Commissioners take no toleration stance against littering

At their Dec. meeting, Dr. Johnny Fields presented the Commissioners' Court with pictures of illegal dumping on Bond Road.

which included household garbage and the remains of dead animals. "This is not my job," he declared to the court.

"I felt like nothing was being done about the accumulation of trash," thus his appearance to the commissioners. "If I drive in a town that's not clean, my impression is people in that town don't care. But I know people do care in Sutton County."

TxDOT Engineer, Paul Chevalier, said he pulled every free standing litter barrel with the exception of those at road side picnic areas because they were not being used by travelers. Household trash was being dumped in them. "People are dumping close to town because they know it will get picked up," stated Paul.

"I can't continue to pick up trash, I need your help." TxDot crews spent 100 man hours picking up trash, 60% on Bond Road & 40% on the Ft. McKavett road. "This is not a new problem, it has been going on for over 10 years."

The commissioners agreed there is a problem and they will do something about it.

County Attorney, David Wallace said that the first step is to notify law officers and they will bring an offense report to his office.

Commissioners approved to pay up to \$1000 for information leading to the arrest of offenders through the Crimestoppers fund. Signs will be posted at areas where people have been dumping stating that violators will be punished to the

> It may be the perception of some that since the City of Sonora closed the landfill, disposing of garbage is no longer available at the landfill site. A Customer Convenience Station is located at the entrance. Waste is weighed and charged at \$5 for the first 100 pounds and .05 thereafter.

> Metal, lumber, leaves, tree trimmings, and other items that will fit in the dumpster may be placed in them with the exception of batteries, oil and oil filters, petroleum related products, items containing freon, items containing asbestos, used tires and antifreeze.

Up to \$1000 reward offered catch someone littering

The Sutton County Commissioners' Court has approved of use of the crimestoppers fund to reward those who turn in violators of the Texas Litter Abatement Act. You may be entitled to up to a \$1,000 reward if information you give leads to the arrest and conviction of a person or persons violating the law. Those convicted of the law face severe fines and jail time of up to one (1) year in jail and up to \$4,000 in fines. 

Walter Lewis (Pete) Kinney, 73, passed away December 2 in a San Angelo hospital.



State Rep. Bob Turner first to file for re-election

"You have to get up pretty early to get ahead of Bob Turner," said a disappointed candidate who had intended to be the first for re-election on December 3. Instead, State Rep. Turner was the first state official to signal his intent to run again as the state representative of House District 73. The filing deadline for all candidates is January 3.

"I am more concerned than ever about rural Texans," said Turner. "Our problem are unique and I feel a great responsibility to help the urban members of the Legislature understand that all public policy decisions are not created equal. What may be a great solution for a Houston or Dallas problem may be terrible for Coleman or Bandera or Crane," he continued. "There are only a handful of us in the legislature who are rural landowners and agricultural producers and seasoned public servants. That combination of background and experience is vital to the well

being of rural Texas and I plan to be back for the 76th Legislature doing what I do best for the people I care about most,"Turner said.

Turner, a resident of Voss in Coleman County, entered the Texas Legislature in March 1991 and represented what was then House District 65. This district was changed to House District 73 during legislative redistricting and now includes the following counties: Bandera, Brown, Coleman, Concho, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Kimble, Llano, Mason, Menard, Real, Schleicher, Sutton, Upton, Ward and a portion of southeast Ector County. District 73 is larger in square miles than Vermont, New Hampshire and Rhode Island combined.

Rep. Turner currently serves on the Agriculture and Livestock Committee and is vice chairman of the Land and Resource Management Committee and is considered to be the champion of rural issues and private property rights in the Texas Legislature.


Sardines Found Effective In Fighting Depression

(NAPS)—According to a study by the National Institutes of Health, a diet rich in omega-3 fatty acids may reduce the development of depression in the same way they may reduce coronary artery disease. Cold-water fish, especially sardines, are one of the best sources of omega-3 fatty acids—a key ingredient in fish oil. The study was published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition.

Similarly, the medical director of the Cholesterol Center of Jewish Hospital in Cincinnati found that high triglyceride and cholesterol levels brought on by a diet rich in saturated fats are strongly correlated with the incident of affective disorders, including depression and manic depression as well as with hostility and aggression. Omega-3 fatty acids have been proven to lower both triglyceride and LDL cholesterol levels.

These studies are increased evidence that a diet low in saturated fats and high in essential fatty acids are not only heart-healthy but brain-healthy.

According to Psychology Today, "The old saw about fish being brain food is true; they are rich in omega-3s. Long a proponent of adding more omega-3 rich fatty to the diet as a way to reduce the risk of heart disease, William Connor, M.D. of Oregon State, contends that the special omega-3s in fish oil are tailor-made for the brain."



The National Institutes of Health study points out a strong corollary between depression and coronary heart disease; depression was more strongly associated with coronary artery diseases than with any other personality variables, including the combined measures of type A personality.


According to the study, it stands to reason that "if low omega-3 fatty acid intake contributes to depression, and low omega-3 intake contributes to coronary artery disease, then this hypothesis predicts that depression and coronary artery disease should be positively correlated."
