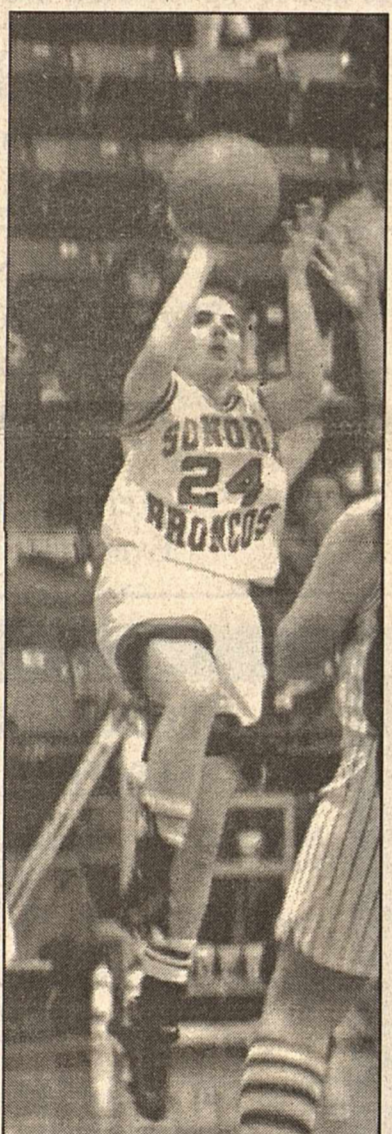

Sonora's Varsity ladies beat Reagan County 58-53 in Tuesday night's game. Despite strong first half finishes on Sonora's part, Reagan County closed in during the second half in what made for exciting basketball.

The Lady Broncos played strong, confident ball amid embattled fights under the basket. Prominently "in the zone" were Pam Jones and Kelly Harrelson from the outside during the fourth quarter. Hospital Board in Search of Physcian

The regular meeting of the Sutton County Hospital District, Board of Directors, was held on Monday, January 23, 1997, of the Hospital.

Discussion was held regarding the bad debt charge-off list for November 1996. Mr. Goodrich reported that all of these accounts had been through the regular procedure for in-house collection efforts, beginning with collection letters and then telephone calls. Motion was made by Ray Smith, seconded by Ben Solis, to approve the bad debt charge-off list for November, 1996, to be sent to collection, in the amount of \$20,349.

Motion was made by Ray Smith, seconded by Ben Solis, to reappoint the Medical Staff for 1997, which consists of Charles R. Pajestka, M.D., Alvin L. Gutierrez, M.D., Nick M. Jackson, M.D., Bernard Rust, D.D.S., and W. Gordon McGee, upon recommendation of the Medical Staff. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Lewis Allen, seconded by Claire Powers Richards, to reappoint Charles R. Pajestka, M.D. as Chief of Staff for 1997, upon recommendation from the Medical Staff.

Mr. Goodrich advised that the Hospital District is on the agenda for the January Legislature to increase the tax cap to 30 cents pending approval of the Board. After discussion at the December 9, 1996, board meeting, the Board felt like the tax cap will need to be raised to 35 cents to cover the projected decrease in mineral values in the next 5-10 years. Mr. Goodrich has talked with Glenna Hodge, assistant to Representative Robert Turner, before the Board meeting that was scheduled for January 13, 1997, and she felt that there would be no problem in changing the tax cap from 30 to 35 cents. Raising the tax cap to 35 cents means that the Board of Directors could go to the voters to ask them to approve increased taxes to a maximum of 35 cents if this becomes necessary. Motion was made by Ray Smith, seconded by Claire Powers

Richards to request the Legislature to approve the 35 cents tax cap.

Dr. Goodrich reported that he is still waiting on approval from the Board to pursue plans for the Hospital Based Home Health Agency. Mr. Goodrich predicts a loss of approximately \$2,075 for the first year, which is to be expected with any type of new business, due to start-up expenses that will take a while to equal. Dr. Pajestka stated that he is willing to back a HBHH Agency as long as it is run properly and according to regulations. Motion was made by Ben Solis, seconded by Lewis Allen, to establish a Hospital Based Home Health Agency. Motion carried with Ben Solis, Lewis Allen, Carol Parker and Claire Powers Richards voting yes, Ray Smith voting nay and Lee Bloodworth voting by proxy. Mr. Goodrich stated that the HBHH Agency cannot be established without extensive groundwork, and he has some negotiating points with Mr. Wood. Mr. Goodrich will draw up a plan and present it to the Board so that the Board will be aware of everything that is going on.

