great detail regarding rank, place stationed, activities in area, etc. We are reprinting the following letter as an example:

Was reporting in old issues of the St. Mazairl, France, December 15,

Steve Murphy, Sonora, Texas. How is everybody in dear old Sonora? The best town in the world. Best wishes for a happy and prosperous New Year.

Over here it rains nearly every day now. Did the same when we were in Bordeaux Quite different from home.

We are all well and happy. This is our third trip to France and a different port each time. Came by England the first trip. Spent the 4th of July in Harve and was in New York November 11. Wish you could have been there. I never saw such a happy and large crowd in my life and won't forget that day on my 100th birthday.

Johnnie Martin and I were together a couple of times while in New York last trip. I saw J. D. Hill, U. S. N. and Lieut. Payne Robinson U. S. A., of Eldorado also. Hope to see some of the Sonora boys over here before

\$1,429,097 last year for major coupons. welfare programs in Sutton County, according to Ray L. Dunavant, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$456,268 spent for families and children and \$233,317 for the aged and disabled for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, X-ray and other services. Also, \$10,803 was spent for families and children and \$55,933 for the aged and disabled in Sutton County for prescribed medicines.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$322,364 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$103,406," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$233,582 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDS) totaled \$23,424. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of



There were 6 investigations in adult protective services. These investigations concerned reports of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of elderly or disabled adults.





Social Security-

Problems may await people whose name and Social Security number on bank records do not match their name and/or number on IRS records. This problem often occurs when a woman marries or divorces and takes a new surname but does not change her name on her Social Security records.

Banks and other financial institutions send out Form 1099 (Report of Interest and Other Income) to customers whose accounts earned interest during the last year. The taxpayer uses the form to report interest income on his or her federal income tax return. IRS uses the information to match against its records and the taxpayer's tax return.

If the bank records and government records don't match, banks and other financial institutions send out letters asking customers to take care of the problem. Sometimes the problem may be the result of a simple typing mistake in the number. So,

when a customer receives such a letter for the first time, he or she should first check their Social Security card against the name and Social Security number on the letter. If the card shows the name correctly and the name and/or number on the letter differs, the customer only has to notify the bank of the correct name and

However, if the Social Security card needs to be corrected, the customer must contact the Social Security Administration.

Either way, customers have 30 days to tell the bank they have corrected the problem or the bank will withhold 20 percent of the interest on the account until the problem is resolved.