Quarterly Quality Assurance Report from the Hospital was given by Ram Perez. Discussion was held regarding monitoring of unsigned nursing entries, and Ram explained the procedure for this. Joint Conference Committee Report was given by Ray Smith.

Sarah Kennel, Director of Nursing in the Nursing Facility, reported that two residents in the nursing facility had expired this month, and there were two new admissions. Things are going well overall. There are only 3 or 4 infections in the facility at the present time, which are UTI's. There are no URI's at the present time. There have been problems in the last couple of weeks with CNA's being out for illness either in themselves or their families. The Board expressed their appreciation for the good job Ms. Kennel is doing in the nursing home.

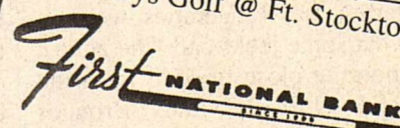

We didn't have any other questions this week so we thought we would take a look back at *The Devil's River News* of Friday, February 7, 1947.

Lt. (jg) Jack Osborne Crites, USNR, of Sonora, Texas, son of Mrs. Pearl Adell McLain Crites, has received a permanent citation for the Air Medal from Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal, for the President.

Lt. (jg) Crites, currently serving with the Pacific Fleet, earned the award in aerial flight against the enemy during anti-

submarine patrols in the Bay of Biscay from January 15, 1944 to May 9, 1944.

The Ozona boys beat Sonora in basketball 22-20 but the Sonora girls volleyball team evened things up with a 42-19 victory over Ozona.

Mr. R.E. Fleetwood, formerly of Sonora, died in San Angelo and will be buried in Belvedere Cemetery.

Miss Phoebe Ann Pearson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Pearson, became the bride of Robert Valliant Kelley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Kelley of Sonora, Saturday evening, February 1, in a candlelight ceremony in Westminster Presbyterian Church, in Beaumont.

At the Sonora Grocery run by George E. (Bud) Smith and R.D. (Ralph) Trainer you could find the following specials: chuck roast 33¢ a pound, long-horn cheese 55¢ a pound, unsliced slab bacon 58¢ a pound, and dry summer sausage 48¢ a pound. No. 1 Idaho russets were

10 pounds for 49¢, California lettuce was 10¢ a head, East Texas kiln dried yams were 10¢ a pound, cabbage 5¢ a head, fresh tomatoes 15¢ a pound, carrots 5¢ a large bunch, winesap or delicious apples 13¢ a pound and seedless Texas grapefruit were 33¢ a dozen.

At Lyles & Rape Tire Company, in the Penick Building you could find the following bargains: 3 ton hydraulic jacks for \$11.95, 5 ton hydraulic jacks for \$13.95, lug wrenches \$1.45, flashlight batteries 5¢ each, and oil filter cartridges 79¢. A 600x16 - 4 ply tire sold for \$13.79 and a 1100 x 20 - 12 ply tire sold for \$81.95.

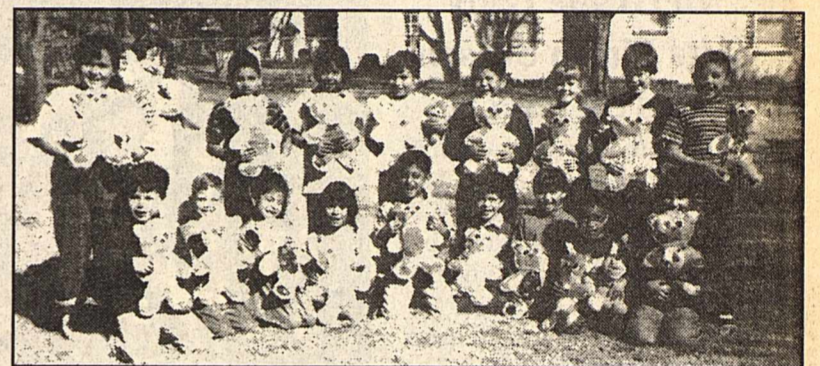

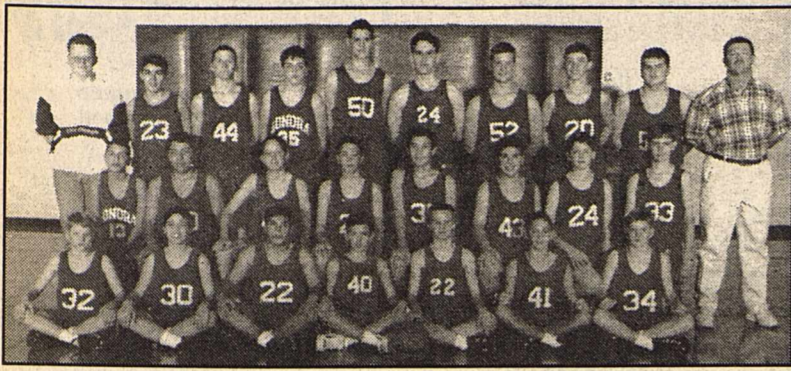

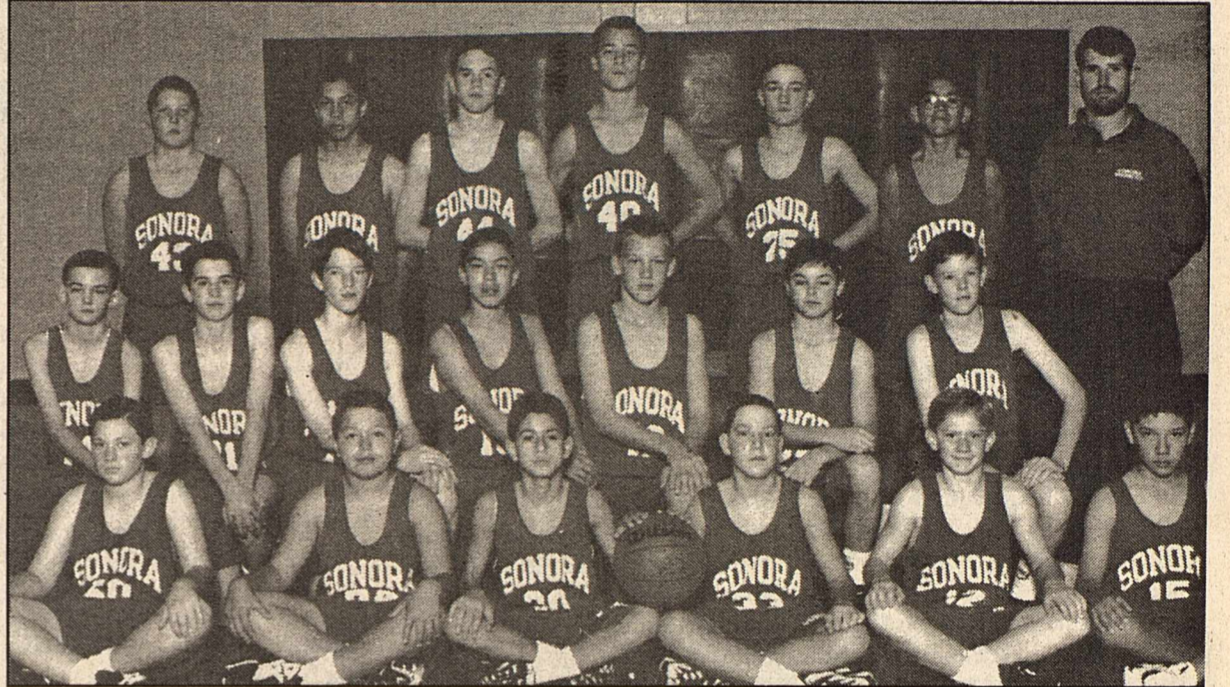

eral contract proposals he has received from physician recruiters and the large number of CV's he is receiving from physicians. Most of the physicians sending the CV's are foreign physicians. The Board of Directors reviewed the CV's and asked Mr. Goodrich to contact several of the physicians to see if they are still interested in coming to Sonora to meet with the Board of Directors

Mr. Goodrich stated that 1997 is starting out with some unexpected expenses, including physician recruitment fees for an estimated \$15,000-\$20,000, elevator repair and upgrading for \$8,000, and an upgrading program for the IBM computer system for \$7,000. None of these expenses were budgeted for 1997. Dr. Johnson stated that he has received word this week that when Community Hospital sold their assets to Columbia, Community has about 45 million dollars in the form of a foundation on which they are just starting to take applications for grants. The money is to be used for health care in the Concho Valley area. It is the consensus of the Board of Directors that the Hospital District should apply for a grant for physician recruiting expenses, elevator repairs, and any other available funds. Dr. Johnson will obtain information on how and where to apply for a grant from the Community Hospital Foundation.

We had another excellent sale this last Saturday with a continued increase in prices for all classes of livestock. Our cattle numbers continued to increase, as did the number of new larger volume buyers. Two of the newer buyers stated they would be here each week if we continue to have the runs like we had Saturday. This is great news! We have the buyers, and we ask that the producers keep consigning their livestock to us to keep the buyers coming. Keep in mind that we have the least expensive rates and offer the best sales prices in the area. Reduce your losses and shrinkage by trading locally with Sonora Livestock Auction.

Cattle: #1 steers 300-400 lbs \$85.00-\$90.00 per hundred, #2 steers 300-400 lbs \$71-\$81.00 per hundred; 400-500 weight steers 1's and 2's \$68 - \$81.00 per hundred; 400-500 weight steers 1's and 2's \$68-\$81.00 per hundred; 600 and up \$65-\$75.00 per hundred. Heifers #1 300-400 lbs \$65-\$70 per hundred, #1 and #2 400-500 lbs \$60-\$68 per hundred. 600 lbs. and up heifers #1 and #2's \$55-\$65 per hundred. We did have a truck load of corriente steers average 580 lbs. sell to Oklahoma buyer at \$42.00 per hundred. These cattle lacked the conditioning and feed needed to reflect the actual market. Slaughter cows and bulls continue on their up and down market with this week reflecting a \$2-\$5 per hundred increase. Slaughter cows yield grade #1's \$34-\$39.00 per hundred, fewer cull cows at \$27-\$33 per hundred.

Slaughter bulls sold steady to \$2 higher at \$34-\$48 per hundred.

Sheep and Goats: We had another good week in the Spanish goat market with a continued increase in numbers for the sale. Spanish nannies continue to sell steady with a market of \$56-\$75 per hundred. Spanish kids sold weak to a dollar lower from \$85-\$95 per hundred. Large billies sold steady at \$100-\$145 per head. Baby Spanish kids sold from \$18-\$25 per head. #1 choice lambs still over the \$1 range with a continued increase in numbers, \$99-\$124 per hundred. There seems to be no problem in getting buyers willing to pay these prices, and the demand is stronger for the heavier lambs. Bucks sold at \$45-\$65 per hundred; Slaughter ewes sold from \$49-\$55 per hundred, replacement ewes not enough to establish a trend.

We are starting to see a few Angora beginning to move, but not enough to establish a trend. We did have a set of young nanny kids sell at \$75 per hundred. These lacked the conditioning needed to reflect actual market. Buyers are calling each week asking for numbers.

If you missed this week's sale, you missed one of our biggest. Our yards were full, and we appreciate the confidence shown by the producers and buyers. Dr. Carl Menzies gave a review of membership drive possibilities to increase the current membership. Currently there are 5,000 producers in the association. He discussed the possibility of increasing dues.

Chico Denis reported on Ranchers Lamb of Texas in San Angelo. The plant should be in operation by June or July. Denis encouraged producers to support the facility.

Dr. Butch Taylor spoke about sustaining the ranching industry in the Edwards Plateau, performance testing of sheep and goats at TAES, and conducted a tour of prescribed fire research on TAES. Dr. Taylor's biggest concerns are the sheep referendum and the possibility of trying to recruit meat goat raisers into the association.

Other speakers were Ralph Mayer, Bill Tullos, and Dr. Dan Waldron.
